Coleman County Livestock Show

The Coleman County 4-H and FFA Livestock show and sale is scheduled to kick off at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday morning at the show barns in Coleman next to the rodeo grounds.

There are 572 entries for the show which includes 312 lambs, 173 swine, 65 calves, 21 rabbits and one poultry entry.

Judging will be on Saturday and Sunday, January 11 and 12.

Those showing lambs will be first in the show ring starting at 8:00

a.m. on Saturday. Calves will be judged beginning at 1:00 p.m. or immediately after the lamb judging. Swine judging will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon followed by rabbits and broilers.

The auction will conclude the activities and will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Monday, January 13. The auction will be held at the Coleman County Livestock Auction Commission Company on Highway 84 north of Coleman.

Super Duper Buys Oakes

Announcement was made recently by Don Oakes, of Oakes Foods of Coleman, that he is selling to Super Duper and effective December 30, 1985, the store at 114 Needham Street, Coleman will be a part of the Super Duper chain. Oakes indicated that he will be associated with Super Duper in the future at another location.

New manager for the food store is Jerry Sikes, a Coleman native, who has been employed by the Super Duper chain in Eastland for the past three years. Sikes and his wife,

Janice, have three children, Tracy, 17; Brian, 14; and Corey, 10.

Super Duper, headquartered in Abilene, currently operates eleven stores, including six in Abilene, two in Houston and one each at Clyde, Eastland and Ballinger. The Coleman store will be the 12th and a 13th is under construction in Winters.

The Super Duper chain started in Abilene in 1964 at the South First and Sayles location. James Parker is president of the company. With the announcement of the acquisition of

the Coleman store is the explanation that Super Duper plans to build a new and larger facility here at a later date on the property on South Commercial purchased some time back where the sign is located. People to Get Statement of Benefits

Every person who received or repaid any Social Security benefits during 1985 will receive a Social Security Benefit Statement, Form SSA-1099, during January 1986, Priscilla Ely, Social Security manager in Brownwood, said recently. The form will show the amount of Social Security benefits the person received as well as the amount of benefits they repaid during 1985. The form should be used just as any other 1099 received from a financial institution when the person completes his or her Federal income tax return for 1985, Mrs. Ely said.

shown on the form starting January 2. People who have questions about tax liability or figuring income tax should call the nearest office of the Internal Revenue Service at the number shown on the back of IRS Notice 703 if they cannot find the answer in IRS publications. A free publication—Publication 915—contains a detailed explanation of the entries on the benefit statement and explains about taxability of benefits. A free copy is available at any Social Security or IRS office. The Brownwood Social Security office is located in the 300 North Main Building near the traffic circle. The office is open Monday through Friday, except national holidays, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

