Chris and Donnie Henderson New Owners of Hosch Funeral Home

One of Santa Anna's oldest business establishments, Hosch Funeral Home, has had a change of ownership recently. Hosch Brothers and Associates, owners and operators of the business for the past 45 years, sold the business last week to Donnie Henderson, a Santa Anna native.

The funeral home will be known as Henderson Funeral Home and will be operated by Donnie and Chris Henderson. The sale of the business also included a residence, located just east of the funeral home, and the young couple and their infant daughter, Clarissa, have already moved here from Coleman.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Hillburn Henderson, Donnie was reared in the Trickham community and attended school at Santa Anna, graduating with the class of 1963. He is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. McClatchy, Sr. of Trickham and Mrs. Rosa Henderson of Santa Anna.

The new owner attended Cisco Junior College for two years before starting his career in the funeral home business. He was first employed with Davis-Morris Funeral Home in Brownwood before attending and graduating from Dallas Institute College of Mortuary Science. He was then employed with Sparkman Hillcrest Funeral Home and Restland Funeral Home in Dallas, Waldo Funeral

Home in Sherman and for the past year with Stevens Funeral Home in Coleman. He holds both the Texas Embalmers and Funeral Director license.

While in Coleman Mr. Henderson was a member of the Coleman Exchange Club and his wife was a member of the Delta Iota chapter, Epsilon Sigma Alpha. They are Baptists.

Henderson plans to continue operation of the funeral home with friendly, personal service and to start improving and renovating the business to better serve this area. Norval Wylie will continue as an employee of the funeral home and others will be added to the staff as needed. They will continue with complete ambulance service and plan to start an insurance program and continue pre-need funeral service.

Mrs. Henderson will serve as receptionist, secretary and bookkeeper. She has been employed as secretary and bookkeeper in Coleman during their residence there. She is a native of Dallas and a former student at Dallas Junior College.

CATTLE DRIVE GOES THROUGH SA LAST WEEK

Perhaps the last cattle drive from Texas to Kansas is now underway with the group of drivers and cattle last week passing through Coleman County. Under sponsorship of a historical performance preservation organization, the cattle drive is from San Antonio to Dodge City, Kansas.

Forty-three longhorn cows and calves, twelve drovers, a chuckwagon and pickups, campers and other vehicles make up the drive. Monday night of last week the group camped on the Carl Buttry place at Rockwood; on Tuesday night on the Emzy Brown place six miles south of Santa Anna; and Wednesday night was spent at the C. D. Bruce place at the west edge of town.

Although trail bosses planned to make about ten miles a day, some of the one-day treks were less because some of the cattle were foot-sore.

Entertainment for the visiting cattle drivers was held last Wednesday night in Santa Anna and in Coleman on Friday night.

Spectators and visitors were welcomed at the campsite and to help with the drive as it came through the community. The group is to be in Abilene this weekend.

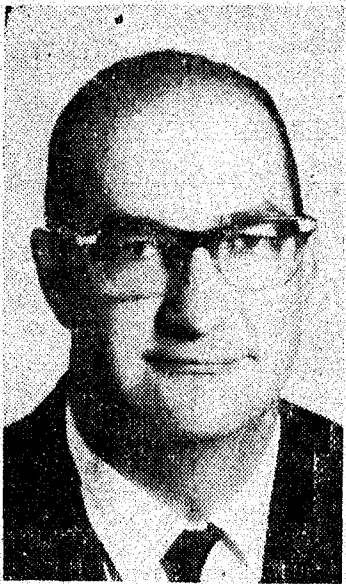

R. C. Smith Hired As New Principal

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In Our Opinion

BY THE TIME this appears in print the Senate may have passed a new minimum wage bill set at \$2.20 an hour.

There is no question that many people will not be affected by the bill because they draw higher salaries than that already, but it will affect a large number of people who are classed in the unskilled or semi-skilled group.

Probably some of these people are underpaid and should receive a boost in their wages, however it will also have an adverse effect on a large group of people.

