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

## Open Letter To Citizens Of S' Anna

Toward the goal of establishing Santa Anna as the center of Comanche Indian history, the Chamber of Commerce is asking

for your assistance. Much of what is known about the Comanche comes from books. What we lack is real evidence. We would like for those of you who have stories about this area to help us out. If possible, we would like for you to write the stories in your own hand and share them with us. Tape recordings are also good. These are important to fill in pieces of the puzzle. For example, stories from older generations of hearths or burned rocks on hilltops could be evidence of smoke signaling.

Other important items are historical artifacts. Historical records show that the Comanche traded metal points, trade beads, brass, tin and silver, as well as

using stone and flint. Since we have only heard of the stone and flint, the other objects have probably been picked up in the past. If anyone knows of such items or stories of such items this would be very important to help fill in the puzzle.

If you can help us we will all benefit. We want to see our community become the center of Comanche history in Texas. We will help document and catalogue your stories and/or collections to share with others.

## "Fair Share Plan" Is Classic Case Of Passing The Buck

As Texas legislators headed to Austin last week to begin a month-long, special session on school finance, school officials found themselves in a frenzy about a proposal that will supposedly put an end to the educational crisis our state now faces. The question that remains, however, is whether this plan will also put an end to small schools as well.

Recently Governor Ann Richards, Lt Governor Bob Bullock and Speaker Gib Lewis unveiled the "Fair Share Plan" to finance public education in Texas. All educational organizations are disappointed and dismayed by this plan and in the state's lack of commitment to adequately fund Texas' public education system.

The "Fair Share Plan" is a classic case of passing the buck from the state to local school districts -- but bucks will come from the pockets of local property taxpayers. The plan will cause the largest local property tax hike in Texas history and it will result in a drastic reduction in state aid for our students. It is a lose-lose situation.

A reduction in state aid means only one thing -- another substantial increase in property taxes -- an increase to the tune of perhaps \$2.5 - \$3 billion over the biennium.

## City Council Meets

The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session November 10 and heard from Scott Patterson, representing the Fire Department. Patterson discussed the purchase of a used fire truck. The City of San Angelo has a 1974 Ford Chasses pumper up for bids with a minimum bid of \$10,000.00. The truck includes some equipment such as hose. A motion was made and carried that the City approve the purchase of this vehicle up to \$15,000 with the Fire Department contributing \$5,000, for a total bid of \$20,000, provided the bid is accepted.

A motion was made and carried to vote for Gary Butts, Deputy City Manager from Brownwood for the TML Group Benefits Risk Pool Board of Trustees.

The City received two bids for janitorial services at the armory. One bid was monthly and one was hourly. The council felt the bids should be resubmitted as both either on a monthly basis or an hourly basis so they can be properly compared. The council agreed that a job description be prepared so there will not be any questions concerning the duties.

Christmas holidays were set for December 24 and 25. New Year's holidays will begin on December 31 at noon and continue through January 1. The City's Open House was set for December 18. The em-

Public education costs will remain constant next year.

Though the proposal would add \$650 million in new state funds to public schools over the biennium, schools will have more students to educate, more classrooms to build, and more teachers to pay.

Additionally, schools will be faced with salary increases as

required by law, continued pressure to bring classroom teachers' salaries up to the national average, and higher health benefits.

On top of that, schools, like Texans, will see increases in utility and transportation costs next year. All of this will more than offset the increase in state aid, leading to an

## Cordero Baptist Dedicated

A dedication service was held Sunday evening, November 15, at Cordero Baptist Church in Santa Anna to observe the transition from a mission to an independent church. The Mexican-American congregation started meeting in the early 1980's under the sponsorship of First Baptist Church, with other financial assistance from the Coleman County Baptist Association, Texas Baptist Home Mission Board and individuals.

The new church, under the leadership of their pastor, Joe Frausto, lists 49 charter members. Gabriel Rosales is deacon, and Arsenio Martinez is music leader.

The Rev. Waide Messer, pastor of the First Baptist Church, was in charge of the dedication program, and the FBC adult choir and soloist Gabriel Rosales presented special music.

Speaker for the service was Rev.

Ferris Akins, Baptist Area Missionary from Ballinger.

