No other person ever so completely acquired the affection of a whole people. His life was written in the smiles of youth; his death was told in the tears of old age. King and pauper, industrial leader and newsboy, educated and unlettered alike were patrons of his rich humor and benefactors of his fine philosophy. With a single word he could send a ripple of laughter around the earth.

That clean, sympathetic, soothing spirit flashed like a ray of morning sunlight that kisses the foliage on the loftiest tree and brightens the petals of the smallest bloom. 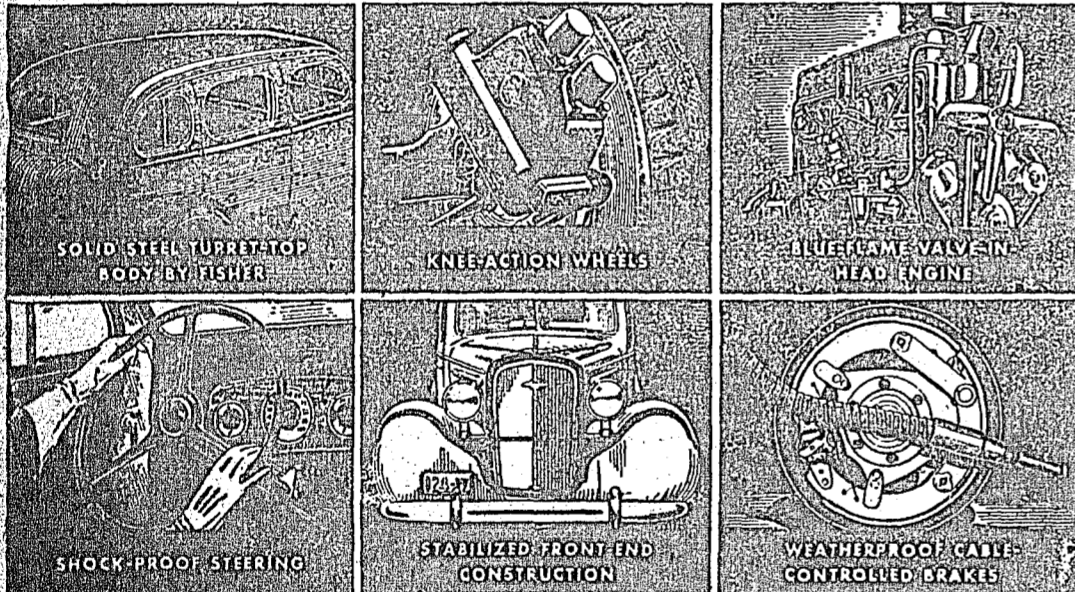

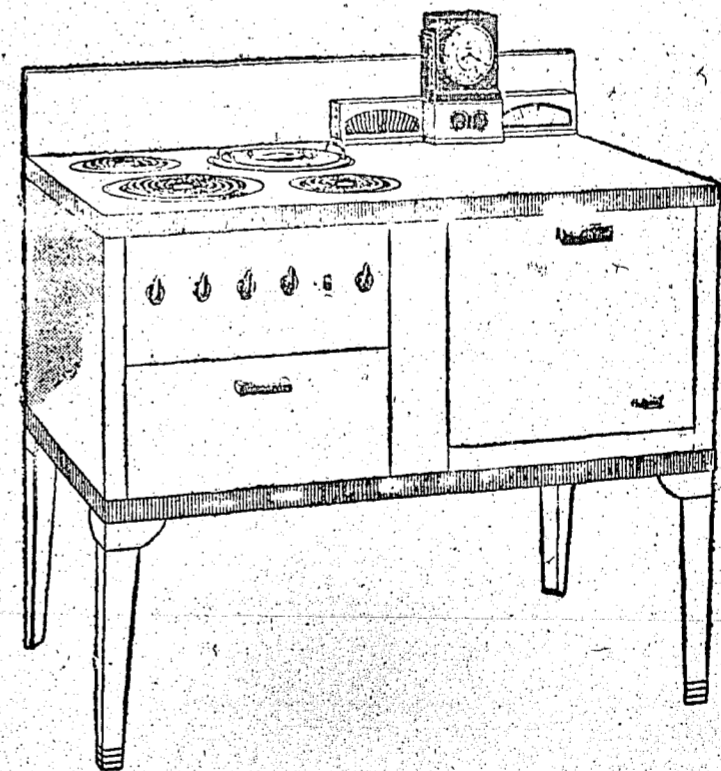

GROWTH OF VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE IN TEXAS
The number of departments of vocational agriculture in Texas has increased from 343 in 1932-33 to approximately 565 for 1935-36, according to P. G. Haines, state director of vocational agriculture in a statement delivered at the Area IV conference, held at Stephenville August 12-17. In 1933-34 there were 378 departments, in 1934-35 there were 455, and in 1935-36 there will be about 565 departments. This is an increase of 35 departments in 1933, 77 in 1934, and 110 in 1935. The number of boys enrolled in vocational agriculture in 1932-33 was approximately five thousand, in 1934-35 about thirteen thousand, five hundred. This represents an increase in enrollment of more than 165 percent. The 1935-36 enrollment is expected to be more than fifteen thousand farm boys. The departments of vocational agriculture in Coleman county are Coleman high school, Santa Anna high school and South Coleman high school. South Coleman consolidated district is the only new department in Coleman county this year. Enrollment expected for the fall term in each school is as follows: Coleman 75, Santa Anna 65, and South Coleman 75. Teachers of vocational agriculture in this county are R. H. Campbell, Coleman; W. G. Godwin, Santa Anna; and C. B. Edwards, South Coleman.
