Setting It Straight

Last week we ran an article cautioning people that conditions are right for grass fires even though vegetation may have the appearance of being green. We also alluded to some financial problems that the Fire Department could have if circumstances prevailed.

It seems this writer misunderstood some statements made by Fire Department president Clint Day.

We reported that the fire department could be short of funds if the rash of grass fires continued or if it was faced with a major equipment breakdown.

In the conversation Day related that the percentage of returns on the Fire Department's membership drive was down, which meant only that the number of people responding was lower. In the newspaper report we indicated that donated funds were down. Actually the money received in the membership drive held pretty steady with years past. Those who did respond gave more, resulting in approximately the same amount of funds accumulated from the drive as in years past.

In talking with Mr. Day this week, he explained that in years past the Fire Department has at times borrowed money to update or repair equipment, but hasn't had to borrow money on which to operate.

He indicated, however, that an unusually high number of fires or an equipment breakdown would certainly put a strain on the Fire Department budget but most probably not to the extent of having to borrow money.

Commissioners Wrestling With Budget Planning; Lots Of Decisions Yet To Make

Coleman County Commissioners were snagged last week in their budget decisions, facing much the same problems as entities across Texas are facing at this time of the year. The County's projected income is reported to be over \$100,000 short of projected expenses.

Raising taxes above the 3 percent increase allowed without public hearings, seems a barrier the officials do not want to attempt to clear. Yet, without increased income, and faced with numerous requests for increased allotments both from departments and other agencies, this may be the year when Coleman County may have to clear that "barrier"

The first group to ask for more funding at the Monday meeting was the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department. Clint Day spoke. He said they want a county subsidy "at least equal" to that given the Coleman VFD. They now receive half. They say they cover more county fires than does the Coleman group and that they have equipment every bit the equal of that of the Coleman VFD. Help toward insurance costs was also requested. County Judge W. W. "Pete" Skelton and several commissioners complimented them for their efficient handling of some recent fires. The petitioners were told: "We'll try and do all we can".

Dennis Dorris of the local ambulance service asked the commissioners how far along the county was in identifying county roads. Answer: "Nowhere". Estimates of costs for the project range from \$40,000 down to \$10,000. The 911 Emergency Service is slated to be operational this year. To be effective the ambulance drivers will have to be able to locate those rural residents calling in for service

No assurances were given about any possible response to the need, other than to point out that street signs previously erected were vandalized or disappeared in a very short time. Mrs. Jack (Doodie) Knox said that she had read that Shackelford County had completed the task for \$10,000 and she would get information to Skelton. Dorris said that a person in Brown County who had worked on the project there had some "short cuts" which could possibly help here. Skelton asked that the person contact him.

Mrs. Jack Knox was attending to request additional county funds for the Coleman library. She reported that because of current low funding from the county, the library was about to lose matching funds from and membership privileges in the Big Country Library. Currently the library receives \$750 annually from the county. She seeks \$3,500 to bring parity between city and county contributions, and had submitted a written request in advance to each commissioner.


It will be interesting for us in Santa Anna to see where his Air Force career takes the SAHS graduate after he completes his studies at the academy.





know by now, been overruled. A federal decision has allowed Secretary of State John Hannah to declare that the November general election will be held in accordance with the Senate boundries as drawn by SB 1. This decision invalidates the

March 10 primaries for State Senate only. According to the Secretary of State, the Senate primary election we held and voted in are to be disregarded as if they never occurred. The only Senate race will now be the final one in the November 3 general election. The plan as designated in SB No. 1 splits a number of counties between two senatorial districts - such as: Taylor, Tom Green, Sutton, Llano, Ector, Medina and others. Representative Rob Junell (D), San Angelo has filed a federal law suit contesting the legality of not entitling the voters to participate in a Primary prior to the General Election. The State Republican Party is also considering filing suit in the

frustrate everyone. No concensus has been reached as far as the selection of any one of the number of proposals that are being circulated. About the only agreement is that the Courts must be removed from the process of deciding the method of financing public education in the State. The Governor talks of calling a special session in the fall to once again tackle this extremely complex issue.

