
Other activities are also being planned for this special two day Sesquicentennial Celebration. Everyone is encouraged to join in celebrating our independence.





Changing Attitudes

This past week I had the honor of leading an adult Bible study group. This was an exciting week for me. And even more exciting is that the group has asked me to do a weekly Bible study with them.

This study is on "Great Personalities of the Bible." In doing this type of study we will attempt to see the personality of the person studied, how God affected that person and how in turn they affected others around them.

One of the studies was on changing attitudes. The story of James and John lends itself to attitude changing.

James and John were nicknamed "Sons of Thunder" which tells something of their being loud and a little ragged around the edges.

We know James and John were extremely ambitious. They asked Jesus in no uncertain manner if they could be the Vice-President and the Secretary of State in His political kingdom. But Jesus pointed out to them His kingdom was of a different kind. Jesus pointed out to them, if it is greatness you want then become a

James and John were also a little narrow-minded. John saw a man casting out demons and said to Jesus "Master we saw a man and forbade him because he isn't of our faith."

But worst of all they were at times ruthless and vindective. When traveling through Samaria the group was rejected by the people of the land. At this refusal James and John wanted to bring down fire from, heaven.

These men who were loud. narrow-minded, ambitious, and ragged became men of love and gentleness. James became the first of the disciples to taste the cup Jesus spoke of, James was killed by Herod. John died of old age but suffered a lot of persecution.

What made the difference in these men's lives. From loud to gentle, from narrow to loving, from ambition to death, from ragged living to fulfilled living.

First and foremost, they came to Jesus. Jesus called James and John while they were at work. Jesus didn't go find people in Ivory towers but in fishing boats and He still does. He doesn't ask us where we live, or what we do for a living, he simply asks us if we want to live the fulfilled

But James and John had to do something with this invitation. They had to respond. Mark 1:20 tells that they left their nets immediately. They didn't wait until tomorrow, or when things got better or next week, they responded at that moment.

At that moment of invitation James and John responded and they became members of the Christ's School of Prayer. The disciples learned from Jesus the meaning, power and nature of prayer.

And last James and John learned the power of love. The difference Jesus made in these men's lives can be seen in the history they left in the early church and in the influence of their story today. They were men who knew sacrifice instead of security, their character took on the character of Jesus, their ambition was lost in service.

Can attitudes be changed? Can lives be changed? Can we find real living in a false world? A definite yes to all three can be found in Jesus. No, not in nature worship, no not in morality, or even in church membership, but simply in Jesus

As the poet Whitter once said. "They touched His garmentsfold and soon The Heavenly Chemist changed their very dust to gold."

As as for influence, James and John are now in the Christian's hall of fame. Their attitudes were changed and they touched others.

Risking his own life the young man brought his comrade to shore. No one knows Austin Gollaher, but the world will never forget the man he saved. His name is Abraham







Wagon Tracks Any little girl could start her sewing career piecing the simple squares and triangles of "Wagon Tracks." You see, it is really a ninepatch, with five of the squares being little four patches and the other four, two triangle squares. Odd print

scraps may be used with white for the little squares, but the large dark triangles really should be one color throughout.

This is a very old design evolving from "Jacob's Ladder" in two values to "Stepping Stones" and several other names in three colors. As this pattern pioneered West it became "Underground Railroad," the "Trail of the Covered Wagon" and finaly just "Wagon Tracks." Made of all pieced blocks it would

Q-What is considered Vietnam Era service for VA benefits purposes?

A-The period is defined as August 5, 1964 through May 7, 1975.

Q-How do I appeal a decision made by the VA about my disability?

A-You need only write a letter to the VA office which made the decision stating you disagree with the VA's decision. This will initiate the appeal process and you will then be advised of the basis for the decision and actions you must take.

Q-I receive 100 percent service-

benefits ceases when your divorce is final. In certain cases the VA must honor a court order for garnishment of compensation for alimony payments.

Q-I understand a law has been passed that will subject veterans seeking care in VA facilities to a "means test." Are any veterans exempt from this test?

A--Public Law No. 99-272. sometimes referred to as the "Means Test" legislation, makes several changes in VA Helath care eligibility requirements. The law establishes a means test, or incomebased test, for determining eligibility for cost-free health care for veterans with nonservice-connected disabilities. The following veterans are exempt from the means test: service-connected veterans, former prisoners of war, veterans exposed to certain herbicides while serving in Vietnam and to ionizing radiation connection with atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons and in the occupation of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, veterans receiving a VA pension, veterans of World War I, the Spanish-American War and the Mexican Border period and veterans
