Swimming Pool **Opens For Season**


Bobbie Dunham, who operates the City Swimming Pool, said weather permitting, the pool will open for the summer at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, June 1.

What started out to be a fishing trip for two Muleshoe families turned into something quite different last Sunday

Wayne and Mary Wauson and their two sons, and Jackey Wayne and Stacy Burris and their daughter and son left Muleshoe early last Sunday morning for White River Lake, east of Lubbock and near Crosbyton.

At the time they left Muleshoe, little wind was blowing, and when they put their boat into the water and boarded it around 8 a.m. Sunday, the wind was just beginning to 'kick up a little.'

As the wind gained, Wauson started trying to get his boat back to the landing when everything started happening.

the high waves.

She excitedly told the men "They sank," and Wauson immediately put Stacy Burris and the four children on the shore.

Men in the parking lot were beginning to yell that a boat had sunk when he turned around to make his way back to where two men were bobbing up and down with the waves.

No other boats were nearby. "I came back out hookin' it," said Wauson, "but had to slow down when I hit rough water."

They circled and verified that only the two men were in the boat, then dragged the two water-logged men into their boat.

In Profile

The Very Real, Personable George Washington



GEORGE WASHINGTON (AND HIS VERY OWN CHERRY TREE)

(Editor's note: This week, The Journal shows how the expression, "George Washington Slept Here" really has meaning for the Muleshoe area. Come along -let's meet George Washington --Muleshoe's own version.)

Not only has George Washington 'slept here' he is in fact, sleeping in Muleshoe, and has been for the past 30 years.

He first got the attention of Muleshoe when he spent 1956-57 and 1957-58 as head coach and athletic director of the Lazbuddie

He was approached by then head coach Wayne Mantooth, to move to Muleshoe as a coach.

At the time, Washington had decided to only coach for a couple of more years, then opt for the more stable physical education department. (Coaches tend to move around an awful lot, he

So, the native of Quitaque, where he was born December 21,

1925, made the move to Muleshoe -- a move he says he has never regretted.

Back when he was a youngster, he moved with his family to the Bula area, and he resided there with them until they moved to Bowie when he was five years of age. Then it was on to Oklahoma where he attended school from the age of seven.

While he was attending Cameron State Junior College at Lawton, Okla. he was on the team that played Compton Junior College in the Junior Rose Bowl at Pasadena on December 13, 1949. He played offensive center and defensive linebacker at the time.

Then, he finished his regular college work at Panhandle A&M at Goodwell, Okla, where he served as Tri-Captain of his football team in his senior year.

Prior to his college years, he served in the U. S. Navy during World War II.

After his college years, started

his coaching and teaching years. He first spent two years coaching in Guymon, Okla.

before going to Wakita, Okla. north of Enid for one year, then one year as athletic director at Wayne, Okla. However, the Wayne school did not have a football program, so he moved to Lazbuddie, then on to Muleshoe.

One of his fondest memories is of a local man who was a coach when he first moved to Muleshoe and later served for a number of vears as a school principal.

Bill Taylor was coaching for Wayne Mantooth when George Washington moved to Muleshoe and he remembers, "Bill Taylor was an outstanding coach. One heck of a nice fellow.

"He had the interest of the boys at heart, and did everything he could to help them, both in the classroom and on the field.

"He's one man who has contributed tremendously to this community."

Not only was George Wash-

ington known as a coach at Muleshoe High School, he also taught science and history.

When first out of college, he started off teaching history, and when he retired from Muleshoe High School a couple of years ago, he was still teaching history -- American History.

"We've had a lot of good kids in Muleshoe," he said, "I can't think of any bad ones."

Reminiscing, "You see them come and go -- you help them with what you can. Kids I had in school were excellent," he said, "both on the football field and

"Some were in football, basketball and track, and they always gave the best they had in whatever they were doing."

He has missed coaching, and has continued to miss coaching and teaching since the day he retired in 1986 -- but he does some substitute teaching now and then, just to keep up with Cont. Page 8, Col. 1

Sales Tax Check Shows An 'Upswing'

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales taxes for their latest payment.

"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, "and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."

City sales tax rebates totaled \$111.4 million.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$9.3 million to the counties which have approved a half-percent county sales tax.

Muleshoe's latest payment was \$22,812.74, an increase of 9.71 percent over the \$20,793.42 received at the same time a year ago. To date, payments for Muleshoe are \$90,953.81, an increase for the year of 17.25 percent, as payments this time in 1987 totaled \$77,571.33.

