### NEWS OF OUR MEN...WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Durwood Hartsfield came in Monday with his discharge from the army. Durwood is here with his wife, Armenta, for the time being. He spent three and one-half years in the army and 4 months of that time as a prisoner of war in Germany. He was released at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

S-Sgt. Travis Smith, who left here with the 36th Division and spent 26 months overseas, was discharged June 13th at Fort Sam Houston. He saw service in Italy, France and Germany, and was in the Salerno invasion. He received the Silver Star for gallantry in action. S-Sgt. Smith is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Smith.

Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Woodard received a second letter this week from a buddy of their son Fred, who was wounded on Okinawa. He said he had seen Fred when he was carried back from the front lines and that he was wounded in the shoulder and that it was not as serious as it was thought at first. Fred is being treated in a hospital on Okinawa.

L. V. Cupps, Mach. 1-c, is here on furlough. Cupps is a light house keeper on Lake Michigan. He plans to return to his base this week.

Pvt. Robert Earl Lancaster who has completed his basic training at Camp Hood, is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lige Lancaster. He will report to Fort Ord, Calif. on August 2.

Pat Hosch has received his discharge from the army and is now back in Santa Anna with the Hosch Furniture and Undertaking Co. Pat has been in the army for over two years and most of that time was spent at Goodfellow Field at San Angelo.

E. W. Bible, of the 121st Naval Construction Battalion, stationed in the Marianas Islands, wrote his father, R. W. Bible, recently that he saw his brother, Cox. Billy P. Bible there July 1 when he went to a movie. They were together for several hours. They also saw A. W. Box from Rockwood, Darwin Lovelady from Whon and a Morton boy from Coleman. Billy serves on an LCT.

1st Lt. Vernon Oakes came in the first of this week from 10 months in the European theater. Lt. Oakes is a P-47 fighter pilot. He has the Air Medal and 4 Oak Leaf Clusters and the Presidential Unit Citation. He has 102 combat missions and most of them were dive bombing close behind the front lines. After a 30 day furlough here Lt. Oakes will report back to Goldsboro, N. C.

S-Sgt. Bobbie Henderson came in Monday night on a 30 day furlough from the European theater. He is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Payne Henderson, and his wife and many friends here. Sgt. Henderson was a gunner in the 15th Air Force. He has been overseas for a little over a year.

### Rachel Cupps Gets Commendation

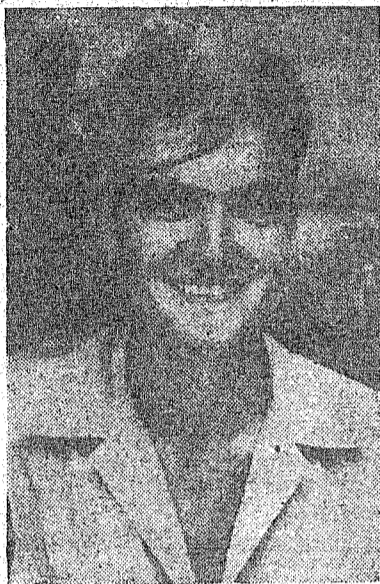
Rachel William Cupps, Aviation Metalsmith Third Class, United States Naval Reserve has been commended by the Commanding Officer for services as set forth below:

Working under adverse conditions, without regard to personal comfort, and with only such facilities as were available aboard, he devoted himself to the difficult task until it was completed. His loyalty beyond the call of duty served as an inspiration to his shipmates and contributed materially to the restoration of the ship to full operational status."

### TREASURY DEPARTMENT WASHINGTON

July 21, 1952

To the Publisher:

Your excellent cooperation helped make the Seventh War Loan the most successful financing program ever known. Raising \$26,313,000,000 against a quota of \$14 billion is a great tribute to the American people—it is an achievement of which they have every right to be truly proud.

Final figures recording newspaper cooperation are not yet ready. However, preliminary estimates indicate that a larger volume of advertising, news and editorial support was given the Seventh Drive than any previous one. This signifies again that the sale of War Bonds keeps pace with the support given each drive by the press of our nation.

