7th-day Adventists Begin Series Of Lectures

Lyndon DeWitt, pastor of the local Seventh-Day Adventist Church, announces they will begin a series of lectures on Friday night that will cover the present world situation in light of Bible Prophecy and the importance of impending events. Most of the subjects of the lectures will be taken from two books in the Bible, Daniel and Revelation.

The lectures will also include a number of discussions from the Health standpoint and these lectures will be delivered by Dr. Charles M. Henner, owner and operator of the Santa Anna Hospital. These lectures will be primarily to better acquaint citizens with their bodies, how to avoid disease and to live healthier.

This series of lectures will last for approximately two months. Services will be held each Friday, Sunday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, at the Seventh-day Adventist Church, located at the corner of Avenue B and North 5th Street, formerly the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. All lectures will begin at 7:30 p. m.

These lectures are being brought to Santa Anna through the combined efforts of the Texas Conference of Seventh-day Adventists and the Santa Anna Hospital. The hospital staff will be in charge of the music, with Melvin Weber being the director. Each service will include songs of all denominations.

Topic for the first lecture is "The Desire of All Nations," which is a portrayal of the life of Christ, blending story, song and picture. Second in the series will be a lecture on "Will Russia Rule the World?" This message will be delivered on Sunday night. Third in the series will be a discussion on "Cancer" by Dr. Henner. The lecture will be illustrated by motion picture, telling of the latest in Cancer research.

DeWitt said this series of lectures was not to be confused with regular church revivals. They interdenominational messages for all people, regardless of belief or creed; and for inspiring faith in the Bible and the sure work of Prophecy. The Seventh-day Adventists extend a cordial invitation to every person, regardless of denomination, to attend each of these lectures.

The lectures will be conducted under the title of Prophecy Speaks. The pastor asks everyone to bring their Bible and bring a friend.

Thirteen children were born to this union. One daughter died as a child and three sons and Mr. Shield preceded her in death. Mr. and Mrs. Shield built a large home in Trickham, which was known as the house of hospitality. Oil field workers and Trickham teachers boarded in the home and preachers of all faiths were welcome there.

Mrs. Shield had been a staunch member of the Christian Church for more than 60 years.

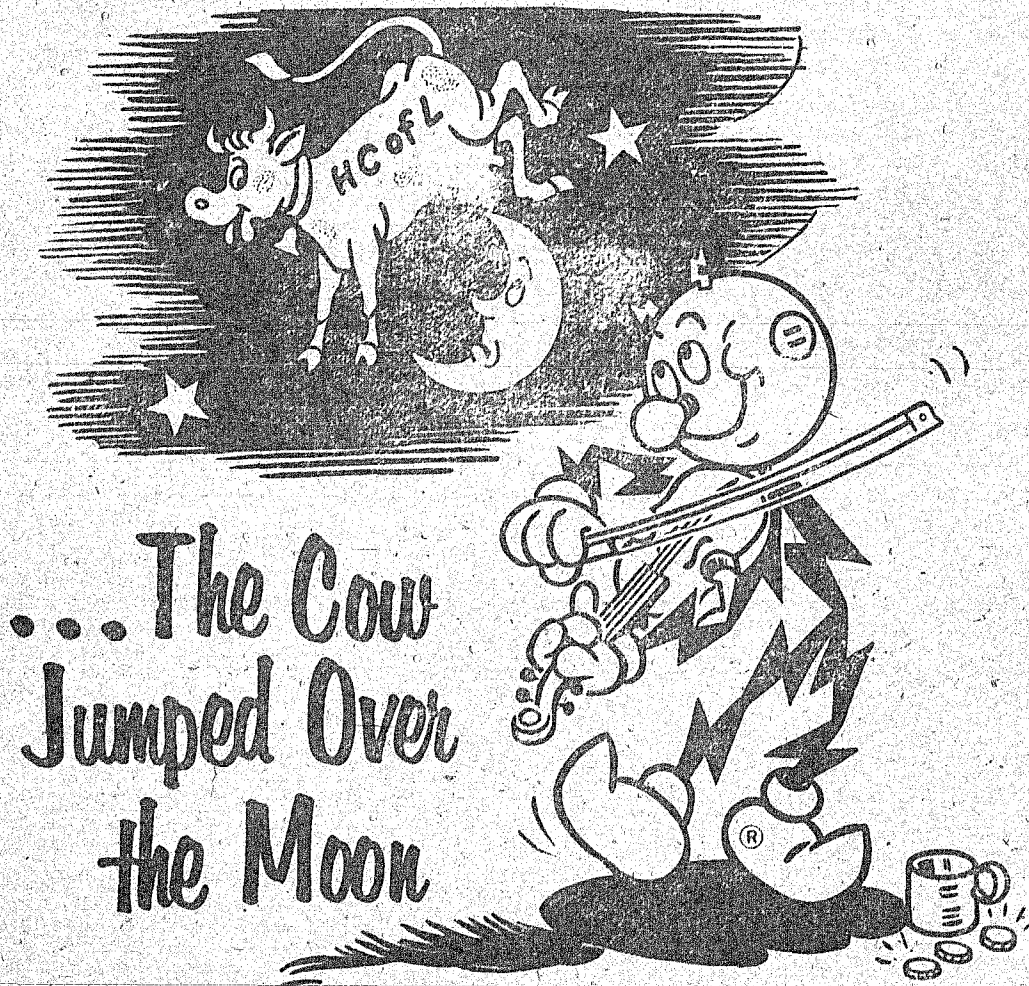
But on Saturday, each got back from Fox Creek with a catch that couldn't have differed by more

