All 7th through 12th grade students who plan to be in the High School Band are requested to attend these rehearsals.

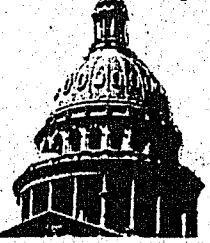
Booster Club Meeting Tuesday

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales says the Democratic plan to redistrict the state Senate — the one passed late by the Texas Legislature — is a "come to fruition."

This year's elections are based on a plan drawn by a three-member federal judge panel in Austin after the Texas Supreme Court tagged the Legislature's plan as being unfair to minorities. Democrats fear it and hate it.

Morales, a Democrat, has been fighting more than a year to substitute the court plan; even though it was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Last week, Morales persuaded a three-judge panel in Washington to approve the Legislature's state Senate plan, and this week he is exploring implementing it for the November elections.

That means finding a federal judge to invalidate the election and order new party primary elections...and quickly.

Preschool Story Time Begins August 13

Santa Anna Library will be having a Story Time from preschool children beginning Thursday, August 13. Preschool age children may come to the library at 10 a.m. on Thursday for stories and activities provided by the library volunteers. The program will last about 30 minutes. Children will be encouraged to check out books to enjoy at home.

Any preschool child who is ma-

ture enough to sit quietly and listen to a story is invited to attend. Parents are invited to stay and listen to the story or check out books for themselves. They can also leave the children and come back for them by 10:30 a.m.

Story Time will be held at the library every Thursday morning for six weeks beginning August 13.

If there is sufficient interest the program will be continued.

Texas Republican Party director Karen Hughes said: "I can't believe that a federal judge is going to invalidate an election that has been ordered, held and validated by the U.S. Supreme Court."

Last Primary Over

Primary elections are now concluded in Texas, including a lingering congressional runoff last week in Houston which was as hot as the summer temperatures.

There, state Sen. Gene Green defeated former state Rep. Ben Reyes for a congressional seat deliberately drawn for an Hispanic.

Reyes called Green a "lacker" and indicated he might endorse the Republican nominee, Clark Kent Ervin, a black businessman.

Black lawmakers split their support in the heated race. Reyes was backed by state Sen. Rodney Ellis, while Green was supported by state Rep. Ron Wilson.

Lawmaker Sues for Libel

State Rep. Sylvester Turner filed a libel suit against Houston's Channel 13 for a mid-election broadcast which linked Turner to a \$6.5 million fraud of nine insurance companies.

The broadcast reported the faked

drowning death of fashion model Sylvester Foster a few days after Turner drafted Foster's will. Foster was found alive and in prison in Spain on drug charges.

The TV station reported that Turner, despite "fishy" circumstances, began legal action to probate the will.

Turner accused the station of malicious and false statements; many in Turner's camp think the broadcast, wired in the final days of his mayoral campaign against Bob Lanier, was the reason Turner lost the election.

Backs Child Support Law

Morales endorsed federal legislation that he says will make it easier to report parents delinquent on their child support to credit reporting agencies.

The measure is being proposed by U.S. Rep. Mike Andrews, D-Houston, as part of an urban aid bill.

"You'd be surprised by the number of parents who finally become concerned about their child support obligations once they realize they won't be able to finance the car, boat or home of their dreams because their delinquent child support case shows up on their credit re-

Citrus Juice Mislabeled?

On another front, Morales accused a large fruit juice company of "mugging our school children for their lunch money" by mislabeling the juice it sells to public school lunch programs.

Morales sued Cal-Tex Citrus Juice Inc. of Houston, alleging that it falsely claims on its juice carton labels that the product is fortified with vitamin C. A Cal-Tex spokesman denied the charges.

Juice that was tested by the state and found to be deficient in vitamin C was taken from Fort Worth, Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso, Lubbock and Longview school districts, Morales said.

Insurers' Stock Eyed

A state Senate committee is looking into legislation that would force insurance companies to divest themselves of stock in companies that operate psychiatric hospitals.

A recent Texas Department of Insurance report found that 11 of the nation's biggest insurance companies hold \$1.4 billion in stock of corporations that operate psychiatric hospitals.

The Senate committee's staff has recommended that the state's Health and Safety Code be amended to require denial or revocation of a license whenever the applicant or licensee is found to be in the health insurance business.

July 5: 283 South of town one mile--grass fire; Later in day at Rockwood--suspicious in nature.

July 14: Cleveland area--grass fire. Controlled burn out of control.

July 15: Shields at old townsite-

-grass fire. Fire was doused and later re-ignited. Dozers were called to cut a fire lane.

