Coyita Bowker, Sharon Greenlee, Dorothy Harris, Janet Neff, Susan Snipes, Sue Newman, and Russell McGough.

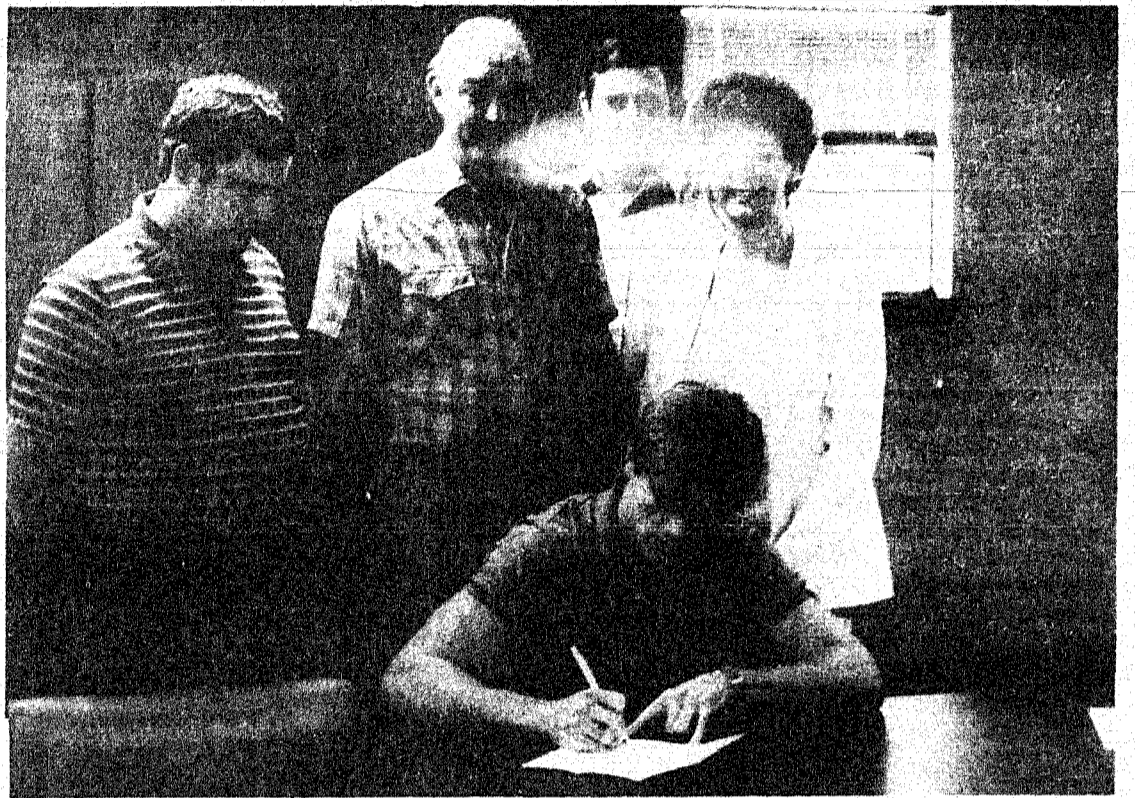
In other action, Superintendent

