"Everyone come eat barbecue", is the message the Chamber of Commerce is sending out this week. The Chamber will be playing host to the citizens of Santa Anna for a free barbecue meal this Saturday, Oct. 17, at 6:30 in the evening at Gary James Memorial Park. Those attending will have an opportunity to meet members of the Comanche Nation Tribal Council who are, according to Chamber president Montie Guthrie, interested in a partnership between the community of Santa Anna and the Comanche Nation. The Indian Chief Santa Anna for whom our town was named was a Comanche.

The event has been billed as a "Not Banquet" and will be

very informal. You are advised to dress casual and bring lawn chairs or even a bale of hay for seating.

According to Chamber of Commerce president, Montie Guthrie, the meal is to say thanks to Santa Anna for the support given the Chamber in its many projects.

There will be no charge, but as Guthrie commented, if anyone feels led to contribute toward the cost of the meal, the Chamber is not above accepting donations.

Mountaineers Entertain Exes With Win Travel To Irion Co. Friday For 2nd District Game

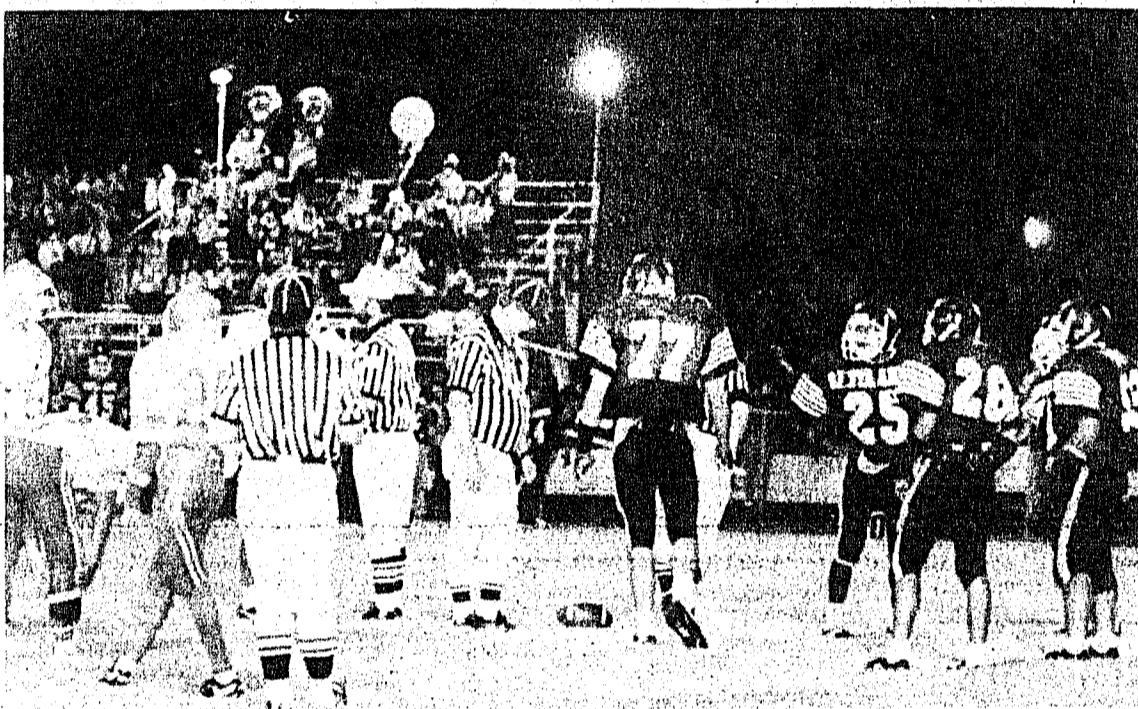
Santa Anna scored in just about every way possible last Friday to hand the Homecoming crowd and Coach John Smith a victory. It was the first district game of the season and the Mountaineers won handily over the Miles Bulldogs, 27-6.

The exes saw a more intense Santa Anna Mountaineers than had been seen in recent games and they also played with more consistency, reported Coach Smith.

"Homecoming was a real positive thing for us", said Smith. "We believe the players need and want to participate in all the festivities and it worked for us."

The Black and Gold scored once every quarter - on a punt return, a fumble return, a run and a pass.

In the first quarter Kevin Morris opened the scoring by returning a miles punt 29 yards. Paul Morris added the point after. Billy Wayne Thomas tacked on a defensive touchdown in the second period by returning a Miles fumble 24 yards. Morris again added the PAT, giving the Mountaineers a 14-0 halftime lead.

In the third quarter Thomas added another TD on a ten-yard run. Morris tacked on the PAT once again.

