Methodist Church Makes Plans For New Parsonage

last week officially sanctioned the construction of a new parsonage to replace the present building which is one of Santa Anna's oldest residences still in use. The congregation met in a Church Conference on Thursday night after the required two weeks of publication of the meeting and the group decided to initiate plans to build as soon as funds are in hand for the project.

Rev. Payne, the church pastor, stressed that although the maximum expenditure of \$15,000 has been placed by the conference on the project, final plans have not been accepted and it is probable that the new home will cost considerably less than that figure. The Building Committee for the project is composed of R. K. Green, chairman, O. L. Cheaney, O. A. Eitheredge, Harry Crews, Bruce Snodgrass, Chester Galloway, and W. B. Griffin.

The new parsonage is expected to be a single story building of contemporary architecture and will replace a two story nine room parsonage which was first built in the middle of 1890's and purchased by the congregation in 1920 for the use of the church. The Building Committee has stressed its desire to receive bids on the purchase of the present parsonage to be moved from the premises that the new one might be built. If the committee so decides, the old building will be razed to furnish some materials for the new one.

Santa Anna has only played one conference game to date and that was last week when the Dublin Lions handed them a 27-0 defeat. Cross Plains has been defeated at the hands of Bangs and then they won over Rising Star last week, to give them a one loss, one win record. The Mountaineers lost a hard fought game to the Dublin Lions last week by a 27-0 score, with the Lions making all 27 points in the last half. During the first half the game was all for the Mountaineers with the statistics showing four first downs for Santa Anna and three for Dublin; Santa Anna gained 84 yards and lost 16 while Dublin gained 80 yards and lost 45. Both teams had been on the other's 27 yard line.

During the last half the Mountaineers could not seem to get their defense to operating as it had the first half and the Lions scored two TDs in each the third and fourth periods with the most sensational play coming when James Burna took a punt from Jay Steward and the Dublin 11-yard line and returned it 29 yards for the TD early in the fourth period.

Fire Prevention And Your Home Grounds

College Station - At this season of the year many parts of your home grounds may be fire hazards, according to Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist for the Texas Extension Service. Dead grass, clustered vines, shrubs and other plants need to be removed and controlled methods used in burning. Not only will this take care of the fire-hazards but improve the appearance of your home grounds.

While you are doing this, take notice of the trees and shrubs which have withstood the dry weather. Some of them in the evergreen family may be called fire safe and be valuable to your property because they form a barrier between the buildings and areas of dry grass and weeds. Among the fire safe shrubs, the specialist says, are many of the privets, cherry laurel, yaupon, liveoak and other evergreens. These are especially adapted to screen and border plantings in the home grounds. Trees which contain an oil substance can be planted to better advantage away from buildings. Pines and cedars, although at-

tractive during the winter, have leaves which burn easily.

Another fire-prevention suggestion for your home grounds is careful placing of hydrants for watering lawns and shrubbery. Not only will the outlets be helpful during dry seasons, but can they provide water for fighting a fire which may originate in the area.

Fire-Prevention Week is a good time to clean the home grounds of lumber and other waste material which might be flammable. It is also an excellent time the specialist adds, to study the landscape from the standpoint of safe plantings and prevent the loss of life and property from fire.

men to build the new world? Christians above all should be interested in this question, and indeed they should be working at it. It is not one of these questions that just solves itself if you let it alone.

Take care of heredity, weed out the unfit, let laws of eugenics improve humanity. Well, that won't work, because all that careful breeding can accomplish is no more than improving people's bodies and minds.

God's Design

Not that eugenics isn't a good thing so far as it goes. So is anything that really improves people, as even barber and beauty shops do, a little. But nothing that works on man from the outside will improve him on the inside as he needs to be improved.

We don't need revised men, revamped men, re-conditioned men; we need new men. The Bible tells us the truth, that man's nature has been so affected by sin that nothing short of a radical operation will effect a cure.

The odd thing about that was that F. D. R. was an Episcopalian, and at his own church he must often have joined in the General Confession: "We have left undone those things which we ought to have done, and we have done those things which we ought not to have done, and there is no health in us."

The Secret

The secret in a way is simple, but it seems so simple that many persons miss it. How is a man born again? What does he have to do to be born again? The truth is: Nothing. The secret is: God in the heart. What do you do to make your home bright? You just pull up the shades. What do you do to have God's Spirit in your heart? Ask him. Open the door.

You do not have to create the sun, it is out there ready to come in. You can keep it out if you insist but you never have to coax it; you can't pay it to come in. still is not as serious as it would be in the extreme southern portion of the state where the growing season is longer and more favorable for the insect.

In the South Texas counties of Kleberg and Nueces, cotton gin trash examinations are showing greatly reduced numbers of pink bollworm. A recent seasonal examination found an average of only 49 worms per bushel of gin trash as compared to an average of 6,156 per bushel in the same area last year.

The prolonged dry spell during the summer gave most farmers good opportunity to clean up their fields in the Rio Grande Valley. But near the very end of the gathering season, the heavy rains delayed the harvest in some sections. The prompt use of defoliants on the plants may have offset any losses in the eradication program, however.

Planting and plow-up deadlines are still in effect in 61 south and central Texas counties. Farming operations are controlled in this large area to prevent the spread of the insect into other parts of the state.

The pink bollworm threat is not confined to those counties alone. In all, some evidence of infestation has been found in 239 counties. Only 15 counties in the northern Panhandle have no restrictions on cotton growth or treatment.

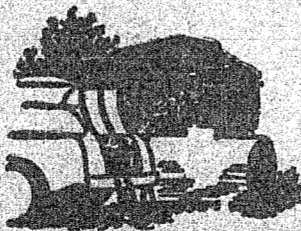

INSECT PROGRESS REPORT Pink Bollworm, the cotton insect which makes Louisiana and Oklahoma entomologists eye Texas fields with apprehension, is believed to be on the decline this year.

Texas is generally regarded by other states as the gateway of the destructive pest for its entry into the U. S. from Mexico. This was particularly true last year when we faced the heaviest

infestation in history. But due to strict state control measures, the latest progress report on the eradication program is encouraging.

The reduction is attributed to efforts of state entomologists, cotton growers and others, plus hot, dry weather. In some northern areas of Texas, however, the pink bollworm population remains uncomfortably high. The threat in those areas
