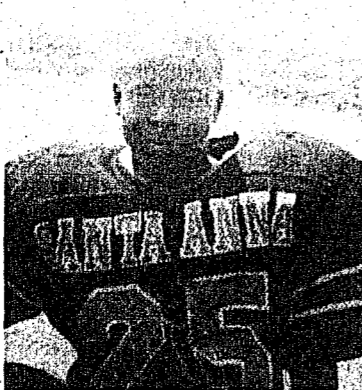

More Wheelbarrow Entries Needed For Parade

Santa Anna, Penetuhkah Comanche Chief

The most well known role of a war chief was that of raider. An important responsibility which is not often discussed was the defense of the band. The following account was taken from the Texas Indian Papers (Winfrey & Day), 1966, Vol. 5, pp 33-34; Letter from J. Pickney Henderson to Wm. L. Marcy, August 22, 1847. Action, it is said, speaks louder than words:

"I am informed that Santa Anna, the Comanche Indian Chief who lately left that section of country very suddenly & under suspicious circumstances with all the women & children of his tribe, has returned and expresses every disposition to be friendly with the white people and to keep his people quiet and friendly as far as he can control them. He states as the reason for his late sudden movement as referred to above was that of learning that two companies of rangers were moving up toward Fredericksburg and apprehending some of his people who were suspected of having recently killed four men

who had been engaged in that region surveying lands for the German immigrants and were missing, and fearing that those companies were about making war upon him he thought it best to convey the women & children of his tribe to a place of safety & return himself to give assurance of his friendly disposition & innocence of his people. He states also that during his absence he had occasion to visit the Wacoos on the upper waters of the Brassos River and that while there the Wacoos had a "Scalp dance" and confessed that they had killed the four men above named.

Santa Anna complains much at the conduct of the Wacoos and says that they are constantly committing acts of hostilities against the white settlements and in that way involve the Comanches as those acts are generally attributed to the Comanches...Those who are best acquainted with Santa Anna have confidence in all of his statements & professions of friendship...

Lack Of Parental Involvement Is Major Problem In Education

A few days ago, a new program to improve student success and reduce failures was put into place in grades 7-12 in Santa Anna ISD. There are several reasons for the program, including reducing failures, improving student responsibility for their work at school, and an effort to improve a parent's involvement in their child's education.

The latter listed above is one of the major problems facing education today. When a child receives a report card with a failing grade on it, or the child receives a progress report during the grading period, too often the school or the teacher never hears from the parent. No one calls to talk to the teacher, no one comes to the school to have a conference with the teacher about their child's lack of progress.

In a survey of 1,300 American high school juniors and seniors,

most students said they would give their parents a grade of "D" regarding parental involvement in their education. The survey conducted by the Sylvan Learning Centers and the National Association of Secondary School Principals, also showed only 14 percent of students polled said that their parents are "heavily involved" in their schooling, while 30 percent said their parents are "rarely or never involved."

Wait, there's more. In a national survey of 1,000 public school teachers, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company found that many teachers are not satisfied with their students' abilities and believe that students are ill-prepared for their studies. The reason? Sixty-five percent of teachers who cited student problems noted a lack of parental support as a major factor in their students' academic failures.

The reasons for bad parent "report

cards" are nothing new: no time, little direction, and precious little assistance. Parents and children today must cope with a societal environment that is a world away from that of the 1950's, 60's and even 70's. Most children in the 1990's come from either dual-income families (both parents working) or single-parent families. According to the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, less than 7 percent of today's families fit the once-traditional mold of the two-parent family in which one spouse, usually the father, works and the other spouse stays home and raises the children. It's the era of Murphy Brown, not June Cleaver.

While many authors and researchers paint today's parental picture as one of rapid societal evolution in which parents are victims as well as their children, some go so

Who or what motivates you? Reflect on the past week and ask yourself what prompted you to do what you did, or did not do. Was it fear? Was it perhaps hate, or anger? Maybe peer pressure, social pressure or economic pressure got you into action. What role did love play in your activity last week? Was it perhaps the compulsion of life-long habit or tradition or the coercion of selfishness? Is your motivation intrinsic or extrinsic? In Isaiah 60:17 God promises that someday His covenant people would have "... peace as your overseer and righteousness as your taskmaster." Christians who are God's New Covenant people should let peace, specifically the peace of Jesus Christ rule and reign in their hearts. Other motivations just can't measure up. When one is "in Christ" then one has the "peace of Christ" only when one is doing what is right. Peace, then, becomes the overseer, the supervisor, the manager, the director, the motivator for life.