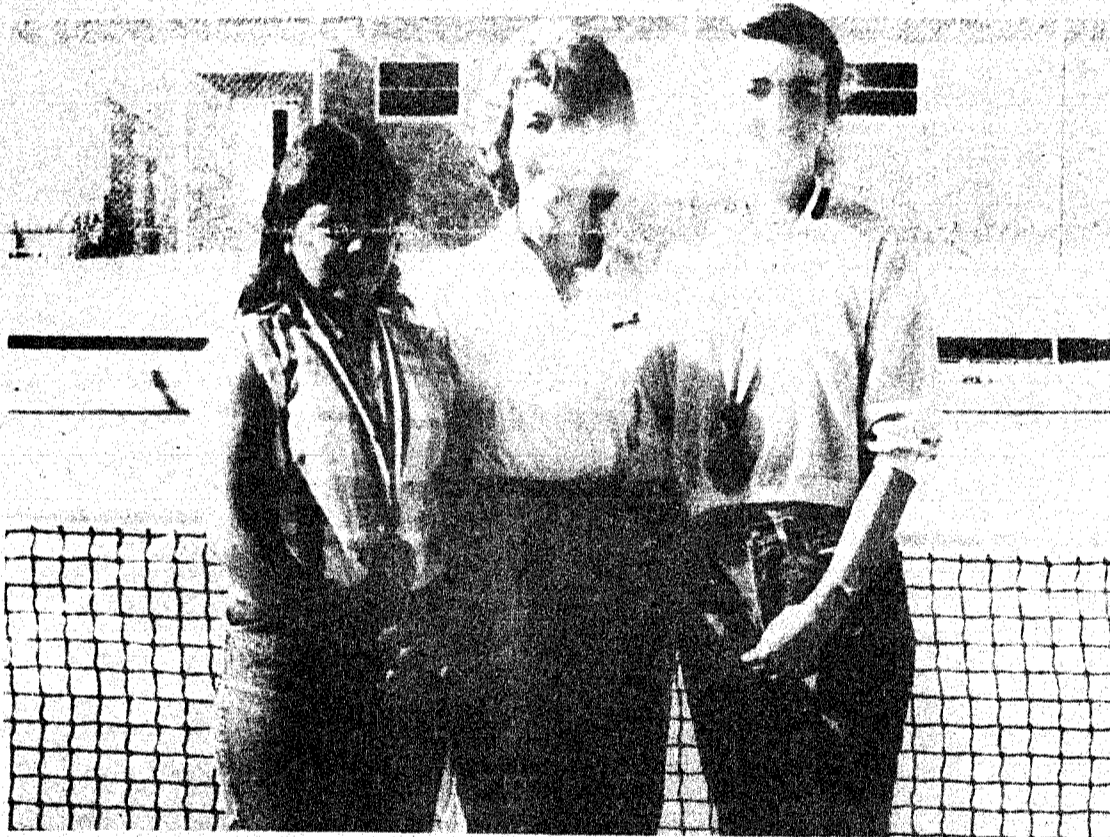

Next, the fifth grade band and the sixth grade band will combine to perform two new numbers that have been arranged for them by Mr. Baker.