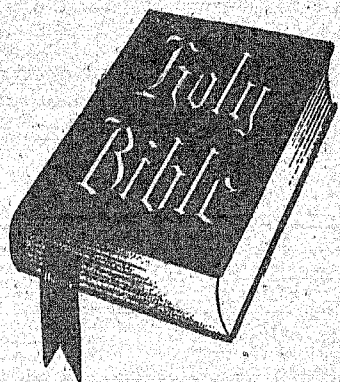

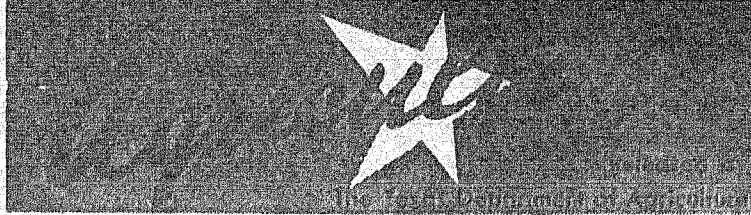

**100 YEARS OF INSECT
CONTROL PROGRESS**

Primitive "Swat That Fly" campaigns are now as outdated as the buggwhip.

Today, scientists are calling on the awesome power of atomic energy to help fight man's perpetual battle against the insects.

Using atomic energy as a tool to learn the secrets of insects is an ultramodern development. Researchers believe it can help them determine insect resistance to insecticides and reveal the cause of insect outbreaks. This new step comes on the 100th birthday of insect research in the United States.

The science of entomology began serving the public in 1854 when New York State and the Federal Government each employed an entomologist. Dr. Asa Fitch focused his attention on New York's insect problems and Townsend Glover originated federal research on pests of cotton and citrus fruits.

Since that time, more than 10,000 species of insect pests have been the target of entomologists. The fight has involved research, quarantine and active area-wide control efforts.

Among the major accomplishments can be listed the successful campaigns against house flies and mosquitoes that began about 1900. A "Swat That Fly" program started that year had much to do with the present 90 percent decrease in the number of typhoid cases, one of the many diseases carried by flies.

Serious efforts to control mosquitoes began when medical men learned the connection between diseases and insects. As a result of entomological and medical efforts, there has been no outbreak of yellow fever in the United States since 1905.

Food-wise, the colding moth that once took 50 to 90 percent of the apple crop now gets less than 5 percent of U. S. production because of the development and application of methods to control it. And 80 years ago, the Colorado potato beetle destroyed a major portion of the crop over wide areas. Arsenical dusts was first used to control this pest, and since 1946, modern insecticides and insect control methods have increased potato production per acre by about 50 percent.

One of the promising new fields opening up to day is that of systemic insecticides — chemicals capable of being carried by the sap of plants, and the blood streams of livestock. When this is perfected, then we really will be living, relatively speaking, in a "modern age of miracles."