Many factors operated against your local War Finance Committee during the Seventh Drive, especially with regard to news. Such events as victory in Europe, President Roosevelt's death and a new president taking office, the San Francisco Conference and many new governmental appointments, etc. overshadowed the drive for many days.

Very few newspapers, however, permitted those history making events to crowd the news of the mighty Seventh War Loan off their front pages and the American people kept right on buying War Bonds to the limit of their ability.

From the very beginning newspapers of the nation have recognized their importance and responsibility in this great, voluntary war financing program. Without exception there is high praise of the press by the 6 million volunteer workers who have carried the War Bond selling job right into the homes of the American people. A free press thus serving the cause of a free people should give every American a satisfying reassurance of the future. It is a record of accomplishment of which every newspaper man must feel proud.

On behalf of Treasury officials and the Allied Newspaper Council, I want to thank you and your associates most sincerely for your outstanding help in making the Seventh War Loan a great success.

### Should Japan's Surrender Terms Be Modified

Some radio commentators or "commentators soft soap news writers", are blaring themselves about the terms of surrender to the Japanese, claiming the Japanese would get out of the war immediately "if" they could get a negotiated peace. Of course they would, but who in the heck wants a negotiated peace with Japan. Those dirty rats have no more honor than the lowest down being in the world. Suppose we let the companions, parents, children and next of kin of those upward of three thousand casualties who lost their lives in that sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, do the negotiating?

To us, any person recommending modified terms instead of the unconditional surrender terms are either so ignorant they should be hushed up or imported to Japan for the remainder of their lives.

The Japs have been taught, by their Imperial form of government, that they are a superior race, and all other races of people are inferior races and should be subdued, enslaved and made to support the Japanese, so they would be able to live in luxury, without toiling and laboring for their livelihood. The Japs think their Emperor is their God, and it is their christian duty to subdue all other peoples of the earth as they are heathens who should serve the Japanese empire without regard for their own welfare regardless of their faith or religion, race, creed or color.

To our certain knowledge Japan has been preparing to start a world war with a view and full determination to conquer the remainder of the world, taking over full control of all other countries, enslaving all other people regardless of race, creed or color, making servants of them to serve the Japanese according to the Japs own terms, for more than fifty years.

Japan thought the time was ripe for her to strike and do her stuff a few years back, and she started her brutal conquest. By this time Japan should, by all means, realize she is fighting a losing battle, and has lost all prospects of winning the war, but let them fight on—the United States and her allies will soon have Japan where we can finish mopping up on them with but a few losses to our armies.

If Japan doesn't surrender, let them perish as they surely will. We say no modification of terms.

### How About Your School Transfers

Only a few more days are left in which to transfer pupils from one school district to another. All transfers must be made during the month of July.

You may secure the transfer blanks and file applications at the office of the County Superintendent in Coleman, or by contacting Supt. D. D. Byrne in Santa Anna.

Scholastics of each district in the county wishing to attend a school other than their home district school must file an application for transfer, except pupils enumerated within the following three districts whereby a blanket transfer of all has been executed by contract with the Coleman Independent District. These three schools are: Indian Creek, Junction and Anderson.

In the past, many patrons have been of the opinion that when a pupil graduates from a grade school that it is not necessary to file an application for transfer to a district maintaining a high school. This is a mistaken idea, and a transfer must be made each year.

Failure to transfer may result in your having to pay tuition on your child next school year.

### War Department To Hold Conference In San Angelo

This editor is requested to attend a conference to be presented by the War Department General Staff from Washington, D. C. in San Angelo Saturday of this week. The army will present official views on Japanese war problems, according to Lt. General Walton H. Walker, Headquarters Eighth Service Command, Dallas, Texas.

The presentation will be illustrated with maps, charts and official army motion pictures. The program called "Task Force 30—How We Will Write 'End' to Japanese war" will be held in the Indian room of the Cactus Hotel.

"Why must we raise as much money this year as in 1944? Why with the European war over, can't the National War Fund budget for the coming year be cut?"

Those are natural questions—questions which every good business man and war chest worker can be expected to ask. They are simple but important questions and, fortunately, can be answered simply and directly.