During the early years, the congregation met in various places for weekly services, with Salome Guzman as the first pastor. In late 1983 work began on a new building at the corner of South Sixth Street and Avenue C. Pablo Serna, a ministerial student at Howard Payne University, was pastor at that time. Moses Padillo as pastor when the group moved into the new building in June, 1984. There have been several other pastors of the congregation, with Joe Frausto assuming the leadership in September of 1991.

About 100 people were on hand for the service to celebrate the achievement of the church as it reaches independent status, with affiliation in the Coleman County Baptist Association and Texas Baptist Convention.

## The Penatukaha Comanches

Two men who were very important to the nineteenth century Penatuhkah Comanches were Mopechucupe (Old Owl), the Penatuhkah civil chief, and Robert S. Neighbors, the agent to the Texas Indians. Many insights into both men can be gained through the tale of their first meeting. The following account was taken from Robert Simpson Neighbors and the Texas Frontier 1836-1859 by Kenneth Neighbours. This book is usually found in special collections of libraries. Barbara Ledbetter, historian at the Fort Belknap archives, has access to a few remaining copies for those who want to add this book to their collection.

...While Neighbors was with the Tonkawas, a band of about forty Comanche warriors led by Old Owl rode into camp....Neighbors used the

opportunity to establish friendly relations with the Comanches, explaining his functions as agent, and expressing the desire of the government for peace, especially with the Comanches. The chief replied that the whites were great rascals, but he liked the Major and especially his coat. The Major, understanding the import of the compliment, made him a present of it. Others expressed this admiration for portions of his clothing, until stood forth in only his shirt. The Major laughed heartily at their grotesque appearance as they strutted about with portions of his of his recently acquired wardrobe upon their tawny figures. The Comanches were so pleased with his generosity that they proposed to adopt him into their tribe and to take him along on a horse stealing raid among the Mexicans.... (page 27).

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.**

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A asymptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

AUSTIN--This Thanksgiving start a new tradition in your family by serving a "Totally Texas Menu".

From the gobble to the sweet potato pie, planning a menu of foods grown or processed in Texas is easy, affordable and wholesome.

"As Thanksgiving approaches, we Texans are truly blessed with an abundant harvest," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "We produce all the ingredients necessary for a sumptuous holiday feast right here in the Lone Star State."

Perry launched the Texas Department of Agriculture's "Totally Texas Menu" campaign last November to encourage supermarkets, hotels, caterers and consumers to market and consume meals using Texas foods and beverages—not only during the holidays but year-round.

Thanksgiving is an especially bountiful season in Texas. With fall vegetable harvest under way in the Rio Grande Valley and South Texas, broccoli, cauliflower, winter squash, celery and lettuce should be plentiful.

Pecan harvest has also begun, the East Texas sweet potato harvest is in and shipments of grapefruit and

oranges are rolling out of the Valley to markets statewide.

As for the main course, turkey supplies are expected to be excellent this year. Whole birds will average about 95 cents a pound, but consumers will find bargains at supermarkets featuring Thanksgiving specials. Ham, which is being sold at competitive prices, is also abundant.

Perry said a "Totally Texas" Thanksgiving menu may feature this typical holiday fare, but it doesn't necessarily have to.

"The state's cultural heritage is so varied and its agricultural production so bountiful, it's possible to prepare a whole range of alternatives without straying from the Texas concept," he said.

Possible substitutes might include Hill Country ranch-raised venison of West Texas prime rib, and for dessert, instead of traditional pie, an apple strudel—a favorite of Czech Texans—or a creamy Mexican flan.

And don't forget to toast the holiday with a bottle of Texas wine from one of the state's 26 wineries, or glasses of chilled Texas milk or Texas bottled water.

## Hunter Ethics — Be a Good Guest

Being in the spotlight is not necessarily a good thing. If it casts too dark a shadow, a spotlight might become the headlight on the locomotive of public opinion. This is a fact American hunters are currently facing.

The "animal rights" movement, once dismissed as a group of extremists, has improved its image. Powerful and emotional messages against hunting are being presented to an increasingly urban populace that has little firsthand experience with the natural cycle of life and even less real knowledge of what hunters contribute to wildlife.

