Heartworm disease is a growing
problem in our area. Because the problem in our area. Because the
symptoms are not severe until the animal becomes heavily infested many dogs are not treated until the have spread the disease to many
other dogs. There have been cases in all areas of Santa Anna, surroundin towns, and even in rural areas; so no locality is safe. The disease is
spread by mosquitoes, and since spread by mosquitoes, and since
mosquito bites are not obvious on mosquito bites are not obvious on
dogs, you will not know when your dogs, you will not kno
dog becomes infected.
The adult worm lives
The adult worm lives in the heart is about 12 inches long, and can shed as many as stream pary worms into the blood stream per day. The baby
worms are transmitted by mos quitoes from dog to dog. Rarely do they infect cats or humans. It takes
aboutt 6 months for the baby about 6 months for the baby worms
to develop into adults within the to develop into adults within the producing microfilariae (baby worms), a blood test performed by your veterinarian will diagnose the
presence of heartworms. If the test presence of heartworms. If the test
is positive, your veterinarian can is pasitve, your veterinarian can
begin treatment of the disease. If the test is negative, the dog can be started on preventive medication.
All dogs should be tested every All dogs should be tested every 6 to
12 months to be sure the disease doe 12 months to be sure tha disease does
not progress to a dangerous leve not progeress is detected.
If the worms have been present long enough in large enough
numbers to cause damage to the cirnumbers to cause damage to the cir-
culation, the symptoms may include a dry cough, shortness of breath,
lack of stamina, listlessness, and lack of stamina, listlessness, and
weight loss. When damage has become severe, the dog may develop a pot belly from build
fuid in the abdomen.
The disease is treatable if detected before severe damage has been done can be prevented by giving the dog car
oral treatrent to thill the infective larvae before they develop into adul worns. Prevention insures that the dogs vital organs not be damaged by treatment.
