ISD Board Acts On Several Items

The Santa Anna School Board met on Tuesday evening of last week to discuss several agenda items and take action on some.

After approving payments of accounts, a public hearing was held concerning the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS). This gives the board a chance to see how the local school compares with schools across Region 15 and across the state. A report will be published in subsequent issues of the Santa Anna News.

The board considered purchase of unitized cafeteria tables. A motion was made to purchase the tables but died for lack of a second.

On the agenda was discussing and possible action on the use of school facilities by others. This was tabled for the time being.

School Superintendent Jim McPhersen gave a report on mowing equipment.

Two items brought to the attention of the board by school patrons were on the agenda. One suggestion was to change the date of school board meetings so as not to conflict is needed and the Santa Anna super-

with City Council meetings, both being held on the second Tuesday of each month. After much consideration, the board decided to make no changes of their meeting dates. The second matter was that of door to door solicitation by students. It was determined that most of the problems arise from fundraisers being scheduled too close to each other. The board agreed to look into the problem further before taking any

No action was taken on consideration for membership in an equity center; and no action was taken on consideration of participating in a TASA (Texas Association of School Administrators) public relations campaign concerning the upcoming elections.

The board set appraisal periods and designated teacher appraisal supervisors. Frank Gray will be supervisor for secondary teachers and Dean Bass for elementary teachers. Mr. Blair, principal at CAP High School, will be available if a third visors will be available to help at CAP if needed.

Approval of site based decision making was given by the board and will be sent to TEA (Texas Education Association) for approval by Sept. 1. Mr. McPhersen explained that the premise of the site based decision making is to give the operation of the school back to the local staff, principals and school district patrons. In other words, to decentralize the administration of school districts. This, of course, is of much more concern in larger school districts where local people don't have as much say in the operation of their school as we in small towns. McPhersen says we will not be able to tell too much difference here in Santa Anna where school patrons have always had good input.

The board considered a health plan and workman's comp plan for school personnel and accepted a bid from Hibbs-Hallmark and Company. The school contribute \$50.00 per month per employee


eighth classes are held Tuesday and Thursday. The following week the classes are rotated so that the fifth through eighth classes are held Monday, Wednesday and Friday; and the first through fourth, Tuesday and Thursday. Essentially, the students are attending a given class every other day of the school week, rather than each day, but are able to accomplish more because more activities can be incorporated into a class that lasts 1-1/2 hours.

Mr. Gray says the new schedule allows for an honors program along with the academic program and the regular high school program. At the present time students in the honors program have classes available in Advanced World Problems; Trig and

Calculus; and honors English on all four levels. It is expected that more honors classes will be included next

Those students who's grades rank 90 percentile, qualifying in 5 of 6 of their classes can be admitted to the honors classes where there is considerable more work involved. thereby challenging the student to achieve even more.

Mr. Gay says that if there is another school in Region 15 that is operating on this type of schedule, he isn't familiar with it. In fact, personnel from Region 15 have inquired about the program as other schools are interested in perhaps following suit.

Mama Mia! Kids in the Kitchen

If you're looking for creative projects you can do with your ds, why not spend time with them in the kitchen? Hands-on fun with foods can stimulate their interest and appetites. Not only a necessary skill for their later lives, cooking is a creative experience for a growing child.

An easy pizza recipe using a pizza crust mix is a great recipe to start with. The kids can make and knead the simple dough, then form the crust circles. Let them use their own imaginations when it comes to the toppings.

Kiddie Pizzas 1 package (6.5 ounces)

Martha White Pizza Crust Mix 1/2 cup hot tap water teaspoon oil

Pizza sauce Grated mozzarella cheese

Toppings such as browned ground beef or sausage or sliced pepperoni, mushrooms, green peppers, onions or black olives

Prehèat oven to 500°F. Lightly rease 2 large baking sheets. Combine pizza crust mix with hot water in mixing bowl. Stir vigorously with a fork until blended (about 30 strokes). Forminto a ball and grease with about I teaspoon oll. Cover and set in a warm place for 5 minutes. Place on a lightly

floured board or pastry cloth. Knead dough a few times. Divide dough into 10 equal portions. Pat orrollouteach piece into a 3-inch circle. Place circles on prepared baking sheets. Spread each with a thin layer of pizza sauce, top with favorite topping and sprinkle with cheese. Bake on lowest oven rack 8 to 10 minutes or until crust and cheese start to brown. Makes 10 snack servings.

When kids are in the kitchen, follow these helpful tips: Have adult supervision at all

times and encourage kids to ask questions about things they don't understand. Use as many plastic and wooden

items as possible—they're less likely to break and are easy to handle.

Be sure hot pads are readily available. Oven mitts don't fit tiny hands.

 Teach children to clean up spills immediately so no one slips.

Show kids how to slowly open the oven door so that the hot air doesn't burn them.

Teach children that cleaning up is as important as preparation.

CED Proposes 26-cent Tax Increase

In spite of the fact that Santa Anna ISD has been able to hold the line on the local school tax, your school tax package will see an increase of 26¢ due to state demands on the Coleman CED (County Education District).

A \$7 million drop in appraised value of minerals in Coleman County is one of the reasons for a proposed 26-cent tax increase in the Coleman County Education District.

The Coleman CED is comprised of Coleman, Santa Anna, Panther Creek and Novice school districts.

