The Mountaineers are ready for a win this week when they face Miles Friday night before a Homecoming crowd.

They will be the first to admit that they allowed miscues to beat them last week at Roby. They fumbled twice on their first two possessions inside the 20-yard line setting the tone for the 6-0 loss. Adding insult to injury, the Mountaineers also received penalties totaling 75 yards.

The lone score came in the third quarter when the Roby Lions hit paydirt on a 24-yard run.

The Black and Gold won in stats but were unable to win the war in the endzone. SAHS had 15 first downs to 8 for Roby. The Mountaineers rushed for 176 yards, led by Billy Wayne Thomas who racked up 116 yards. Roby was held to 112 yards rushing and 34 passing. Vicente Frausto threw for 65 yards for the Mountaineers.

Coach John Smith commented that defensively, Glen Donham and Rusty Fleeman put out strong

performances. Donham had an interception to his credit and made several key tackles in the secondary. Fleeman was touted for having held his own at defensive end.

The Mountaineers are now 2-3 for the season and will host the Miles Bulldogs starting at 7:30 Friday.

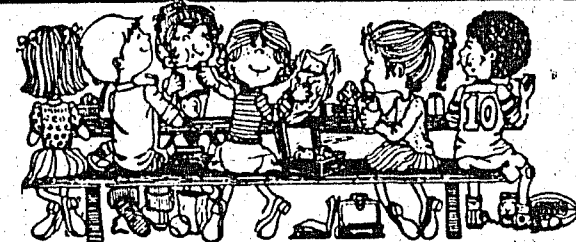

# North to Alaska

## Second week

On this morning, Wednesday, the 19th, it is cloudy when we get up, but soon clears, and are we glad to see the sun for a change. We find out that Mt. Spurr had erupted yesterday, and spewed ash for 360 miles east of Anchorage. Mt. Spurr is west of Anchorage, across the Cook Inlet, it covered Anchorage, Whittier and Valdez, but did not go north, so we didn't get any ash in North Pole. First time this mountain had erupted since 1953, according to the newspaper.

After all our riding of yesterday, we were on the road again today. The water in North Pole is not very good to drink, so they go to Fox, which is north of Fairbanks a few miles, and get fresh water. We drove around North Pole a little more, and then headed for Fox. Between Fox and Fairbanks is the halfway mark of the Alaska Pipeline. So, we stopped here and took a few pictures, read about the pipeline, and there is a visitors center here, also. The pipeline is a little over 800 miles long, and starts at Purdoo Bay on the Arctic Ocean, and goes in a zig zag fashion down to Valdez, part of the way, it is underground, and goes over mountains, across rivers, follows the road part of the way to Valdez. We went on to Fox and got the water in five gallon jugs, then just drove around the countryside for a while.

