Bernice Johnson, county tax-assessor - collector, announces this week that arrangements have again been made with Mrs. J. G. Traffic Lights To Be Changed This Week-End

The two traffic lights located in the downtown part of Santa Anna will be changed from the regular stop and go signals to caution for through traffic and stop signals for traffic entering from side streets, this week end. By action of the city council, these lights are to be changed for a trial period and if they work successfully, will be left this way.

The lights for through traffic, or traffic going east and west, will be a blinking amber color indicating for the driver to use caution in passing the lights. Lights for the side streets will be a blinking red light, indicating a signal for drivers to come to a complete stop and wait for through traffic to clear before entering the main street.

All lights will be blinking all time they are on and drivers are urged to obey the signals from these lights. Through traffic will not need to stop when passing through town and this will prevent the traffic tie-ups that have been happening. Drivers coming in from side streets are urged to use the utmost caution in entering the main street. The traffic light at the corner of the Rockwood and Coleman highway will remain as is.

The world's greatest indoor rodeo will be presented in Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum twice daily in combination with the superb horse show.

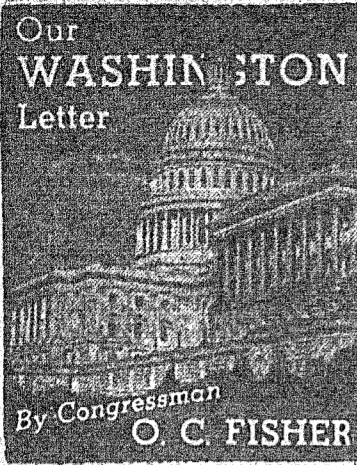

2 Political Races Have Opponents In This Precinct

The race for District Clerk became a more than one-man race this week with the announcement of G. A. (Tode) Hensley that he was seeking the office. Richard D. Bass announced several days ago that he was seeking the office and the present District Clerk, T. H. (Sticks) Corder, has not announced his intentions. Candidates have until May 3, to announce their intentions and file for places on the Democratic ballots, with the first primary election to be held on Saturday, July 24.

Walter C. Holt announced this week that he was seeking election as Commissioner of Precinct 2, running against the present Commissioner, Earl Hardy.

There is a good possibility of contests developing in some of the other elective offices before the dead-line.

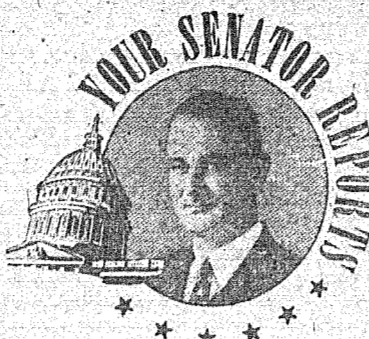


An academy for the Air Force becomes more likely following the approval last week by the House Armed Services committee of a bill to authorize one. It would be patterned after the Military academy at West Point and the Naval academy at Annapolis. The United States is the only major nation in the

world that does not have an Air Academy.

It is planned to begin a year from next July with the first class, of perhaps 300, then increase the number each year until eventually about 2500 cadets would be enrolled, with about 500 graduates annually. An existing Air Force facility will be used for the school while the permanent facility is being constructed. It is hoped that, if the bill is enacted, the new academy will be ready for use by 1957.

The location of the site for the academy has not been announced. The final decision will be made by the Secretary of the Air Force. He will have the advice of a commission to be appointed by him. A few years ago a commission spent six months on a similar study. It reported its view that only 7 of hundreds that applied should be finally considered. These included three possible sites in Texas — at Randolph Field, a site in the Fort

PARM PROGRAM: The President's farm message proposes a number of changes in the present program. Some of these changes, I believe, would result in less protection and less income for the farmer. I cannot support any proposals that would have such an effect.

The recent trend in the farm economy has been downward. It is the duty of Congress to take action designed to halt and reverse that trend. I do not believe

Worth-Dallas area, and one in Grayson County.

The Navy submarine Tusk tied up at the Naval Gun Factory here in Washington the other day after an overnight trip up the Potomac River from Norfolk, Va. I had lunch in the vessel as guest of Lt. Comdr. Charles Thomas Cooper of San Angelo, the commanding officer. The Tusk is one of the most modern of our submarines. It has been nearly everywhere, including service in the Far East during the Korean War. This Spring Commander Cooper will take the vessel on a training mission to the Caribbean. The Tusk was in the Mediterranean last spring.

The 300 foot submarine is the home of eight officers and 65 enlisted men. She was commissioned in 1946 as a fleet-type submarine and converted into a streamlined guppy type with the snorkel in 1948.

a flexible price support system—even if it is called a "modernized" parity concept — is the answer.