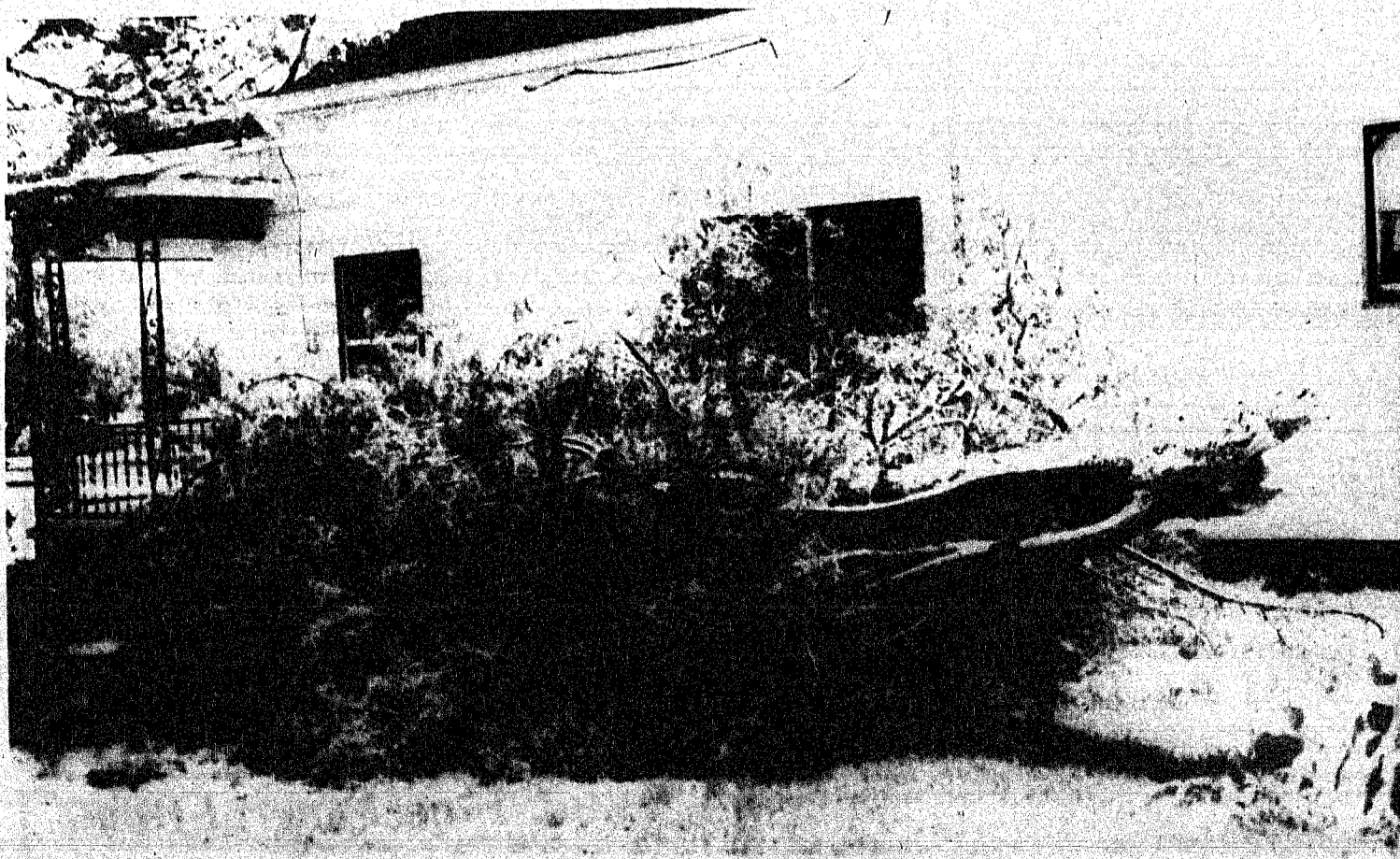
Following this group will be the high school band performing a variety of music ranging from the traditional "American Patrol" to Cyndi Lauper's rock ballad, "Time After Time."

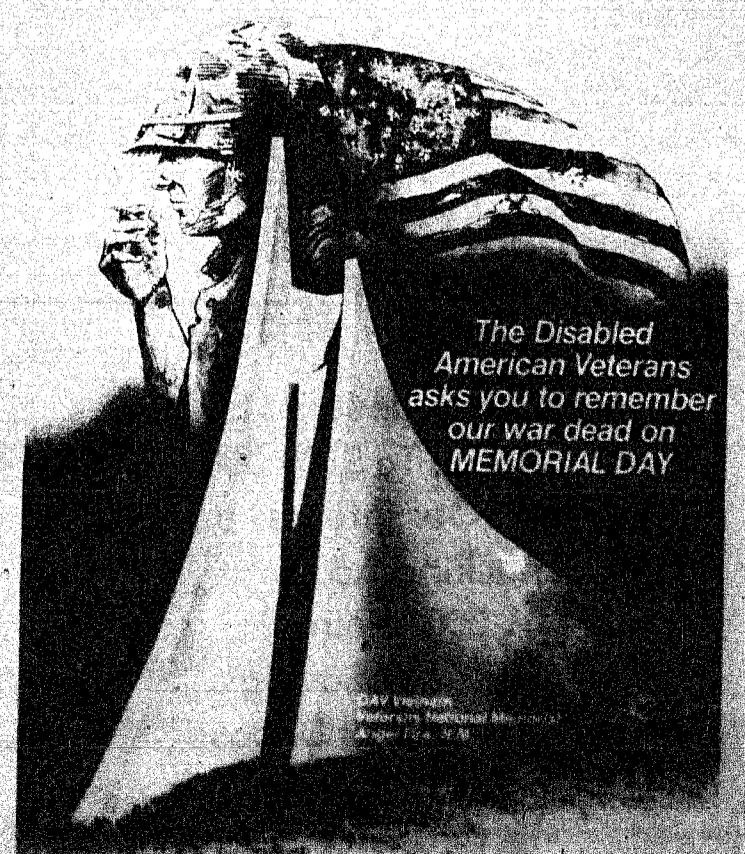
This 20 foot cedar tree belonging to the Bill Conner's stood just north of the Conner's home on South 8th Street.