July 16: South of town--grass fire. Started from burning trash. One building and 6-8 acres of grass-land burned.

July 18: Back to location of fire of July 16--grass fire. Cleanup out of control.

July 26: Gouldbusk grass fire. Several hundred acres burned. Possibly started by hunters.

July 27: Tank battery fire north of Talpa. Caused by lightning.

July 28--Gas well fire north of Talpa. Took several hours to get under control.

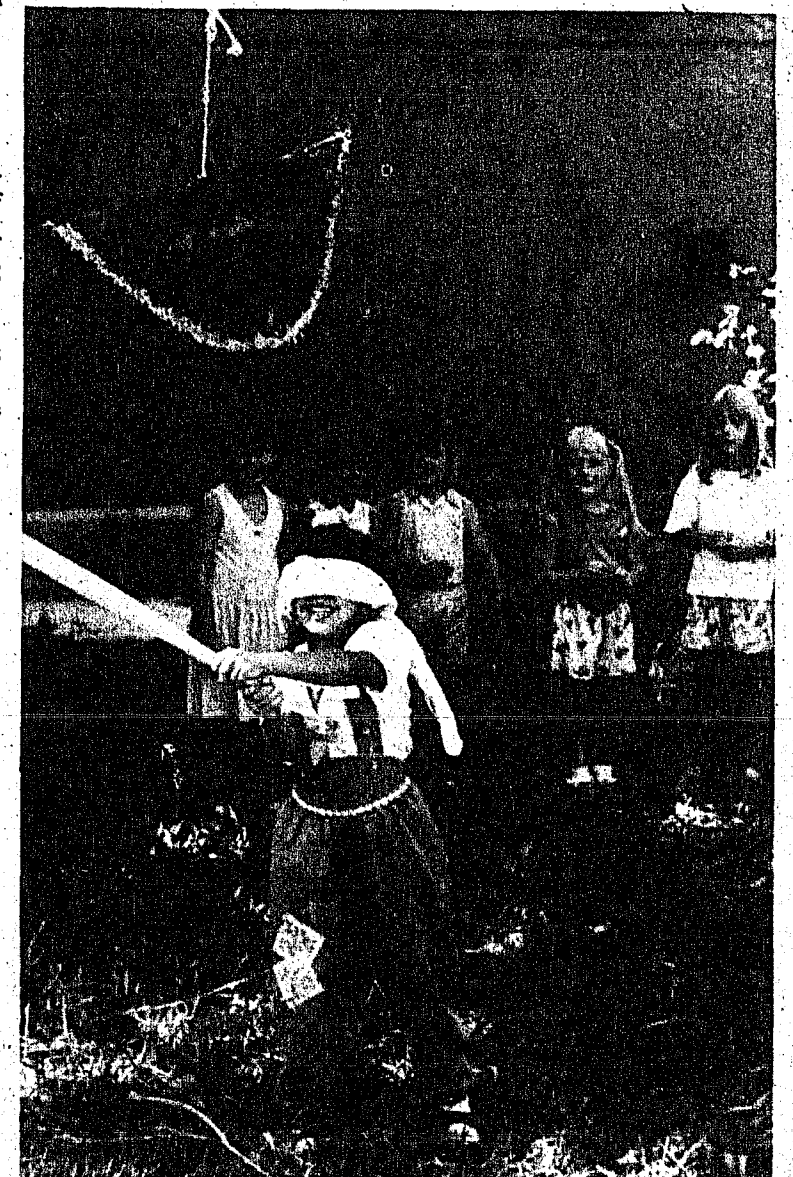

Bob Pearce

Services for Jay Robert (Bob) Pearce, age 74, were held at 10:30 a.m., August 3, 1992 at the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna, the Rev. Waide Messer officiating. Henderson Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

He died July 31, 1992 at Brownwood Regional Hospital.

Bob was born September 17, 1917 on a farm north of the Santa Anna Mountain to John R. and Leora Barnard Pearce and this was only a few miles east of where he was residing when he died. Bob graduated from Coleman High School in 1937. He also spent two years at John Tarleton College in Stephenville, Texas. After leaving college, Bob worked for the Triple A (Agriculture Adjustment Administration) and the CCRA (Central Colorado River Authority). He worked four years as Coleman County District Clerk and then in 1947 went to work for List and Clark Construction as a draftsman on the Benbrook Dam, Benbrook, Texas. He then worked many years in the U.S. Corps of Engineers in the Real Estate Division in Fort Worth, Somerville, Waco, Texas, Trinidad, Colorado, Libby, Montana and Walla Walla, Washington. In April 1974 he started work in El Paso with the U. S. Boundary Commission in the Real Estate Division. He retired after 23 years of government service on July 7, 1977 to the family farm between Coleman and Santa Anna. He raised a few cattle and crops but also worked for various oil companies as a landman. He retired from this in 1980. He entered Brownwood Regional Hospital July 9, 1992 with a massive stroke and died July 31, 1992.