Miles scored its only time when quarterback Jason Havlak tossed to Winecott for 19 yards.

Thomas put the icing on the cake for the Mountaineers in the fourth quarter, scoring his third TD on a 36 yard pass play from QB Vicente Frausto.

Santa Anna's defense, led by Joe Baugh, Carlos Garza and Kevin

Morris, held the Bulldogs to 130 total yards,83 rushing and 47 passing. The defense forced 6 turnovers; three interceptions and three fumbles. Baugh had eight unassisted tackles.

Smith said "Improvement showed up in all areas, and we continue to improve".

Santa Anna is now 3-3 overall and 1-0 in district. They will travel to Irion County Friday. Irion County holds a 0-6 overall record. They lost their district opener last to Eden, 57-7.

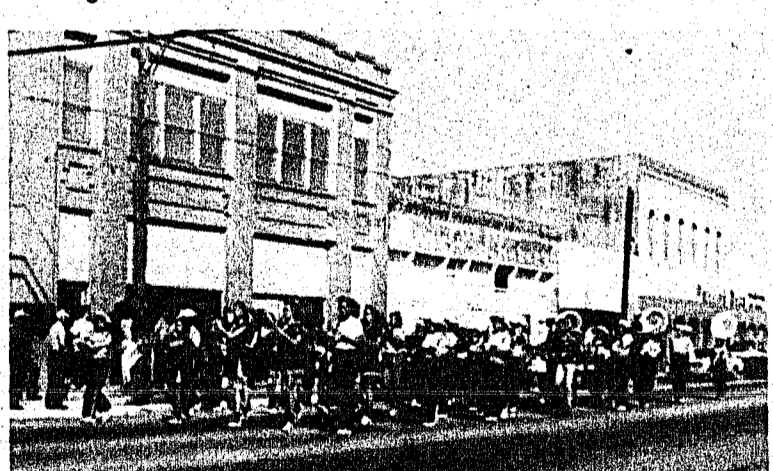

Section Of Town Out Of Power Last Friday After Truck Pulls Poles Over

As the Homecoming parade was going on in downtown Santa Anna last Friday a different kind of excitement was going on up on Ave. A. between First and Second Street.

The traffic on the highway was detoured around the parade and a truck that had taken the detour hit some low hanging lines, subsequently pulling over two utility poles, knocking a several block area out of electrical power and TV cable.

At the time a report was turned in by David Huggins, the wires were on fire and sparking in all directions. Immediate blocking of the area was taken care of and Police Chief Carlos Torres notified WTU. When he contacted the driver of the truck, the man was not aware

of what had happened.

The truck was hauling a box shaped cargo which contained a hunting cabin. The cabin had originally been an enclosed Fruehauf trailer but had been converted into the hunting cabin.

Torres stated that after measuring the cargo, it was determined that the height was within legal bounds, and had simply hit some low hanging feeder cable.

Brownwood TV Cable people as well as WTU employees from Santa Anna and San Angelo worked until close to midnight setting new poles and repairing damaged cable.

Torres reports that visible damage seemed to be limited to a small grass fire, two poles and a transformer. He is awaiting a damage estimate from WTU.

