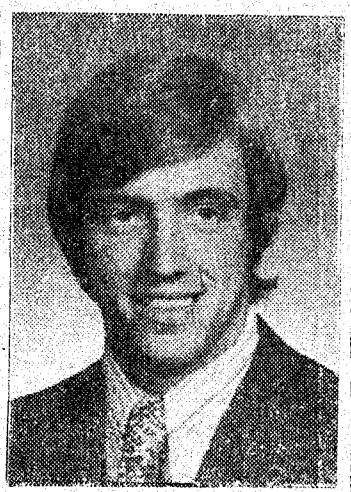

Screwworms Are In S-Anna Area

Screwworms in Coleman County have reached epidemic proportions with 21 cases reported through Monday and at least three others suspected. The latest local cases reported are south of Santa Anna in cattle herds of Burgess Stewardson, Melvin Lawrence and Tom Kingsbery. The worms were in navels of young calves.

Bill Brown, State Animal Health representative, said that it is impossible for his department to spray all the infested herds and that each livestock owner with confirmed cases is urged to have their herds sprayed. Mr. Brown is marking the pastures where confirmed screwworm cases are located and aerial drops of sterile flies will be made within a few days.

Texas has had over 12,000 confirmed cases of screwworms this year with over half that number being during the first two weeks of June.

Area livestock owners are urged to watch their stock carefully and treat and report any suspected cases.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY

A. D. Pelt, president of the Santa Anna Independent School Board of Trustees, led the monthly meeting, which was held at the school business office on Tuesday night, June 13. All members were present for the meeting except M. L. Gault, Jr.

Verdon Parker led the opening prayer and minutes of the previous meetings were read and approved.

Members of the board and Sgt. Cullen Perry toured the new vocational agriculture building and made plans for accepting the new building. Plans were discussed for construction of a chain link fence around the practice football field and to the new building. A door will be made in the old old building shop so that the old building will be accessible to the new shop area.

Bills and accounts for the past month were reviewed and approved for payment totaling \$4,441.35. The major expenditure was for the insurance on all the school buildings at a total of \$3,376 for one-year coverage.

The old school bus offered for sale was sold to A. E. (Gene) Boylin for \$125 which was the high bid on the vehicle.

Approval was given for student testing to be graded through the regional service center during the coming year. Student insurance for the coming year will be with the same company as the past years.

Plans for furnishing the new vocational agriculture classroom were discussed. Some new chairs will be purchased for the classroom.

Following other routine discussion and announcements, the meeting adjourned.

Coleman Co. Water Supply Corp. Seeking New Members By July 1

The Coleman County Water Supply Corporation extends an invitation to all interested people of Coleman County that desire to become a member or user of the facility to file an application and make the \$100 meter deposit not later than July 1, 1972.

After July 1, the engineer will make a preliminary design for the water system based on the actual number of users or meter deposits. Water lines will be extended to as many people as is economically feasible.

Forms for making the application can be secured from any one of the directors or at the Farmers Home Administration office located in the Rhone Building in Coleman. To be considered as a potential member or user your application and deposit must be on file with the Corporation. When final plans are made for the facility, anyone not reached for service will receive a refund of their deposit.

JOHNNY OSAGE

By Janice Holt Giles

"Johnny Osage" is the son of Hannah Fowler and the brother of Rebecca of "The Believers." He comes by his name because of his close friendship with the Osage Indians. His story is told against the background of the old Osage homeland, the present state of Oklahoma. By 1821 the frontier had moved westward and Johnny, a restless man who preferred the wilderness unspoiled by civilization, moved with it and became a partner in his brother-in-law's trading post.

Such a man, the arrival of a group of missionaries to "improve" the Osages is far from welcome. And to Judith Lowell, the young teacher dedicated to educating Osage children according to the laws of God and the White Man, Johnny's openly expressed admiration for Osage ways is shocking and inexplicable. But both of them are honest and brave enough to dare to open their minds and hearts to convictions other than their own.

The touching love story of Johnny and Judith is set against a dark and bloody background of raids and massacres in the bitter feud between Osages and Cherokees—a feud in which the U. S. government plays the role of uneasy arbiter. There are both real and fictional characters in this historical novel.

It was pointed out to the assistant county agent that last week's column was rather dry. In fact he said a big glass of H₂O was required in order to read the column.

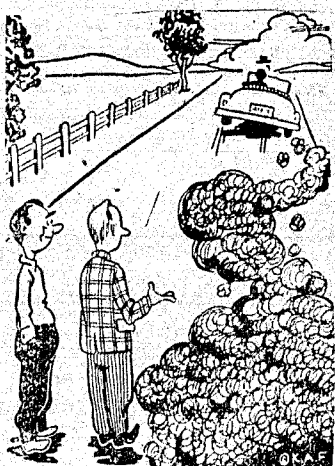


