# Lt. B. T. Wiley, Jr. **Missing In Action**

Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Wiley were advised by the War Department Monday that their son, 2nd. Lt. Burl T. Wiley, Jr., a co\_pilot on a B-29, operating in the South Pacific theater of war, had been missing since May 3rd.

Lt. Wiley was on his seventh mission over Japan, supposed to be flying from the Marianas, and from reports, connected as best we can get, five of the eleven men crew were seen to bail out, after the plane was badly crippled over the target. Further reports indicate the five men. were rescued by a submarine and saved. The other six, headed for their home base in the crippled plane, failed to show up, and their whereabouts, together with their B\_29, is still unknown.

The State Health Officer stres. sed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculately clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passages should be kept clean and dental defects corrected im. mediately

Sanitation and thorough clean liness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re\_emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken\_for-granted measures such as washing the dishes in hot soapy water and rinsing them in hot clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs and fixtures scoured clean and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bed clothes, ridding the home of flies, rats and roaches which, since poliomyelitis is believed to be a filth borne disease, are suspected as being responsible for transmis. remarked that "one of my men sion.







all, he is the most wonderful baby of all. Many mothers are overanxious.

Your baby will not gain the same amount each week, some weeks the gain will be more, some weeks less than the average. Don't adopt the best week as the standard you ex-pect your baby to equal every week. Most normal babies gain from 4 to 5 ounces each week but if he makes a steady gain, seems, well and happy, he is all right.

If the baby appears definitely to be hungry for more food than you are giving him, the chances are he knows better than you do how much he needs. He may need more variety or he may do better if you allow him to eat more of the same foods than he has been eating. You might experiment cautiously, al-though it would be far preferable to get the advice of your baby's physician before making any

changes. But, after all, you do have to be guided to a considerable extent by your baby's appetite. If he seems hungry after he has had the usual serving of cereal, prepare some more for him. He will doubtless stop when he has had enough. Fortunately these days, with the pre-pared baby cereals and baby foods, an additional serving is no problem

One possibility is to add some of One possibility is to add some of his special baby cereal to his strained vegetable or the strained fruit. It thickens the vegetable or fruit which makes it easier to feed it and the cereal adds food value. A small amount of addi-tional cereal added in this way may make just the difference between sunger and satisfaction.



## **House** Passes Anti-Poll Tax . Bill 251° to 105

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP) -Overriding objections of south ern Democrats, the House passed Tuesday and sent to the Senate legislation to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting for federal offices.

It was the third time in successive Congresses the House Home Sugar has approved the measure, and -as in the past-foes predicted For Canning it would die in the Senate.

Passage came on a 251 to 105 roll\_call vote, after hours of sharp debate before a crowded House. Spirits ran high during the argument, and at one time the chair had to admonish spectators not to applaud.

Most sontherners, and a few Republicans, assailed the legislation as an invasion of states rights and termed it unconstitu. tional. Proponents denied this and contended the bill is needed "to provide freedom of the ballot" for millions of southerners.

The measure declares illegal any regulation imposing the poll suance of allotments as long as new tire is issued, or forces it to tax as requirement of voting for the quota lasts. We see that same spirit operative today. To be sure, it does not usually show itself in such crude action as physical killing, although the day when that may happen again may not be far away.

In our cultivated time, it is revealed in a scholarly attack upon God's Word, an undermining of the faith of our young people in schools or colleges, or a ridiculing of those who wish to live a separated, consecrated life.

III. No Compromise (vv. 34, 35, 38-40),

A wise man, Gamaliel, presented what we would now call a program of appeasement. He urged that they wait and see what would happen.

At first glance his idea seems to be most commendable, and of course it did save the lives of the disciples at the moment. But it was essentially a "do-nothing" policy of compromise. If he believed in what the disciples were doing, he should have come out boldly on their side. Notice that the believers had no

part in this scheme. They listened, but did not give assent. They took the beating and went right out and preached the gospel again. What a fine example for us to follow! Those who are alert to the real problems of the church today recognize that the willingness to compromise with the world, the flesh, and (so it seems at times) the devil



himself for the sake of peace, is destroying the real ministry of the church.

IV. Absolute Fearlessness (vv. 40, 42).

The early church was a very small group of believers with no position of influence or power in the world, Humanly speaking, it would have been expedient for them to heed the admonition now twice given (compare Acts 4:18) and confine their testimony to a private wit- they can hire, whom they can ness.

But they had hearts which were aflame with the fire of God, a commission to take the good news of God's saving grace to all men, and the assurance of God's presence (see Matt. 28:19, 20, Acts 1:8), and they were absolutely fearless.

The world admires true courage not only on the battlefield, but in the pulpit.

The criticism which men in the armed services make of the church centers at this point, namely, that the church has been too timid about giving out the Word of God, about really believing and practicing it.


