

She died Tuesday, September 29, 1992 at Leisure Lodge Nursing Home in Coleman.



By Mrs. L. Brusenhan, Jr. Editors Note: Mrs. Brusenhan is sharing with us Alaska as seen there her eyes. This will be a series of articles over several weeks.

Second week On this morning, Wednesday, the 19th, it is cloudy when we get up, but soon clears, and are we glad to see the sun for a change. We find out that Mt. Spurr had erupted yesterday, and spewed ash for 360 miles east of Anchorage. Mt. Spurr is west of Anchorage, across the Cook Inlet, it covered Anchorage, Whittier and Valdez, but did not go north, so we didn't get any ash in North Pole. First time this mountain had erupted since 1953, according to the news-

After all our riding of yesterday, we were on the road again today. The water in North Pole is not very good to drink, so they go to Fox, which is north of Fairbanks a few miles, and get fresh water. We drover around North Pole a little more, and then headed for Fox. Between Fox and Fairbanks is the halfway mark of the Alaska Pipeline. So, we stopped here and took a few pictures, read about the pipeline, and there is a visitors center here, also. The pipeline is a little over 800 miles long, and starts at Purdoe Bay on the Arctic Ocean, and goes in a zig zag fashion down to Valdez, part of the way, it is underground, and goes over mountains, across rivers, follows the road part of the way to Valdez. We went on to Fox and got the water in five gallon jugs, then just drove around the countryside for a while.

In Fairbanks, we went to

Alaskaland, which is a Theme Park. In 1967, the local Pioneers of park site, known as Alaskaland Pioneer Park, and it a memorial to the role that Fairbanks has played in Alaskan history. They have bought old log cabins from around the state, and restored them, and use them as gift shops. There is the Observation Train Car that President Harding rode on when he went to Alaska to drive the Golden Spike in the railroad, when it was finished. It has been restored. Also, you will see the second largest wooden sternwheeler paddle boat, the Chena Sternwheeler, which was used on the Chena River for several years, and then just anchored and left for quite a few years. They have restored it, and it is open for viewing. There is a quilt that took 24 Pioneer Auxiliary Women and one grandson to make. It depicts scenes of Alaska's history, and vas made in nonor of the failfoad and highway.


We didn't tarry too long in looking around, as we wanted to see the demonstration of the Indian Olympics, which is held in the park also. This is called The World Eskimo--Indian Olympics, and they do not do the games for medals, but' to keep themselves in condition during the winter. This day, there

It was a very enjoyable demonstration and was glad we had the opportunity to watch it. When this was over, it was getting late, so we went oack to North Pole and rested, then to bed.

Woke up on Thursday, the 20th, to clouds. Thank goodness it cleared up later in the day. Baked cookies, washed clothes, rounded up our things, as when we leave in the morning, we won't be coming back to North Pole. Late that afternoon, we went to Ester, which is about 17 miles southwest of Fairbanks, to an old fire station which has been converted into a theater, called The Fire House Theater. Here they show slides of The Northern Lights, that have been taken by the owner, LeRoy Zimmerman. Very impressive, but would really liked to have seen the real thing. Was just too cloudy, and they didn't start till about 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning. Went back to North Pole, and went to the Refinery Lounge, which was built in 1901 on a refinery site. There is a wall of Velcro, and the owners have made a suit of the other half of Velcro. Someone will put the suit on, then run and jump at the wall, they land in all sorts of positions, then get their picture made. But this night, they had a new game. They had a "bowling ball" made out of iron, with a seat inside, a place for your hands and feet, after you are strapped in with a helmet on, some men will spin the "ball" around and around, and then roll it toward the "pins" made out of heavy plastic, trying to make a strike. I didn't see women doing Alaska, made available a 44 acre this, but a lot of the men did. We stayed long enough to watch three or four men do it. Headed for Anita's and bed, as we have get up early in morning.

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

In Sitka, Alaska, but sold October 18, 1867, the Russian flag was lowered and the U.S. flag was raised. But it did not become a state until 1959. The waters of the Chena River overflowed in 1967, flooding Fairbanks. Federal aid helped businesses rebuild and residents received low-interest financing to restore their homes, or build new ones. In 1915, Congress set aside land in the Tanana Valley for a land-grant institution. The new college opened its doors in 1922, with six students and six faculty. By 1962, there were 1,200 students. Other colleges were later opened, but the University of Alaska at Fairbanks, remains the statewide administration and main campus.

In 1968 Purdhoe Bay oil lease sale brought the state its first riches. Fairbanks is the seat for the Federal Court in Alaska. AUSTIN - The re-entry of Dallas billionaire Ross Perot into the presidential arena makes Texas, more than ever, a key electoral battleground.

To observers across the nation, Perot might as well have flown a blimp shaped like a big, black question mark over the Lone Star State.

Campaign students keen on historical footnotes might want to note that the home bases of President Bush, Perot and Gov. Clinton draw a tight geographical triangle between Houston, Dallas and Little

Here in his home state, Perot may have more influence; as one veteran Democrat said: "Perot hurts Clinton in other states, but he hurts Bush in Texas.'

A scenario having Perot winning Texas and one other key state, say recession-plagued California, ends with Bush or Clinton denied a majority of electoral votes, throwing the election into Congress.

There, each state gets one vote, decided in caucus by its newlyelected House members; 26 votes are needed to become president.

Six months ago, political pundits were predicting an easy Clinton win, since Democrats control most state delegations about 2 to 1.

Texas' Top Slot

In Texas, where the top state race on the ballot is for railroad commissioner, Gov. Ann Richards held a private reception at the Governor's Mansion for her beleaguered protege, Lena Guerrero.

Guerrero resigned as commission chairman two weeks ago, apologizing for falsely claiming to be a University of Texas honors gradu-

Outside the Mansion, about 40 protesters demonstrated against the reception, paid for by the wellfinanced Guerrero campaign.

Guerrero began her milliondollar media buy last week with commercials airing her apology.

Bullet Train Woes

The Texas High Speed Rail Authority, formerly chaired by Guerrero, can't raise the \$170 million needed to start the "bullet train" project by its December deadline.

The other two railroad commissioners also sit on the authority, and one, Bob Krueger, accused private companies of not delivering on promises to contribute.

The other, Jim Nugent, said he could see "the strong possibility of lawsuits over the project's derailment."

The Authority suffered charges of overspending and mismanagement this summer, and the executive director resigned.

More Prison Expenses

A federal judge slapped a ruling on the state prison system last week, ordering it to pay stiff fines for "stiffing" county jails housing state prisoners.

The judge ordered the state to pay \$50 per day for each prisoner lingering in Harris County jail because of overcrowded state prisons.

County officials called it a "complete victory."

Lawmakers had been reluctant to reimburse counties for full expenses of housing inmates awaiting transfer to state prisons.
