German and Comanche Treaty Talks

Chief Santanna's Speech
My brothers, we have listened to your words. Our people will do what we, the highest chiefs, are going to decide upon and ordain. We hope that all is true what you have said. This will be proven when it comes to the ratification of the treaty and to the presents. I believe you and your people are friendly disposed toward us. I have seen our great father in Washington. We have made a good treaty of peace with him. I hope that the treaty we are about to make with you and your people will be just as good and sound. I have not forgotten our great father's speech. It is engraved in my heart and I see him every morning when I awake, as he was in Washington and as he spoke to me. I hope, my German brother is like my great father. I hope he has a wide, white heart, like my father, the President, for all his children. My brother will walk the white path of peace and keep it with my people, as the path of peace has been kept until now with my great father. And the white path will be wide and lead to his door, to his heart, and to

the hearts of the German people, so that my people can use it and remain on it without fear of treachery. I have spoken.

Chief Buffalo Hump's Remarks

Do not believe that I am opposed to anything, because I have not spoken. My friends have spoken. My chiefs and my warriors have consulted. My people have listened. I agree with all that Mopechucupe and Santana have said. I have spoken.

Santanna's (Santa Anna's) "talk" was included in Roy Holt's chapter on Santa Anna in his book *Heap Many Texas Chiefs*. This book was published by Naylor Press (1966) and has been out of print for several years. I was pleased to learn from Mr. Holt's daughter, Nancy Hughes of Copperas Cove, that Mr. Holt's research papers were donated to Texas Tech. These files of more than 18,000 pages of research on Texas history are housed in the Southwest Collection of Texas Tech University Library.

Nathan Wise of Santa Anna dominated the lamb show at the Coleman County Livestock Show Monday. Although the show overflowed with entries the Santa Anna 4-H'er was able to nail down three first place breed championships and came away with the trophy for Grand Champion Market Lamb with a heavyweight medium wool lamb. His breed champions included Champion Fine Wool, Champion Fine Wool Cross, and Champion Medium Wool. Mitzi White of Panther Creek showed the Reserve Champion Lamb, also a heavy medium wool.

Chris Cheaney of Santa Anna 4-H had the Champion Southdown Lamb, preventing his friend from sweeping all four breed champion awards.

Allilyn Ivy of Coleman FFA earned the Junior Market Lamb Showmanship Award and Wise came took the honor for Senior Market Lamb Showmanship.

Santa Anna 7th grader, Ryan Keeney, a Junior FFA member, earned the Junior Swine Showmanship trophy. Ryan exhibited eight pigs in the show. Shelly Carter, a SAHS junior, was awarded the prestigious Senior Showmanship Award. Shelly showed nine pigs at the county show.

Dusty Avants of Panther Creek and Jarad Hale of Coleman showed the grand champion and reserve grand champion, respectively. Santa Anna youngsters made a fine showing in the judging when a number of their animals received high marks in their breed class. Those complete results may be found in the results listed below.

Payton Mayes of Panther Creek showed the Grand Champion Market Steer, a mediumweight European cross. Rodney Henderson of Coleman FFA had the reserve grand champion market steer with a heavyweight European. Junior Market Steer Showmanship award went to Candice Henderson of Coleman

City Council Meets To Discuss Routine Business Matters

Mayor Gale Brock called the regular monthly meeting of the Santa Anna City Council on Tuesday evening, January 12, 1993.

Tom Hays led the invocation. Minutes were then read and approved.

The December Police Report was reviewed by the council.

Superintendent Derriel Warnock reported that the Subtitle D regulations concerning landfills are proposed to go into effect October 9, 1993. The City of Brownwood has made preparations for a regional landfill. At this time the proposed fees are \$7.50 per cubic yard. For the City of Santa Anna, the cost would be approximately \$4,800 per month to take garbage to Brownwood, not including pick up and delivery costs. The regulations are not definite at this point. The City does not know what regulations will be enforced; therefore, the City is unable to determine which would be more effective, a regional landfill or trying to operate our own landfill.

The City Crew spent time removing a tree and laying a water line to the new library this past month. The water plant has been repainted on the inside. It is planned that when the weather warms up, the outside will be repainted. A letter has been sent to a property owner concerning the building downtown between the new library and the bank. The City only had two reported waterleaks during the month of December compared to 16 last month.

Jim Spillman made a motion to put the old fire truck up for bids. The City will advertise for sealed bids in the Santa Anna News with a

minimum bid of \$1,000.

Green Thumb, Inc. has asked for the City to contribute \$100 per year to the cost of worker's compensation. Spillman made the motion that the City contribute \$100 for this purpose. The motion carried.