Here, briefly, are the answers: With more than two million American troops left on duty in occupied zones, USO has doubled the number of USO Camp Show units, to entertain men now idle who formerly were sustained by the excitement of battle action. Similarly, more USO Camp Show units are being sent to the Pacific, where constantly increasing numbers of men are fighting on lonely, uncivilized islands.

USO Camp Shows now entertain more than two million American fighting men each week.

With more and more wounded men being returned to U.S. military hospitals, USO also has increased the number of units playing the "Hospital Circuit," staging shows in hospital wards among the beds and cots of our wounded heroes.

USO also has expanded another service to the wounded, through USO recreation centers established at all military and naval hospitals.

The Pacific war is a shipping war. Thousands of merchant ships, and increasing numbers of merchant seamen, carry the munitions, equipment and men required for the war against the Japs. Still others continue to serve the European front, carrying supplies and transporting troops home or to new battle areas.

United Seamen's Service follows the ships to all ports of the world, to provide off-duty recreation for the millions of seamen at the end of their voyages through battle zones. Submarines, bombs and suicide planes are forgotten, at least for a few hours, as the heroic seamen relax in facilities provided by this great National War Fund agency.

In the Pacific, the needs of relief agencies are constantly increasing, as new islands and new lands are liberated. The people of the Philippines, who fought the Japanese throughout the years of occupation, are in pitiful condition, as are Chinese in areas newly liberated from the invader. Thousands of children and helplessly aged people must be fed and clothed—and quickly.

The people of the Philippines

are loyal Americans. China has suffered more and fought longer against the Japs than any other United Nation. Both deserve and must have continued and expanded assistance from the people of America.

For years the people of Europe suffered under the heel of the Nazi—and for years we were unable to help them. Now we can get in and give them a helping hand—lift them to new hope and eventual self-sufficiency—save them from starvation and despair.

Dire need among liberated slave-workers and other displaced persons has brought about a demand for additional services by refugee relief agencies. Plans call for these agencies to do a fast, immediate emergency job, and then to move quickly to liquidation as governmental agencies become able to take over. Three agencies—Russian War Relief, American Denmark Relief and British War Relief—already have voluntarily removed themselves from the roster of agencies supported by the war fund. But until immediate suffering is ended, other refugee relief agencies must carry on, in the interest of humanity.

For the first time in months, representatives of War Prisoners Aid are being permitted to visit prisoner-of-war camps in Japanese territory, to serve American and allied prisoners. While the end of the European war permitted a 40 per cent cut in the budget of this great agency, there can be no thought of curtailment of service to our men held by the Japanese as long as a single man remains behind enemy barbed wire.

In simple terms, national, state and local quotas remain the same as last year because the NEED remains the same. No funds are being wasted. Every dollar given in the war fund drive is a dollar that will help our fighting men and helpless war victims.

More than 61 per cent of all funds raised by the National War Fund is used for services to our own fighting forces. Slightly

**8TH NAVAL DISTRICT BUILT 11,711 SHIPS AND CRAFT**

DALLAS, Tex. July 19—Headquarters of the Eighth Naval District, of which Rear Admiral A. C. Bennett is Commandant, today revealed that 11,711 ships and craft have been built for the Navy in the Eighth Naval District. The Eighth Naval District comprises the states of Alabama, Tennessee, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma and the Western half of Florida.

The cost of these vessels was \$1,462,617,000.

Not included in the figure were 14,005 rubber landing boats and life rafts built for the Navy, 798 cargo ships built in the district for the U. S. Maritime Commission, or most of the 2,150 ships from inland yards which went to sea through the Port of New Orleans.

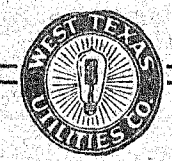

**OFFICE OF DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION  
 GENERAL ORDER 52  
 Effective 12:01 am, June 30, 1945**

"No carrier shall reserve, assign or allocate seating or sleeping space on a passenger train more than 120 hours in advance of scheduled departure time of such train. No carrier shall issue a ticket for a reserved seat or sleeping space on a passenger train more than 120 hours in advance of scheduled departure of such train, except in the case of tickets for reservations made prior to the effective date of this Order which have not been picked up."

