# City Council & School Board Meet

## **School Board Extends Brister's Contract & Sets Election Date**

In action taken at the School Board meeting on Monday night, January 13, the board set April 5 as election day for the school board election and extended the contract of Superintendent Gerald Brister. Members of the board whose terms expire this year are Donald Strickland, Roddy Dean and Eddie Hartman, who is the current board president.

The Board also discussed grading procedures after a report from

Superintendent on local grading procedures.

In compliance with new state law, the board voted to purchase five voting booths, the cost of which will be shared equally by the county, who will also share in use of the booths. New state law reads that all taxing entities must provide voting booths for the voter's privacy. Cost of the booths are approximately \$500 each.

The Board adopted Special Education policies and procedures as submitted by Small School Cooperative.

The board voted to require mandatory attendance of tutorial sessions by students in 8th grade and below with failing grade averages.

The board went into closed executive session to discuss the matter of extending Brister's contract.

Upon returning to regular session the board voted unanimously to extend the contract by one year. With one year left on his present contract, the new contract will expire in June

## **Council Meets In Regular Session**

Mayor Joe Guerrero called the meeting to order with all members present except Councilperson Carmen Donham.

First on the agenda was Bob Neville, of Brownwood TV Cable. He was not there.

Second on the agenda was Police Chief Bill Allen, who asked permission from the council to fix the police car. He brought to the attention of the council that the sanitation truck did not have license plates. The matter has been corrected. He also brought to the attention of the council that all city vehicles need a city emblem on them. The emblems

have been ordered and will be put on the city vehicles as soon as they

James Hague then addressed the council about speeding truck traffic through town, especially at the curve by his store, the Santa Anna Quik Stop. The council discussed getting in touch with the highway

department and try to get them to install an overhead flashing caution light at the curve. Hague also requested that something been done about children being out so late at night. He requested a curfew, but Bill Allen said a curfew could not be

The council then went into executive session. When they returned old and new business was discussed. There was no old business, but it was requested that the city build a ramp behind the old Bailey Lumber Building for wheel chair use. The action was approved.

Contracts were then signed from the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Office for them to collect city taxes.

Accounts payable were approved and agreed to be paid in the usual manner. The meeting was then adjourned.

# Santa Anna Receives \$2,123.96 Tax Check

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$53.2 million in local tax payments to the 1.017 cities that levy the onepercent local sales tax.

Santa Anna received \$2,123.96 compared to \$1,584.70 last year, an increase of 34.03 percent. This makes total payments for 1986 \$2,123.96. Coleman received \$18,939.02 this payment period compared to \$17.991.72 last year at this time, a 5.27 percent increase. Coleman County total is \$21,062.98, a 7.59 increase.

Houston's check for \$8.4 million was the largest, down 3 percent from last year's payment of \$8.6 million. Dallas received \$6.4 million, down 4

percent from the \$6.7 million sent last year.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.3 million was up 8 percent from 1985's figure of \$3.1 million. Austin received \$2.6 million-the same amount the city received in January 1985.

"Statewide payments are up 3 percent over last January's checks. However, a short holiday shopping period since Thanksgivigng and an early cut on in processing tax returns may account for some cities showing lower payments," Bullock

Fort Worth's check for \$2.3 million was a 28 percent increase over last year's \$1.8 million check. El Paso's payment was \$1.3 million-a 7 percent increase over the \$1.2 million received last January.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$24.3 million to the state's five Metropolitan Transit Authroities. Houston's MTA received \$9.8 million, compared to last January's figure of \$8.6 million. Austins fifth Capital Metro's check was for \$2.6 million. San Antonio's VIA received \$1.7 million, up from last January's \$1.6 million payment. The Fort Worth Tranist Authority received \$570,344-up from last January's payment of \$439,200.

## **New City Ordinance**

A new City Ordinance was passed on the 10th Day of October, 1985. The ordinance reads:

An ordinance making it unlawful to possess with intent to consume, publicly display or consume any alcoholic beverage within the boundaries of any lands owned by the City adjacent to any lake or lakes owned by the City; making it unlawful to swim, dive or ski in the waters of any lake owned by the City; making it unlawful to possess firearms or to possess fireworks within the boundaries of any lands owned by the City adjacent to any lake or lakes owned by the City and providing a penalty.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Santa Anna, Texas: ARTICLE I. It shall be unlawful

for any person to: (a) Possess with intent to consume any alcoholic beverage; (b) Publicly display any alcoholic

beverage; or (c) Consume any alcoholic beverage,

within the boundaries of any lands owned by the City of Santa Anna, Texas located adjacent to any lake

ARTICLE IV. It shall be unlawful for any person to have in his possession a firework or fireworks of any type withing the boundaries of any lands owned by the City of Santa Anna, Texas located adjacent to any lake or lakes owned by the City of Santa Anna, Texas.

ARTICLE V. Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemanor and, upon conviction, shall be punished by fine not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

## **Deer Harvest Questionnaires Needed**

Department reminds landowners in Coleman County who were issued antierless deer permits or antierless deer tags for the 1985-86 hunting season that now is the time to return their deer harvest questionnaires. The questionnaires, which are attached to the front of the permits or tags, should be completely filled out. The number of antiered bucks, antlerless deer, and turkey harvested for each tract of land for which permits were obtained should be recorded. If none were killed. "0" should be marked in the apprepriate blank. All cards should be returned as soon as possible following the close of deer season. Questionnaires should be returned by the end of January 1966., Each postcard questionnaire is self-addressed on the

AUSTIN-Some low-income Texas households may be eligible for help in paying their heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Commissioner Marlin Johnston.

