Letters To Editor

Dear Editor,

Last week's "Letters to the Editor" column carried a letter which has stimulated no little bit of thought and question. Certainly we appreciate the Santa Anna publicity item which appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and we are proud of every advancement our city makes, but last week's letter and the article in the Fort Worth paper have several differences of content which need clarifying.

I would like Mayor Henner and the other city officials to make a public statement in the News concerning certain of these points. They could do much to enlighten the citizenship if they would directly answer the following questions:

1. What was the exact deficit in the "town treasury" at the start of this term? How much per month accumulated and for how many months?

2. What has been the revenue since this new administration has been in office and from what sources did this revenue come?

3. What items of city equipment have been disposed of and what amount was realized from their sale? If major equipment was disposed of, when was it purchased and at what cost? Also, was said public equipment properly cited by publication in four editions of public news-matter?

4. What has this administration done in comparison with other administrations to help the city by supplying needed improvements such as paved city streets, extension of sewage lines, insect and sanitary control?

5. How many employees does the city employ and why did the article in the Star-Telegram say there were only two full time employees?

6. Who was responsible for the content of the article which appeared in the Star-Telegram which left these questions not substantiated by public fact? I believe to know the truth is every citizen's right and to inform the citizenship is every administration's responsibility. I believe the misunderstanding on this civic matter is the result of a lack of information or an error in publication. I challenge those who can give the information to present the matter to the public in this newspaper.

tions and we know of at least one bank account that is not near the balance it was some three or four years ago. So we doubt the truth of this statement.

The article made several other statements that, so far as we know, are not true. One statement that has seemed to cause more comment than any other is a statement made to the fact that "the town treasury (Santa Anna) was running \$300 a month in the "red" when the present city council took office. According to a financial statement published in this newspaper soon after the present council took office a balance of \$1588.75 was in the operating fund as of April 13, 1953. The statement of revenue and expenditures from April 1, 1951 to March 31, 1953 showed the income of the City of Santa Anna to be \$167,164.68 while the expenditures for the same time was \$144,504.48, so from these facts we cannot see where the city treasury was operating in the "red". It would appear to us that the city was in a good financial condition.

A "Letter to the Editor" published last week was very enlightening on some subjects and another "Letter to the Editor" published this week challenges the Mayor and other City officials to make a public statement concerning some points that have caused very much discussion in the past few weeks. This writer joins the writer of the letter published this week in challenging the city officials to answer the six questions asked them and to answer them in a manner in which the layman of the town can understand. This writer would like to add one question to this group and that is "Precisely why was the city equipment disposed of?"

In the six questions asked by the writer of the "Letter to the Editor" this week, the writer asks why the sale of city equipment was not cited by publication for four weeks. This writer does not know all the laws concerning the purchase and sale of equipment for a city, but we do know that where equipment is purchased in the amount of \$2000 or more, Notice of this intention must be published for two weeks with the first publication being at least 14 days prior to date set for purchase and the purchase must be made on a bidding basis. As to the sale of equipment we do not know whether a public notice is necessary or not, but feel that in the interest of the public it should be made. Some of the equipment supposedly disposed of by the present city council was worth more than \$2,000.

And to the city council, we hope you will accept the challenge above and give the citizens of Santa Anna answers to the seven questions asked.

This writer would also like for the city council to publish another financial statement, as according to law it is time for one to be published. The last statement was published for the period to and including March 31, 1953. Article 1001 of the Civil Statutes of the State of Texas states: "At the end of every half year he (the city treasurer) shall cause to be published, at the expense of the city, a statement showing the amount of receipts and expenditures for the six months next preceding, and the general condition of the treasury." Acts 1935 p. 123, C. L. Vol. 3, p. 494, Acts 1901, p. 131.

Tile Co. And Oil Co. Officials

Honored Tues. Nite

Approximately 250 persons attended the Community Chamber of Commerce Appreciation Banquet at the School Lunch room Tuesday night, honoring the officials and stockholders of the Santa Anna Tile Co., Inc., and the officials of the Humble Oil and Refining Co., who recently completed one of the most modern service stations in west Texas here in Santa Anna.

Dr. Charles M. Henner, mayor, gave the Welcome and said that the opening of the tile factory is another achievement of the town for which everyone can be proud.

He told of his opening of the Santa Anna Hospital, the building of the new service station and added that these three projects are something the town and surrounding area can well be proud of.

R. M. Fielder Sr., of Abilene, tile company vice-president, said that one reason the factory site was in Santa Anna was because of the residents' "interest and community spirit". Fielder said that he had been thinking of improving the making of tile since 1947 when he took up ceramics as a hobby.