LIVESTOCK INDUSTRY: The President stated in his farm message that no new laws are needed to deal with problems of the livestock industry. He recommended that "existing conditions with respect to meat animals be continued."

I talked to hundreds of cattlemen between sessions of Congress. I certainly did not find them satisfied with "existing conditions." It is not their feeling that problems affecting the livestock industry are being dealt with adequately.

All the President's recommendations must be studied carefully. They must be changed when changes are necessary to maintain the protection Congress already has accorded to agriculture.

RURAL TELEPHONES: Texas now has seven REA-financed rural telephone systems. Only Minnesota, with eight, has more. More than half the States now have rural telephone facilities financed by REA. Telephone loans amounting to \$49,000,000 were approved last year. That was about \$6,000,000 less than the total approved in 1952.

OIL DEPLETION: Texas Service Stations, Associated, is a trade association of service station operators with thousands of members in some 200 Texas cities and towns. The organization's board of directors sent me a copy of a resolution they recently passed, vigorously opposing any effort to repeal or reduce the oil depletion allowance.

I had the resolution placed in the Congressional Record. I know it will help to inform the members of Congress about this important matter.

Five Former Santa Annans Pass On During Last Year

On Jan. 23, 1953, Isola Campbell Allison, oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Campbell, passed on at her home at Nacoma, Texas. Mr. Campbell was once editor of the "Santa Anna News." Mrs. Allison's husband and three children survive, also her two sisters and one brother.

On August 26, 1953, Mrs. Nora Herndon Kinnebrew of Shreveport, La., departed. She was the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Herndon, early day citizens. Mrs. Kinnebrew was the last living member of a family

of six children. She left two sons.

Mrs. M. H. Major age 83, widow of Rev. Major, who served as pastor of the Santa Anna Methodist Church during the years 1902-1905, passed on from the home of her son, David, in Bowie in September. Many remember Mrs. Major as an art teacher during one year of her residence in Santa Anna. A son, Wamon, and a daughter, Gertrude, preceded Mrs. Major in death. Gertrude's husband is a Methodist minister. They were the parents of eight children.

Another early day Methodist family, was that of J. L. Seibert who moved to Beaumont from Santa Anna more than 50 years ago. Mrs. Seibert age 93 died last August at the home of a daughter. Mr. Seibert and one son preceded her in death.

Still another fine character has gone recently, Louis Tarver, whose family was prominent in Santa Anna at an early day. Louis died in Dallas of a heart attack late in the summer of '53. He was a cousin of Mrs. Annie Weaver of Santa Anna. Only a sister, Miss Fannie Ada Tarver, is the survivor in this family.

