Clinton Elected

Here in Santa Anna voters cast 237 votes for Clinton and 188 for Bush in Tuesday's presidential election cutting across the trend that gave Texas to Bush. However as we all know by now, Clinton is the new President-Elect holding a popular vote lead of 44-39 over President George Bush.

Bush carried Texas even though it was much closer than four years ago.

Ross Perot, who Received 115 votes in Santa Anna came in a distant third with 18% of the national vote.

Marron, the Libertarian candidate received 2 votes in Santa Anna.

Closer to home, Bob Turner won re-election to the Texas House of

Representatives with 61% of the vote in the 73rd District. In Santa Anna he received 436 votes to 87 for Brelsford.

State Senator Bill Sims won over his opponent, Troy Fraser with 52% of the vote. In Santa Anna voters picked Sims 339 to 183.

Congressman Charles Stenholm won re-election with 66% of the vote over Jeannie Sadowski. In Santa Anna Stenholm garnered 401 votes to 188 for his opponent.

In the Race for Railroad Commissioner, Lena Guerrero took the lead in Santa Anna with 260 votes to 251 for Williamson. Statewide Williamson was the winner with 53% of the vote.

Coleman County candidates, who were all unopposed, were elected to their posts. They included District Attorney Ross Jones, County Attorney Joe Dan LeMay, Sheriff Wade Turner, Tax Assessor/Collector Billie Baker, Commissioner Prct. 1 Willard Allen, Commissioner Prct. 3 Vernon State, Justice of Peace Nance Campbell, and Constable Rondoc Horton.

Due to limited time and space we are unable to list all candidates. We are aware that most readers will have all this information before they receive the Santa Anna News, but felt you might be interested in how local voters responded to key races.

Murder Suspect In Custody

Santa Anna residents are still stunned over the apparent murder that took place here Saturday night. Douglas Wayne Taylor, age 22, was stabbed to death following what appears to have been a violent roadside confrontation with the man now charged in the murder, Davey Beal, also a Santa Anna resident.

According to Coleman County Sheriff Wade Turner, Beal turned himself in to Coleman County deputy Ken Brixey in Abilene about midnight Monday after having notified authorities that he would be arriving there by bus.

Beal was returned to Coleman where he was arraigned before Judge Nance Campbell on a murder charge. Bail has been set at \$250,000. At press time he remains in Coleman County Jail.

In the meantime, Santa Anna Police Chief Carlos Torres and Coleman County Deputy Gary Berry were in Del Rio Tuesday obtaining evidence. Beal had apparently abandoned a vehicle there.

Taylor was pronounced dead at Coleman County Medical Center at 12:40 a.m. Sunday by Justice of Peace Nance Campbell.

According to reports from Police Chief Carlos Torres, Taylor and his assailant had apparently argued over Beal's ex wife at the woman's residence in Santa Anna. Taylor and the woman left the residence in one

vehicle and Beal in another.

As the couple were headed toward town on U.S. Highway 283, Beal reportedly rammed his tan Ford pickup into the Chevrolet Blazer driven by the woman and ran it off the road, Torres said. According to witnesses at the scene, a fight followed in which Beal allegedly

Rain



Thunderstorms rumbled through the area Saturday producing rain, some small hail and some high wind. But the rain was greatly appreciated, especially by the farming and ranching community.

A little rain fell here Saturday afternoon, Oct. 31, and a greater amount that night, making for an accumulation of 2.34 inches. That is also the total rainfall amount for our community for the month of October.

We had no rain at all during September. The year's total now stands at 22.80. Average yearly rainfall for our area is about 27 inches.

Deer Hunting Season Opens Sat.

Quail Season Has Begun

Another excellent year for deer, quail and turkey hunting is expected in Coleman County when the season opens Saturday, November 7.

According to B. D. Davis, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, a fixed wing airplane was used this year for the first time to census 79,634 acres of deer range. The deer range covered a large portion of four counties.

Census data indicated favorable fawn production last year. These 1991 buck fawns will be antlered bucks this season.