Students and those who do not have any kind of skill and must be trained for their jobs will find it hard to find work, because in the case of learners, very few employers can afford to pay \$2.20 an hour for their labor. In many skills it takes as much as years to learn enough to be of help, and rather than train employees and pay them \$2.20 an hour while they are learning, most will take their chances in trying to hire skilled help in the beginning.

With unemployment as high as it is, and still jobs going unfilled because lack of skills, how is an increase in the minimum wage going to help? It will not help fill the need of skilled workers in the labor market because there will be fewer trained in the needed skills.

Of course there will always be a need for those who do ordinary labor, and they are almost impossible to find. It is hard to get someone to mow a lawn or do any kind of yard work any more, or to dig a ditch or anything related to what is called manual labor. The reason for this is that they can draw more on welfare than they can make doing this kind of work, so unless one can find a youngster who would not qualify for welfare, he is out of luck.

It boils down to a problem. The small business man cannot afford to hire help; yet is unable to operate without it, and the minimum wage along with welfare are doing a good job of putting him out of business.

The \$2.20 an hour minimum wage is going to do one of two things — raise a lot wages or put a bunch of people into the growing unemployed ranks.

Of course it has yet to pass the House. However they passed a similar bill at \$2.00, so more than likely there will be a compromise somewhere in that vicinity.

WELFARE REFORM is another problem facing Congress. According to Senator Lloyd Bentsen there are now 1,152 separate welfare programs in this country, each one different from the others. All are in desperate financial circumstances as costs sky rocket. During the last three years, almost four million Americans have been added to the rolls, bringing a total of just under 15 million people on welfare in this country. Costs of welfare stands now at about \$18 billion a year and is still increasing.

Some, including the Democratic nominee, supports a guaranteed annual income. Although the amount varies with the individual, some have suggested as high as \$6,500 a year. If and when that happens, we wonder who is going to do the work in this country. There are a lot of people who live on less than that amount, and not very many people would turn down the government dole work instead.

Government give-aways have a way of back-firing. They may get votes in some cases, but the end result is that inflation soars and what seemed to be quite a sum of money turns out to be not nearly enough in the end.

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STATE Capital NEWS By BILL BOYKIN

Austin — Property tax reform may be one of the big issues before the 1973 session of the Texas Legislature.

This is the prediction of Texas Research League in a newsletter analyzing the subject.

The property tax, notes TRL, is the largest source of revenue for support of the government in Texas. Collections exceeded \$1.4 billion in 1970 and rose \$220 million between 1968 and 1970.

Recent federal and state court decisions holding public school finance systems based on locally-imposed property taxes unconstitutional focused new attention on such taxation. The decisions stimulated interest of House and Senate committees on extensive reforms.

Criticism of the revenue source and proposals for reform may center on these factors as pointed up in the TRL study:

• Administration is inequitable. Different standards apply to different types of property.

• There are too few professionally-trained assessors, and many tax offices lack even the most fundamental tools such as tax maps and appraisal cards on each parcel of property. Furthermore, there are far too many tax offices and districts. (Given an "impossible tax law" to administer, local officials do remarkable well, according to a Tax Policy Committee study.)

• Personal property — tangible and intangible — is particularly difficult to assess. Some states have given up attempting to tax all property, and recognize this fact in basic laws.

• Taxpayers are at a marked disadvantage in redressing grievances over illegal or inequitable assessment in the courts.

"ABOLISH BOARD" — Former State Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver says the best way to promote insurance regulation reform in Texas is by the drastic remedy of abolishing the Board.

Teaver was rejected for Board membership by the state Senate, and apparently has returned to Gov. Preston Smith's staff.

He told an interview panel that insurance industry influence cannot be removed from regulation without getting rid of the Board which he charged is industry-dominated.

The former chairman suggested the present three-member Board should be made a nine-member, part-time citizen board or that an elected insurance commissioner be chosen to head the regulatory agency.

DEATH PENALTY REVIEW SOUGHT — Texas and Georgia will ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review its decision declaring the death penalty, as it is most often applied, unconstitutional.

