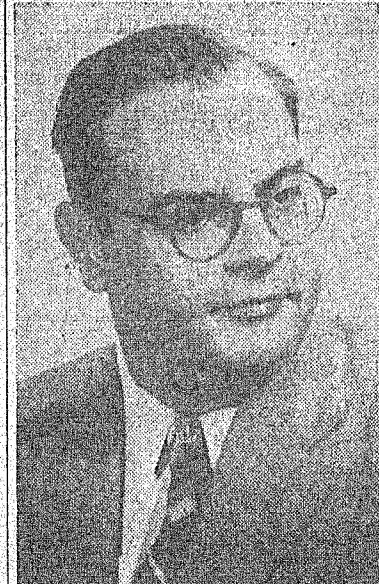
## Salvation Army Drive To Start Monday, Nov. 23rd

## Mountaineers Journey To Rising Star For Final Game Of Season; Beat Bangs 33-12

The final football game of the season for the Santa Anna Mountaineers will be played on the Wildcat Field in Rising Star Friday night, November 20. The game is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p. m. and after the game last week with Bangs an exceptionally good crowd is expected to follow the Mountaineers to see their last game.

Rising Star has been in the cellar throughout the season, not winning a game and scoring very few points during the season. Santa Anna has been riding above Rising Star during this time.

The Mountaineers have scored 105 points during the season to 21 points for the Wildcats and in district competition the Mountaineers have scored 80 points to 14 for the Wildcats. However, the Wildcats tied Wylie 0-0, but this was on a muddy field and the Wildcats were really fired up for that game. Bangs beat the Wildcats 12-0 on November 6 and the Mountaineers handed Bangs a 33-12 pounding last week.

This week the Mountaineers will be wearing their black jerseys for the first time this year. Coach Behrens has suggested that those who want accurate numbers of the Santa Anna line-up, be sure to cut out the Mountaineers line-up that is printed on the full page advertisement, sponsored by Santa Anna merchants and professional men, that appears elsewhere in this issue of The News. The programs at Rising Star will most likely be printed from some old program and the numbers will not be the same and a number of the player's positions have been changed during the past week. Be sure to take this clipping to the game with you.

On the first play in the fourth period Boyd French, Mountaineer very capable center, intercepted a Bangs pass on their 39 yard line and returned it to the 9 before being pulled down. On the next play James Allen went wide around left end for the TD. The extra point was made on a pass play. Bangs took the kick-off and worked their way down to the SA 21 yard line and attempted a screen pass and again French broke the play up by intercepting the ball and attempted to hand off to Wise, but fumbled and recovered the ball on the SA 15 yard line. On the next play Allen went through the left tackle slot and raced 88 yards for the final TD. The try for extra point was missed and the Mountaineers were in the lead 23-12. Bangs took the kick-off on their 24 and returned to the 30. Two plays later, McClellan

intercepted a pass and the coach sent in most of the "B" string for a few minutes playing time before the game ended.

### AROUND THE DISTRICT

The Ranger Bulldogs completed their District competition Friday night and took the undisputed championship of District 7-A by handing the DeLeon Bearcats a 48-7 defeat. Ranger does not have a game this week end, as their ten game season is complete. They will play Friday night, November 27 in a bi-district game. At present Dublin is standing in second position with Bangs yet to play. The Dublin Lions just barely edged the Eastland Mavericks 7-6 in a close game. Eastland attempted a field-goal in the closing second of the game, but it was ruled wide by the officials. Cross Plains beat Wylie by one point, 13-12. Ranger is in the lead; Dublin is in second place; DeLeon and Eastland are tied for third and fourth places; Bangs and Cross Plains are tied for fifth and sixth places; Wylie is in seventh place; Santa Anna in eighth place; and Rising Star in the cellar in ninth place.

Games this week will see Santa Anna at Rising Star; DeLeon at Wylie; Bangs at Dublin; and Eastland at Cross Plains.

Bernice Johnson, county Tax Assessor-Collector, stated this week that she would be at the Santa Anna National Bank all day Tuesday, November 24, for the purpose of collecting 1953 taxes. This is a service the tax office renders for citizens of the Santa Anna area who are unable to go to Coleman to pay their taxes. All taxes paid in November are subject to a 2 percent discount, but poll taxes are not discounted. Members of the National Guard may get poll tax receipts for \$1.00.

All citizens of this area are requested to take advantage of the tax collector being here to get their state, county and school taxes paid. Be sure to get your poll taxes paid at the same time. Next year is election year and everyone will want to express their opinions in the elections. More important than the primaries will be the general election next November when a number of proposed constitutional amendments will be voted on. Be sure to pay your poll taxes.

## Father of Local Merchant Buried Last Thursday

Joe H. Snodgrass, 70, prominent McCulloch County farm leader and father of Bruce Snodgrass, local hardware dealer, died at 4:20 p. m. in the Brady Hospital Tuesday, November 10, after suffering a heart attack a few hours earlier. Mr. Snodgrass had held practically every office in farm organizations in McCulloch County during the past fifty years. He had been suffering a heart condition for the past several years.