Bob was baptized into the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna on July 7, 1926 and later married Frances Griffin in that same church July 30, 1944. He was also a Master Mason and member of Mountain Lodge 496.

He is survived by his wife, Frances Griffin Pearce; two sons, John C. (Kit) Pearce and Richard H. Pearce, both of Santa Anna; a sister, Johnnie Moseley of Fort Worth; one brother, Lyle Pearce of Louisville, Kentucky; and three children. He was preceded in death by two sisters and one brother, Hazel Spence of Trent, Mildred Holt of Copperas Cove and Upton Pearce of Santa Anna.



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Thoughts From Our Pastors

—Aren't We Lucky?

Most people reading this already know of my altercation with a gunman in a motel parking lot that took place last month. We were on our way to a church conference in Pennsylvania and the second night on the road we faced the challenge. A pocket knife and key chain took the major force of the bullet and Jasper's belly was just grazed leaving a surface wound. His tie, shirt and undershirt was ruined. It is amazing how many people have reminded us how lucky we were. We really appreciated their concern.

Most people reading this are not already aware of some other circumstances that have prompted similar responses. Our daughter was standing in the shower when lightning struck the home. Several electrical appliances were damaged but she wasn't hurt. Wasn't she lucky?

Another daughter was driving home one night, and encountered a rather severe wind, hail and rainstorm. Her car was blown off the road, but she managed to return to the road without wrecking the car. Wasn't she lucky?

Most recently, during another severe windstorm, a huge tree was split down the middle and fell away from our home. Jean was sitting on a couch near the window not even 7 feet from the base of the tree. It could have fallen in her direction, damaging the house and possibly injuring her. (As it was, she was only "surprised" to put it mildly.) Wasn't she lucky?

Weren't we all lucky? No, we were not lucky. Christians do not live their lives by lady luck. The Bible makes it clear that the one true God, creator of all things, is absolutely sovereign in time and eternity. In Him, we live and move and have our being. Luck simply has nothing to do with life for the Christian. By dictionary definition, luck is "the change happening of adverse OR fortunate events." Our Sovereign God does not allow anything to happen by chance, rather He foreordains whatsoever comes to pass. He is in charge. When David's dream of building a temple was shattered (God told him he was not the person for the job, rather his son would be) David responded by calling God "Sovereign", and "Lord." (Read it in II Samuel 7) But when it came time for David's son Solomon to build the temple, David called on his Sovereign Lord (who had "shattered" his dreams) to give Solomon wisdom, understanding and success in the building. Read it in I Chron. 22.

Aren't we lucky? No way! For the Christian, nothing can be considered happening by chance. Rather, this we KNOW, "all things work together for good, to those who love God, who are the called according to His purposes."

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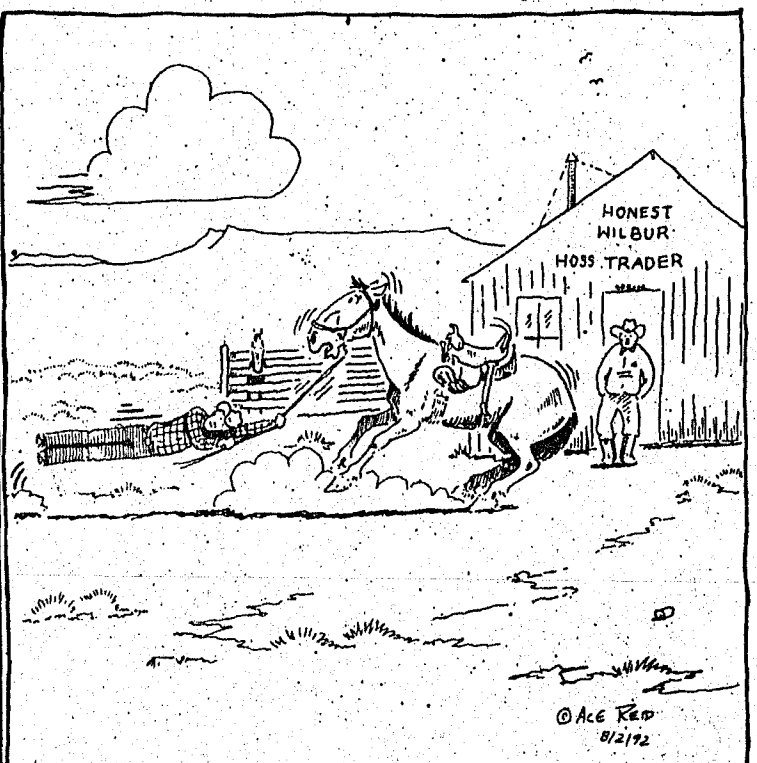

