Richard Traylor well known Santa Anna businessman and formerly a farmer, died of a heart attack Tuesday, October 27th at 10 a. m. in the Santa Anna Hospital, where he had been taken about two hours earlier.

He was born October 24th, 1903 being 50 years and three days old at time of death.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Traylor, both deceased, highly regarded pioneers of this vicinity.

Richard Sharp Traylor and Miss Clara Ruth Lamb were married in November, 1921. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Mr. Traylor was manager of the D & D Feed Store, which position he had held since its organization.

Mr. Traylor is survived by the widow of Santa Anna and one son, J. E. Traylor of San Angelo, and one grandchild. Three brothers also survive: Jack and M. T. Traylor of Coleman and H. D. Traylor of Topeka, Kansas, and two sisters: Mrs. Pearl Shropshire of Colorado City and Mrs. Willard Eddington of Mullin. Many other relatives and a host of friends survive.

Funeral services are scheduled for Thursday afternoon, October 29th, at the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Harry C. Wigger of Midland recent pastor, and Rev. Maurice Smith, Mr. Traylor's former pastor at the Buffalo Baptist Church, officiating. Burial will be in the Santa Anna Cemetery with Hosch Funeral Home in charge.

## Mountaineers Entertain Wylie In Last Home Game; Lose To Powerful Ranger

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will play hosts to the Wylie Bulldogs Friday night on the local field at 7:30 p. m. in the last home game of the season. Wylie, the same as Santa Anna, has had a very unsuccessful season this year. At present they have won one game and tied one game and lost four. The Mountaineers have won one and lost five.

At the beginning of the season the Mountaineers lost two boys to injuries, James Richard Allen with a broken collar bone and Jerry Scarborough with a broken arm, before the season got underway. In every game since the season opened, the Mountaineers have suffered injuries and last week saw disaster strike the Mountaineers in more than one way. Jay Steward and Joey Bryan were scheduled as starting half-backs for the Mountaineers and both were injured in an automobile accident south of Rockwood on Wednesday night. Raymond Estes, one of the pep leaders, was also injured in the accident. Boyd French, center, was suffering from a knee injury and was not due to play Friday night. He was being replaced by Donald Ray Owen and in the first half Owen got his knee hurt and will be out for the remainder of the season. Donald Trull was also injured again in this game, as was Charles McClellan, but both these boys are expected to be ready to go Friday night. It is believed this year has been the worst in history for injuries for the Mountaineers.

In spite of all the hard luck the Mountaineers have suffered this year, they will have a good starting eleven for the Wylie game and are expected to come out the winners. A team with as much spirit as these Mountaineers have is going to be hard to defeat.

### LOSE TO RANGER

As was expected, the Mountaineers lost to the powerful Ranger Bulldogs Friday night.

The final score, 34-0, was held down by the Ranger coach and it was appreciated by all the officials of the Santa Anna schools. The Ranger first string is really powerful and well organized. There is no doubt but what they will win this district and go well up into the state before they are beaten, if they do not win the state, which they are expected to do.

During the first period Ranger scored twice with the first TD coming early in the game when Charles Massegee, right half, romped 19 yards on their first play from scrimmage after recovering a Mountaineer fumble. Billy Browning left half, kicked the extra point. The second TD came when Massegee passed to Chico Mendoza, right end, for 16 yards.

In the second period the Mountaineers kicked out of bounds on the Ranger 1-yard line. The first play netted the Bulldogs 1 yard, the next netted 33 yards then a five yard penalty set them back on their 29 yard line. Then Quarterback Scott Forney passed to Massegee who was stopped on the Santa Anna 24 yard line, but before he could be set down he had

Eastland overcame two TDs in the first period to beat the Bangs Dragons 23-12 and in a non-conference tilt, the Cross Plains Buffaloes lost to the Cisco Lobos by a 38-0 count and the Buffaloes lost their best half-back, Kenneth Beeler, who got a shoulder broken early in the game.