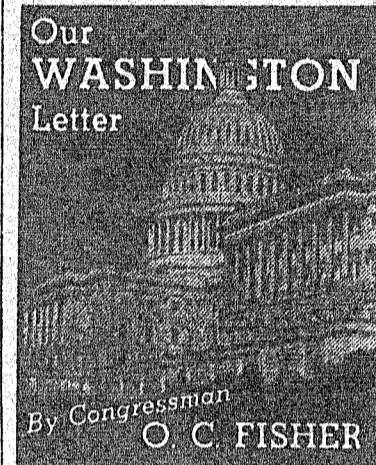

An Eden Minister comments: "In my opinion, President Eisenhower is not only doing a fine job as our President, but he is

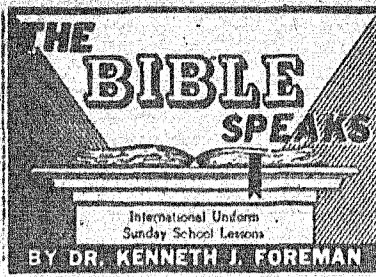
a man who can be depended upon in making a sound decision in matters which must be weighed with intelligence and sound judgment."

day, and gave him the idea that changed the lives of a whole nation. Tearing his long cloak into a dozen strips ("Is the man crazy?" Jeroboam must have thought, for the cloak was brand new), he invited the younger man to take ten of the pieces. The ten strips were ten "tribes" of Israel, and putting them into Jeroboam's hand meant that he was to be the leader of the revolution and secession which would tear those tribes away from the then united nation. The preacher, in short, was inviting and inciting rebellion and revolution.

When Is Revolution Necessary?

It is not the first time that preachers have been on the side of the revolutionist. In the American revolution some churches, among them the Presbyterian, were so active in promoting that revolution that when British soldiers searched the houses of citizens suspected of revolutionary tendencies, if they found in the house a copy of the Presbyterian hymn book or catechism, the evidence was considered sufficient to make arrests on the spot. This raises a serious question: Why is it that churches and preachers, which are generally conservative and teach and preach patriotism as a Christian attitude, why is it that they have ever supported revolution, even by violence? Over in England a famous convention of preachers and other religious leaders in the year 1648 wrote it into their creed that "it is the duty of people to pray for magistrates (they meant the government in all its branches), to honour their persons, to obey their lawful commands, and to be subject to their authority. . . . Yet in the very next year, 1649, some of those same religious men took off the head of King Charles I. How can men who believe that obeying laws and authority is a Christian duty, also become revolutionists?

For the People
Revolution is not something for every day or every generation. It is a desperate last resort. But as in the days of Ahijah, so since then it is true that a government which ceases to be of the people, for the people and by the people, has forfeited its right to respect. The reader of I Kings will discover a gem of wisdom in what the old counselors said to the young Rehoboam: "If you will be a servant to this people today and serve them . . . then they will be your servants forever." Rehoboam turned his back on this wisdom, looked on his royal power as a means of tyranny; and so Jeroboam's revolution had an easy victory.

Preacher Meets Rebel
Prophets in ancient times were something like preachers of these times, with two important differences: Prophet and preacher both speak for God to men. But the modern preacher has a church; the prophets had no established church, no chapel. They could not so much as rent a school-room or a theatre as preachers sometimes have to do. The prophets had to say their say wherever and whenever they could. There was no "regular eleven o'clock service." The other difference was that while the modern preacher likes to have a large church full of people to preach to, the prophet of olden times did not always (perhaps not usually) try for large crowds, but rather picked their listeners very carefully. They would be content with an audience of one, provided the one man was the right man. So the prophet Ahijah met a young man named Jeroboam alone one

HEALTH FOR TODAY - Infected Gums

Questions answered on your current problems by Charles M. Henner, M. D., U. S. Public Health Service.

QUESTION: Is pyorrhea contagious? (Santa Anna).

ANSWER: Pyorrhea is a mild inflammation of the gums, caused by poor oral hygiene too vigorous scrubbing with a tooth brush, too much sweets and highly refined foods instead of salads, vegetables, meats, digging around the roots with tooth picks or straws; all these are responsible for the beginning of the inflammation that eventually leads to loss of teeth from pyorrhea. It is not caused by a specific bacteria or virus and is NOT CONTAGIOUS.

Other causes of pyorrhea are tartar and calcium deposits around the teeth, crooked or missing teeth, any mouth disorder that puts under stress or strain on the teeth, vitamin C deficiency.