According to Skip Casey, Coleman School Superintendent, the number of dollars that Coleman CED is required by the state to raise is about \$1,600,000.00. This gives the board no option except to set a tax rate that will raise the necessary amount of money. The tax rate this year is computed to \$1.04, therefore making a 26-cent increase for the CED tax rate which will cause a significant increase if districts are not able to reduce their local tax rates by close to 26 cents.

Bill Jones, chief tax appraiser said, "Coleman County lost approximately \$7 million of appraised value from last year. The majority of the loss came because of low natural gas prices and a drop in mineral values."

According to information from the CED, taxes on the average home in the Coleman County (valued at \$21,108) would increase by \$31.43 because of the higher CED tax rate.



Look Out, Drunk Drivers! Higher Education Will Get You! Colleges and universities are dropped to 3,161-a decline of 17.1 per cent--and is still falling. helping get drunk drivers off the streets and highways and otherwise working with law enforcement Council estimates that each traffic agencies to reduce traffic accidents.

The programs--cooperative efforts with the Texas Department of Transportation--already are paying for their costs many times over in lives saved and reduced injuries and property damage.

The effort to reduce drunk driving is especially effective. It accomplishes this by providing 65 state law enforcement officers with instant computer information as to where intoxicated drivers are likely to be cruising. It is attracting attention across the nation.

The devise is known as TRASER--short for Traffic Services Microcomputer System. It was developed by Martin Crouse, principal programmer for the Texas Transportation Institute at Texas A&M University.

Since San Antonio began using be made at the business meeting. the system in 1989, traffic fatalities there have been reduced almost 50 per cent a year, and arrests for DWI have soared.

Special mobile units are assigned to patrol at specific times and places. If they spot a car being driven erratically, they stop it and test the driver for intoxication. They have found that almost onethird of all DWI arrests occur in the areas and during the times that TRASER has indicated.

The effort has been so successful that it won a national biennial award from the Federal Highway Department for outstanding highway safety improvement. Because of its results in saving lives in Texas, TRASER has been adopted in 40 other states.

Devising such computer programs, however, is only one example of the cooperation between the Texas Department of Transportation and the state's colleges and universities. The "Kid Safe" program developed at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio is another.

U.T. Health Science Center--San Antonio, recognized for its efforts to educate parents on the proper use of infant and child care car seats, now will devise materials to teach children under age nine to be aware of dangers to pedestrians. The Texas Department of Transportation is providing a \$12,500 grant for first-year funding.

I pass by an abandoned tire dump every day and it doesn't look as if anyone has started cleaning it up. Whom do I tell about it?

Call the Clean Texas 2000 Information Line to report the tires. If a Texas Water Commission District Office is listed in your telephone directory, it would be best for you to call that office, because the people there will probably be more familiar with your area. If none is listed, then call the Clean Texas 2000 number or call our tire specialists at 512/834-6683. We've identified about 350 abandoned tire sites in Texas. We're tackling the worst sites first, so it's possible that we know about the site you have mentioned. Nevertheless, we encourage you to call about any sites you know of. We'd rather hear about them twice than not at all.

What's the single most important thing I can do to reduce waste?

If you are a homeowner, the most immediate thing you can do to reduce what you send to the landfill is to cut back on yard waste through mulching and composting your grass and leaves. But the single most important thing you can do to reduce total waste produced by our nation is to learn to buy products that don't produce waste byproducts in their manufacture. It's not always easy, but you can look for products that don't require much wasteful packaging, for products that can be reused and for natural products that don't use petroleum as a base. When you shop, keep in mind the motto, reduce, reuse, recycle! And you could consider adding 'repair' to that list as well.

AUSTIN - As expected, polls at the close of last week's GOP national convention in Houston indicated rising support for President Bush and slippage for Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton to below 50 percent.

In Austin, a three-judge federal panel was expected to decide this week whether to stop Texas Secretary of State John Hannah from voiding primary elections to install a Democrat-favored Senate redistricting plan.

Attorneys for the Texas Republican Party argued that Hannah's orders to disregard the primary elections and to allow top party committee members to choose candidates is blatantly unconstitutional.

Lawyers for Attorney General Dan Morales, a Democrat, said Hannah doesn't have authority to order new primaries.

Democrats Request Primary

Morales' stand-in, Renea Hicks, asked the federal judges to order new state Senate primary elections to validate the plan imposed by Hannah.

"Are you inviting us to order you to have another primary?", asked one federal judge; the state's attorney said it would be preferable to using a "tainted" redistricting

Still unanswered is how much a new statewide primary election will cost Texas taxpayers.





toward the expense of the health plan.

The board considered purchases of new vehicles with primary attention given to the vehicle used by the ag department. The discussion was made to replace the current vehicle with another pickup. McPhersen advised the NEWS on Monday that they had purchased a full size Ford F-150-1992 model from Bledsoe Motor in Coleman. After Bledsoe had met the board's purchase price with trade-in. In addition the board will be seeking bids on two vehicles with plans to purchase one. They are seeking bids on a 1993 Suburban and a 1993 one ton chassis fifteen passenger van set to their specifications. Those bids will be opened

and a decision made on what vehicle purchased on September 8. The board also authorized solicitation of bids to replace the floor in Perry Gymnasium.

Superintendent McPhersen gave his report which included school enrollment, bank deposits, report from appraisal district, monthly audit on budget and other informational items.

The board also announced bids accepted on food products for the cafeteria and fuel for school vehicles. Food products bids went to Gandys, Ben E. Keith, White Swan, Morton Snacks, DeCoty Coffee, and Mrs. Baird's Bread. The fuel bid was accepted from T & T,