The occurrence of spike bucks in Coleman and Runnels Counties was investigated by biologists during both the 1990-91 and the 1991-1992 hunting seasons. Spike antlers showed up in 49 percent of the 1-1/2 year old bucks during the 1990-91 season. The spring and summer moisture situation was only fair during 1990. Vegetative conditions favorable to antler growth were much improved during the spring and early summer of 1991. Spike antlers showed up on 25 percent of the 1-1/2 year old

Santa Anna, Penatuhkah Comanche Chief

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In previous articles we have used "Peneteka" as the spelling for the name of the Comanche band to which Chief Santa Anna belonged. The name of the band, as with the name of the chief himself, has several different spellings. Ms. Pelon writes that she has chosen "Penatuhkah", the spelling she finds on the list of bands published by the Comanche Tribe. She was given this list when she visited the Elder's Center while doing research for her thesis).

(Quoted from *Santa Anna and The Santa Anna Mountains* by Rupert Richardson, *West Texas Historical Association Year Book*, Vol XI, Nov. 1935)

"Thenceforth until his death Santa Anna made periodic raids against the people of the North Mexican states, the lower Rio Grande valley, and even the Corpus Christi region. Comanches were not discriminating in their political geography; wherever Mexicans lived was Mexico. The raid of 1849 was unusually destructive. At the head of 550 warriors he crossed the Rio Grande about forty miles below the Presidio del Norte, chased the people of Reynosa into their homes, entered Carmargo and killed

several persons in the town, took goods out of the stores of Rio Grande City, and forced the abandonment of many settlements between Brownsville and Ringgold Barracks.

It is said that he would have attacked Brownsville but for the fact that his warriors were afraid of the cannon at that place. A party of his men captured a wagon train hauling goods from Point Isabel to Brownsville, broke open a box of fine French prints for ladies dresses, and proceeded to amuse themselves by tying bolts of this cloth to their horses tails and riding forth at a gallop against the wind with twenty or thirty yards of variegated muslin streaming behind them."

"A newspaper report of that day credits Santa Anna with one of the most generous and sportsmanlike acts on record. As his warriors were approaching the lower Rio Grande settlements the chief feared for the safety of a friend in Camargo and sent him a letter with the information that the Comanches would soon attack that place. Since Comanche chiefs frequently used Mexican captives as secretaries the story is not so improbable as it may at first appear."

He was preceded in death by a sister and a brother.





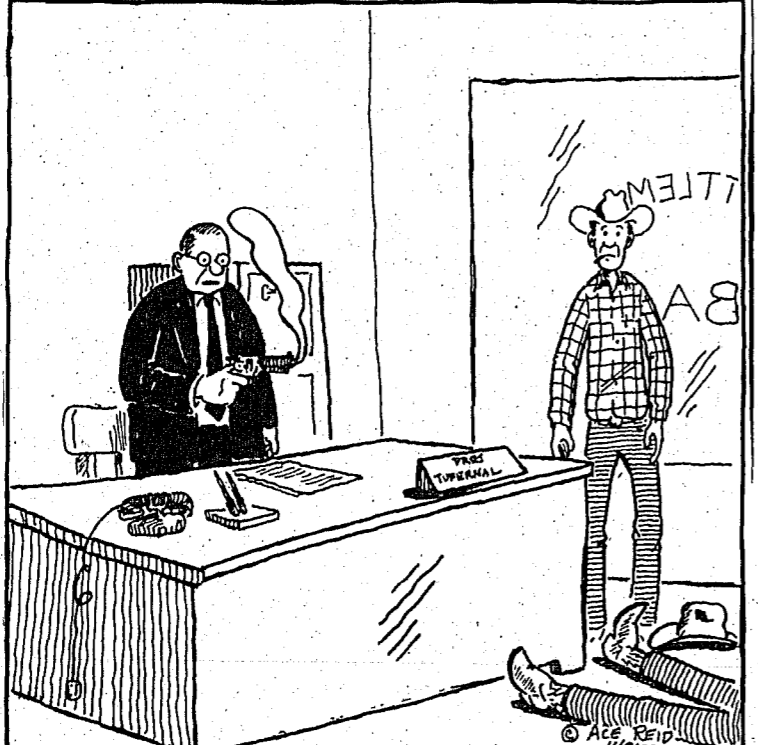

Rusty Fleeman grimaces in pain (and perhaps dissatisfaction) as he is being treated for an injury during last Friday's loss to Water Valley.

