



People Get Statement Benefits

Every person who received or repaid any Social Security benefits during 1985 will receive a Social Security Benifit Statement, Form SSA-1099, during January 1986, Priscilla Ely, Social Security manager in Brownwood, said recently.

The form will show the amount of Social Security benefits the person received as well as the amount of benefits they repaid during 1985. The form should be used just as any othetr 1099 received from a financial institution when the person completes his or her Federal income tax return for 1985, Mrs. Ely said.

People who have substantial other income may have to include up to half of their Social Security benefits in their taxable income.

Included with the benefit statement will be IRS Notice 703. This is a worksheet that people can complete to see if any of their Social Security benifits may be subject to Federal income tax.