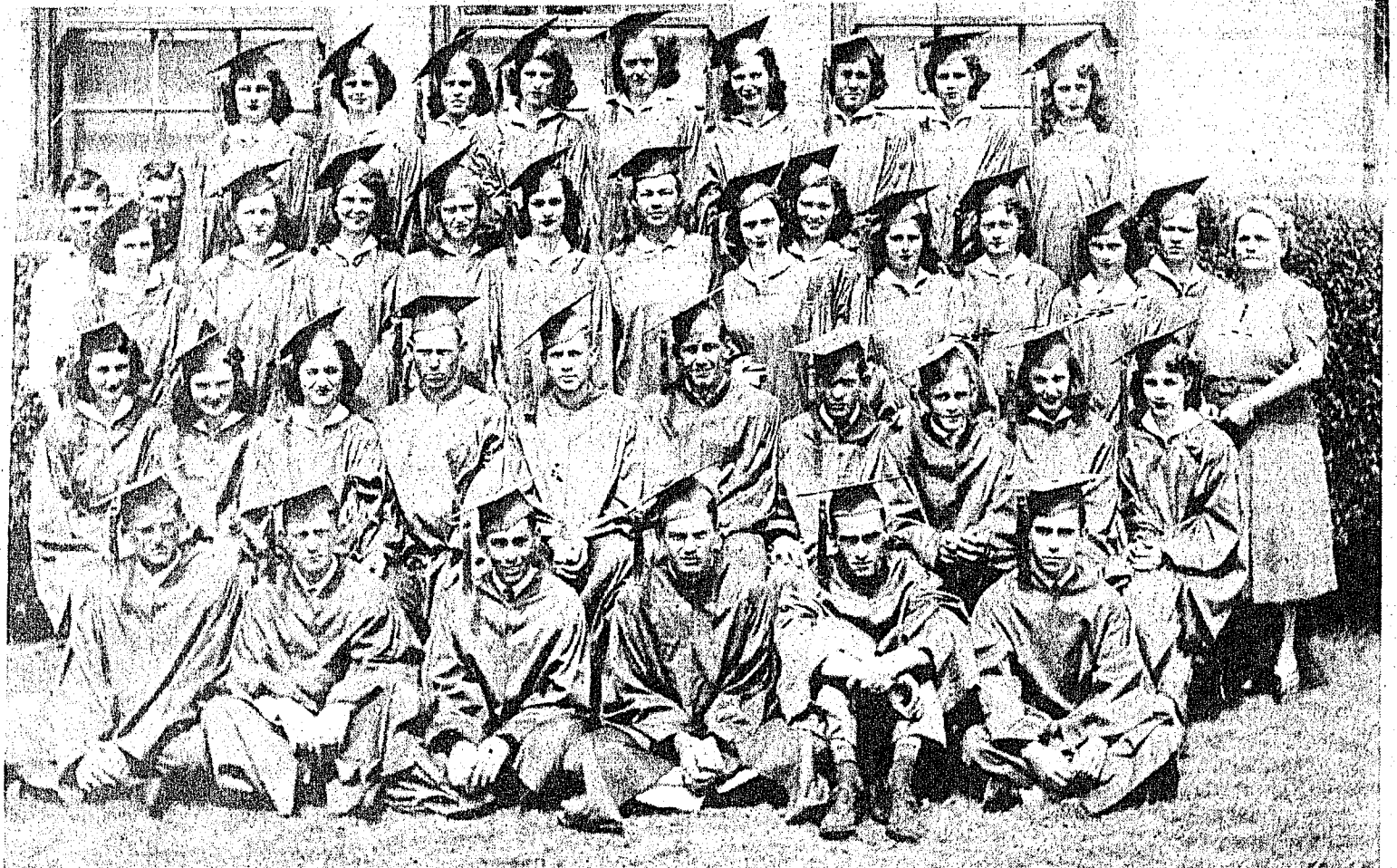
In Fairbanks, we went to Alaskaland, which is a Theme Park. In 1967, the local Pioneers of Alaska, made available a 44 acre park site, known as Alaskaland Pioneer Park, and it a memorial to the role that Fairbanks has played in Alaskan history. They have bought old log cabins from around the state, and restored them, and use them as gift shops. There is the Observation Train Car that President Harding rode on when he went to Alaska to drive the Golden Spike in the railroad, when it was finished. It has been restored. Also, you will see the second largest wooden sternwheeler paddle boat, the Chena Sternwheeler, which was used on the Chena River for several years, and then just anchored and left for quite a few years. They have restored it, and it is open for viewing. There is a quilt that took 24 Pioneer Auxiliary Women and one grandson to make. It depicts scenes of Alaska's history, and was made in honor of the railroad and highway.

We didn't tarry too long in looking around, as we wanted to see the demonstration of the Indian Olympics, which is held in the park also. This is called The World Eskimo-Indian Olympics, and they do not do the games for medals, but to keep themselves in condition during the winter. This day, there

were five tribes represented, three girls and two boys; Eskimo, Aleut, Haida, Athabaskan and Tlingit. It was a very enjoyable demonstration and was glad we had the opportunity to watch it. When this was over, it was getting late, so we went back to North Pole and rested, then to bed.