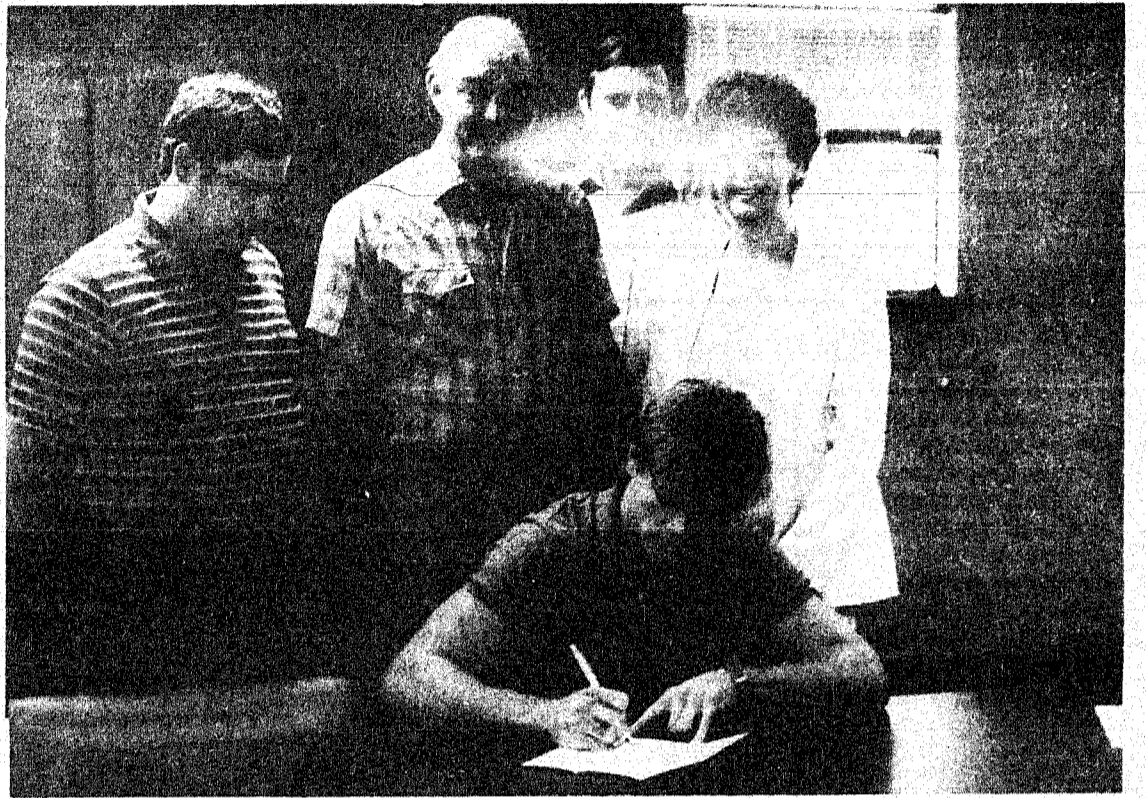

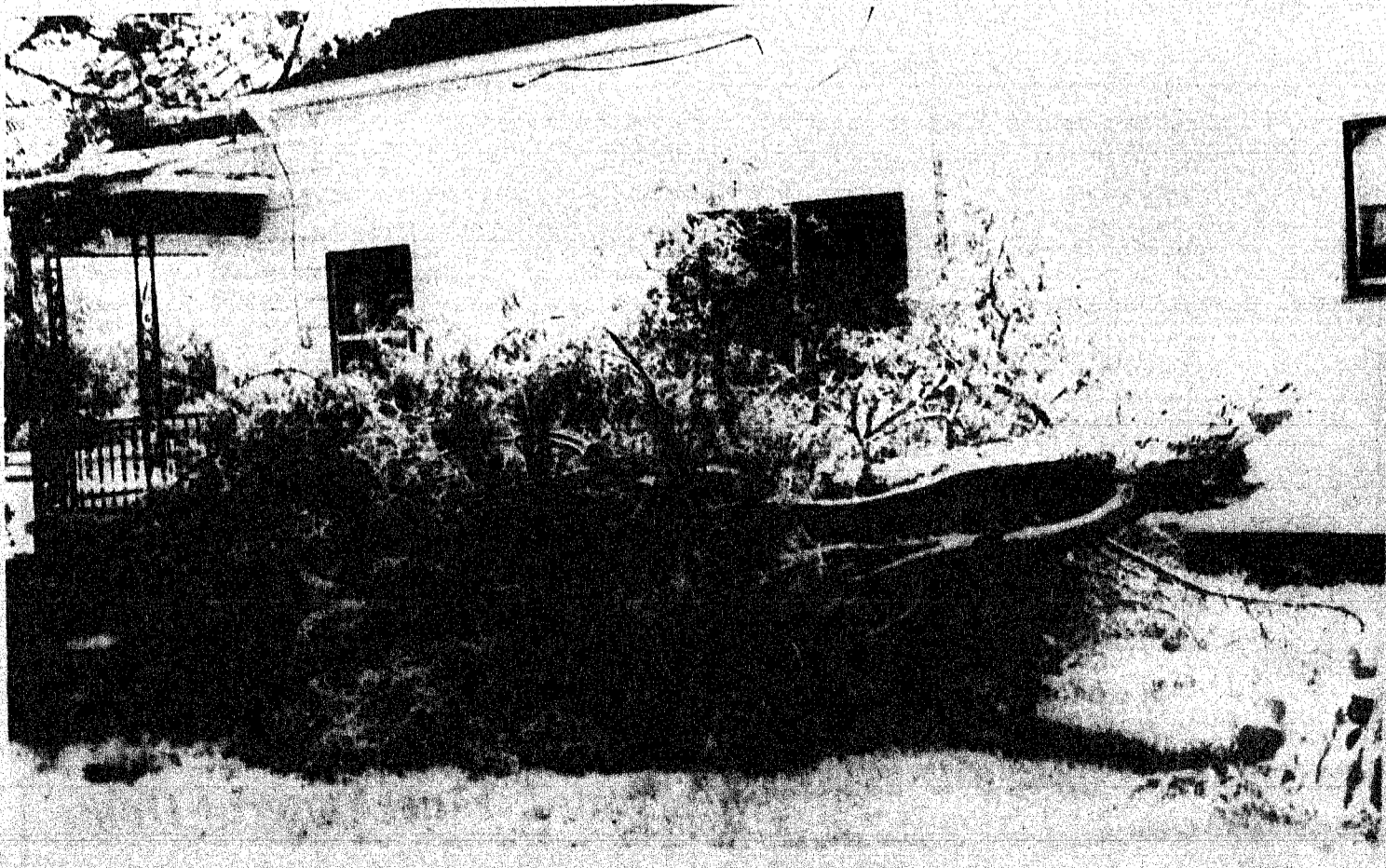

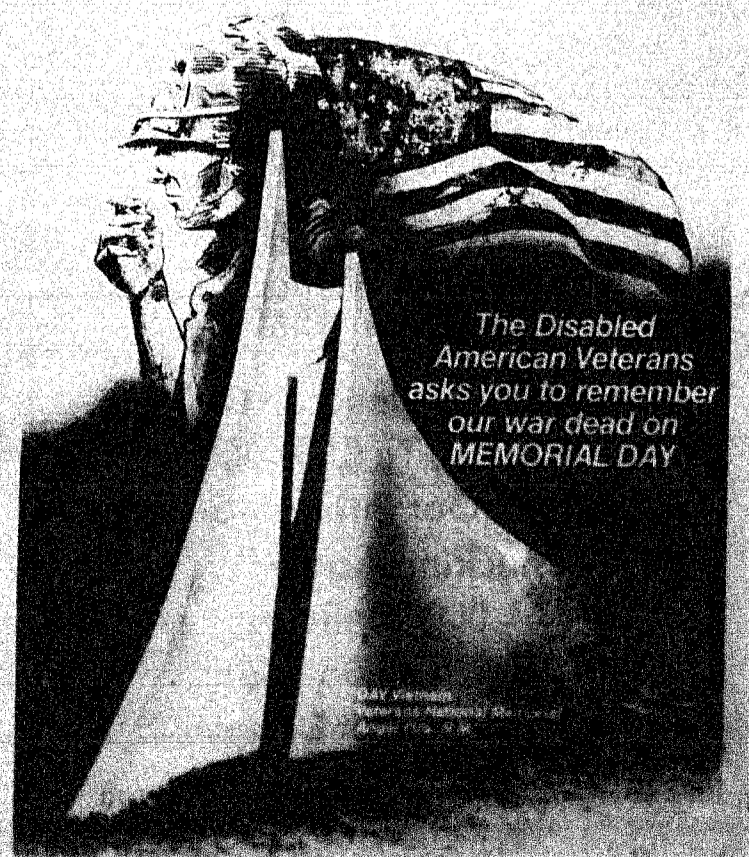

Appraisal District Meeting

Coleman County officials and school administrators learned Monday of the financial impact of the decline in petroleum prices on the 1987 taxes. Bill Goad, a representative of the Thomas Y. Pickett Company, met with the group to give totals on mineral, utility and industrial appraisals on which taxes are computed for the coming year.

Based on petroleum prices and values in January, eight of the nine taxing entities in the county have a decrease in values as prepared by Pickett and Company. The Novice Independent School District, with a heavy mineral base for taxes in recent years, has a 36 percent decrease in appraised values for the new year.

Others with decreased valuations are Mozelle ISD with 27 percent; Talpa-Centennial and Coleman

County with 25 percent; Santa Anna ISD with 23 percent; and Coleman ISD with a 14 percent decrease.

