Our journey will include activities such as: games, crafts, bible study, music, worship and refreshments. Each day will provide a new exciting journey, so join us every day.


Family night will be held at the church Sunday, July 12, at 6 p.m. At this time parents and family will be able to see first hand what their children have learned and accomplished throughout the week.

Coleman County voters Tuesday approved the formation of a hospital tax district that will allow Coleman County Medical Center to remain open. Funds will also be provided to subsidize an ambulance

The unofficial count was 1,670 in favor of the tax district and 1.275 against. As a result of the election, the tax district will be able to levy a tax of 24 cents per \$100 valuation. Taxes will be collected beginning in October.

When asked what the hospital would operate on until taxes can be collected, Martin replied that the board can borrow money against the

Medicare funds had begun to be received, which will also help to tide them over. Martin emphasized that any money borrowed would be the very least they could manage on until tax money starts coming in.

Santa Anna voted 252 for and 46 against the tax district. Other communities voting against the tax were Talpa, Novice, Gouldbusk, Glen Cove, Voss, and Rockwood.

John Martin, interim administrator for the hospital said after hearing the results of the voting, "It's a great day for the citizens of Coleman County." He added, "as soon as the county

expected taxes and also said that commissioners appoint the new board, which has already been named, the board will organize and hire employees, since it is a new entity." The new board will serve until May of 1993 and then Coleman County voters will elect a new board with staggered terms.

"Establishing an ambulance service will be our first priority," Martin said. It is possible the group can work out an arrangement with Medivac, and it might be that they seek some other source.

During the past year the hospital was temporarily closed and changed

By: Kerry Shropshire, CEA-AG The Coleman County Farm Bureau and the Coleman County Extension Office will be sponsoring a Private Pesticide Training on Tuesday, July 7 in the Coleman County State Bank Club Room (3rd floor). This meeting will begin with a breakfast starting at 7:00

Information to be presented is designed to help those individuals which already hold a Private Applicator License/Certificate to gain needed credits (will be worth 2 CEU Credits). In addition to the 2 CEU credits there will be 1/2 credit given in Intergrated Pest Management, which is a required category.

C.E.U. Credits are needed by all individuals holding a Private Applicator License-Certificate if they want to renew that license. This means that anyone that holds a Private Applicator License/Certificate must collect 15 CEU credits before December 31, 1994 if they want to continue to buy restricted use chemicals. These pesticides are normally used in the farm or orchard situations. Many of our Coleman County producers have these certificates which are

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#### Excerpts From The Bylaws Of Coleman County Electric Cooperative

**Meetings of Members** Section 1. ANNUAL MEETING. The annual meeting of members shall be held at such time, during the month of July as the board of directors may direct and such meeting shall be held at such place in the Cooperative service area, as shall be designated in the notice of the meeting for the purpose of electing directors, passing upon reports covering the previous fiscal year and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting. If the election of directors shall not be held on the day designated herein for any annual meeting, or at any adjournment thereof, the board of directors shall cause the election to be held at a special meeting of the members as soon thereafter as conveniently may be. Failure to hold the annual meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or dissolution of the Cooperative.

SECTION 2. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called by the president, by the board of directors, or by a majority thereof or upon a written request signed by at least ten per centum (10%) of all members and it shall thereupon be the duty of the secretary to cause a notice of such meeting to be given as hereinalter provided. Special meetings of the members may be held at any place within the County of Coleman in the State of Texas specified in the notice of the special meeting, or elsewhere within the area served by the Cooperative as may be designated by the board of directors.

SECTION 3. NOTICE Of MEMBERS' MEETING. Written or printed notice stating the place, day, and hour of the meeting and, in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than twenty (20) days before the date of the meeting, either personally or by mail, by or at the direction of the secretary, or by the persons calling the meeting, to each member; provided, however, that with respect to all meetings at which directors are to be elected such notice shall be so delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than fourteen (14) days before the date of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the Cooperative. with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members shall not invalidate any action which may be taken by the members at any such meeting.

SECTION 4. QUORUM. As long as the total number of members does not exceed one thousand (1,000) at least fifteen per centum (15%) of the total present in person shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. In case the total number of members shall exceed one thousand (1,000) then at least one hundred fifty (150) of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

SECTION 5. VOTING. Each member shall be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. At all meetings of the members at which a quorum is present all questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by mall, except as otherwise provided by law, the articles of incorporation, or the Cooperative, or these bylaws. If a husband and wife hold a joint membership they shall jointly be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the mem-

SECTION 6. VOTING BY MAIL. In addition to the method of voting for directors of the Cooperative as provided by the existing bylaws and by a member being present and vot-

ing in person, each member shall be and is hereby permitted to vote by mail for directors of this association. At the time notices of members' meetings are given as provided by Article II of these bylaws, and with a notice of members' annual meeting, or any postponement thereof, there shall be sent to each member either personally or by mail a ballot which shall contain the names of all members who have been nominated as candidates for directors with a statement of the number to be elected and with appropriate instructions to the member to vote for such members; EACH MEMBER SHALL BE INSTRUCTED AFTER VOTING FOR THE REQUIRED NUMBER TO SIGN SAID BALLOT AND RETURN THE BALLOT TO THE COOPERATIVE AT ITS OFFICE PRIOR TO THE DATE OF SAID MEETING. Said ballots when so received shall be retained and placed in a locked ballot box until the date of the members' meeting at which time shall be delivered to the inspectors of election and counted together with the votes cast in person at such members' meeting. The directors who receive a plurality of the vote shall be elected. Drawing by lot shall resolve, when necessary, any tie votes.

SECTION 7. ORDER OF BUSINESS. The order of business at the annual meeting of the members, and so far as possible at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially

as follows: 1. Report the existence of a quorum. 2. Reading of the notice of the meeting and proof of the due publication of mailing thereof, or the walver or waivers of notice of

the meeting, as the case may be. 3. Reading of unapproved minutes of previous meetings of the members and the taking of necessary action thereon."

4. Presentation and consideration of, and acting upon, reports of officers, directors, and committees.

5. Election of directors. 6. Unfinished business

8. Adjournments.

5. Keep a bucket of water nearby while setting off fireworks. Use the water to douse any malfunction-

ing fireworks or accidental fires and to immerse minor burns. Also use this bucket of water for disposing of used sparklers.

6. Keep everyone, especially children under 15 years old, a safe distance away from the area where the fireworks are ignited.

7. Read and follow the directions exactly.

8. Never touch a firework after it has been lit. If the firework malfunctions, do not try to relight it or pick it up. Carefully douse all used fireworks with water.

9. Never experiment with fireworks. Don't take fireworks apart or mix anything with the contents. Never make fireworks at home. Don't set off fireworks in metal, glass or other types of containers.

10. After you have finished lighting fireworks, cool the remains with water. Then collect all used fireworks materials and put them in a metal container. Cover with water again to reduce the chance of an accidental fire.

"Even one fire from fireworks is one too many," Hines said. "Most of these fires can be prevented. The fun that children and adults have with fireworks can never equal the loss of lives and property caused by