Morton has shown a whopping 65.94 percent increase in payments. Their net payment this period was \$7,129.87 and was \$4,296.78 for the same period a year ago. For their year, their payments have increased 37.28 percent. Total payments at this time a year ago were \$19,727.90, up to their current total of \$27,083.11.

In Lamb County, Littlefield shows an increase for the year of 4.80 percent. Their total payments a year ago were \$105,133 .-34 and are \$110,180.87 at this time in 1988. Their net payment for this period is \$31,576.65, up 22.33 percent over the \$25,812.46 of a year ago.

Friona, in Pariner County, is down in receipts for the year, by 3.48 percent. Their total at this time last year was \$42,012.11 and is \$40,550.19 at this time this year. Friona does reflect an increase in monthly receipts. This month, they received a total of \$13,613.67, up by 23.35 percent over the \$11,036.26 this time in 1987.

The largest allocation this month went to Houston - \$19 million.

El Paso County received the biggest county allocation -- \$1.3

The Comptroller's office also sent checks totaling \$50 million to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities.

May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 21.

Electric utilities—once regarded as "widow and orphan" stocks due to their safety characteristics—are no longer the safe haven they once were.


Indeed, the bankruptcy filing by Public Service Company of New Hampshire—the first for a major public utility since the Depression—underscores the growing risks of the group.

The factor having the most impact on the industry is the rising tide of consumer advocacy across the country. Regulators are taking a harder look at construction costs and are making shareholders pay for mismanagement and overruns. Environmental concerns, such as the acid rain issue and the piling up of spent nuclear fuel, have hurt the group as well.

wnat's happening with the kids and in the schools.

He didn't just sit down and fold his hands, though.

When he moved his family to Muleshoe, his daughter, Lana, now Lana Lewis of Lubbock, and mother of his grandson, Dustin, was just getting ready to start school. "I came to Muleshoe with the intention of building a home and staying," said Coach Washington. "And, that's just what I did."

His son, Mark, resides in Muleshoc. Coach Washington's wife, Lois, who he is very proud to say became his bride almost 40 years ago, is still working as secretary to Bob Graves, principal at Watson Junior High School.

He says they were married on June 26, 1948 at Frederick, Oklahoma.

For many years, Coach Washington was known for his 'Board of Education,' and many people were recipients of his special 'Boards of Education.' He cut them out in the woodworking shop, shaped, sanded and painted them, and they were either sold, or auctioned off to help make money for the junior class to sponsor the junior-senior banquet.

Sandy Noble helped Washington cut out and form the special 'boards' which were painted white with black lettering, in keeping with the Muleshoe High School colors.

In years past, Washington did a lot of tree-trimming around town, but has slowed down with some of that activity now.

He proudly shows off some of his woodworking displayed in his home, such as turning bowls on a lathe, book shelves and plaques.

He was proud to be a part of the winning football teams of the early '60's and has many plaques and honors displayed in the study in his home.

As the two men were already in the boat with Wayne and Mary Wauson and Jackey Burris, the game warden attempted to pick up some of the floating debris from the sunken boat -- such as gas can, tackle equipment and other equipment.

The game warden thanked Burris and Wauson for their assistance, and returned to the shore, as did the Muleshoe trio with their extra passengers.

After getting settled down a bit, the Muleshoe group went to the crappie house and spent the rest of the day fishing from there, catching some 35-40 crappie.

Both men disclaim saving the Lubbock duo's lives, but, with

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

Blood pressure is the force of the blood against the walls of the arteries and veins through which it is being pumped by the heart.

High blood pressure (hypertension) is the condition that exists when the heart pumps harder than it should to circulate the blood.

The hypertension threshold recommended by the Joint National Committee on Detection, Evaluation, and Treatment of High Blood Pressure in 1984, for an average-sized adult, is a reading of 140/90 mmHg.

If high blood pressure is not treated, the heart may continue to work harder and harder, eventually becoming enlarged. The high pressure may result in damage to the eyes, heart, brain, or kidneys.

In about 10 percent of patients, high blood pressure is found to be a symptom of an underlying problem, such as a kidney disease, tumor, or congenital defect. This is known as secondary hypertension.

If the underlying problem is corrected, the blood pressure usually returns to normal. In 90 percent of patients, the reason for high blood pressure is unknown. It is known however, that being overweight or using a great deal of salt, can contribute to the problem.

South Plains Health Provider Organization, Inc. will be providing free high blood pressure screening in all of its clinics. Personnel will be available to screen, at the workplace, those businesses and industries whose employees would like to be screened.