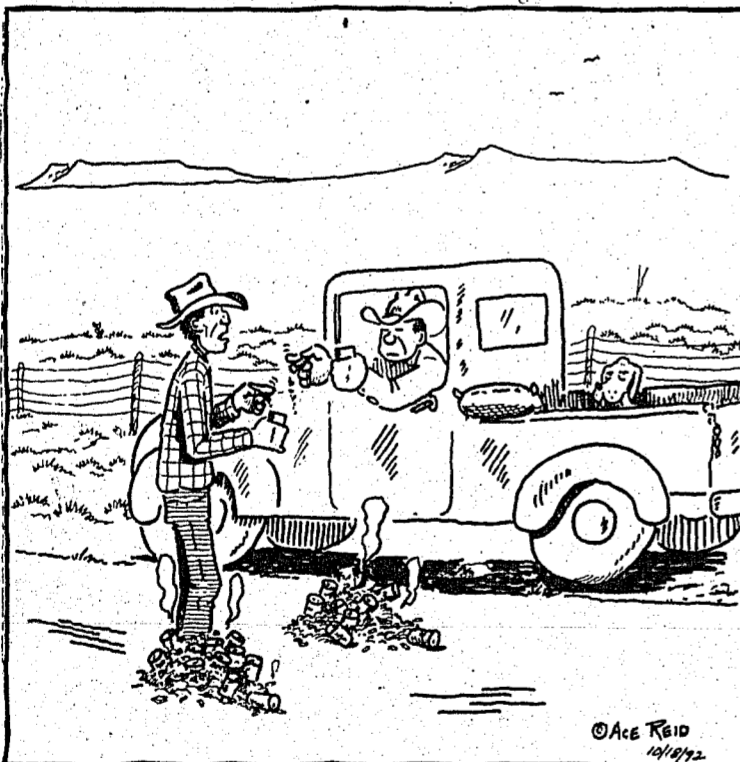

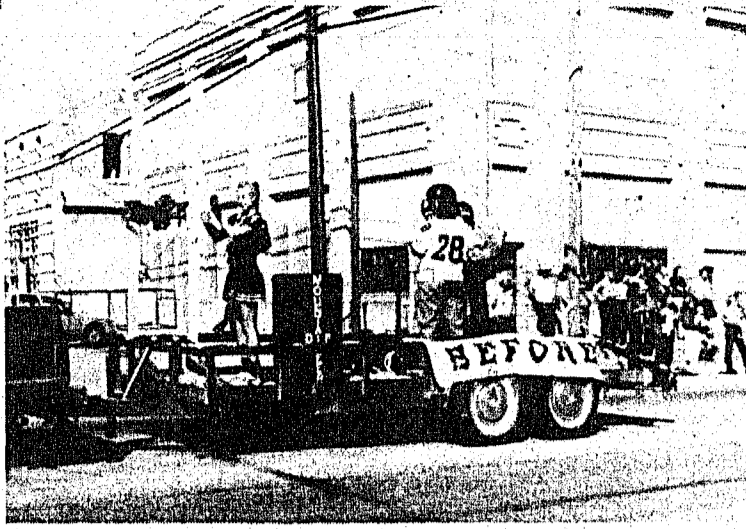

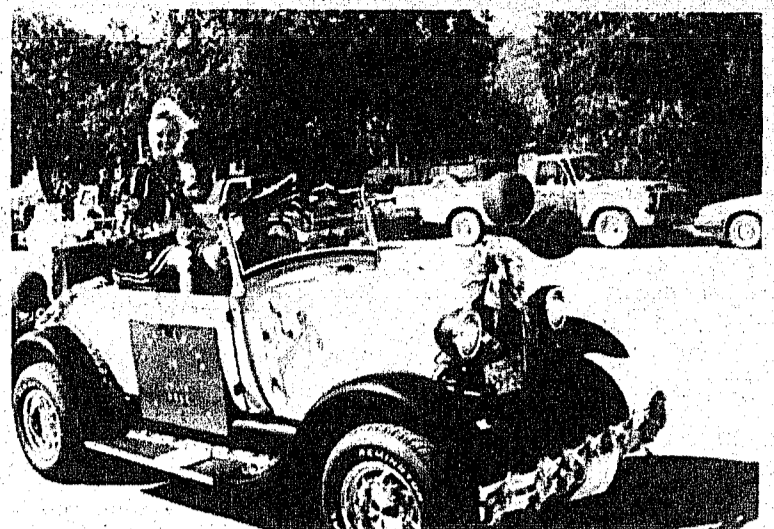

Coleman County Grand Jury No Bills Commissioner Vernon Slate, Returned Nineteen Indictments Against Others

The Coleman County Grand Jury returned a no bill against Commissioner Vernon Slate after investigating various allegations of official misconduct concerning Slate.

In other cases presented to the Grand Jury by District Attorney Ross L. Jones when they meet for the October term on October 8, nineteen indictments were returned.

Among those indicted were: Billy Jack Strasser, Joel Wayne Griffin, Jr., and Jose Chavez Sandoval were indicted for Felony D.W.I., a class 3 felony.

Henry Ladale Clark and Stanley Glenn Robinson were indicted for possession of a controlled substance, a class 2 felony.

Jesse Earl Snyder and Marquita Jane Snyder, and James Bernard Slaughter, also known as James Bernard Salome were indicted for burglary of a habitation, a class 1 felony.

Daniel Paul Wells was indicted for burglary of a vehicle, a class 3 felony.

Myron Aundrea Edwards and Leoncio Garcia Jimenez were indicted for possession of a forged

instrument, a class 3 felony. John Michael Wixson was indicted for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, a class 3 felony.

Frank Avalon Harris indicted for aggravated assault, a class 3 felony.

Tommy Teafatiller was indicted for criminal mischief, a class 3 felony.

Michael Samuel Bennett, Mary Gonzales and Maria Williams were indicted for theft over \$750.00 but less than \$20,000.00, a class 3 felony.

Edgar Lee Caraway was indicted for escape, a class 3 felony.