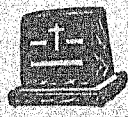

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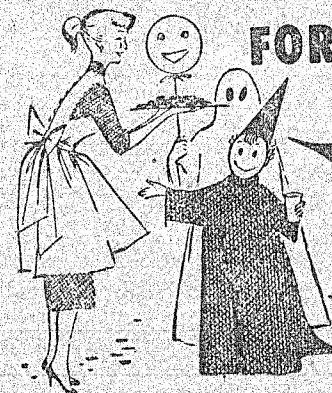

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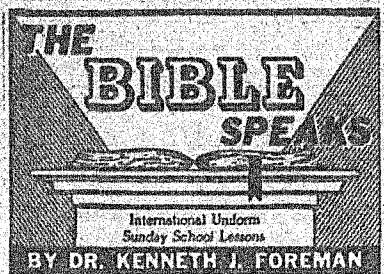

**God-Planned Homes**

Lesson for November 1, 1953

NO Christian home can be found between the covers of the Bible. Naturally there were no Christians before Christ, and the New Testament books were all written so early in our era that what we know as a Christian home could not exist. Jesus himself was brought up in a Jewish home. Timothy had a Jewish mother but a Greek father, and the "faith" that was in his mother and grandmother was not, probably, the faith of Christians. Nobody named in the Bible was married in a Christian church by a Christian minister. We have to say, if we stick to the facts of history, that the Christian home is something that developed out of the Christian faith which the Bible inspires and instructs, rather than something the Bible directly describes.

**Law In The Home**

The Christian home is not something so radically different from other kinds that it can't be recognized. Among the most primitive races there are homes of a sort. Always there is a mated pair, father and mother, and children more or less under their care. Father and mother (aided often by other members of the tribe) teach the young what they are expected to know. So much is universal. Now in the Christian home, one special feature marks it off from less developed types: training in religion. This we have inherited from the Hebrews long before us. According to Deuteronomy, the law of God was to be known by the parents and taught by them to the children. This is not simply the Ten Commandments, but the whole management of life under the will

of God. Now it should go without saying that if parents try to teach their children what is right, without doing right themselves, failure is certain. Some of the most important matters can be taught only by example. To take one illustration: parents should be the best persons to tell their children what Christian marriage is and how to achieve success in it. But if parents live in constant strife or even break up altogether, then what?

A recent study was made of 12,000 young people. It was discovered that in the homes where they came from, where the parents were both Roman Catholics, only 6.4 per cent of the homes had broken up; where both were Protestants, 6.8 per cent had broken up; where the parents were of different religions, 15.2 per cent were broken; and where there was no religion at all, 16.7 per cent of the homes were broken. What those unsuccessful husbands and wives did about their own marriages will have much more effect on their children than any good advice.

**Love In The Home**

A good home is much more than a place where everyone behaves correctly and does just as he should. A well-managed penitentiary might be that sort of place too. The great difference between the model penitentiary and the model home is that in one, the good behavior is compulsory, in the other the ruling motive is love.

There is no home where love never makes mistakes; none where love is complete and flawless. But where love is, there is hope. Without love, the least differences pile up into unscalable mountains of incompatibility and resentment; where love is, even mountains of difficulty can be brought low.

What the Bible teaches everywhere, especially in the New Testament, is that love, in the home or anywhere, to have its perfect work must not be one-sided. If every member of a home really set out to be the kind of person Paul describes in I Cor. 13 or Eph. 5, break-ups would be seldom indeed. Love ought not to be left to mothers alone!

**God's Planning**

A Christian home is one where God's plan of love is followed. But God never does for us what we can do for ourselves. We have to plan for our homes just as we do for anything at all that we want to succeed. This should begin early, too, like all good planning. Young people do not always ask the right questions before they fall in love. loss estimates have been attempted with such diseases as Anthrax, Foot and Mouth, Pneumonia, Shipping Fever, Swine Erpsipelas, X-Disease, Black Leg, Atrophic Rhinitis, Anaplasmosis and Ketosis, to name a few. If we could determine it accurately, the loss would be staggering.