Mayor Brock reported that Udcil Copeland is quitting the nutrition program as of January 15, 1993. This program is carried out through the County and is funded through the West Central Texas Council of Governments. The City has yet to find anyone to take over the local program for Senior Citizens. The council agreed to check with Coleman and see if they could pick up the participants and take them to Coleman or deliver the meals for an interim period until something is worked out.

After going into executive session, Karen Morris made a motion to enact the salary increases as discussed in the executive session. The motion carried.

A motion was made and carried to pay the accounts payable in the normal manner.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Brock, Councilpersons, Tom Hays, Emmitt Simmons, Danny Kellar, Jim Spillman and Karen Morris, and Superintendent of Operations Derriel Warnock and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

You could see one of these children someday. It wouldn't take a minute and might bring relief or joy to a family.

Franklin Remembered
Statesman, printer, scientist, inventor, writer — all these describe Benjamin Franklin, one of our nation's most admired Founding Fathers.

Born on Jan. 17, 1706, in Boston, Franklin was only 12 when he began a career as a printer. In 1723, he moved to Philadelphia where he established his own newspaper, the *Pennsylvania Gazette*. Franklin began publishing *Poor Richard's Almanack* in 1732, which included such well-known sayings as "Early to bed and early to rise make a man healthy, wealthy, and wise."

Franklin embarked upon another career eight years later when he invented the "Pennsylvania fireplace," later known as the "Franklin stove," which soon heated buildings throughout North America and Europe. He also conducted a series of experiments with electricity, including the famous experiment in which a kite flown during a thunderstorm proved the presence of electricity in lightning.

In 1751, Franklin was elected to the Pennsylvania Assembly, where he began a 40-year career as a public servant. In 1775-76, he helped draft the Declaration of Independence, which he also signed. During the Revolutionary War, Franklin served as ambassador to France, and in 1781, he was appointed a commissioner to negotiate peace with Britain. Franklin's last great public service was his attendance at the Federal Constitutional Convention in 1787. He died in Philadelphia on April 17, 1790. © 1992, PM Editorial Services

The Texas Legislature opened on Tuesday, January 12, 1993 complete with swearing-in ceremonies, election of a new House Speaker, and the naming of committees and committee members. This will be the 73rd session of the Texas Legislature. It was not only the beginning of the 73rd session of the Legislature, but it was also the beginning of my serving as your state representative for the new 73rd district.

The session will be overloaded with problems, and it does not promise to be a "fun session". Public School Finance, Higher Education funding, Private Property Rights, Criminal Justice reform, water related issues, environmental issues, and health care issues are the problem areas that must be addressed by the Legislature. A very interesting side note, worthy of mention at this time, is a comparison of the current issues to be debated, with those of a past session. In Former House Speaker Billy Clayton's book "Gavel, Grits and Glory", the Speaker states the most pressing issues which were facing the new state legislature in 1963, and the mentioned issues are exactly the same as those I have listed above! Interesting, isn't it?

It is definitely my pleasure to be your representative in the Texas House of Representatives, and I promise to work hard to represent you conscientiously and earn your confidence. Realizing very well that it is physically impossible to each, but can be as brief as desired. The Governor of the State can call a special session at any time during the two year period to address a specific need or purpose which may have arisen in the state. For example, the 71st Legislature had six special called sessions in 1989-90, and in the 72nd session, just concluded, we had four special sessions.

Please feel free to visit or contact us. We can only represent you if you inform us of your special concerns. Your input is valuable to me. Also, I welcome groups to visit their state capitol, especially while we are in legislative session. I urge local school leadership to consider bringing school groups to Austin to meet some of the state officials and observe Texas government in action. We can arrange school bus parking for you and tours of the Capitol and Governor's Mansion. I would consider it a pleasure to visit with your group

It is my desire to meet and become acquainted with as many of you as possible. To better accomplish this, I would welcome the opportunity to come to your community and simply attend, or present a program for any civic club, school class, faculty group, agricultural group, retired teachers, Sunday School group, or whatever your program needs may be. The one restriction is when the session begins on January 12, I will only be able to accept speaking engagements and visits as time permits. Usually the first two months of the session leave Thursday and Friday nights open, along with weekends. Also, some Monday noon speaking opportunities might be possible.

Let me give you a few facts about the Texas Legislature that you may not know. Each regular session of the Legislature is 140 days in length—the session will end this year on May 31. The Legislature, according to the Texas Constitution, begins on the second Tuesday of January of each odd numbered year. Special sessions are not to exceed 30 days in length personally and have introduced as you sit in the House gallery—if the House is in session during your visit.

I anticipate this becoming a continuing series of articles that will appear in your local paper, and I will make every effort to keep my constituency abreast of what is happening during the legislative session.