TxDot Public Hearing On Future Projects December 9

Local citizens will soon have the chance to voice opinions and ask questions about the status of proposed transportation projects.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will hold a public meeting on December 9 at 10:00 a.m. in the Adams Street Community Center, Room C which will focus on the Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP), the department's 3-year project schedule.

In this meeting the public will get a first-hand look at specific transportation projects that are scheduled to begin in the nine-county area of District 23 in the next three years, said Brownwood District Engineer Wes Heald.

"In large part, it is the public's input that helps us to develop this plan," he said. "Therefore, the public is strongly encouraged to attend so that they can voice their concerns and we can jointly address our transportation needs."

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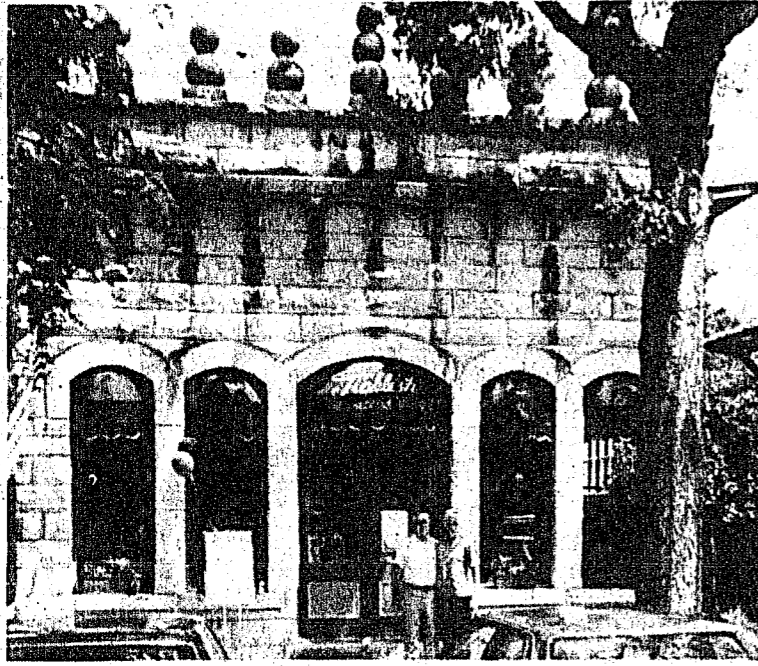
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Recalling Memories

far as to lay much of the blame squarely at the feet of the parents. In her book, *SOS: Sustain Our Schools*, author Patricia Graham writes that parental apathy ranks with the toughest obstacles that children must overcome, including high levels of poverty and empty hours of television. According to Graham, change is not likely unless families take the initiative to make education a priority. Too many households, Graham writes, are ruled by the "pleasure principal." Too many parents are not vitally concerned with their children's educational welfare, and too many parents are using the TV as an easy way to keep their children occupied at home, Graham says.

Others argue that most parents are not apathetic—they simply lack the time and resources to make a difference. Experts such as Dorothy Rich, author of *Mega Skills*, says that concerned parents want to see their children succeed in school, but they don't know how to help them.

Because it has been estimated that only 13 percent of a person's first 18 years are spent at school, making education a priority in the home is crucial to any effort for student improvement. Potentially in control of almost 90 percent of a child's time, parents are, indeed, a child's primary and most influential teachers. Education is a family affair. The most important factor in the success of a child in school is a home where education is held at the highest level of importance in everyday life.

At Santa Anna ISD, we are committed to providing every child with the best educational experience we possibly can. The staff here is exceptionally well qualified to do just that. It is important to us that we have the parents' support in our efforts. It is also important to the child that parents are involved in their educational experience on a daily basis.

It seems that too often the only time a parent comes to school is in response to a disciplinary problem, and in the process of dealing with those situations there is frustration on the part of the parent and everyone involved. Parents and school personnel must have the opportunity to communicate regularly in an effort to solve potential problems before they become a factor in the teaching-learning process.