Woke up on Thursday, the 20th, to clouds. Thank goodness it cleared up later in the day. Baked cookies, washed clothes, rounded up our things, as when we leave in the morning, we won't be coming back to North Pole. Late that afternoon, we went to Ester, which is about 17 miles southwest of Fairbanks, to an old fire station which has been converted into a theater, called The Fire House Theater. Here they show slides of The Northern Lights, that have been taken by the owner, LeRoy Zimmerman. Very impressive, but would really like to have seen the real thing. Was just too cloudy, and they didn't start till about 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning. Went back to North Pole, and went to the Refinery Lounge, which was built in 1901 on a refinery site. There is a wall of Velcro, and the owners have made a suit of the other half of Velcro. Someone will put the suit on, then run and jump at the wall, they land in all sorts of positions, then get their picture made. But this night, they had a new game. They had a "bowling ball" made out of iron, with a seat inside, a place for your hands and feet, after you are strapped in with a helmet on, some men will spin the "ball" around and around, and then roll it toward the "pins" made out of heavy plastic, trying to make a strike. I didn't see women doing this, but a lot of the men did. We stayed long enough to watch three or four men do it. Headed for Anita's and bed, as we have got up early in morning.

Fairbanks is Alaska's second largest city, and the northern most city on the Alcan Highway. An Italian immigrant, Felix Pedro discovered gold in 1902, near the Chena River; and Captain E. T. Barnette had set up a trading post nearby. When the gold rush shifted to the immense Yukon Basin, he moved his post. Due to the influence of Judge James Wickersham in St. Michael, Fairbanks was named after Charles W. Fairbanks, senator from Indiana. It became the business center of interior Alaska, with a telegraph line, and a road of sorts connecting Fairbanks to the port city of Valdez, 376 miles to the southeast. The town had about 5,000 inhabitants, with another 5,000 scattered around a dozen mining camps in the outlying areas. A narrow-gauge railroad was built to link these camps to south bound riverboats carrying gold. In the next 70 years, there followed the effects of military spending and construction, the victory of statehood, a devastating flood and the discovery of oil. The Russians owned

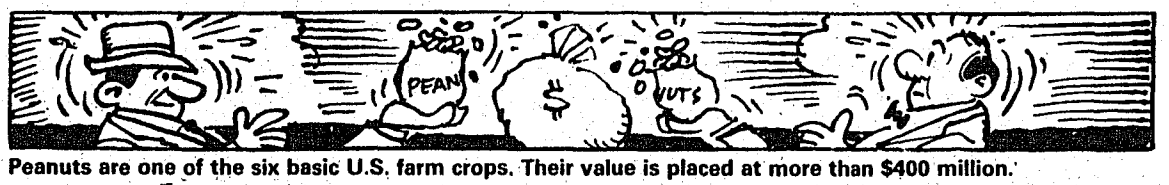

Alaska, but sold it to the U.S. in 1867, for \$7,200,000.00. In Sitka, Alaska, but sold October 18, 1867, the Russian flag was lowered and the U.S. flag was raised. But it did not become a state until 1959. The waters of the Chena River overflowed in 1967, flooding Fairbanks. Federal aid helped businesses rebuild and residents received low-interest financing to restore their homes, or build new ones. In 1915, Congress set aside land in the Tanana Valley for a land-grant institution. The new college opened its doors in 1922, with six students and six faculty. By 1962, there were 1,200 students. Other colleges were later opened, but the University of Alaska at Fairbanks, remains the statewide administration and main campus.

In 1968 Purdoo Bay oil lease sale brought the state its first riches. There were plenty of jobs and money for several years, but by 1979, it was bust time. The economy turned around again, and between 1980 and 1986, the state had become rich again. Fairbanks is the seat for the Federal Court in Alaska. There are museums of all kinds, orchestras, operas, arts of all kinds, festivals of all kinds, all sorts of sports, churches, hotels, motels, bed and breakfasts, shopping malls, library, a hospital, airport, train, and buses, plus much more.