Commissioner Johnston said the onetime payment is available to many lowincome households. Households which this month received food stamps. Aid to Families with Dependent Children. or Supplemental Security Income will be mailed applications automatically. Other low-income households may request an application from DHS during the enrollment period of January 15 through February 18.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a oneperson household having less than a \$547.49 gross income per month. The gross income limit is \$733.49 for a twoperson household, \$919.49 for three. \$1,105.49 for four. \$1,291.49 for five. and \$1,477.49 for six.

Eligible households must be subject to energy cost increases-because of bills or rent being higher due to rising energy

Households in privately owned or rented housing are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs. Energy assistance checks are sent di-

rectly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy company for the benefit of the eligible person.

Households receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy company business office with the regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy company. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

## History of Santa Anna News Related On 100th Anniversary

Few newspapers have as unique a history and beginning as The Santa Anna News. The first issues were published in a cave on the west Santa Anna Mountain, a central Texas landmark.

According to Beatrice Grady Gay in her book, "Into the Setting Sun," Con Rowland came to Santa Anna for his health in the 1880's to recover from "the dread white plague so prevalent on the coast."

Since there was no house on the property on the north side of the mountain, he spent the winter in a eart of degout. When his health im-proved, he returned to his former home for his printing press and established the newspaper. The Santa Anna News, with the first issue published in January 1836. It remains the oldest continuous business in the community.

With the coming of the Santa Fe Railroad in 1888, the town was moved from the gap of the mountains (a route of the Military Road and a cattie trail) to the railroad right-of-way a few blocks distant.

Rowland sold out to Charlie Spann, who is turn, sold to Will Hubert and his more in the 1880's. They seld to Austin Callen and moved to Coleman to publish the Col-uman Democrat.

A fire in 1819 destroyed early

newspaper files and records of ownership, but G. W. Faulkner was publisher for seven years before selling to J.J. Gregg, who later sold to his son, John D. Gregg. From 1920 until 1966 it was under the Gregg

Bob Parker was editor of the publication for a brief time in the

Johnny Valentine was publisher for two years, ceiling to W. T. Hays in 1888. Barbara Kingsbery was

editor of The Nove from 1966 to Jesuary, 1904. The paper went from sterpress to offset in 1972, Craco lookies, Inc., a division of Weedon lewspapers, Inc., has sensed The News since July 1979.

Jan Naroa Henderson was managing editor from January 1984 until the end of June, 1984. Linda Bertoni was then menaging editor until February 1985. Polly Warnock was editor for a short time, having to resign from the position due to bealth problems. Dense Turner is



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

# Don't Let Your

five-part weekly series by Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, designed to help parents teach their children and themselves how to survive a house fire.)

In the time it takes to read the next few paragraphs, several homes in this country will catch fire. A residence burns every 45 seconds, adding up to 1,900 a day and almost 700,000 a year. Nearly 7,000 persons die in these fires and at least onefourth of the victims are children under 14.

Most children are pathetically helpless to save themselves in a fire. Through lack of knowledge and practice, they make deadly mistakes such as rushing into smoke-filled hallways or down burning stairways when they could go safely out a window. Some don't even try to escape. They wander in bewilderment or panic. Many hide in closets or under beds and firemen find them dead, waiting in vain for parents to rescue them.

The tragedy is that youngsters could get out alive if parents would take a few minutes to show them how. Parents would be appalled to discover that their child's school did not hold fire drills. Yet, have you ever held a home fire drill with your child? He is about 200 times more likely to be caught in fire at home than at school.

A child who has practiced what to do in a fire is much less susceptible to panic and has a better chance of surviving, fire authorities unanimously agree. This has been proved by thousands of pupils who, fire-drilled trained, have calmly escaped from buringin schools.

A home fire drill could be done "straight" like a classroom exercise. On the other hand, there is value in capitalizing on a child'e imagination. Drills conducted as a "let's pretend to be firemen" game may stimulate more interest and impress the information more firmly in the child's mind.

Below is the first of several home fire drills to be offered in this series designed to teach children how to survive a fire. In the fifth part of this series, a final "rookie" examination will be presented to determine whether your children qualify as "firemen."

The first drill is "Meet the Fire Chief." In this drill, the entire family, called the "fire department staff," get together to make escape plans. A "fire chief" is elected to draw a rough diagram of the house. He asks the other "firemen" to help map out two separate escape routes from every room in the house. There

must be a main route, and in case that is blocked, an alternate. Pay special attention to escapes from bedrooms where fire is most likely to trap you. Don't depend much on stairways as these are often flooded with heat and deadly smoke, making passage impossible.

Your best escape route is through a window, perhaps one that opens onto a garage deck or porch roof. Even if you can't get to the ground from there, you can usually wait safely in the fresh air for rescue. Or, you could use a sturdy trellis or commercially available fire-escape ladder either portable or permanently installed. A knotted rope might be all right for athletic youngsters if they go down hand over hand instead of sliding.


Decide on who' will help very young children or the elderly in the family and where you will meet after the escape, so no one risks going back in for someone who is already safe.

A youngster may want to draw his own copy of the fire-escape plans and regulations to put on a bulletin board in his room.