He said his goal has been to develop a tile which will be easy for the average person to use in building. A plastic cement is used to keep the tile in place.

Fielder said the factory had been under intensive study since 1951. He said it is estimated that every \$1 paid an employee has a turnover of seven times in his hometown. Thus, the approximate \$4,000 eventual payroll will mean \$28,000 buying power to Santa Anna businessmen.

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, principal speaker for the evening, commended the faith and foresight of those who are developing new industries in Santa Anna and said such evidences of free enterprise and the American spirit benefits the entire community and area.

Hardeman also warned against the people being lulled into a sense of false security by elements seeking to hoodwink good people into subversive organizations masquerading as truly American. He also warned against losing American rights by letting "one worlders and do-gooders" sign them away to other countries through the U. N.

Ford Barnes, Secretary of the Community Chamber of Commerce, introduced members of the Humble Oil and Refining Co. and chamber representatives from Brownwood and Ballinger. W. R. Mulroy introduced West Texas Utilities Co. officials present and Fielder introduced the tile company officials and stockholders.

R. K. Green, vice-president of the Community Chamber of Commerce and Superintendent of the Santa Anna schools was master of ceremonies and the Rev. Jack Payne, pastor of the First Methodist Church, gave the invocation.

The high school band provided dinner music and the Choral Club, which was organized for the first time this year, sang several numbers, one of which was the new Santa Anna High School alma mater, composed by Carl Gilkerson, band director.

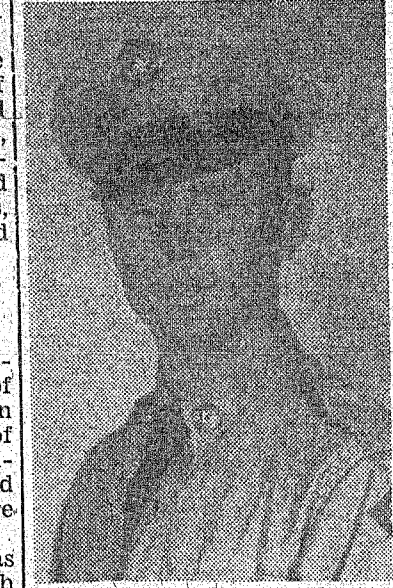

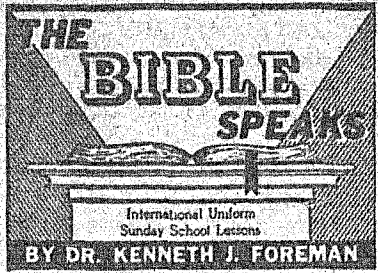

World Planning

Lesson for October 4, 1953

THE man who invented the word "Utopia" knew what he was doing. Sir Thomas More first used the name as the title of a book in which he described the island of Utopia, a place where everything is perfect—climate, laws, schools, people, everything. But Sir Thomas was having his little joke, for "Utopia" comes from two Greek words meaning No Place. He knew there is no real place in this world where everything is perfect; being a saint and a sensible man he suspected there never would be. No Christian has ever expected to see a perfect world this side of heaven.

Why Christians Plan

Nevertheless, Sir Thomas More lived an active life, working hard to make the England of his day more like the Utopia of his dreams—or rather, more like the heaven of which Utopia might have been a suburb. For he was a Christian, and Christians, at their best, do plan for a better world. Christians at their worst do not. At their worst, Christians either accept the world as it is and imitate it, or even defend it against all critics; or they run away from it, shutting themselves away from it, leaving it to dirt, disease and the devil. (It might be asked, are such persons Christian at all? That is another question.) Almost all Christians plan on a small scale. Most of us live in a rather small world, and in the tiny world of our daily life we like to make plans that are Christian. In the home, for example: an unplanned home, higgledy-piggledy, with everything in a continual uproar, is not the kind of home we want to live in. Christian young people plan to make their marriage and their

home as near like heaven as they can—and that takes planning and hard work too.

Widening Circles

Are we of today better Christians than our ancestors were? John Baillie asks the question in his "The Belief in Progress." His answer is No, if you mean by the question: Are Christians today more devoted, more saintly, than eight or eighteen centuries ago? If we have advanced beyond our forefathers, it is not in being better men personally. But John Baillie thinks, and it is a thought worth pondering, that we can and sometimes do have a wider view of the area of Christian action. Let us ask the question: Are we cleaner than our ancestors were? No, if you mean devotion to the ideal of "cleanliness next to Godliness." But while the citizen of 1800 was personally as clean as the soap of those days would permit, his kitchen and his streets and his water supply were not clean by our standards. Now planning for cleanliness includes such things as mosquito extermination and bonds for a sewer system. So it is with Christian planning. If you want to keep your home Christian you will need to do some thinking about all those wider circles that affect the home; schools, government, business life, war and peace.