Meanwhile, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has received a request from the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles for an official interpretation of the June 29 Supreme Court decision. The Board also wanted to know if the death penalty actually had been declared unconstitutional. Some justices

hinted a constitutional death penalty provision may be possible.

The Board will continue to follow the procedure of not recommending commutation for the 45 inmates on death row until it receives a formal request from the prisoner, judge, district attorney and sheriff in each case.

DEER SEASON SET — White-tailed deer season opens November 18 and lasts through January 1 in most counties subject to regulatory authority of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Regular season in the Trans-Pecos is from November 24-December 10.

In portions of Terrell and Pecos counties, seven additional days have been added for whitetails only, with the season opening November 18 and continuing through December 10.

Opening date for all deer hunting in the Panhandle is November 18, and closing date is December 3.

COURTS SPEAK — The Court of Criminal Appeals held Texas judges can no longer deny bail in murder cases due to a U.S. Supreme Court decision outlawing the death penalty.

The State Supreme Court held cigarette vending machine companies must pay taxes on cigarettes they stockpiled just before a 1969 tax increase.

The High Court upheld a \$4,400 judgement for a workman in Nacogdoches County who was injured by a falling tree limb's knocking him into a power saw.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company can build a parking lot in a residential area of Spring Valley, Harris County, the Supreme Court ruled.

A dispute over sale of Red Ball Motor Freight Inc. and advancing of nearly \$2.3 million to a new parent corporation will be heard by the Texas Supreme Court.

A Nueces County man can recover for damages to his property from Hurricane Celia though he was past due in payments on his insurance policy, the State Supreme Court held.

CITRUS BLACKFLY THREATENS — Agriculture Commissioner John C. White warned that the citrus industry in the Rio Grande Valley may be wiped out unless the citrus blackfly is brought under control.

White said the fight against the insect has been going on for more than a year, and that eradication measures are a nuisance to Brownsville area residents.

Ground spraying of infested trees is necessary every two weeks. If not controlled, the fly can defoliate and kill a citrus tree within two years. The insect is now contained in trees in Brownsville. There have been only two outbreaks of the pest in the U.S., once in Texas in 1956 and once in Florida.

GRANTS AWARDED — The Moody Foundation of Galveston recently approved almost \$2 million in grants for 26 worthy projects in 11 Texas communities.

The 26 projects came from a total of 58 requests for funds

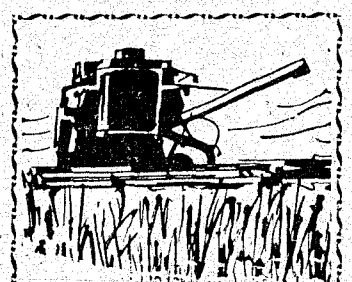

He wrote and sold his first short story in the summer of 1947 and has since become one of our most distinctive mystery novelists. THE VENUS DEATH is his fifth novel.

Michael Russo, Acting Director of the Division of Vocational Technical Education, Bureau of Adult, Vocational and Technical Education, U.S. Office of Education, Washington, will outline the charge of vocational education in this new thrust; and Miss Bertha King, Program Specialist in the Division of Vocational Technical Education, U.S.O.E., Washington, will discuss the role of vocational homemaking education in Career Education.

Homemaking teachers will attend group work sessions the remainder of the week on Homemaking Education, Home Economics Cooperative Education, Pre-employment Laboratory Programs, Coordinated Vocational - Academic Programs and Home Economics for the Handicapped. Special workshops will also be held

for city supervisors of home-making programs and for college and university home economics faculties training teachers of vocational home-making education. Consultants from industry, universities, public school and the Texas Education Agency will lead the work sessions.

More than 2300 teachers are expected to attend the week-long meetings, said Mrs. Jane B. Moore, president of the Vocational Homemaking Teachers Association.

A wise man feareth, and departeth from evil; but the fool rageth, and is confident (Pro 14:16). Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people (Pro 14:34). A wise son maketh a glad father; but a foolish son is the heaviness of his mother (Pro 10:1).