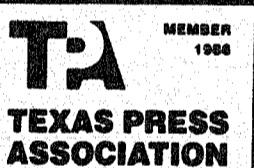

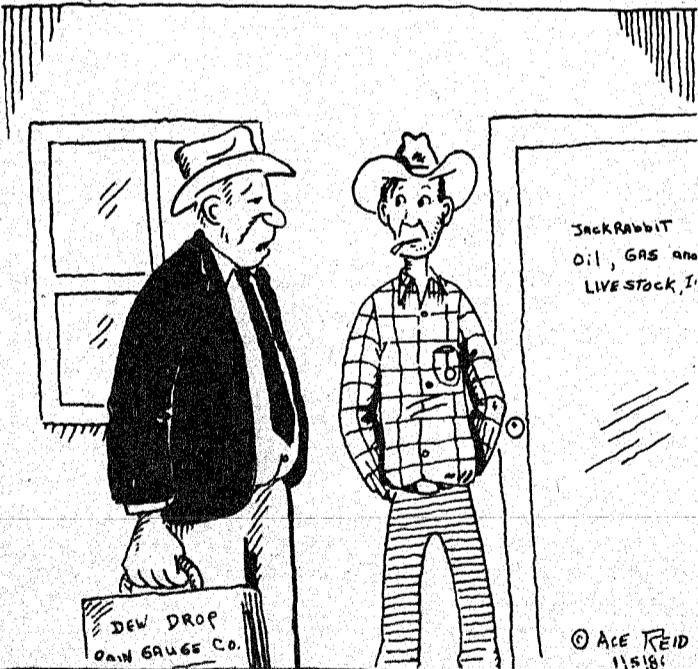

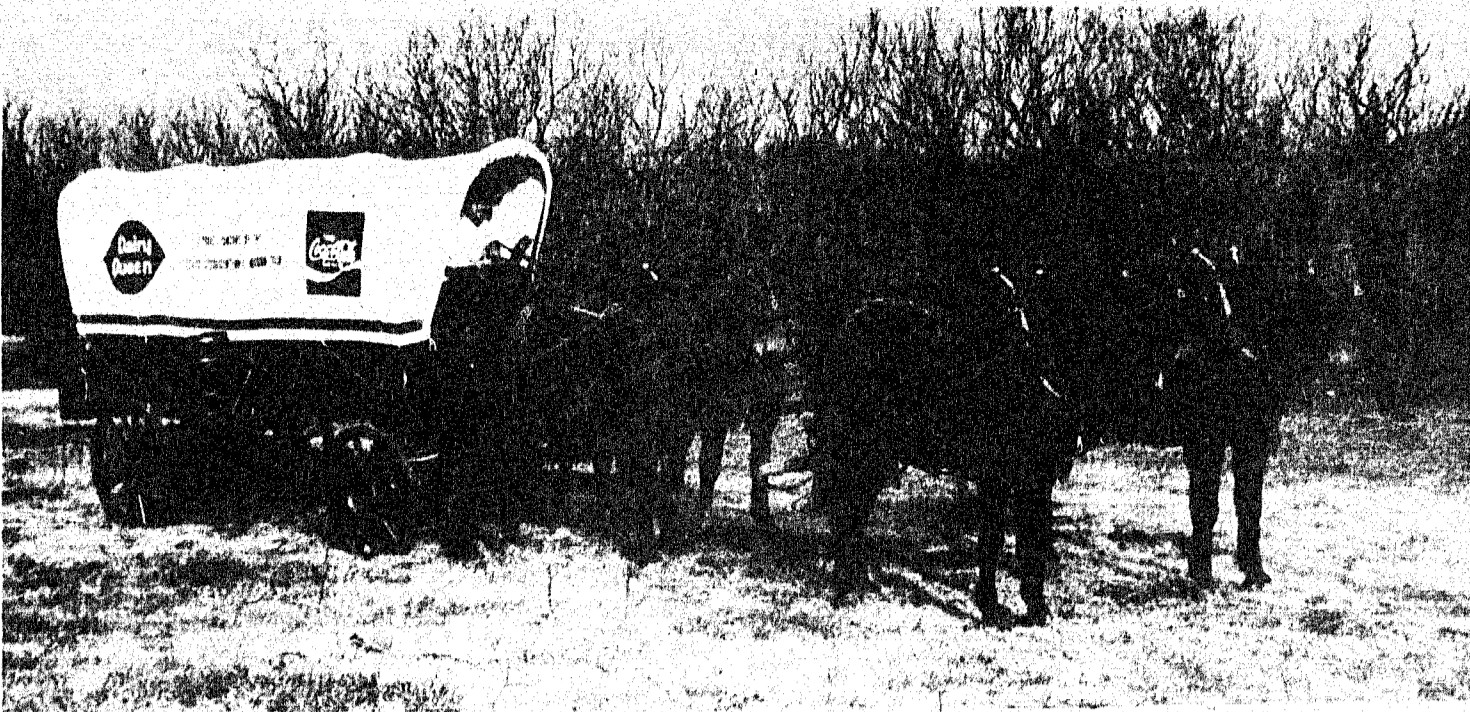
Mrs. Ella Hart Word Received of Mrs. Hart's Death

Tuttle averaged 12 unassisted tackles and eight assists per game.

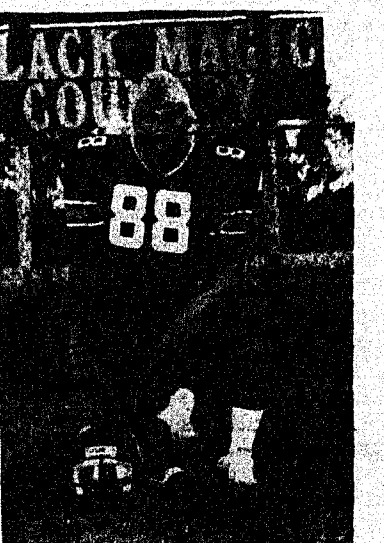

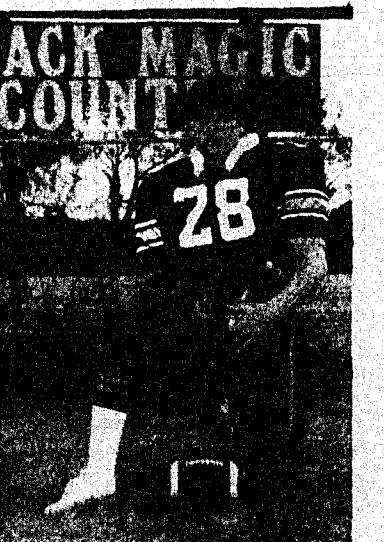

March 1, 1986 is the deadline for the 1986 scholarship essay contest which has been announced by the Permian Basin chapter of Mensa, the "High IQ Club," and the Mensa Education & Research Foundation. The award will be made on the basis of an essay of no more than 500 words which describes the applicant's career, voca-

tional, academic, or goal direction. The application should describe a career direction toward which the scholarship is to provide aid.

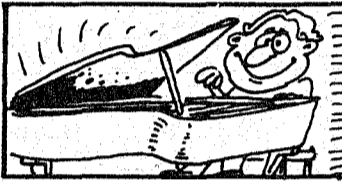
