Veterans Administration News
(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representatitivequestions answered daily available at any VA office.)

Q-I have a VA insurance policy with a large loan on it. I have elected a lifetime annuity for the
beneficiary. I know that this will reduce the amount of the payments if I die. Is there anything the
beneficiary can do to recive the lifetime annuity?
A-Yes. The loan may be paid up atter death by the beneficiary to
receive the ifetime annuity. Other options, which could be of greater
value to the beneficiary, wrill be exvalue to the beneficiary, will be ex-
plained when the claim is receive plained when the claim is received. Q-Does the law provide for a monof a veteran if the veteran disappears?
A-The law makes no direct provi-
sion for a benefit tor dinder sion for a benefit for dependents of a
veteran who disappears. Depending on the circumstances of the disappearance, if the veteran was entitled
to benefits at the time of the disapto benefits at the time of the disap-
pearance, the VA may pay a special pearance, the VA may pay a special
benefit for the veteran's dependents. After 7 years the VA may consider death claims based on a disap-
pearance. The VA must, however, consider the circumstances behind the disappearance before deciding whether death benefits may be