The decrease in valuations is five percent for the City of Santa Anna and three percent for the City of Novice.

The City of Coleman has a two percent increase in mineral, utility and industrial values, based largely on the reassignment of some properties from real estate listing to industrial status.

Although the decline in valuation will hurt finances of the taxing entities, county property owners will have some relief if the tax rates are unchanged. However, the taxing units have the option to raise tax rates to offset the lower values. It was also noted that approximately four million dollars in new construction has been added to the county rolls for the new year.

According to Mr. Goad, the drastic decline in mineral values has affected taxing units all over the state,

with some decreases in mineral values as much as fifty percent.

Representatives from Coleman County, City of Coleman and Coleman ISD, City of Santa Anna and Santa Anna ISD, Talpa-Centennial and Mozelle ISD were on hand for the meeting at the Appraisal District office Monday evening. Also present were James Hunter and Glen Copeland of the Appraisal Review Board, and members of the Appraisal District Board.

In the regular session following the group meeting, the Board signed a contract for the purchase of a computer for the District and approved the appointment of Collier Watson of Coleman for the 1986 audit of the Tax District.

The preliminary study was made for the 1987 budget, with a hearing slated at the Monday, June 9, meeting to make final changes.

Barbara Kingsbery presided at the meeting that was attended by Board members Jake McCreary, Billie Wright and Lang Martin, Chief Appraiser Bill Jones, staff member Henri Gilbreath and John Skelton, former Chief Appraiser for the Coleman County group.

Commodities Distribution At Armory

The distribution site for the U.S.D.A. food-stuffs has been changed for the summer months.