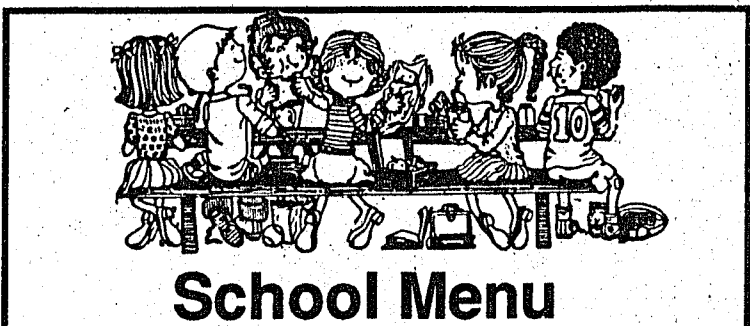

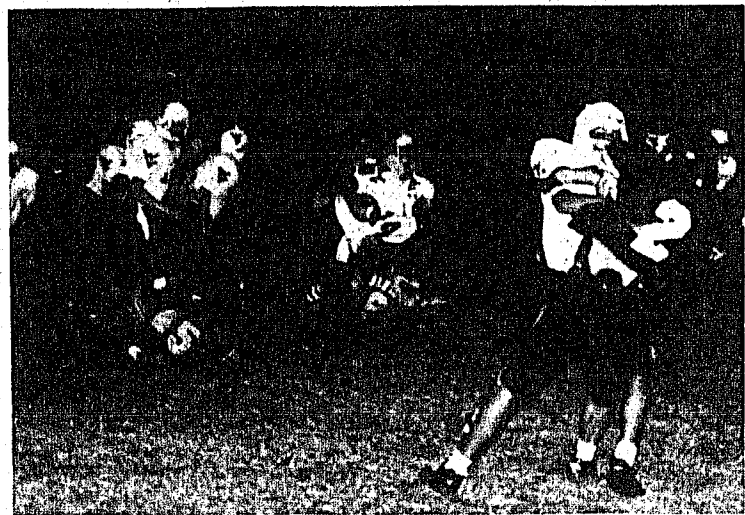

bucks during the 1991-92. Spikes do occur in significant numbers even during good years. The difference in the occurrence in spikes between good years and poor years would indicate nutrition. Another reason for spikes is that yearling bucks born late during the previous year may not have sufficient age to produce normal forked antlers. Genetic potential may also be lacking.

Spikes do not remain spikes. Spikes will usually develop into bucks good enough to satisfy most hunters. The occurrence of spikes in other than the 1-1/2 year old age class of bucks in the four county area is rare.

Last year proved to be a better than average quail year. This year is even better. The quail census conducted during August indicated an 80 percent increase over 1991.

The last really abundant quail year was 1987. This year is probably not as favorable but you may not be able to tell the difference. Quail are numerous everywhere. Quail hunters need to "get with it" since it might be a while before there is another year as good.

Small-game harvest surveys indicate a 54% increase in hunters and a 58% increase in turkey harvest since 1987. There are presently more people hunting turkey in the spring than in the fall.

The recommended guideline to harvesting deer throughout the county is 1 antlerless deer per 200 acres. The buck harvest recommendation for the northern half of the county is 1 buck per 450 acres. AUSTIN — While the limelight focused on elections last week, a handful of staffers labored backstage to prepare the Capitol for the Nov. 10 special session on school finance.

Gov. Ann Richards is bringing lawmakers back to Austin to attempt to remedy their third consecutive botch — the "Robin Hood" plan, which the courts declared unconstitutional.

The new plan was such a well-kept secret until after Election Day that left-out lawmakers speculated there actually wasn't one.

Of course, there was, but with every state House and Senate seat up for election, only a fool would bring up the subject of new taxes.

Or illegal taxes. The Texas Supreme Court struck down the Robin Hood plan for creating an illegal state property tax.

The tax was collected all summer anyway, and still is today — even as lawmakers sit down to the opening gavel.

It is the third time that lawmakers — most of them lawyers — got a failing grade in bill writing.

No, this is not the stuff political careers are made of.

Session A Gamble?

Some observers see little chance the legislature will approve anything in a special session; some believe it is a big gamble by the governor, now riding high in popularity polls.

In the Democrat-dominated legislature, Republicans still have

more than one-third of the House votes, enough to stop a proposed constitutional amendment.

Despite a high number of lame ducks, the votes may not be there for a routine tax increase so soon after balloting.

