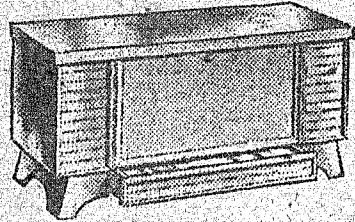

Detroit — Chevrolet introduces its 1954 model passenger cars Friday.

More than 7,000 retail dealers nationally will display a variety of body styles in events that range from annual open houses to elaborate entertainment programs.

The showings come near the close of one of the company's

most successful years. A statement by W. E. Fish, general sales manager, reported 1953 retail sales will be topped only by the record-breaking volume of 1950, once again out-selling all other automotive makes.

Fish described the new models as "greatly improved" and "fit successors to the cars that have led the industry in sales for 18 of the last 19 years."

"This is a record of popularity," he pointed out, "that can

be matched by few products of any kind in the last quarter American markets."

The dealer exhibits will be held simultaneously across the country and follow the 1953 model pattern when two days rather than one were designated for "announcement showings."

Introductions will benefit from a broadscale program which the company plans to continue throughout next year.

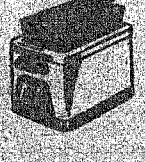

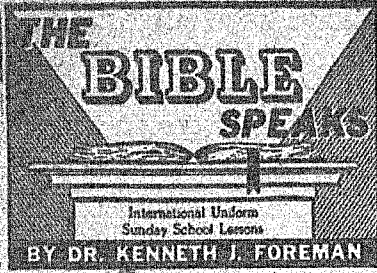

Prince of Peace

Lesson for December 20, 1953

GOD'S will is for a warless world. No one can read the prophets and make anything else out of it. God's will is for peace in this world. Peace among angels, yes, peace beyond death, yes of course; but that is not the whole of it. God's will is for peace among men, peace on this good green earth. So long as there are wars, we know that God's will and intention for mankind is being resisted. God wants a warless world.

Leader To Peace

One of the many names for Christ is "Prince of Peace," a title given by a prophet long before his birth. It will be worth our while to look into that title this week and see what exactly is meant by it, for it is much more than a striking phrase. The word "Prince" has nothing, necessarily, to do with royalty, though it often does. Its literal meaning is leader, captain, chief.

As Prince of Peace therefore, our Lord is Leader of Peace. But again, the title may mean more things than one. Let us start with "Leader to Peace." In this sense, Christ is one who points out the road to peace, shows mankind what peace means. As the Bible uses the word, peace does not mean simply the ebbing of a battle-tide, the lull between attacks. It is not a negative word, it is positive. The kind of peace to which Christ points is not mere indifference, it is based on love and good-will. For instance, as these lines are written, the United States is at peace with Canada; it is also at peace with a dozen other countries that could be mentioned. But while it is barely possible that war might break out with any nation, it is probably less likely to break out with Canada

than with countries with which we have less in common and for whose people our own people have a much weaker affection. True peace is based on mutual good will. Jesus taught us much more about peace; for example his reference to "peace-makers." But we must pass on.

Leader Of Peace

As Prince of Peace our Lord is also Leader of Peace. That is to say, where Christ is known and honored (not in name only, but actually known and loved), there peace is far more likely to be than where He is not known. It is sometimes said that civilization breeds wars. No doubt it does; but barbarism breeds even more. Savage tribes are in an almost perpetual state of warfare. It is also pointed out that Christian nations are often warring. On the other hand it may be asked: Where do you find a really Christian nation? Who starts the wars? Are the "Christian" nations the aggressors or do they have to rise to the defense against aggression?

One thing is certain. Before the coming of Christ, wars were taken as a matter of course. No nation ever bothered to apologize or explain their fights. Since Christ's coming, and more than ever in recent years, nations that go to war have a bad conscience about it. Piles of "white papers" and the like are put out to show why it was necessary to declare war. At least, Christian nations are aware that the road of war is never the right road except as a last resort.

Leader By Peace

Another meaning that may fairly be given to "Prince of Peace" is "Leader by Peace." That is to say, the leadership and Lordship of Christ is never one of coercion. There have been leaders by the sword; there have been leaders by lies, for the human race is all too easily misled; there is one and only one Leader of men who will reign only through love.

At Christmas time men often wonder why it is that the angels' song has never been fulfilled. Peace has not come on earth to stay. Peace is always pictured as a bird poised for flight. The full reign of the Prince of Peace seems to be so slowly coming. The reason is that unlike all earthly leaders, Christ will have none in his kingdom who is not there by his own free will. God could no doubt beat the world into silent submission in a very short time. It is not beyond the power of the Almighty to bring every human war to an end.

mark a modern innovation? What does it actually do?

A trade-mark identifies merchandise as being the product of a particular manufacturer or distributor. The use of trade-marks is very ancient. They were used by the brick-makers of ancient Egypt, the lampmakers of old Athens, and the helmet makers and armorers of medieval England. While a trade-mark is most often a word, it may also be an emblem, symbol, slogan, or other device. The intended function of a trade-mark is to distinguish the goods of the proprietor from the goods of others in the market place. The expression "trade-mark", "brand-name", or more simply "brand" or "mark", are synonymous.

A person or company becomes the owner of common law rights in a trade-mark through adoption and use of the mark on goods. The law affords protection to the owner by prohibiting others in the field from appropriating the mark or one so similar as to be likely to cause confusion.

There is a twofold purpose behind such legal protection: First it protects the purchaser from deception and assures him that he is getting what he wants; and second, it protects the trade mark owner from piracy of the good will, reputation and property rights which he has built up in a mark through manufacture or sale of merchandise carrying the mark.

Trade-marks are frequently among the greatest and most valuable assets of a company for they symbolize the good will and reputation of the company. To achieve such a status, however, a trade-mark must be selected. Among other considerations it is, of course, important that a mark be chosen which is not confusingly similar to any other trade-mark used by another on similar goods. It may be

necessary to conduct a search of marks already in use in order to determine this question.

When a word has been selected, it must then be properly used in connection with the goods to become a valid trade mark. Once in use, it should be carefully guarded. It is possible for a good trade-mark to lose its legal protection due to improper use by its owners or the public.

The Federal and most State governments including Texas, have, by legislation, provided for the registration of trade-marks by their owners. While a trade-mark need not be registered to receive protection in the courts, such registration does afford substantial benefits to trade-mark owners.