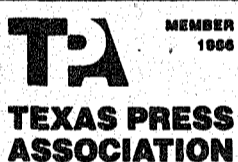

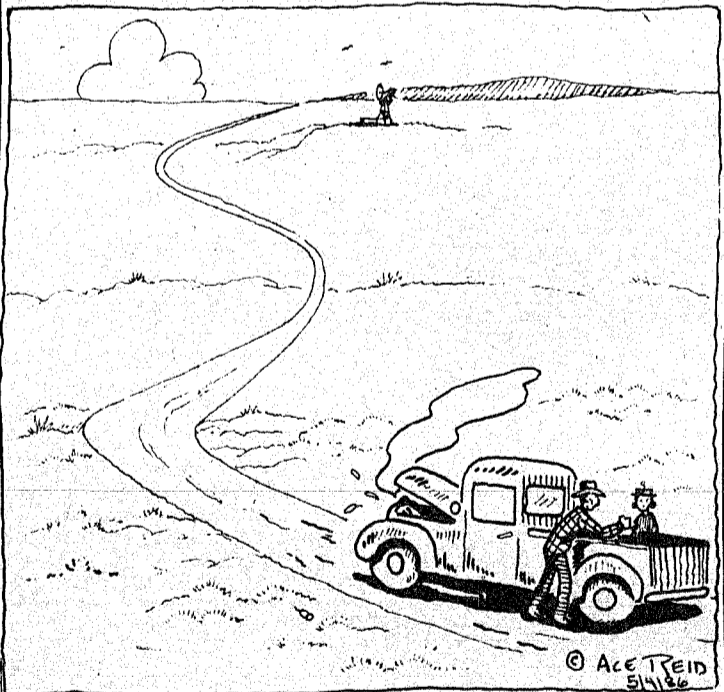

Following a honeymoon in Jamaica, the couple will reside in Austin.

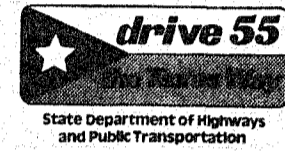

She is a housewife, raising a family of three children and assisting her husband, J. C. Brimer, who was Postmaster at Valera for some 30 years before retiring in 1972.

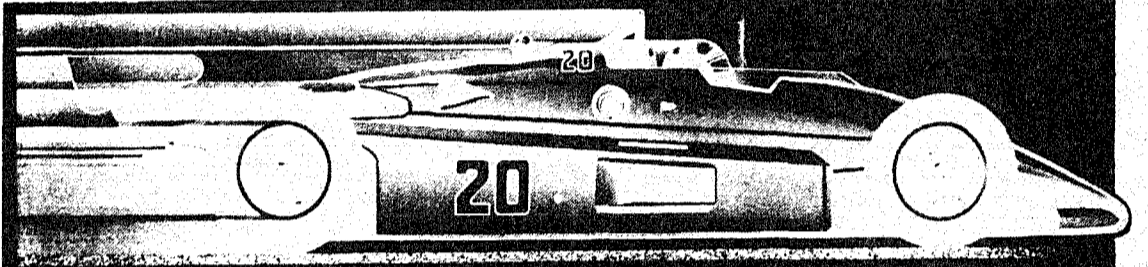

The Taylor's Of Harper

Sometimes it is hard to realize that the lives of many of us were touched by survivors of Indian raids, so long ago they seem.

In an earlier article we mentioned Mrs. Samantha Taylor, who was born about 1849 in Gillespie County and came to live in Coleman County in 1922. Of her age she was never sure; "Ma's book (Bible) got tore up, so from then on she figured out our ages the best she could."

Samantha's childhood was spent on the small rivers in Gillespie County, where they had a bounty of what they could raise, but little money to buy other needs. She was married soon after the Civil War, in which her husband, James, fought in a frontier battalion; two of her sisters also married Taylors, brother of James, all sons of Matthew Taylor whose cabin was on the site of the present town of Harper, and they all lived nearby.

By 1870 the raids of the Comanches and sometimes the Kiowas were a commonplace, during the "light of the moon." The settlers had almost no protection against these raids, most of them being too poor to own an extra gun or to keep hired help.

Matthew Taylor's cabin was struck one afternoon by a band of Indians. He was away from home, but his wife, her mother, two young daughters-in-law and five small children were there. One of the young women, Gil Taylor, was caught near a spring where she had gone for a bucket of water. The Indians had probably been hiding there for some time, waiting to learn just who of the family were there. Poor Gil alarmed the others by her screaming as she was lanced to death and scalped. Her long, wavy hair made a prize for their lance, and they left her body lying in the weeds and approached the cabin.

Samantha could think of nothing but to bar the doors of the cabin, hoping that she and the five small children would be left alone. The elderly grandmother slipped out to the cowlot and hid among the gentle cows.

When the raiders came beating on the doors, Samantha's mother-in-law put up a hopeless fight. Samantha and the five little ones huddled together and watched as she was beaten, stabbed and scalped. The Indians ransacked the cabin, taking whatever they wanted, talking and laughing as they looked into trunks and bedding.