Suppose We Don't Plan?

A Christian who wants a Christian home but will not join nor work in his local P.T.A. is missing one of his best chances to work toward the home he wants. If you want a Christian home and take no interest in politics, you may by your very neglect be turning over the control of your community to crooks and exposing your children to the kind of community that crooks operate. If you want a Christian home but think that government is no concern of yours, you may find your congressman voting for measures and policies that produce or hasten war, and you know very well that war can break up homes faster and more painfully than any other thing unless it is liquor. We must never forget that the devil is planning all the time, and his henchmen are planning. If Christians do not do some counter-planning, we are fools. Furthermore and most important, we must remember that God has a plan for this world which he made and loves and has not forsaken. The Bible gives us the lines along which God's servants have always worked.

Plants in banded drill rows eight inches apart grew rapidly and made growth enough to survive the winter. But plots where the plants were between fertilizer rows developed slowly and many were killed during the winter. Further tests showed that if a high rate of fertilizer, 750 pounds per acre of 3-12-6, were placed in contact with the grass and clover seed at planting time, then the stands of clover was suppressed. Growth was also slow if the bands of fertilizer were one inch below and one inch to the side of the seed. Therefore, the method of placing fertilizer one inch directly below the seed proved superior to all other tests.

There was apparently very little advantage in broadcasting the seed and banding the fertilizer. However, drilling the seed showed considerable advantage even when the fertilizer was broadcast.

Examination of the weed content in harvested forage showed that where both seed and fertilizer were drilled, practically no weeds were in evidence. But where seed or fertilizer were broadcast, weeds were a real problem, especially at low rates of seeding and fertilization.

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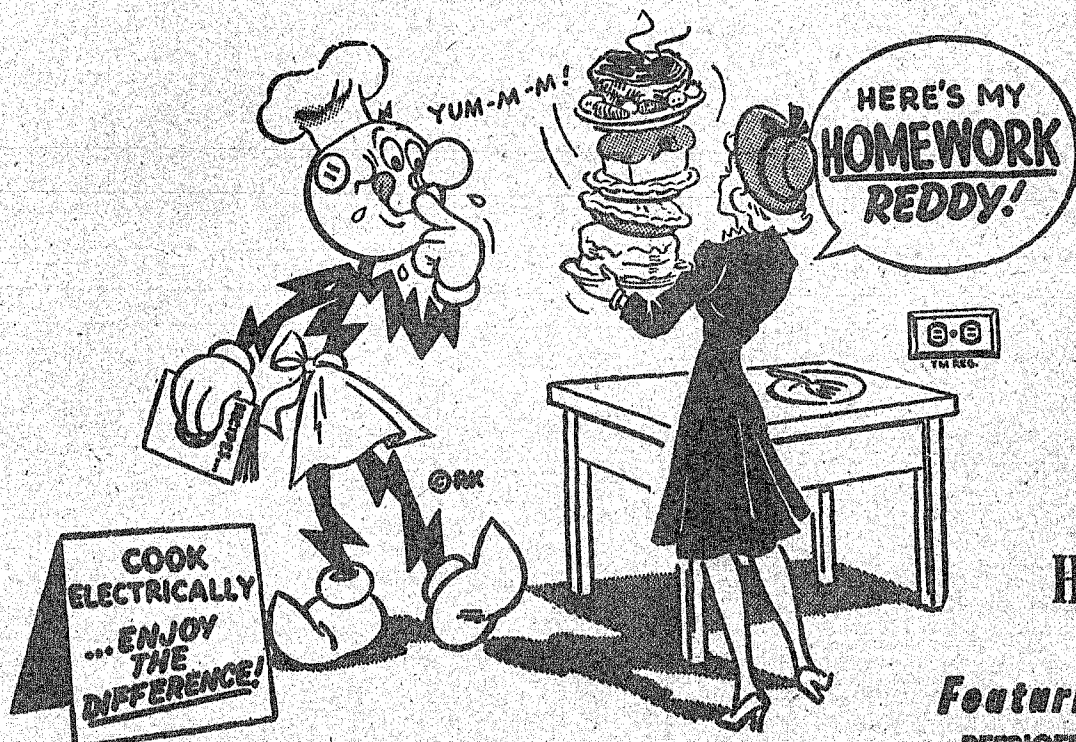

GRASSLAND SEEDING

The problem of how to establish a good grassland crop may now be close to a solution due to experiments conducted during the past year.