Funeral services were held Thursday, November 12, at 10:00 a. m. at the First Christian Church in Brady, with the pastor, Rev. John G. Wallenburg, officiating. Burial was in the Rest Haven Cemetery.

Born at Trichham, Mr. Snodgrass had lived in McCulloch County for the past 60 years. He was engaged in farming in the Stacy community for nearly a half-century before retiring and moving to Brady about 8 years ago. He still owned his farm and had kept well up on farm problems and rural projects, even though he had retired. He owned a small place near Brady and had been feeding sheep there a short while before he was stricken. Mrs. Snodgrass rushed him to the hospital, where he died a short time later.

Survivors are the widow, Mrs. J. H. Snodgrass of Brady; five sons, Bruce of Santa Anna, Percy of Donna, Duard of Dallas, J. H., Jr., of Oklahoma City, Cecil of Dallas, and one daughter, Mrs. Mary Bell Williams of Brady.

**PART-TIME FARMING**

Farmers are often asked for advice by friends who long for "a little place in the country." What do you tell them? The first thing you can tell them is that a great number of people are already trying it. A recent census listed two-thirds of a million part-time farmers in the United States. Another million "residential" farmers do a little farming for income. Altogether, these small farms make up a third of all farms in the nation.

A lot can be learned from the small farm operators who are established. Probably they will recommend strict planning of land use. Besides a house and garden, about an acre and a quarter will be needed to raise grain to feed a couple dozen hens and 40 chicks. For a cow, the "new" farmer may need two more acres to produce hay and pasture and three-quarters of an acre for grain.

To feed three pigs 6 months takes about an acre each for grain and pasture. And to keep a horse requires three good acres to grow pasture, hay and grain.

These estimates are based on acre yields of two tons of hay and 40 bushels of corn. If he plans to raise only fruit and vegetables for home use, half an acre to an acre of good land might be enough.

A large garden properly cared for will net about \$100 to \$300 a year in fresh and preserved food. More labor, skill, equipment and a larger investment are required to produce milk, meat and most specialized crops.

Both the advantages and disadvantages should be counted before plunging into part-time farming.

Among the advantages: It provides a wholesome and healthful environment for children. It gives a measure of

security if the part-time farmer's regular job is lost. It furnishes outside work and recreation, beneficial to the health. It supplies the means for profitable use of spare-time family labor and lowers the cost of living.

On the other hand, the job is confining, especially if he raises livestock. In times of crisis on the farm, he may get little sleep at night after a hard day's work, frequently in hot sun or cold rain.

It costs a lot of money to get started and keep going. Land near town is expensive and supplies and equipment come high. It is hazardous by reason of drouth, hail, disease and insects. This cuts deeply into earnings and sometimes capital.

A good rule-of-thumb to follow is get a farm that has enough acreage to bring in the income expected — and don't set the sights too high. There is a lot to do, and a lot to learn that first year.

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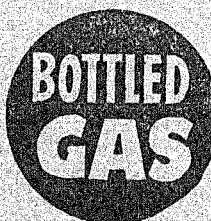
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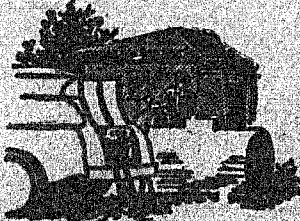

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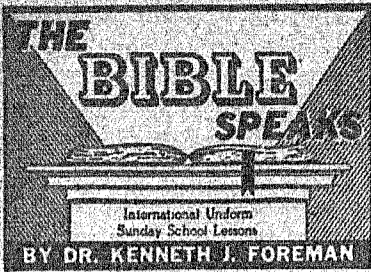

**Help The Hungry**

Lesson for November 22, 1953

AS CHRISTIANS, we owe a great deal to our mother-religion, the religion of the ancient Hebrews. Two of the characteristic strong points of that religion are ours too: one is that religion has everything to do with our everyday life, and the other is that society (that is, the persons who make up society) has a sacred duty to care for the weak and friendless. Now in ancient times the most helpless people in the community were the widows, the orphans and the "sojourners," that is to say, migrants, people without land or family, uprooted and displaced persons. Widows had very little chance at a living except by almost slave-labor; orphans even less; and as for the sojourner, in most places in those days even his life was in danger. If anybody starved in an ancient city, it would be the sojourner first, then the widows and orphans.

**An Ancient "Poor-law"**

The Hebrews were taught carefully, from Moses' time onward, that God loved these helpless persons, widows, orphans and sojourners; and the Hebrews were commanded to take care of them. Something can be learned from a study of the ancient laws protecting these poor persons, laws which the Hebrews believed, and so can we, that God himself inspired. They are not laws which we can copy unchanged, for conditions of life and work have changed. But the spirit of them is as fresh and as needed today as three thousand years ago. Consider this from Deuteronomy: "Love the sojourner therefore, for you were sojourners in the land of Egypt."