The first symptom is bleeding of the gums, and this should be heeded since there are more teeth lost after 40 years of age from pyorrhea than from cavities. Neglected, this process continues to work unheeded, painlessly eating away at the gums, forming pus pockets around the teeth and forming abscesses in the jaw bones until the teeth are loose enough to wiggle with the tongue or fingers. Then it is too late!

Unfortunately, it is not until the patient gets "down in his back," has "rheumatism in all my joints," "kidneys gone bad," or develops sciatica or neuralgia, or splitting headaches, and the

doctor examines him or her and says, "You've got some bad teeth that are probably causing most of your trouble. Better let your dentist take care of that and you'll probably do all right."

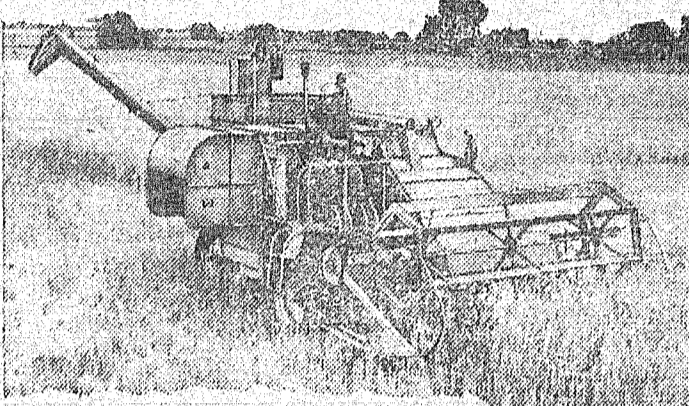

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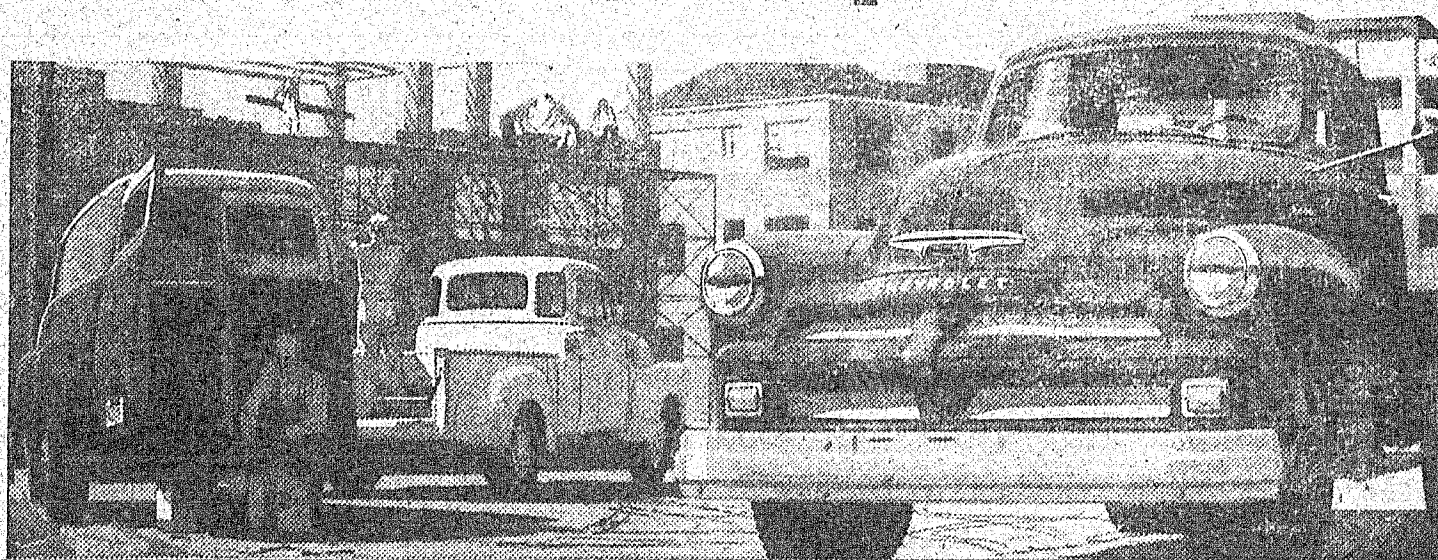

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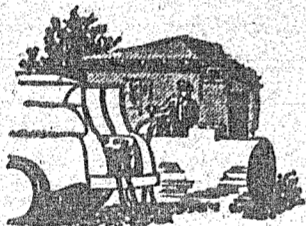
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