There would seem to be a hesitation on the part of parents to come to school to visit with the teacher. The reasons are many. I will be the first to admit that school personnel have been hesitant to contact parents and discuss their child. I think there is a feeling of intimidation felt by both sides, and a lack of trust that either party has the best interest of the child at heart. We all have a tendency to be protective of our own position and interests. This has a direct effect on the

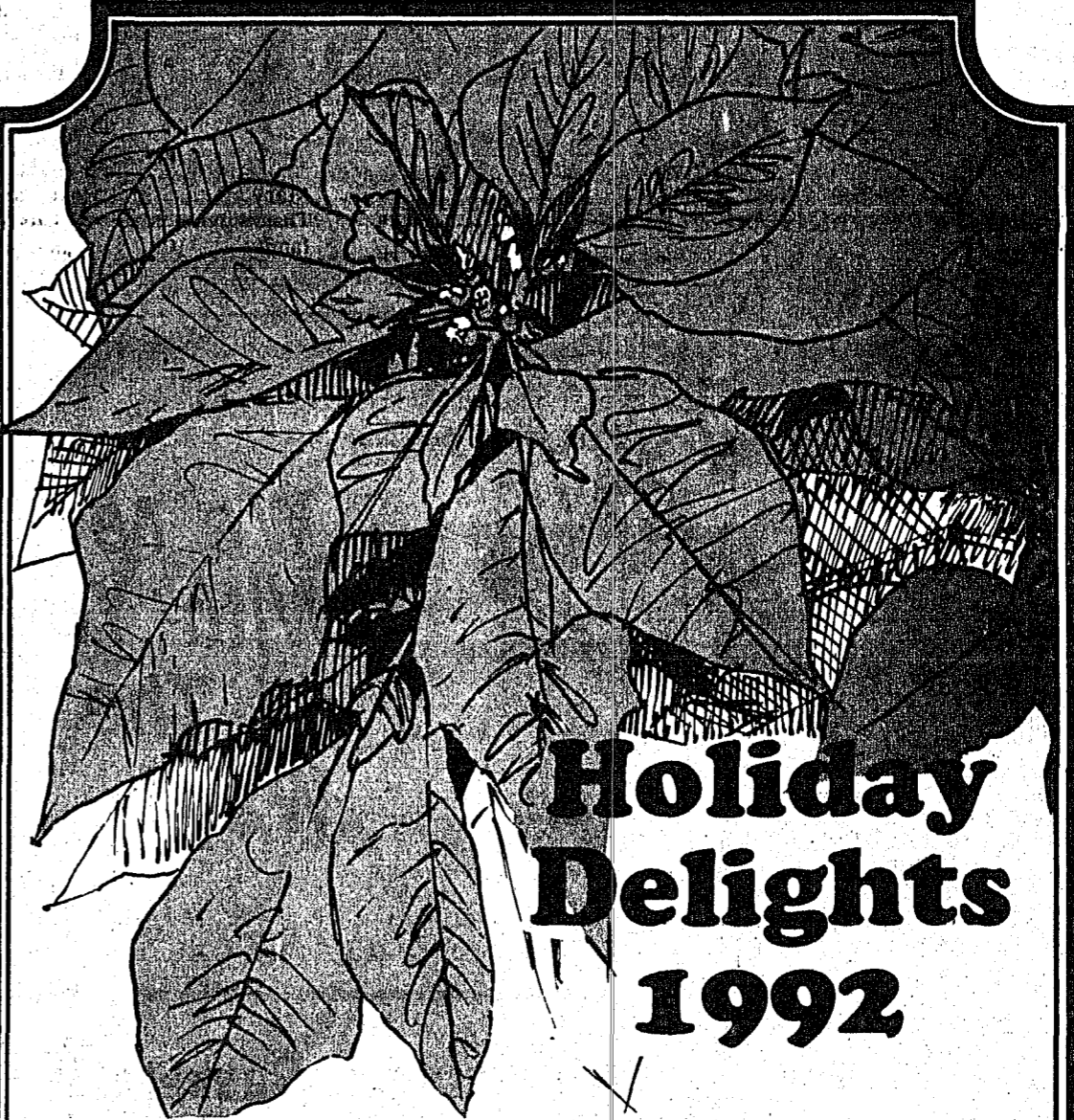

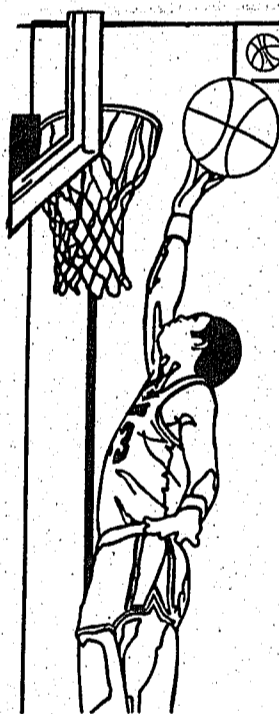

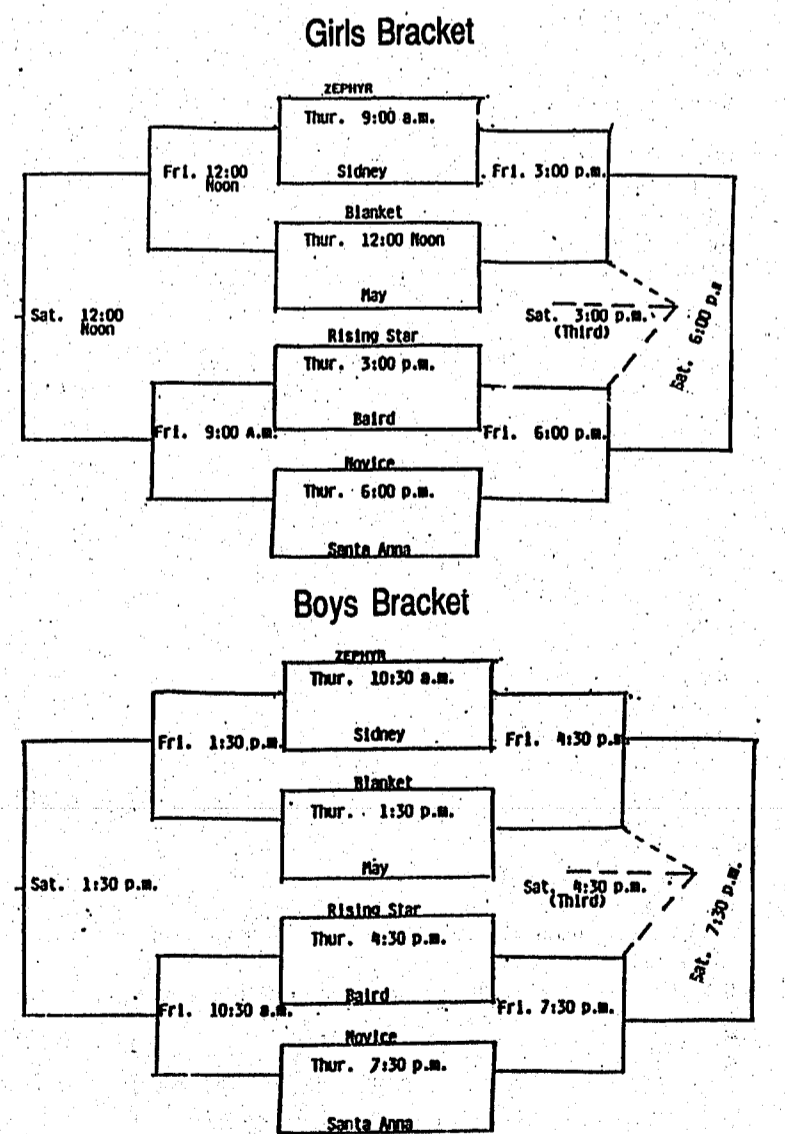

The following cases were presented for disposition by District Attorney Ross L. Jones before the Honorable Donald Lane in the 42nd District Court of Coleman County, Texas on Wednesday, November 18:

Refugio Diaz Salinas, cause no. 503, delivery of a controlled substance, namely cocaine, a class 1 felony, pled guilty to Judge Lane, waiving a trial by jury. He was also ordered to pay restitution to the Texas Department of Public Safety Crime Laboratory in the amount of \$140.00 and restitution to the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force in the amount of \$175.00. The sentence imposed in this cause will run concurrently with the sentences imposed in Causes Nos. 504 and 505, 42nd District Court, Coleman County, Texas.

In Cause No. 504, Mr. Salinas pled guilty to delivery of a controlled substance, namely cocaine, a class 1 felony. Punishment was set at twenty-five (25) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. He was also ordered to pay restitution to the Texas Department of Public Safety Crime Laboratory in the amount of \$140.00 and restitution to the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force in the amount of \$175.00. The sentence imposed will run concurrently with the sentences imposed in Causes Nos. 503 and 504, 42nd District Court, Coleman County, Texas.

Walter Maurice Estes pled guilty to Aggravated Sexual Assault, a class 1 felony and was sentenced to fifteen (15) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. He was also ordered to pay a \$1,000.00 fine and court costs.