The farmer has long been troubled by the puzzler of how to give grass seeds a good footing in the soil. In most cases, he still relies upon the old "broadcast" method — a system prevalent during Biblical times.

Now a new type of "precision planting" is showing excellent results.

Precision planting calls for drilling of grass and clover seed at a depth of one-fourth inch. One inch below these seeds has been placed a band of fertilizer. Soil is then packed over the seed.

The advantage of fertilizer placement in a band below the grass seed became evident soon after the plantings were made

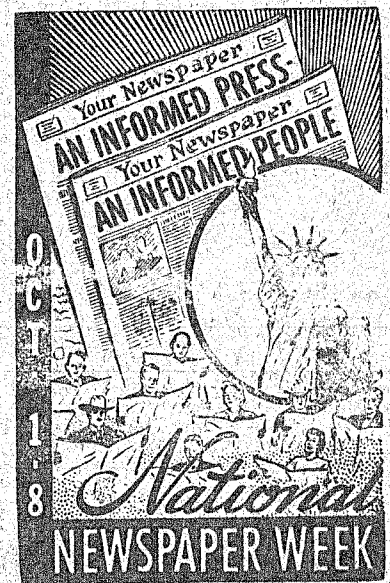
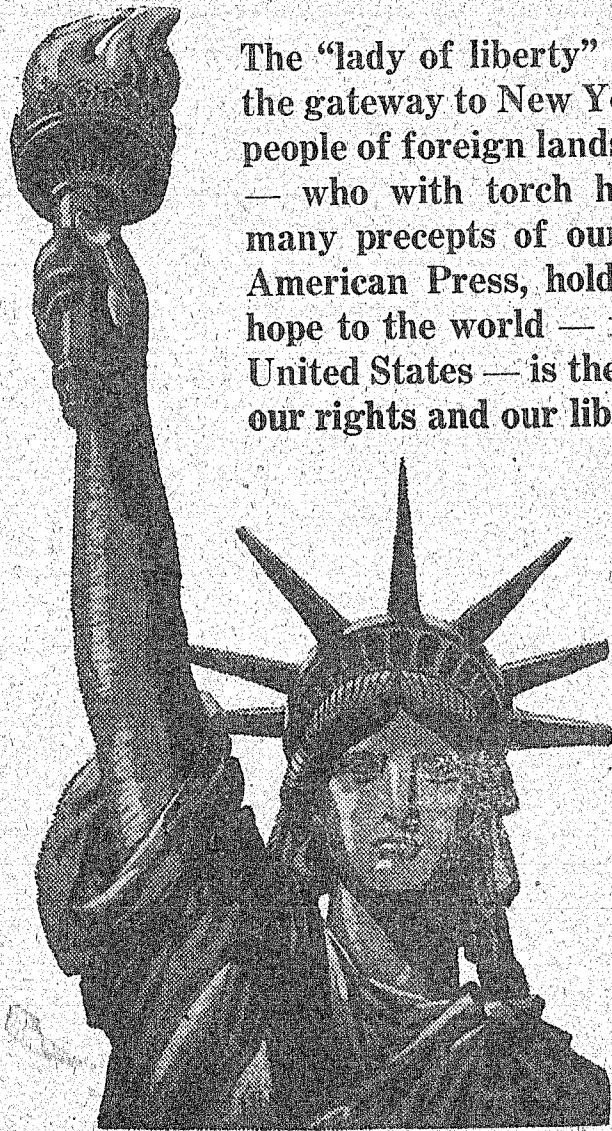

**New Procedure For
Men Inducted In
Military Service**

Fort Bliss — Beginning September 28, Army inductees from New Mexico, Arizona, and Western and Central Texas will report from their local induction centers to a new Reception Center at Fort Bliss, near El Paso, Texas.

The Bliss Reception Center has been created as the result of a new Department of the Army policy to process Army inductees directly to Training Divisions or Training Centers where they will be trained. The new plan is scheduled to be in full operation here by October 1. It is expected to save time and money by cutting the period of induction processing to 72 hours and by eliminating much transportation cost.

Heretofore, new soldiers from the areas named were received at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, or Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and then assigned to various posts for training.

Under the new plan, the inductee will be sworn in at the nearest large city induction center and given transportation and meal tickets to Fort Bliss. He will then be given 21 days to attend to personal and business matters, before reporting to Fort Bliss for processing and training.