The best Richards and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock may hope for is to repeal the illegal aspects of school finance and try only for a consensus on a statutory concept of fair play for school funding with no tax increase.

Actual funding — the dollar amounts — would be minimal at best or delayed until new members meet in the January regular session.

The gamble for Gov. Richards is the special session may produce nothing, expanding her image of ineffectiveness on the school finance issue.

Rudd Unveils Reforms

A leading contender for Texas House Speaker last week unveiled sweeping reform proposals that would curtail the role of the powerful but secretive Calendars Committee and realign key committees.

Rep. Jim Rudd, D-Brownfield, sent copies of his proposals to House members, who will elect the next speaker in January. He and Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, are thought to be locked in a battle for the 76 votes needed. Rep. David Cain, D-Dallas, also is thought to be a front-runner.

Rudd proposed the following:

- Abolish the Calendars Committee. Bills passed by committee would stay in the chief clerk's office until 30 House members state in writing their support for bringing the bill to the floor for debate.
- Require that the chair of the Corrections Committee come from an urban area.
- Prohibit the chair of the Insurance Committee from being a trial lawyer or a person who has a financial interest in the insurance industry.
- The chair of the Public Education Committee would have to be committed to education policy, not education finance. Education finance issues would go to another

committee.

A House Finance Committee would be established by merging the Ways and Means and Appropriations. Three permanent subcommittees would be created: expenditures, revenue and strategic planning. Members of each subcommittee would elect their chairs.

Meanwhile, speaker hopeful Rep. Tom Uher, D-Bay City, ended his candidacy in favor of Laney.

Bee County Prison Talks

Bee County officials have agreed to negotiate with the state prison system, which wants to buy or lease parts of Chase Field to relocate a backlog of prisoners now jamming county jails.

The Beeville-Bee County Redevelopment Council voted unanimously to begin negotiations, said Brad Arvin, the group's executive director.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice wants to locate the prison system's regional headquarters, training facilities and maximum-security cluster units at the defunct military base.

Other Highlights

- Hundreds of Texans picked up \$125,000 in unclaimed money and stock at this year's State Fair of Texas. "More than 33,000 people visited the state Treasury's unclaimed property booth at the fair," said Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison.
- Former state Rep. David Hudson, a vocal lottery opponent, has been hired to watch over the state's lottery contracts. Hudson, of Tyler, said his opposition to the lottery while he was a lawmaker would not hinder his ability to oversee the contracts.
- Three groups of Texas farmers will travel to Paris for a firsthand look at the French high-speed rail transit system and to ask their French counterparts if the train has disrupted their lives. Texas TGC Corp., holder of the Texas franchise, is sponsoring the trips. Many Texas farmers are opposed to the train, with would connect Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Austin.

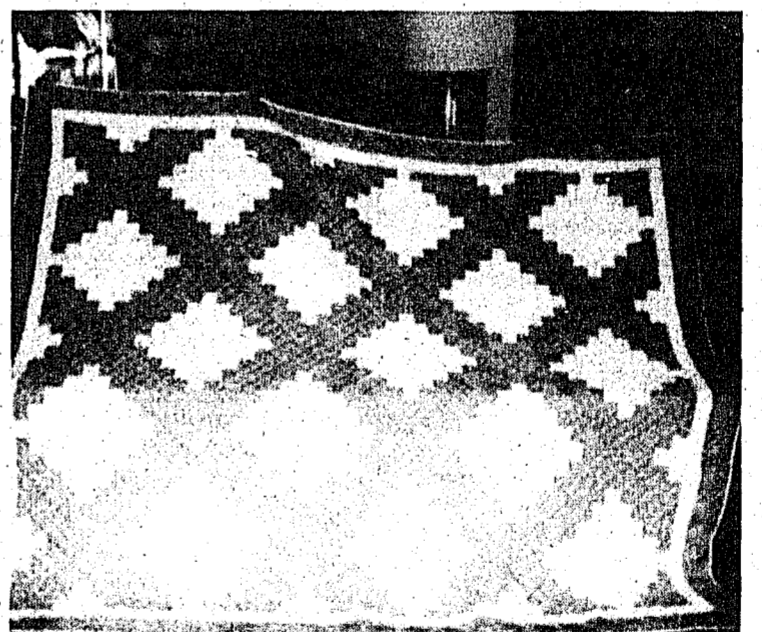