One agriculturist has hazarded a guess. Dr. L. M. Hutchings, of Purdue University, said, "Based on animal population figures and average values per head, animal agriculture failed to realize a potential gross income of \$2,791,000,000 in 1951 as a result of death losses alone."

These figures point up the value of strict sanitation measures on the farm. Good sanitation is the first step in breaking the disease chain. Today's antibiotics, potent drugs, vaccines and im-

proved feed supplements have accomplished a great deal however, they have a steep up-hill battle if they are not used in conjunction with a sound farm sanitation program.

A sound disease-preventive

program should not be regarded as an expensive burden. Rather, it is an investment like that of a fence for livestock. This sanitary fence is a necessity for keeping diseases out and livestock in good health.

The Texas Department of Agriculture at Austin has prepared a chart of recommended disinfectants for combatting the prevalent diseases which affect livestock. A copy will be mailed upon request.

**DISEASE DOLLAR LOSSES**  
An uncontrolled livestock disease can be just as destructive as an uncontrolled forest fire. Livestock diseases have been smoldering since long before the domestication of the animal. In these days of concentrated meat animal production, the threat of livestock disease grows more alarming — taking a big bite out of the growers' profits. The extent of this problem can

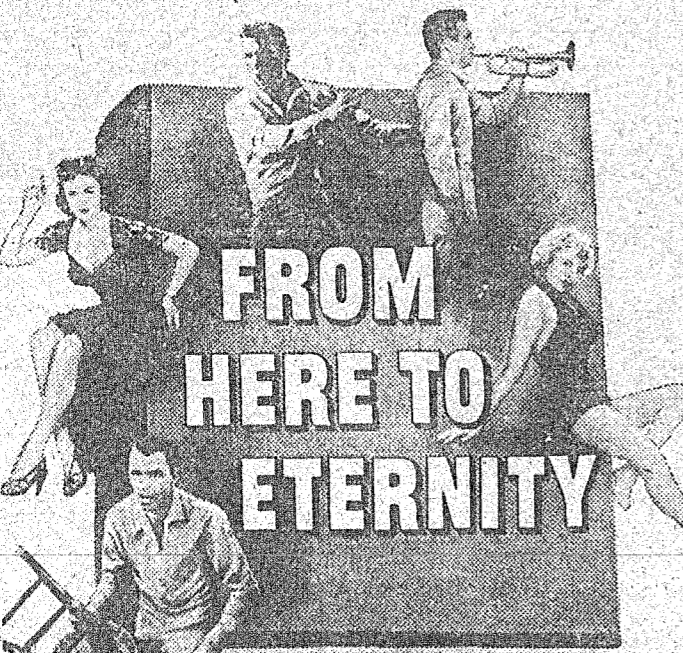

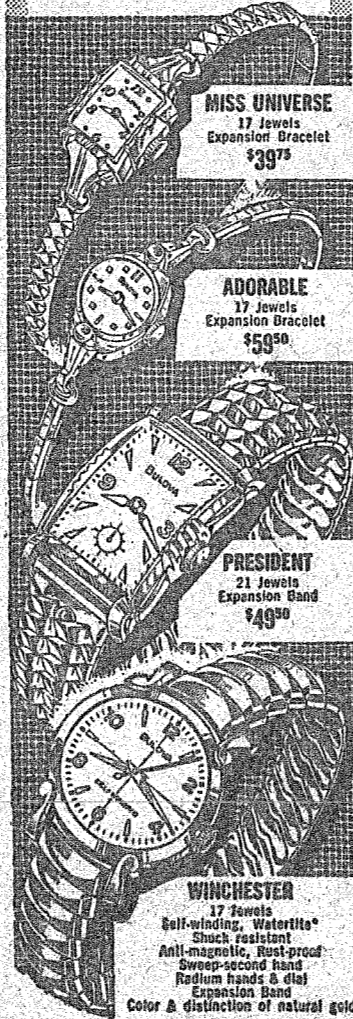