They caught the Taylor horses and forced all the five little children and the terrified Caroline to mount them barebacked. Leaving Mrs. Matthew

Taylor dead, and not knowing about the old grandmother hiding in the shed, they started north with the anguished Caroline and the five children, some hardly more than babies.

That the captives would have survived the long ride back to the Reservation in Western Indian Territory, when one thinks of the scanty food, the few hours of rest, and the fierce blows at any complaint, it seems that it was a miracle that they all lived.

In the Reservation, the new captives were hidden in the tepee camps for awhile. Caroline was the slave of the women at their labors and of the men as well. The little white, blue-eyed children were separated among the Comanches, all glad to have more white babies they could rear as their own.

Some of the white traders, taking their hacks among the camps with things to sell, became aware of the white women or the children, and the Indian agent was told of them. One by one they became known, and the agent demanded their custody.

Caroline was soonest found, and was taken to the Indian school where there were a few other white captives, waiting relatives to come for them. With one wagon of rescued whites, she was offered a ride back to the Pedernales to her people, but she refused.

"No," she said firmly, "I'm not a-going to leave my little children off up here to be raised Indians. And then I'm not gonna leave poor Gil's babies here, either. I'm gonna go back when I can take all five little Taylors, and not before!"

At the school, she asked for work to do. The Indian children came to the school each day if close enough to their tepees, but many more boarded through the week. There was food to cook, milk to churn, beds to make, endless washing to do by rub-board. The agent allowed her to do this, and there was small pay, which Caroline hoarded up.

One by one the children were found and brought to the Agency. Their one garment was usually only a dirty rag, and here Caroline's small savings served well; she could go to the sutler's store and buy calicoes and gingham, needles and thread, and she made garments as well as she could for them and herself.

After the five little Taylor children had been rescued, and their ransoms paid by the Federal Government, Caroline still had no way to take them and herself back to her home.

But she found a kind friend, a man who had come north with a trail herd of cattle. He did not live on the Pedernales but his heart was moved by the pathetic girl, not more than twenty-years old, and her plight. He

would take them back where they wanted to go, he said, and would charge Caroline nothing. It was growing cold and the long wagon journey would be hard on them all. But they thanked the Agent for his goodness to them and they made the many days journey safely.

Caroline's husband and all the family could hardly believe her story of her ill-treatment and trials.

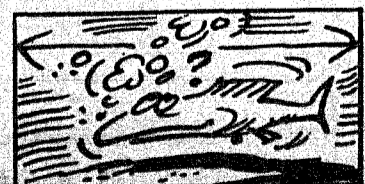
The widower of the murdered girl, Gil, soon chose her young sister, Samantha, as his new wife, and they were married in Fredricksburg by a justice of the peace, Speck Ratliff, when she was thirteen or fourteen years old. As their children came along, they got very little schooling because of the dread of Indians. Some older relative would teach them to write their names, and perhaps a few words of spelling, but there was never any money for any newspaper, and to own a book was unthought of.

Samantha became a "doctor-woman." Learning all she could of home remedies, she learned to look along the creeks and rivers for saffron, "balmoney," fox-glove and other herbs which were known to have medical elements. Camomile was a prized plant, the settlers keeping some of it growing in an old bucket or gourd so that wherever they moved they would not be without it. She tried many kinds of poultices and made "tea" of various wild or domesticated herbs.

Some of the Taylor children, when grown, came to Coleman County to farm or to work as laborers, and after the death of her husband, in 1923, she came here to be with them. Late in life, she moved into Santa Anna, where she maintained a home until her death in 1953. Her last years were made easier by her receiving a government pension for her husband's service in the Confederate army, the only ready money she had ever had. "It was not the German war," she would say, "it was the old war, the first war they ever had."

In her neat little home, she would look around her and feel thankful for many things. And among them, she would say, was that she did not have to live her old age in dread of Indians.

Several relatives of Samantha Taylor still live in Santa Anna today including Mrs. Dorothy Alsbrook, Oscar Taylor, Joe Taylor and others.
