

Who Was Santa Anna?

Only two cities in Texas are named for Comanche Indian Chiefs: Quanah in north Texas and Santa Anna in central Texas. Both memorialize great men of the Comanche Tribe. Quanah is named for the last great war chief. Santa Anna is named for one of the first. Little is known of the man, Santa Anna. There is no photograph, since he died prior to widespread photography. As far as we know, the only western artist to work among the Comanche at this early date was Catlin and it appears that none of his works identify Santa Anna. There exist a few written descriptions such as the German attractive and "well countenanced" but non describe his facial features. Santa Anna, or San-tana, or San-

history of Texas. The earliest maps creaties which ceded Comanche land drawn by Anglo cartographers show few geographic features but several note the placement of the "Santa Anna Peaks". Santa Anna was probably born in the first years of the 1800's. We know from records

that he and another Penateka Comanche Chief, Buffalo Hump, died in the cholera epidemic which practically destroyed the Penatekas

in 1849. White men's bullets could not kill him but this disease did.

Santa Anna was a formidable leader of the Penateka. He

successfully led his people for Romer's. They all describe him as many years as their war chief. He was stubborn in his defense of his homeland around the peaks and refused to yield to the white man's ta-na shows up in much of the early westward expansion. He resisted all

or weakened their position until a single fateful event in his life. Very soon after Texas joined the United States, several Comanche chiefs were invited to travel to Washington D.C. to meet President James K. Polk. Since his tribe of Penatekas were receiving the most pressure from the northwestward

expansion of the whites, he accepted. In his journey to Washington D.C., Santa Anna came to realize the futility of the Comanche struggle. In his wisdom and perception, Santa Anna realized that thoughts of defeating the whites was folly. He has seen the extent of their strength.

On his return to his homeland at the peaks, Santa Anna soon became and unpopular leader. He told his fellow Comanches of what he had seen and counseled peace with the whites. No one believed him. He kept his counsel and made peace with the advancing whites, especially the neighboring "tribe" of white to his immediate south in Fredericksburg, the Germans. He made fast friends and traded with his southern neighbors regularly. He refused ,however, to make peace with the Mexicans. This "tribe" he reserved the right to raid and attack whenever he found them. It was on his return from one of these raids that he contracted cholera and died in 1849



GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

All Departments are subject to the following rules and regulations. 1. All work exhibited must be made by Coleman County residents

2. All articles must be the work of the exhibitor and must have been completed within the past 12 months.

3. Work must not have been previously entered in the Fiesta de la Paloma or Coleman County Fair. 4. Department Chairwoman. helpers and judges are disqualified from entering the department in which they are assigned.

5. Entries will be accepted between 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. Friday, October 2 and 7:30 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Saturday, October 3, not before or after.

6. Judging will be conducted between 9 and 11 a.m. No one will be allowed in the building during this time except for judges and department chairwomen.

7. The building will be open to the public from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m.

8. Entries will not be released before 4:30 p.m., but should be picked up by 5 p.m.

9. Exhibitors are responsible for completing an entry form for each item exhibited. Items left without a completed entry form will be disqualified.

10. More than one entry may be entered in each class.

People are very generous in meeting the needs of our library. Donations to the building fund keep coming in. Volunteers help build and help keep the library open. People donate new and used books.

At the beginning of the summer, we asked for easy reading books for our lower elementary children. At that time we had one shelf about half full of easy reading books. Now the shelf is almost full. The Richters brought a big box of new books--mostly easy readers. Others donated used books. There were several easy readers in every box of books donated.

Last week I was working in the children's section and noticed that we do not have many books in the children's non-fiction section. We have a good selection of biographies. One small bookcase holds all of our other non-fiction books. This includes history, science, sports, religion, social studies and other factual material.

Just before I left the library I started sorting the children's books that were in the boxes from our friend, Chuck Weeth in Abilene. There are 23 new children's books. Almost three quarters of them are non-fiction.