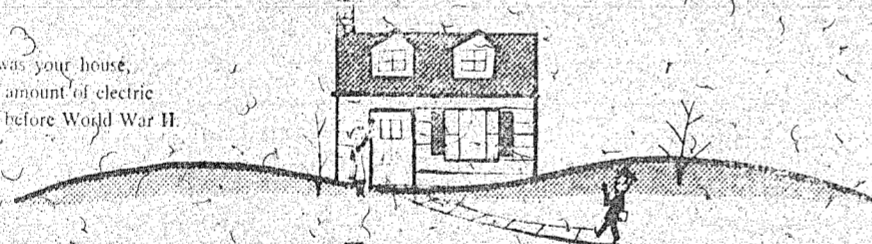

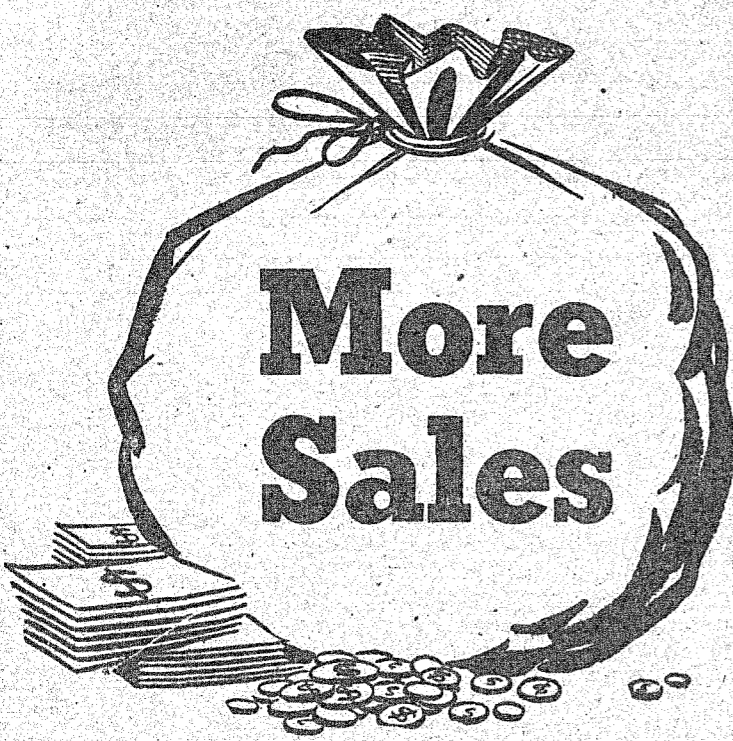

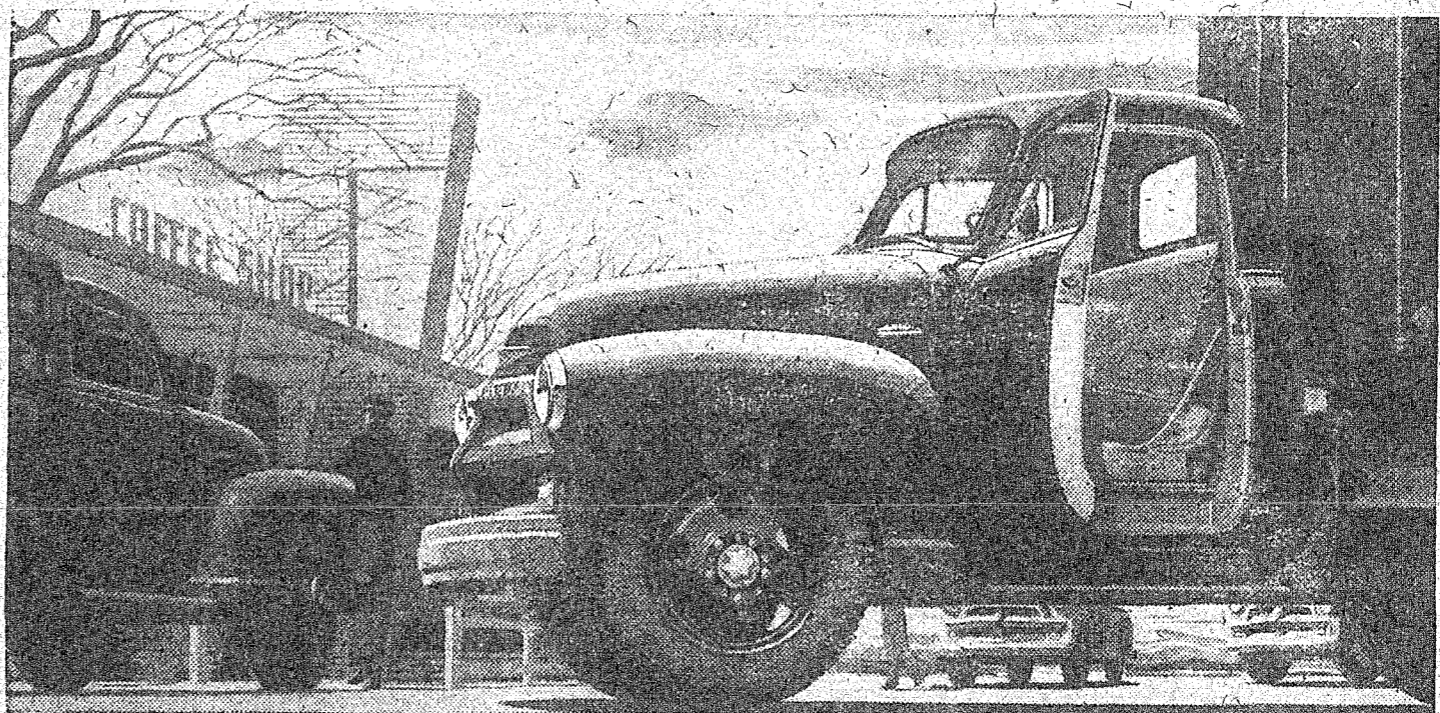

LAW DIVIDES SEPARATE
COMMUNITY ESTATES
DIFFERENTLY

The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full owner-

ship of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

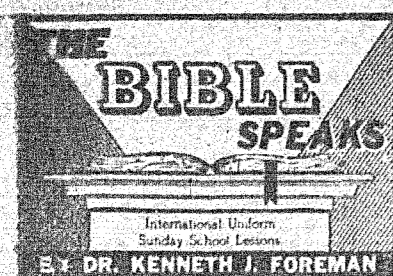

Some walls are actually good. One of these is the wall of Privacy. The lady that runs the "Ding Dong School" on TV was saying only last summer that even little children need privacy. Virginia Woolf wrote a book called "A Room of Her Own" isn't that what we all need? Many a family has broken to pieces just because the house where they lived was a bit too small. There was no place where any one of the family could get away from the eyes of the rest. We all need a little privacy, a little solitude, a little time when they have no business to ask.

