Commissioners Okay Three Percent Tax Hike

Members of the County Commissioners Court, in session yesterday, scheduled a public hearing on the proposed budget for Wednesday, September 30, at 10 a.m. in the Courthouse, and then set the new tax rate with only a three percent increase. At this level of increase a public hearing on the tax rate is not required.

The current tax rate is .4670 on the hundred dollar valuation. The three percent increase will move that figure to .5038. For the budget, project receipts come to \$1,731,171.00, with projected disbursements listed at \$1,693,116.00.

There was discussion on the county's participation in the proposed 15 miles of rebuilding of FM 503 south of Valera, leading to the Lake Ivie area. Action on the matter was delayed, pending the

receipt of more information on the county's financial involvement. The state has earmarked \$5-million for the project, and it is understood that construction is to begin in the spring of 1993.

District Extension Service Agents were present with people they were recommending to fill the two positions in Coleman County. These two people, Carol Katzer and Marty Gibbs, were hired, as covered in another story, with pictures, on this page.

Deputy Sheriff Mike Bowers was present to discuss the proposal to advertise for bids for two new vehicles for the department. Decision was made for the advertisement for bids to be placed in the Coleman newspaper, one for two pickups with extended cabs and another for two full-size passenger

cars. Both bids were to include with trade-ins and without trade-ins.

Veteran Service Officer Floyd Gilbreath advised the Court of his need for a copy machine. He explained there are 930 recipients in the county who must file forms from time to time and he needs to have a copy of each of these forms. Decision was made to look into the cost of a copier to fit the needs.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing presented bills for payment, totaling \$51,181.24. Of that amount, \$35,877.73 were for the general fund, and the balance was for precincts, as follows: Precinct 1, \$2,711.72; Precinct 2, \$2,954.41; Precinct 3, \$4,193.24; and Precinct 4, \$5,444.14. The bills were approved for payment.

Prepared by County Treasurer Barbara Freeman, a financial statement was presented, which listed fund balance as of August 31, 1992 as follows: Worker's Compensation, \$25,757.83; Records Management, \$12,820.93; General Road & Bridge, \$85,850.31; Precinct 1, \$97,956.92; Precinct 2, \$29,703.76; Precinct 3, \$7,520.30; Precinct 4, \$120,928.17; General Fund, \$1,908.70.

Fund totals came to \$382,446.92, with a footnote that \$380,155.38 of that amount is invested in money market funds, earning interest at the rate of 3.40 percent, and that total interest earned is \$15,124.37. Outstanding liabilities on equipment from the General Road and Bridge Fund totaled \$19,292.05.

Mountaineers Look To Cross Plains Buffaloes After Taming The Wildcats

The Mountaineers are looking forward to going up against the Cross Plains Buffaloes after taming the Rising Star Wildcats 30-6 last Friday night.

Coached by former Santa Anna coach, Doug Dallas, Cross Plains is a veteran team with eight returning offensive and nine defensive starters. Last year the Buffaloes lost seven of its first eight games before winning its last two district starts, but are expected to fare much better in their district standing this year.

They were beaten by a strong Roby team last week, 33-20.

Commenting on their win over Rising Star, Santa Anna is expected to meet the challenge of the Buffaloes.

Paul Morris was the pace setter

for the Mountaineers against Rising Star, gaining 223 yards in 17 carries and scoring on runs of 76 and 67 yards.

Teammate Anthony Thomas got into the big play action with a 42-yard touchdown sprint. Thomas finished the game with 116 total yards to his credit.

Billy Thomas' one-yard scoring run rounded out the Mountaineers, scoring. Santa Anna crossed the goal line twice in the second quarter to take a halftime lead of 14-0 after a defensive standoff in the first period of play.

The Mountaineers added 16 points to their total in the final quarter.

Rising Star scored in the fourth quarter with a little over a minute

to play in the game. Santa Anna came back after that to answer with their fourth and final TD.

The Mountaineers racked up a total of 422 yards on the ground and held Rising Star to 30 yards rushing on 33 tries. Santa Anna was able to complete only one pass in 11 attempts.

SAHS Band Will Take Part In Sims Governor For Day Event Saturday

AUSTIN--A large delegation of West Texas citizens will be on hand when their State Senator Bill Sims is sworn in as governor for the day on September 19.