At the Fort Bliss Reception Center, which is attached to the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center, he will receive an orientation on Army procedure, an initial issue of uniforms, part of his first month's pay, and physical and dental examinations.

He then will go to an RTC training unit for eight weeks of basic training, during this time he is given the Army General Classification Tests to determine which jobs he is best fitted for in the Army. The first eight weeks of basic training is identical in all branches throughout the Army.

By the close of eight weeks, the men will have been divided into groups by the Department of the Army. For the concluding eight weeks of their basic training, some men will be retained at Fort Bliss for training in Antiaircraft Artillery, while others will be sent to various Army posts in the continental United States for training in other branches of the service. Between the two periods of training, each man will receive two weeks leave.

At the conclusion of his 16 weeks of basic training, he will be given a permanent assignment.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers trounced the Early Longhorns Friday night 25-6 for their first win of the season in two starts. Santa Anna lost to Junction two weeks before by a 7-0 score.

The game started with the Mountaineers kicking to Early and they returned the ball to their 31 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage Early fumbled with Santa Anna recovering. Losing 4 yards in 4 tries, the Mountaineers let the ball go back to Early and then on their second play from scrimmage the Longhorns fumbled again and Santa Anna recovered and two plays later Jay Steward raced 27 yards for the first Mountaineer TD. Wess Wise passed to Steward for the extra point and the Mountaineers took an early 7-0 lead. Late in the first period Santa Anna recovered another Early fumble on the Early 26-yard line and four plays later Dean Bass went over the goal from the 9 yard line to take a 13-0 lead, which was the half-time score.

Midway in the second period a low pass from Wise to Charles McClellan was good for slightly over the 40 yards, but the play was called back and the Mountaineers were penalized for off-side. The second period ended with Early on the 1-yard line after an 18 yard scamper by Harry Craig.

Early kicked to the Mountaineers to start the third period. Charles McClellan took the ball on his 27-yard line and returned it to the Early 46. A ground play netted 5 yards and a pass from Wise to Steward was good for another 6 points, putting the Mountaineers 19 points out in front. Early took the kick-off on their own 14-yard line and after a series of 12 running and passing plays David Walls handed off to Craig who went 12 yards for their only score. In the final period Early kicked to the Santa Anna 28-yard line and 13 plays later Bass went over from the 9 yard line for the final score of the game. The game ended with Santa Anna in possession of the ball on the Early 41-yard line.

Outstanding men for Santa Anna on the line were Charlie McClellan at right end and James Perry played an outstanding game from the guard slot. Because of minor injuries in the back-field, Dean Bass was used on most ground plays and he sure did a wonderful job. In this writer's opinion, this was his best game in the four seasons he has been playing. All the other boys played steller football and we think their prospects are good for their next game with Dublin on Friday night, October 2, at Dublin.

TRAVEL TO DUBLIN

This week end the Mountaineers travel to Dublin for the first conference game for Santa Anna and the second for Dublin. On paper Dublin is a 1 point favorite in the game, but paper figures do not always work out when teams are matched on the gridiron. About the only thing we have to go by is the Early-Rising Star game, the Dublin-Rising Star game and the Santa Anna-Early game. Early beat Rising Star 19-0 and Dublin beat Rising Star 39-0; Santa beat Early 25-6, so the prospects for a good game Friday night are good and the Mountaineers have a good chance of winning their first conference game.

The Mountaineers will not have very hard work-outs this week, due to three of the boys having pulled muscles. However,

they will do some light scrimmage and are due to practice a lot on passes.

Boyd French, Donald Trull and Jay Steward all got muscles pulled in the Early game and it is expected that it will take a week or two to get these straightened out. All three will be ready for the Dublin game though.

AROUND THE DISTRICT

Dublin, Ranger and Bangs took the lead in District 7-A competition over the week end by winning their games, while Eastland and DeLeon played to a tie and Cross Plains, Wylie and Rising Star took Zero standing as the result of losing their games. Dublin, the defending champions, took Rising Star by a 39-0 count; Ranger handed Wylie their second defeat of the season by a 33-13 score; Bangs won their first game in three starts by defeating Cross Plains 14-6; and Eastland and DeLeon both still stand at 500 because of their 7-7 tie. Santa Anna will get in the conference column this week end when they travel to Dublin for their first conference start.

Wylie will take a rest this week end and Bangs travels to DeLeon; Cross Plains goes to Rising Star; and Ranger and Eastland tangle at Eastland in one of the top games in the district for the week.