How to Cross Barriers

When the other hand is on my shoulder, I feel as if I had no choice. They are not always on my shoulder. Men and women are not always in the same way. Without the sunburn that comes to those living beyond the wall. Such a wall in ancient times, was erected between the Samaritans and the regular Jews. It was an invisible wall, but it had no doors and no one crossed it. Yet one day Jesus walked right through that barrier and several other walls all at the same time. He talked to a Samaritan woman. Between were the walls of sex-temptation, of morality—she was beneath even "ordinary" respectability of nationality and race—he was of pure blood, she of a decidedly mixed breed of intelligence—she must have had a pretty low I.Q. 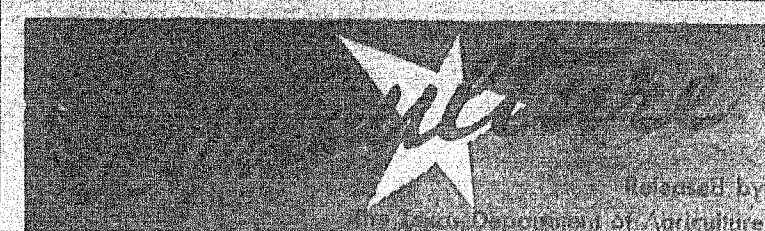

When the program was curtailed on Jan. 11, some 4,120 farmers and livestockmen, had received hay allotments from county drought disaster committees. The allotments involved the purchase of more than 119,846 tons of hay.

Actually, these allotments did not grant free hay to farmers. Instead, they provided free shipment of hay from the point of purchase to the farm or ranch.

The farmer, himself, bought the hay. The railroads reduced their fare by half, and the state and federal governments paid the reduced shipping rate for the purchaser.

The Texas Department of Agriculture, which administered this program, had \$389,000 to spend. Some \$704,000 of this was federal money and \$185,000 was available from Texas.

In the final days of the program, it was costing about \$13 per ton to ship this hay to Texas from other states as far away as California and South Dakota. These expenditures rapidly ate up the available funds.

Actually, all the money has not yet been spent. But all the money has been earmarked for spending. In other words, enough hay shipment allotments have been granted to use up all the funds now on hand.

The allotments were halted on Jan. 11, so that the department of agriculture could determine whether or not all of them would be used. Within a few days, the federal government announced it had \$400,000 more to contribute to the fund. But as reports continue to reach the department in Austin, it becomes evident that a great deal of this sum, too was spoken for in the closing hours of the program.

If a survey of the situation reveals that all allotments will not be used, or if a special session of the Texas Legislature appropriates more relief funds, then the program can be resumed in early spring.

Treasury Department Requests Early Payment Of Taxes

Business firms with large payrolls were asked today by District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr., of the Internal Revenue Service to release the 1953 W-2 tax withholding statements to their employees as soon as possible, to expedite the filing, payment and adjustment of as many individual taxpayer returns as possible.

With their W-2s in hand, the director pointed out, thousands of taxpayers will be able to prepare their income tax forms at once and send them in to his office. The address, to which payments should be sent is 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas. Make checks or money orders payable to the District Director of Internal Revenue. Please don't send cash, the revenue office asks.

"To hundreds of our citizens," Mr. Campbell said, "the withholding tax represents their entire tax indebtedness. In some cases, there may be a small overpayment or underpayment. Most such cases can be easily set forth by the individual by a reading of the instructions. We'd appreciate taxpayer cooperation in getting all such forms into us at once."

MARINES WANT MORE MEN

Certified Seed Is Cheap Crop Insurance

"Certified seed" cost slightly more, but the added expense assures purity, higher germination and better yields at harvest. Seed of questionable purity and germination may not be cheap at any price, says L. C. Coffey, extension agronomist.

Coffey points out that seed labeled "certified" is the best seed available of a particular variety. Seed in this category comes from fields that have been inspected during the growing season, properly handled upon harvest, cleaned, tested for purity and germination and properly stored. All this, he adds, is insurance for the farmer.

The blue tag attached to each certified seed sack carry information of interest to the buyer. Issued by the State Department of Agriculture, the blue tags are placed only on seed that have met these high standards.

Farmers should purchase now the seed they will need for planting this year's crops, Coffey advises. Supplies generally are adequate, but last minute shoppers may find local supplies depleted and thus, forced to plant whatever seed is available.

Coffey says if planting seed has not been chemically treated for seed-borne and seedling diseases, farmers by doing so will gain additional insurance against poor stands and plant losses during early plant growth. County agricultural agents can supply information on seed treating and can make local variety recommendations.

Co-chairmen of the 1954 Heart Fund campaign are Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General John Ben Shepperd. This is the third year that Governor Shivers and Mr. Shepperd have served on the state Heart Campaign Committee. Ben H. Wooten, Dallas banker and immediate past president of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, again is serving as state Heart Fund treasurer.