Arturo DelaRosa, Jr. was indicted for aggravated sexual assault, a class 1 felony.

Billie Lee Moore was indicted for two counts of indecency with a child, the first count being a class 3 felony and the second count being a class 2 felony.

A case pending against Billy Wayne Slayton was disposed of. Mr. Slayton pled guilty and was sentenced to ninety days confinement in the Coleman County Jail and was ordered to pay a \$1,000.00 fine, court costs and court-appointed attorney fees. Mr. Slayton was represented by James Bowen.

The article in the Oct. 1 edition of the Santa Anna News on the Indian chief for whom Santa Anna was named was most interesting.

I graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1941 and as a child I was very interested in local history. At one time I interviewed Miss Louella Chambers, a relative of my classmate Mary Field Mathews, considered one of the earliest settlers of Santa Anna still living. She talked about the ghosts of the white horses.

I had the idea that we learned in school that Santa Anna was named for the Indian chief Satanta, but the clerk in the Post Office department got the spelling wrong and the official name became Santa Anna. Lone Star A history of Texas and the Texans is a fascinating history of the state. Although it mentions Satanta, I find no mention of Santa Anna, other than the Mexican general. The author is T. R. Fehrenbach.

Satanta is mentioned in this book on pages 538, 540, 541 and 542. This man was a Kiowa chief and fought against Satank and Big Tree. He was captured by Gen. Wm. T. Sherman and imprisoned twice. He tried to commit suicide unsuccessfully, once and later jumped out of the second story hospital window headfirst. The 1990-91 edition of the Texas Almanac likewise refers to Satanta, but the only Santa Anna mentioned is again the Mexican general. The history of Coleman County, published in 1985 mentions that Kiowas, Comanches and Apaches used the Santa Anna Mountains as lookouts and the Comanches used them for burial grounds. As a child, I climbed the west mountain when relatives came to visit, but I saw no evidence of a burial ground.

I cannot find the history of Santa Anna in the county history, but recall that it referred to Santa Anna as the namesake of the Indian. I have also read some articles by the late Mrs. Charlie Bruce about the matter, giving a similar story to the one in your paper. I cannot find the authority for her articles.

I have a picture postcard of Satanta that I bought in Taos or Albuquerque. An article in a recent Dallas Morning News said he was buried in the prison cemetery. Santa Anna is not an Indian name as far as I know, but it is not the