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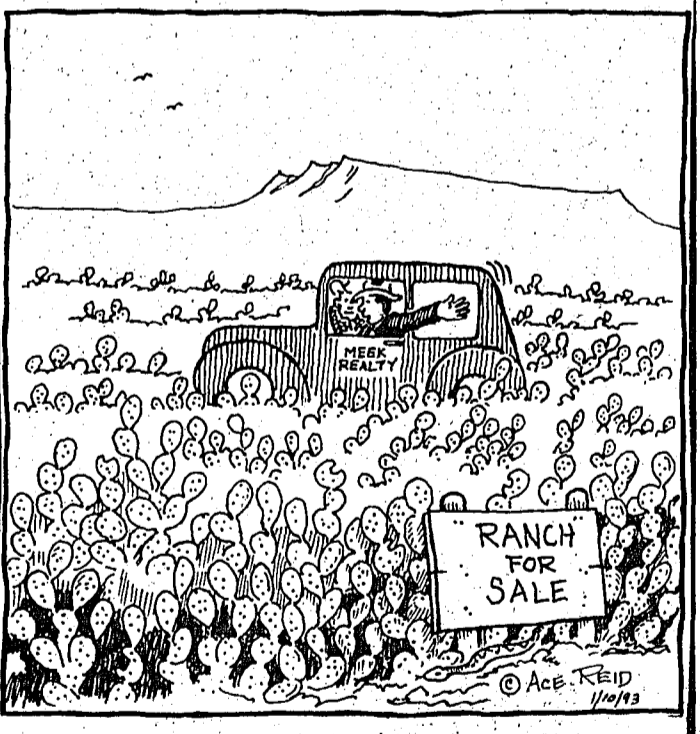

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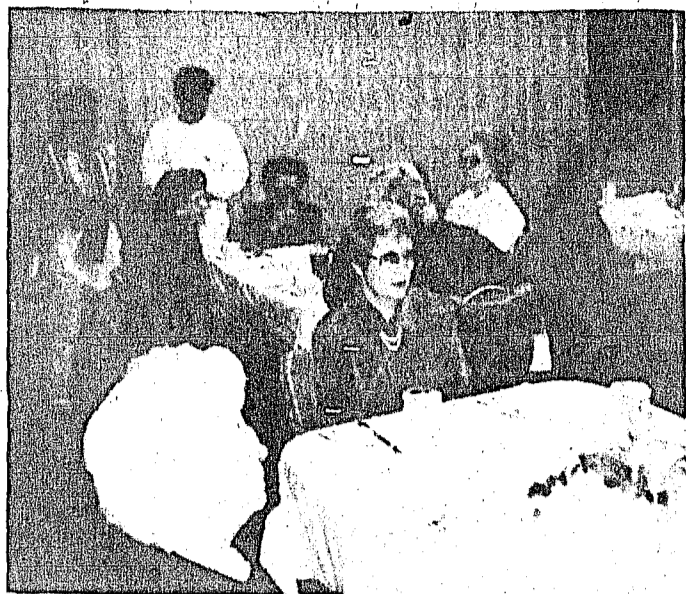
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Self Culture Club Enjoys Brunch Prepared By FHA Class

The Makings of a Law

"If you love the law and you love sausage, don't watch either of them being made."

This quote by Betty Talmadge, former wife of former U.S. Sen. Herman Talmadge of Georgia, sums up the findings of a two-year study of Congress by Citizens for a Sound Economy (CSE), a Washington, D.C.-based public-interest group. In mid-1992, CSE published its findings in a book titled "Wasting America's Money II," which examines the reckless spending habits of Congress. Examples cited in the book include:

- A \$19 million grant in the 1990 farm bill for the study of emission of methane gas from cows.
- The \$320,000 set aside to purchase the house of President William McKinley's in-laws in Ohio.
- The \$1 million Federal Highway Administration study to determine why Americans don't ride bicycles or walk more often.
- The \$150,000 spent to examine the Hatfield-McCoy feud.
- CSE plans to keep monitoring congressional spending. As CSE president and author of the book, Paul Beckner, put it: "Our country cannot afford this out-of-control spending much longer. Money can't grow in our pockets if it's constantly uprooted for transplantation in Washington, D.C." ■

story, Retired Extension Agent; and Sid Miller, Texas Certified Nurseryman.

