Santa Anna Girls and Baird Boys Win Annual Santa Anna Tournament

The Santa Anna girls won the championship bracket of the annual Santa Anna Basketball Lt. Lynn Pittard tournament last Saturday night to win the trophy in the girls division. They won over the Bangs girls by a 37-36 score in one overtime. The Coleman girls won over the Mozelle girls 36-22

to win the consolation bracket. In the boys division, Baird won over Mozelle by a 37-35 count to win the championship trophy and the Santa Anna boys won over the Coleman "B" boys 46-38 to win the consolation bracket.

In the games scheduled with Goldthwaite for last Thursday night the girls lost in the first game and the boys lost by a 2point margin, 43-41 in the final game. The Santa Anna teams returned the game to Goldthwaite on Tuesday night of this week.

40th Div., Korea — Army 2nd Lt. Lynn P. Pittard, whose wife, Barbara, lives at 805 Third St. Brownwood, Texas, was recently awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service with the

10th Infantry Division in Korea The son of Mr. and Mrs. Will H. Pittard, Route 2, Bangs, he distinguished himself as a forward observer for the 625th Field Artillery Battalion from June 13 to July 27, 1953. Pittard personally policed communica-tion lines after heavy enemy barrages to insure their availability for calling in friendly fire. During one outburst of Red artillery, the lieutenant's reconnaissance sergeant was wounded. After caling in U. S. counter-fire, the Brownwood of-ficer "though still receiving intermittent fire, — carried the wounded man down a steep, rocky slope to a medical evacua-

tion point," says his citation. Pittard, now the battalion's intelligence officer, entered the Army upon receiving his commission in 1952 through the Reserve Officer Training Corps program at Texas A & M.

Prince of Peace Lesson for December 20, 1953

GOD'S will is for a warless world. No one can read the prophets and make anything else out of it. God's will is for peace in this world. Peace among angels, yes, peace beyond death, yes of course: but that is not the whole of it. God's will is for peace among men, peace on this good green earth. So long as there are wars, we know that God's will and intention for mankind is being resisted. God wants a warless world.

Leader To Peace

One of the many names for Christ is "Prince of Peace," a title given by a prophet long before his birth. It will be worth our while to look into

that title this week and see what exactly is meant by it, for it is much more than a striking phrase. The word'''Prince'' has nothing, necessarily to do with royalty, though it often does. Its literal

er, captain, chief. As Prince of Peace therefore, our Lord is Leader of Peace. But again, the title may mean more things than one. Let us start with "Leader to Peace," In this sense, Christ is one who points out the road to peace, shows mankind what peace means. As the Bible uses the word, peace does not mean simply the ebbing of a battle-tide, the lull between attacks. It is not a negative word, it is positive. The kind of peace to which Christ points is not mere indifference, it is based on love and good-will. For instance, as these lines are written, the United States is at peace with Canada; it is also at peace with a dozen other countries that could be mentioned. But while it is barely possible that war might break out with any nation, it is probably less likely to break out with Canada

than with countries with which we have less in common and for whose people our own people have much-weaker affection. True peace is based on mutual good will. Jesus taught us much more about peace; for example his reference to "peace-makers." But we must pass on. Leader Of Peace

As Prince of Peace our Lord is also Leader of Peace. That is to say, where Christ is known and honored (not in name only, but actually known and loved), there peace is far more likely to be than where He is not known. It is sometimes said that civilization breeds wars. No doubt it does; but barbarism breeds even more. Savage tribes are in an almost perpetual state of warfare. It is also pointed out that Christian nations are often warfaring. On the other hand it may be asked: Where do you find a really Christian nation? Who starts the wars? Are the "Christian" nations the aggressors or do they have to rise to the defense

against aggression? One thing is certain. Before the coming of Christ, wars were taken as a matter of course. No nation ever bothered to apologize or explain their fights. Since Christ's coming, and more than ever in recent years, nations that go to war have a bad conscience about it. Piles of "white papers" and the like are put out to show why it was necessary to declare war. At least, Christian nations are aware that the road of war is never the right road except as a last resort.

Leader By Peace

Another meaning that may fairly be given to "Prince of Peace" is 'Leader by Peace." That is to say, the leadership and Lordship of Christ is never one of coercion. There have been leaders by the sword; there have been leaders by lies, for the human race is all too easily misled; there is one and only one Leader of men who will reign only through love.

At Christmas time men often wonder why it is that the angels' song has never been fulfilled. Peace has not come on earth to stay. Peace is always pictured as a bird poised for flight. The full reign of the Prince of Peace seems to be so slowly coming: The reason is that unlike all earthly leaders, Christ will have none in his kingdom who is not there by his own free will. God could no doubt beat the world into silent submission in a very short time. It is not beyond the power of the Almighty to bring every human war to an end.

There is a twofold purpose behind such legal protection: First it protects the purchaser from deception and assures him that he is getting what he wants; and second, it protects the trade mark owner from piracy of the good will, reputation and property rights which he has built up in a mark through manufacture or sale of merchandise carrying the mark.
