Education District). A $\$ 7$ million drop in appraised
value of minerals in Coleman County is one of the reasons for a proposed 26 -cent tax increase in the Coleman County Education District.
The $\mathbf{C}$ The Coleman CED is comprised Creek and Novice school districts According to Skip Casey Coleman School Superintendent,
the number of dollars that Coleman CED is required by the state to raise is about $\$ 1,600,000.00$. This gives the board no option except to set a tax rate that will raise the necessary amount of money. The
tax rate this year is computed to tax rate this year is computed to
$\$ 1.04$, therefore making a 26 -cen \$increase for the CED tax rate which will cause a significant increase if districts are not able to reduce thei local tax rates by close to 26 cents.
Bill Jones, chief tax appraiser said, "Coleman County lost ap proximately $\$ 7$ million of appraised value from last year. The majority of the loss came because of low natural gas pric