There is a certain rich man in America whom we may call Mr. X. He came to this country when a

boy, an immigrant son of very poor parents. Had he stayed in the old country, he himself thinks he would have had to live and die at his father's ill-paid trade. In America's freedom, however, this boy rose to riches and honor, and is now a man who loves to talk of the "American dream" and of how he himself is an example of it.

But what does Mr. X think of encouraging others at this present time to come over and try the American dream for themselves? He is opposed to it. He wants no more immigrants. He is glad the door was open to himself; he wants it closed now for good. But he does not stand alone; he gets re-elected to congress by several thousand other Americans who do not love the sojourner. "Love the sojourner" means have a concern for migrant workers, for displaced persons, for immigrants, for oppressed minorities. America can hardly call itself a Christian nation unless it takes such laws of God more seriously.

**Helping Men To Help Themselves**

Another and more particular law is found in Leviticus 19, where the farmer of those days is forbidden to harvest either his wheat-field or his grape-vineyards clean. He must always leave some wheat un-gathered, some vines untouched. We see how this worked in the case of Ruth who would have starved had she not had the chance to glean (pick up those stray sheaves) in the fields of Bethlehem.

This is not a law we can copy right on to our statute books; but we may well copy its spirit and intention. First there is a real concern for the man at the bottom of the ladder. Then there is given him an opportunity to work for his own living. Wheat and grapes are not delivered to his door; he has to get out and work for his food. But the point is that he is helped by being enabled to help himself.

**Hunger Around The World**

In the time of Moses, and of Jesus, indeed till most recent times, our neighbors, those whom we could help, were those whom we could see, within walking distance of our homes. No doubt there were famines in India, floods in Japan, while Jesus was living. But he never said a word about aid to India, because in the first place the Galileans themselves lived on the edge of starvation, and in the second place if they had had a million tons of surplus wheat they could never have reached India with a quart of it. ## 1954 Agricultural Conservation Program For Co.

The county committee, along with the local soil conservation service technician and other agricultural agencies in the county, have developed the 1954 agricultural conservation program for Coleman County. This group has selected six practices on which cost-sharing will be offered to farmers and ranchers of Coleman County on the completion of the practice.

These practices include:  
No. 2 — Initial establishment on cropland of perennial or biennial legumes or perennial grasses, to retard erosion and to improve soil structure, permeability, or water-holding capacity, as a part of a crop rotation.

Eligible grass or legume are Blue Panic Grass, King Ranch Bluestem Grass, Indian Grass, Switch Grass, and Madrid, Evergreen Legume. Cost here per lb. pure live seed: 75c, 1.00, 50c, 75c, and 15c respectively.

No. 8 — Controlling competitive shrubs necessary to permit growth of adequate, desirable, vegetative cover for soil protection on range or pasture lands.

A. Pricklypear and/or cactus— 60c per acre for infestation from 1% to 4%, plus 15c per acre for each percent infestation in excess of 4%.

B. Mesquite — \$1.00 per acre for infestation from 1% to 10%, plus 10c per acre for each percent infestation in excess of 10c but not to exceed 80%.

C. Oak — 6c per acre for each 1% infestation, not to exceed \$3.00 per acre.

No. 12 — Constructing or enlarging reservoirs for livestock water to obtain proper distribution of livestock and encourage rotation grazing and better grassland management as a means of protecting established vegetative cover.

Federal Cost-Share: 10c per cubic yard of earth moved in constructing the dam.

No. 17 — Constructing terraces to detain or control the flow of water and check soil erosion on sloping land.

Federal Cost-Share: \$1.50 per 100 feet of constructed terrace with proper fills.

No. 18 — Construction of diversion or spreader terraces, to intercept run-off and divert water to protected outlets, or to spread water to prevent erosion or to permit beneficial use of run-off.

Federal Cost-Share: 6c per cubic yard of dirt from determinations made from the excavations of the diversion or spreader terrace.

No. 28 — Initial establishment in the cropping system of winter annual legumes for the improvement of soil structure and for winter protection from erosion.

Legume: Austrian Winter or Dixie, Wonder Peas, top price per lb. \$0.0675; Hairy Vetch, top price per lb. \$0.16.

The county committee has designated November 20 through December 4 as the initial sign-up period for the 1954 program. The committee will budget the approval of the practices into six periods for 1954. Each period will be 60 days and will begin January 1, 1954. Producers are asked to sign up for only the practices they expect to carry out the next 60 days. All approvals issued will be a guaranteed cost-sharing assistance. Farmers and ranchers may sign up any time during the period in which they expect to carry out the practice. This will keep the program on a current basis. Approvals will be issued on Monday of each week.

The county committee has placed a limitation of \$750 on each farm or ranch in the county.
