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To Amend HB

Mothers Against Drunk Driving is asking legislators to amend a section of HB 1234 by Hightower which would allow offenders arrested for any crime to avoid criminal charges.

Under a new provision called deferred prosecution, prosecutors would be able to place a defendant on probation for up to one year instead of filing charges. The probation could be extended for one additional year if the defendant has not completed one of his probation goals. If the defendant successfully completes his one year probation, the case would never be filed.

An offender arrested for any and every crime, including capital murder, murder of any kind, rape, aggravated rape, aggravated assault, every 3G offense, DWI involuntary manslaughter, etc., is eligible for deferred prosecution. The bill makes no exceptions for the use of deferred prosecution, even if the person is a habitual offender. In addition, there is no limit on the number of times that an offender may receive deferred prosecution.

"Like deferred adjudication, deferred prosecution would allow repeat offenders to be tried as first offenders since they would not have a conviction on their record. In addition, offenders who committed a crime, however heinous, could walk away without any punishment, without a record of conviction, and even without a record of an indictment" said Bill Lewis, Public Policy Liaison of Texas MADD.

"We're asking the Legislature to change HB 1234 so that it does not While Intoxicated with a high recidivism rate," said Lewis.

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
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