Santa Anna School Takes Part in National School Lunch/ Breakfast Program

The Santa Anna School District takes part in the National School Lunch/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 60 cents. Meals are also available free for a reduced price.

If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.

If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the income chart, your children can get free or reduced-price meals for 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

Your eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked for information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of the verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing school superintendent James McPherson, 348-3136, P. O. Box 99, Santa Anna, Texas 76878.

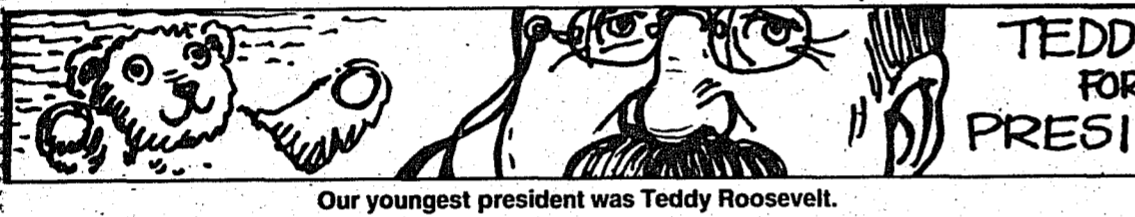
your children to get free or reduced-price meals and verify eligibility.

You may apply for free or reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible not but have a change, such as a decrease in household income; and increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps from AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.

In the same respect, if your children are eligible for and receive the free or reduced-price meals, you must report any later changes to the school, such as income increases, household decreases, etc.

BLACK-EYED PEA SALAD

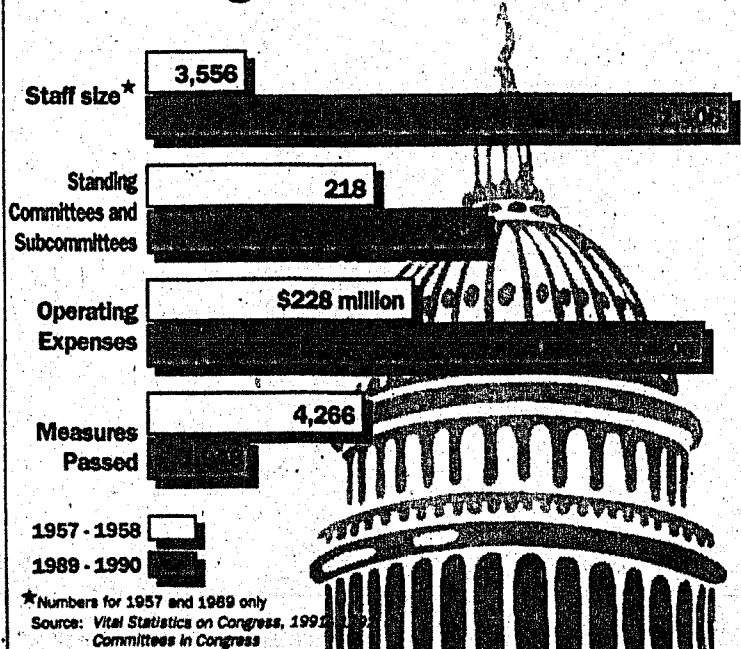
- 2 T. vegetable oil

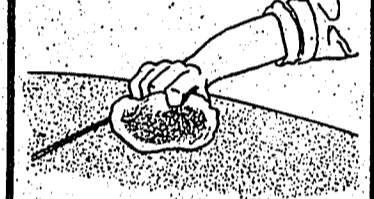

Whole-Wheat Raisin Cookies

- 1 cup whole-wheat flour
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3/4 cup vegetable shortening
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup skim milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup raisins, chopped

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease baking sheet. Mix dry ingredients except sugar. Mix shortening and sugar until creamy. Add egg, milk and vanilla and mix well. Stir in dry ingredients. Add raisins. Mix well. Drop dough by teaspoonfuls onto baking sheet, about 1 inch apart. Bake until lightly browned, about 9 minutes. Remove from baking sheet and cool on a rack.