American hunters started the wildlife conservation movement at the turn of the century and have overwhelmingly financed it ever since. Such technical facts, however, seldom fit a 20-second TV soundbite. Also, hunters have an image problem — too often we do look like "goons with guns." An honest and critical appraisal of our hunting ethics and approach now is needed. Soon, simply being "legal" may not be enough.

Every successful hunter is proud of his buck, but not everyone on the highway wants to see it lashed across the car hood. Show respect for your game and for others' sensibilities.

The display of firearms intimidates and frightens some people. Even in hunting country, making a carload of non-hunting tourists feel like they might experience a B-movie plot doesn't help the hunters' image.

Our bewildered faces, muddy boots and hunting clothes drenched in deer scent make a strong impression in the local restaurants. If shaking off society's shackles, including shaves and showers, contributes to your "rugged and manly" outdoor experience, fine. But keep your experience to times when you are either outdoors or by yourself. Clean up before you go into town and inflict yourself on people who favor regular bathing.

Hunter safety is not just for kids. The world is getting more crowded and so are hunting areas. The veteran hunter who learned his craft almost alone can be dangerous in the modern woods.

In these recessionary times, state hunter-safety training programs could be a target for budget cuts. Take the course and support your state's hunter-safety program — it may be the future of hunting in America.

Hunter/landowner relations also are critical to hunting's future. Rural landowners control much of the hunting land in the country, and many are fed up with goons with guns. Sure, it's the poachers and slob who litter, cut fences and shoot up signs, gates, cows and family pets. But, who forgot to close the gate that let a dairy herd out on the highway? Who trampled standing crops? Do you know what gunning a 4-wheel drive across a wet field does to the field? The farmer does.

Ask permission before entering private land. But remember, the farmer's tractor is his "office" — interruptions during critical planting and harvest times are not appreciated. Call at a convenient time, present yourself as a safe and responsible person and say "thank you" in a tangible way. On private land, you are the landowner's guest; on public land, you are the public's guest — act like one. ■



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actual decrease in state aid per pupil.

In essence, the local property tax continues to be the cash cow of public education because of state policy, a policy that has been declared unconstitutional on three successive occasions and cannot be made right by a constitutional amendment, which this plan proposes.

The state leadership says they won't support a tax bill because the people of Texas have made their voices loud and clear. But the taxpayers are only given half the story. They have not been told that the "Fair Share Plan" will cause local property taxes to skyrocket, and that even the poorest of the poor school districts will have to raise local property taxes to unbearable levels just to stay even.

Under the "Fair Share Plan" the poorest school district in the state, Edcouch-Elsa ISD will have to increase taxes by 22 cents for an increase of only \$48.00 per weighted student. Edgewood ISD the lead plaintiff in the school finance lawsuit, will be forced to raise local property taxes next year by 28 cents just to break even.

In Santa Anna ISD, with a combined tax rate of \$1.40 currently, we will be forced to raise taxes another 13 cents by the 94th school year in order to stay even.

Unfortunately, the "Fair Share Plan" becomes the "unfair Share Plan" for Texas school children and Texas property taxpayers.

When you go to buy an automobile, you realize there is a relationship between cost and quality. Public education is no different.

The citizens of Texas and state officials continue to demand a world-class education system while the state considers lowering funding

per student. But a world-class education isn't built on a shoestring budget or on a state that thinks so poorly of its children that it ranks 36th out of 50 in the amount of money it spends on their education.

Governor Richards said recently, "If you can't fill the till, don't pass the bill." Those of us at the local level must urge her to heed her own advice and come up with a plan that adequately funds public education.

We have run out of band-aids in Texas. It's time for major surgery... for our future...for our children.

restrict what can be picked up due to restrictions on what can be taken at the landfill and specify what will be picked up at the curb. The project will be looked into further with the possibility of the first clean-up to be held in March or April, 1993.

Superintendent of Operations Deriel Warnock reported that more extensive work is being done at the water treatment plant. The final inspection of the sewer farm project was held November 13. The mowing equipment for the sewer farm will cost approximately \$9,200.00. The remaining balance of the construction account will be used for this equipment, but it is not expected to cover the total cost. A motion was to allow the City to pick up the balance up to \$2,000 on the mowing equipment carried.


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