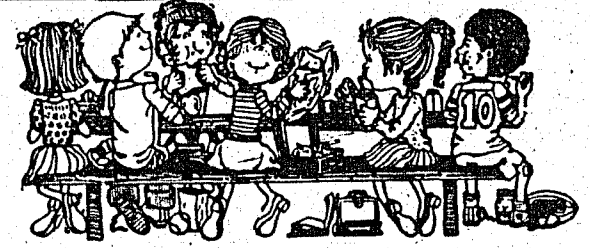

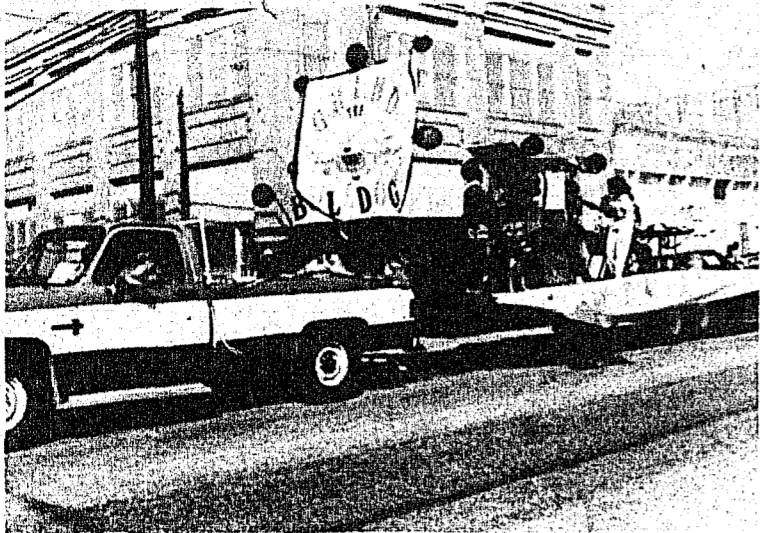

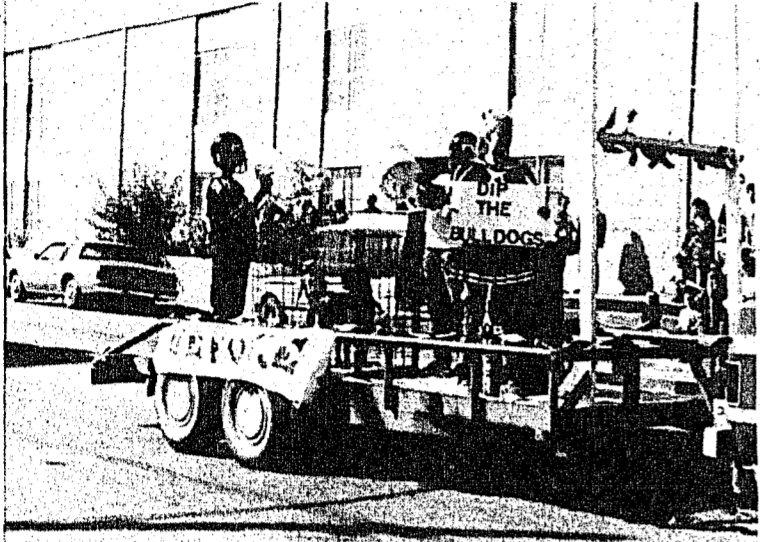

Well, bless my soul, the sun is shining today, the 21st of August, and we get our bags packed and in the car. Left Anita's at 8:45 and head southeast on the Alcan Highway toward Valdez. About 14 mile down the road, we drive by the Eielson Air Force Base, there are planes on the runway warming up, and saw a few of them take-off. A little way past there, it started to cloud over and rain. Oh well, it will be a good trip anyway. We drove to Delta Junction, where we turned southwest on Highway 4, after a lot of waiting on road construction on the Alcan Highway. In the winter, the roads will freeze and buckle, they call this a break in the road. So they have to work all summer, as they can't work in the winter. There were several "breaks", so we had several waits. Took 2-1/2 hours to drive about 80 miles.

We drove through the Alaska Range of Mountains, saw Mt. Deborah off in the west, with snow on it's top. Most of the mountains still have snow on them. The Alaska Pipeline follows this road, which is also called the Richardson Highway, and you can see how really crooked the pipeline is. We drove by the Donnelly State Park,

We had to pull our shoes off just inside the front door, as the lady didn't want her rugs messed up, and we didn't blame her. Our rooms were upstairs, with a bath between them. We rested a while, then took our baths and hit the hay.

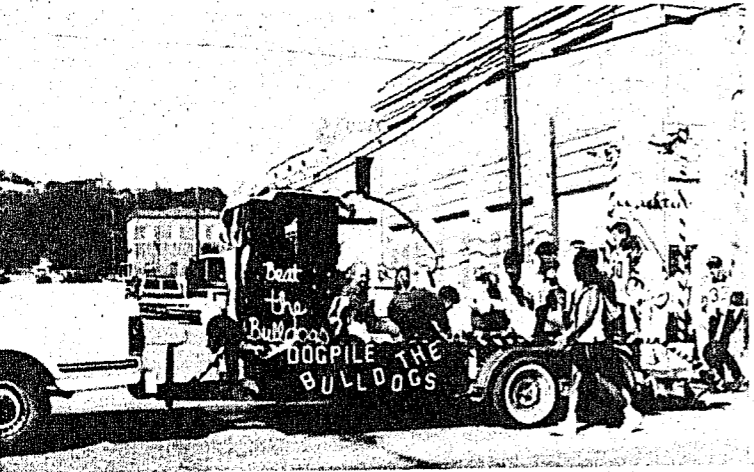
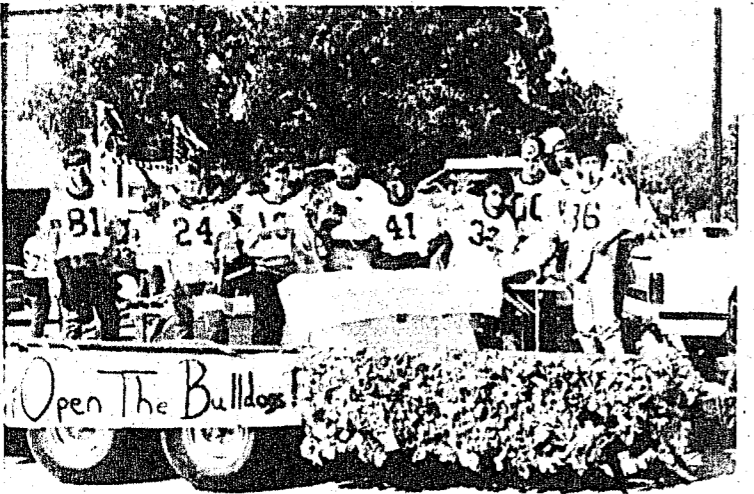