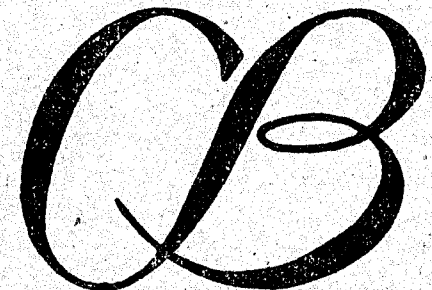

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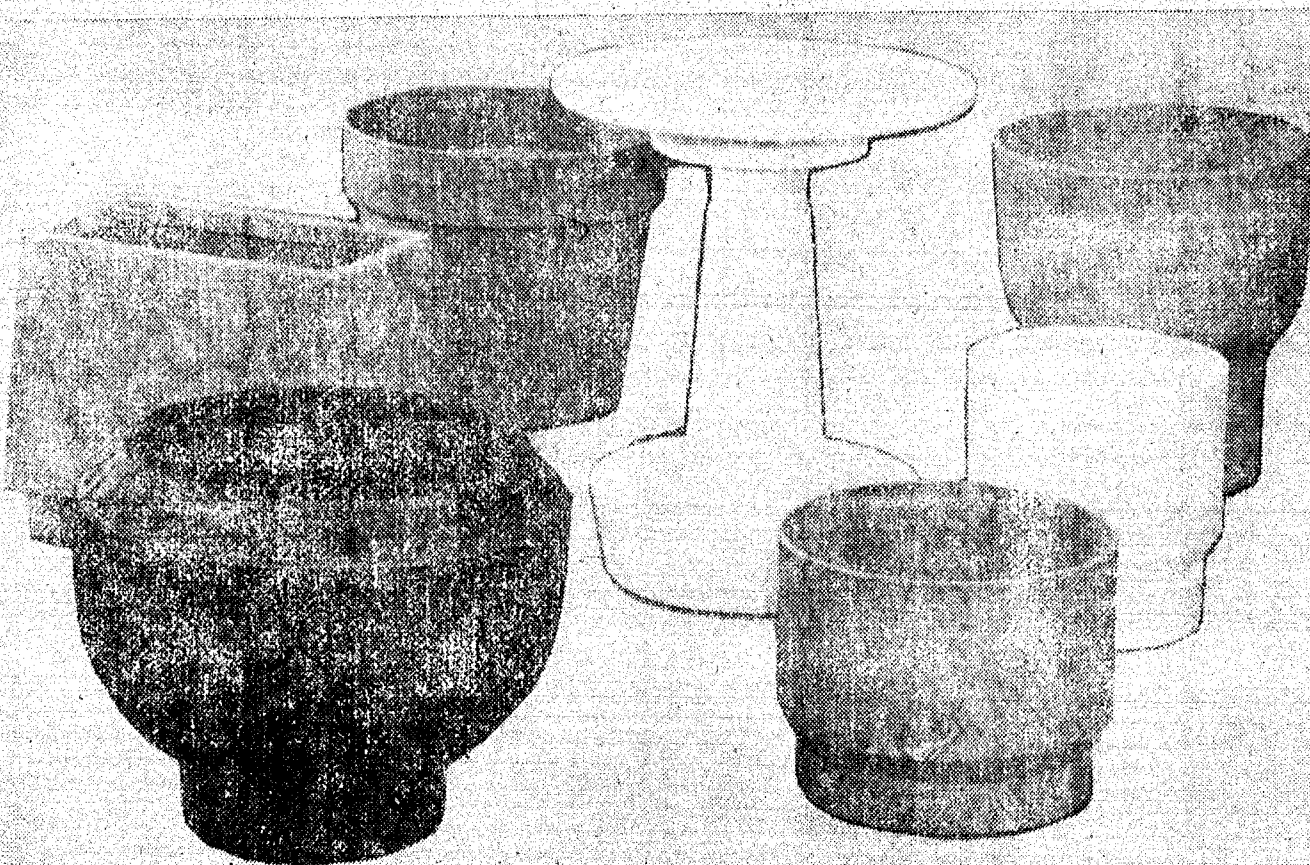