Serving on the Governor's Health. Care Task Force has proven to be an eye-opener for me. The question most asked is this: is every citizen "entitled" to government financed health care? And, if so, who pays? You guessed it - the taxpayer is chosen once again! The cost of such an undertaking in Texas would be monumental, obviously. It is a proven and known fact that making preventive medical care available at a minimal cost does reduce the catastrophic costs of subsequent major illnesses that can occur when medical care has been put off due to lack of funds by an individual. These preventative care services, such as: mammograms, blood sugar screening, childhood immunizations, prenatal care, and well baby clinics, all of which are minimal in cost, can and do reduce the catastrophic costs of subsequent major illness. I feel that this type of medicine deserves our strongest support in any state health care plan.

A decision announced by the Texas Water Commission to not add "any" state mandated requirements to the Federal EPA-subchapter-D-Solid Waste requirements is welcomed by our area of the State. A previous announce-ment by TWC staffers that they would impose a number of additional requirements, above and beyond the federal regulations, was withdrawn by Commissioner John Hall. Private property rights - such as who owns the ground water under your property - has drawn lots of attention, with the Edwards Aquifer being designated as an underground river by the Texas Water Commission. The contention is that if it is, in fact, (which it definitely is not) an underground river - not an aquifer - the state owns and has total control over it's In my capacity as your state

representative I have testified on behalf of the voters of the 65th District before a number of state agencies, on a variety of issues in recent weeks. I appeared last week before the Texas Department on Aging. The Agency is in the process creating a new formula for funding our local Senior Citizens Centers. The proposed plan that the state agency presented reduced funding for Senior Centers in our area by 19 percent, while increasing funding in some urban and South Texas areas by as much as 44 percent. My testimony and position was in opposition to their plan. So, with a lot of local support, a few other legislators who appeared, and the West Central Texas Council of Governments, I am convinced the agencies plan was thwarted. There may be some reduction of funds in the rural areas, but certainly not as great as the Agency proposed.

My office staff and I, in Coleman and in Austin, stand ready to be of

Equipment Due in September

Will Coleman County be ready for the 9-1-1 Emergency Service when the county is cut into the system in December? That is the question, and the answer is not yet forthcoming. No action is underway yet concerning addressing, which is an important part of the operation.

The addressing would include identification of all county roads. probably by numbers in most cases. with signs being erected.

Speaking at Coleman Rotary Club. Monday noon was Mary Boyd of Austin, who heads the 9-1-1 Commission in Texas. She reported that equipment is scheduled to be installed here in September, and that this county would be cut into the system in December. She added that it takes some time to get a system operational.

Boyd pointed out that under the plan the county is designated to head the addressing program. She also added that some money for the addressing would be forthcoming, but she doubted if it would cover all

The question of identifying county roads came before the County Commissioners Court last week, when one of the ambulance operators was present. There was some discussion on cost of the project, but no action was taken. The ambulance operator pointed out the importance of being able to locate callers quickly.

Under the 9-1-1 system, instructions are to dial the three numbers, stay calm and speak clearly, giving the state of emergency, location of the emergency, name and phone number from where the call was placed. Boyd explained that the 9-1-1 system retains all the information that is received.



No assurances were given to Knox. In discussion, the needs of the Santa Anna library came up, with the probability that any additional funding given one place would necessitate increases for the

Sheriff Wade Turner spoke of additional funds needed by his department. The "big ticket item" in his request is for the purchase of 4 vehicles. All but one of the

department's cars have over 100,000 miles on them, and repairs and breakdowns are becoming too frequent, he said. The last auto purchases were approved in 1988. as he remembers.

The cost for the 4 is estimated at \$60,000. In addition, a new refrigerator must be bought for the jail; 2 additional cellular phones are needed; the computer system has to be upgraded; the copy machine is now costing too much for maintenance; and the jailers need to have an allowance for the purchase of uniforms.

Constable Rondoe Horton had submitted a request in writing for a salary increase of \$100 a month. He also asked verbally that a car be furnished in lieu of the mileage he currently receives for using his own vehicle. He stated he has served over 500 papers and that it takes an average of 10 trips to legally serve one paper on an individual.

Horton also received no assurance of acceptance of his proposals. One of the unknowns in the county budget process is the amount of money the state of Texas will provide for the full FM 503 project in Precinct 3. The county has received estimates from the utilities that it will cost about \$110,000 to move the lines above and below ground for the proposed route. The acquisition of right-of-way (or cost of refencing pastures) will have to be paid for by the county through Road & Bridge funds. How much will that be? Your guess may be as good as anyone's.

Where can expenditures be reduced? The search for savings has, so far, not yielded much. This year \$20,000 was spent on ambulance subsidy. That is out because of voting the Hospital Tax District.