AUSTIN - Gov. Ann Richards' administration fought political spinout last week amid the resignations of two top appointees.

Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero quit her post after remorsefully admitting she did indeed lie on her political biographies and resumes; and

State prison board chairman Sheldon Hale resigned after board member Joshua Allen complained to Gov. Richards that Hale targeted him for a police probe.

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Guerrero, whose appointment last year symbolized Richards' "New Texas", was the first woman and Hispanic to sit on the commission, which regulates oil and gas and trucking.

Richards and Guerrero drew flack because she had not one day's experience in any of those industries; now Richards is bleeding politically because Guerrero, it turns out, lied about having a college degree.

The governor, insiders said, was "madder than hell" over the damage done by her protege and campaign general.

But she and Guerrero have traveled too many roads to end their close alliance; when Guerrero asked for advice, she replied "do what is best for you as a person." Guerrero apologized, but Hale did not.

Complains to Richards

Hale, an Amarillo attorney, had ordered a conflict-of-interest probe of fellow board member Allen, a Beaumont contractor.

But he did not first notify the governor's office, as required by

Allen, the first African-American to sit on the panel and also a Richards appointee, complained to her when he found out he was a target.

A governor's spokesperson said Richards believed the probe hurt unity on the board, but did not ask Hale to quit.

Hale won't say if she did; he did say he thought the probe was proper, even if it turned up no evidence, and that he would probably do it again.

Morales Steps In

Hale's departure could jeopardize a pending settlement of the long drawn-out Ruiz prison reform lawsuit.

Attorney General Dan Morales had Llso clashed with Hale, mainly over the proposed settlement of the Ruiz case.

Morales thought Hale, a trial lawyer, negotiated a pact too soft on inmates and favoring the prison inmates' San Francisco lawyers at the taxpayers' expense.

Morales called on Richards to name a prosecuting attorney as Hale's successor, a tougher negotiator.

In response, the San Francisco lawyers for the prison inmates warned they may not sign off on the settlement, if they think the prison board is changing directions.

Guerrero: Odds Good

Capitol insiders give Guerrero a good chance at winning the election because she has \$1 million in TV ads bought and paid for.

"Don't underestimate what a \$1 million media buy can do." cautioned one veteran Democrat.

Her Republican opponent, Barry Williamson, doesn't have near the financial resources, although his chances of getting more contributions now are enhanced.

Guerrero's Credibility

The big issue is Guerrero's credibility; she may have shot herself in the foot again, even as she salved the first wounds. CONTINUED BACK PAGE





Continued From page 3 rode on is a school bus that takes children to school in the winter, and is used as a tour bus in the summer. It is noisy, like all school

buses, but the driver-tour guide and all the people on it were really friendly, it was almost like being on a family outing. We left on the bus at 10:00 a.m., our driver-tour guide was a junior student at the University of Alaska at Fairbanks, majoring in engineering, but said he thought he would change it to teaching, as he really enjoys driving the bus in the park. If you ever go to Denali, I hope you will get him for your guide, he was very informative. His name is Bill Evans.

Still rainy, and snowed on us for a little while, but soon turned back to mist. You will see forests of spruce, birch, willow, hemlock, aspen, cottonwood, popular, larch and tamarac; and quite a few wildflowers can be found here. There are forests of small trees called Taiga Forests, this name means "little sticks" in Russian, they are pruce trees. There are 155 speci of birds, 37 species of mammals and approximately 450 species of plants. You are driving through the Alaskan Range of mountains, but a lot of the mountains in the park have their own names. There are five rivers, the Savage River, the Sanctuary River, Teklanika, East Fork and Toklat River. There are several rest areas, with portable toilets, park ranger stations, Eielson Visitors Center, and the road is gravel, but in fairly good shape. We saw grizzly bear sows with their cubs, caribou with some calves, a few moose with their calves, a Hoary Marmot, a ground squirrel, Dall Sheep, and a wolf, which really excited our guide as he said he knew drivers who had been driving for years and never saw a wolf. 