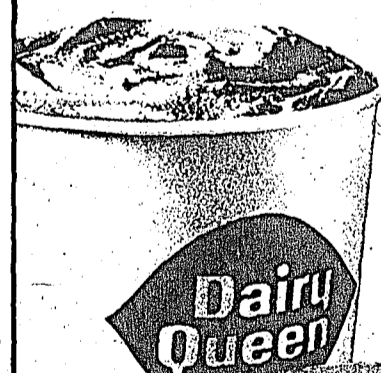
Door prizes, valued up to \$50.00, will be given during the clinic. Prizes include a fertilizer spreader, pecan trees and fruit trees.

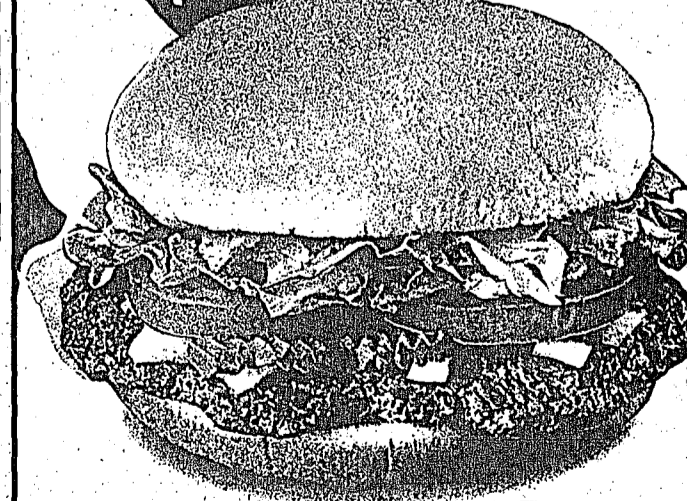

Home Dehydration—Food Safety And Meat Jerky

If you received a home dehydrator as a Christmas gift there are a few thoughts about food safety to consider if you're making meat jerky.

Many people enjoy making their own beef and other meat jerky. Making this food in a home dehydrator often saves money, but food safety precautions are necessary.

Typically, jerky is made by cutting meat into thin strips, marinating in a salty marinade and drying in a dehydrator or oven at 140 degrees Fahrenheit. The principle of food dehydration is based on the fact that the water necessary for bacterial growth is removed. In jerky, the salty marinade also helps prevent bacterial growth.

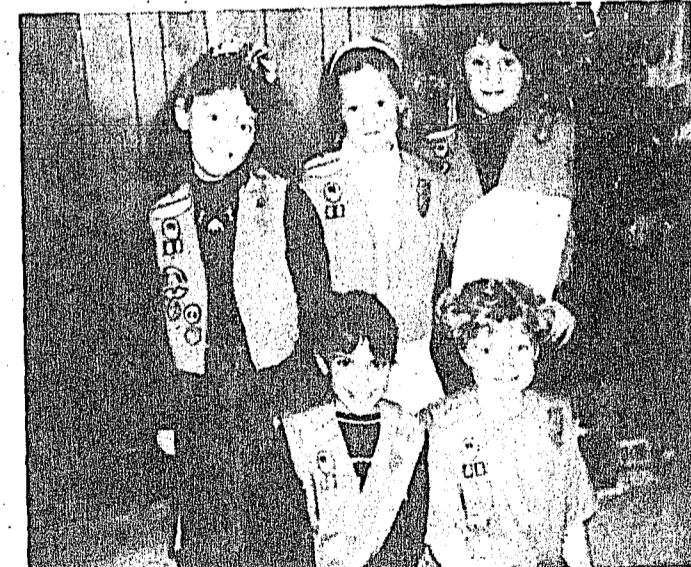
Because the potential for foodborne illness is high with protein foods, special precautions need to be taken. Clean hands and equipment are crucial, and the meat should be handled as little as possible. The salty marinade is important. Use thin strips of meat. Keep good circulation in the dehy-

drator and be sure meat is thoroughly dry. It should crack easily when bent.

Storage of the dried jerky in a well-sealed moisture-vapor-proof plastic or glass container is necessary to prevent rehydration of the product. Absorption of moisture by the product can allow bacterial growth, making the food unsafe. Also, failure to allow the jerky to cool before closing it in the container may allow condensation to collect on the surface and create an environment suitable for bacterial and mold growth.

An additional precaution is to heat the raw strips of meat in the marinade to 145 to 155 degrees before drying. This can be done easily on the range and will help destroy any Salmonella bacteria that may be present, while retaining the quality of the jerky.

Another consideration is the fact that those who are at special risk for foodborne illness, those that weakened immune systems, should be extra cautious in consuming home prepared jerky.

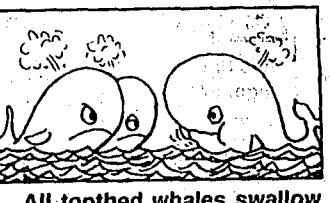