A convoy of charter buses is expected to bring several hundred West Texans to the capitol city for the day-long festivities, according to Raul Garcia, chairman of the Tom Green County Sims Governor for a Day steering committee.

Garcia and other county steering committee chairmen are urging residents of the 25th State Senatorial District to take part in the event, which will begin at 12 noon when Sims is sworn in as Governor for the day during a ceremony in the House chamber. A reception will follow in the Governor's Reception Room.

Also planned will be a barbecue lunch at 1 p.m. on the west side of the capitol grounds in which lamb, cabrito, tortillas, kolaches, and other West Texas cuisine will be served.

In addition to the barbecue, high school bands from more than a dozen 25th District communities will hold concerts on the grounds, followed by Sam Lewis' armadillo races and performances by a group of clowns. The Fort Concho Infantry from San Angelo also will set up an encampment on the grounds.

During the swearing-in ceremony, choirs from Midland College and Angelo State University will perform in the House chamber. Entertainment in the capitol rotunda will feature the Ballet Azteca

Folklorico, the seven-piece senior citizen band from Kingsland and the San Angelo Square and Round Dance Club.

Garcia said roundtrip tickets for the chartered bus from San Angelo will be \$20 each, and the noon barbecue will be \$15. All other events are free. Ticket information in San Angelo is available from the San Angelo Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Santa Anna High School Band will be among several West Texas bands holding concerts during the afternoon activities. Others will include San Saba, Mertzon, Del Rio, Medina, Ingram, Copperas Cove, Imperial, Harper, Comfort, Ballinger, Brownwood, Mason, Ozona and Fabens.

Other capitol grounds activities will include armadillo races, the Fort Concho Infantry encampment and clowns to entertain the children.

For 47 years Alvine Johnson has directed the church Christmas pageants. What happens when the women decide to change that? You really must read the last chapter. It will be a real blessing.

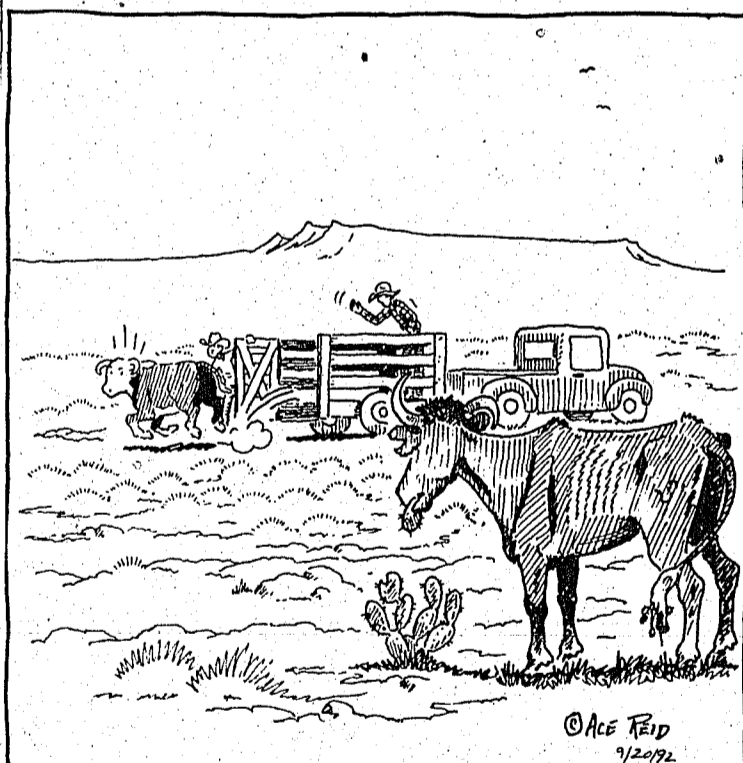

Notice Of Comparable Tax Rate And Revenues

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (S.3.1.) the tax rate for last year provides \$6.193 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (S.3.351) that same rate now provides \$6.542 per student in state and local revenues.

State law requires a minimum tax rate of \$1.04 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna School District hereby gives notice that it has adopted a tax rate of \$36 that will provide \$5.008 per student in state and local taxes.