**OFFICE OF DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION  
 GENERAL ORDER 53**

"On and after 12 o'clock noon, July 15, 1945, no common carrier by railroad or sleeping car company shall operate or transport any railway car containing sleeping space or sleeping accommodations to a point of distance 450 miles or less from the point of origin of such car, such distance being measured by the shortest distance by railroad over which sleeping cars are operated between such points. . . Each common carrier by railroad shall forthwith cancel all reservations for space after 12 o'clock noon on July 15, 1945."

# What about Travel now....

*under the new Government rulings?*

The Government has curtailed civilian travel by ordering the railroads not to make reservations on passenger trains more than five days in advance of departure and by banning sleeping car service on trips of 450 miles or less.

A lot of people are assuming that, with the European war over, the travel situation on trains should have eased up by now.

But they are finding out that it's harder than ever to get space. They're asking themselves, "Why?"

The reason is simply that the railroads are being called upon to repeat a job of moving over 3,000,000 soldiers. But this time it is to be done in 6 to 9 months whereas originally it took more than 2 years to move these men.

The railroads are still operating with the same number of passenger cars that they had when the war started. Building new passenger cars has not been permitted since Pearl Harbor.

Many Pullman cars have been converted into

hospital cars, and, of course, more Pullmans and coaches than ever are being withdrawn from civilian service to use in the movement of men to the Pacific.

The great bulk of traffic for the Pacific funnels into 4 railroads to ports of embarkation in California. Santa Fe, with its improved facilities, is carrying a large part of this traffic.

This all adds up to the fact that only a very limited amount of space is left over for civilian travel.

Of course we like to accommodate our friends and make new acquaintances. But you, too, agree that the troops and materials needed to whip Japan must come first.

New cars are now on order. Santa Fe has enough new chair cars on order to seat 3186 people. 16 new lunch counter-diners are also on order. A substantial number of new sleeping cars will be placed in service on the Santa Fe as soon as War Production Board orders permit.

## RECIPE FOR HOME CANNING

The "sweet tooth" of many people in Coleman County is letting the desires be known as the calls come in rapidly to Miss Jewell Hipp, County Home Demonstration Agent's Office, wanting information on making preserves, jams, and jellies, with little or no sugar, for the winter home food supply.

A series of articles on satisfying the sweet tooth is being prepared by the Home Demonstration Agent for the newspapers. To have an adequate diet, only 7 pints of preserves, jellies, and jams are needed for each person in the family.

Using honey in preserves and jams is being reviewed in this week's article:

1. Honey may be used instead of sugar when making apple-sauce, apple, peach, or pear butter, and berry jams.

2. Equal measures of honey and sugar may be used in all jams, jellies, and preserves.

The following recipe for Honey peach jam is excellent:

¾ teaspoon allspice, 3 teaspoons broken stick cinnamon, 1½ teaspoons whole cloves, 3 pounds peaches (about 10½ cups), 2 cups honey, 3 table-spoons lemon juice, ¾ cup juice.

1. Put spices in cheesecloth bag.

2. Cook all ingredients slowly

until of desired consistency. Remove spices.

3. Pour into sterilized jars and paraffin or seal.

This recipe for honey apple butter is also very good:

1 quart honey, 1 gallon cooking apples, 1 quart vinegar, 1 teaspoonful cinnamon.

Cook several hours, stirring often to prevent burning. If the vinegar is very strong use part water. Pack in hot jars and seal.

Pickled fruit, apples, peaches, and pears, prepared by this recipe are very palatable:

3 cups honey, 3 cups vinegar, 2 cups water, 1 teaspoon salt.

Bring these ingredients to a boil. Add fruit and cook until tender. Pack in sterilized jars, cover with pickling syrup and seal. For apples, tie the spices (cloves and cinnamon) in cheese cloth sack and boil in pickling syrup. For pears and peaches stick two or three whole cloves in the fruit and allow stick cinnamon to cook in the pickling syrup.

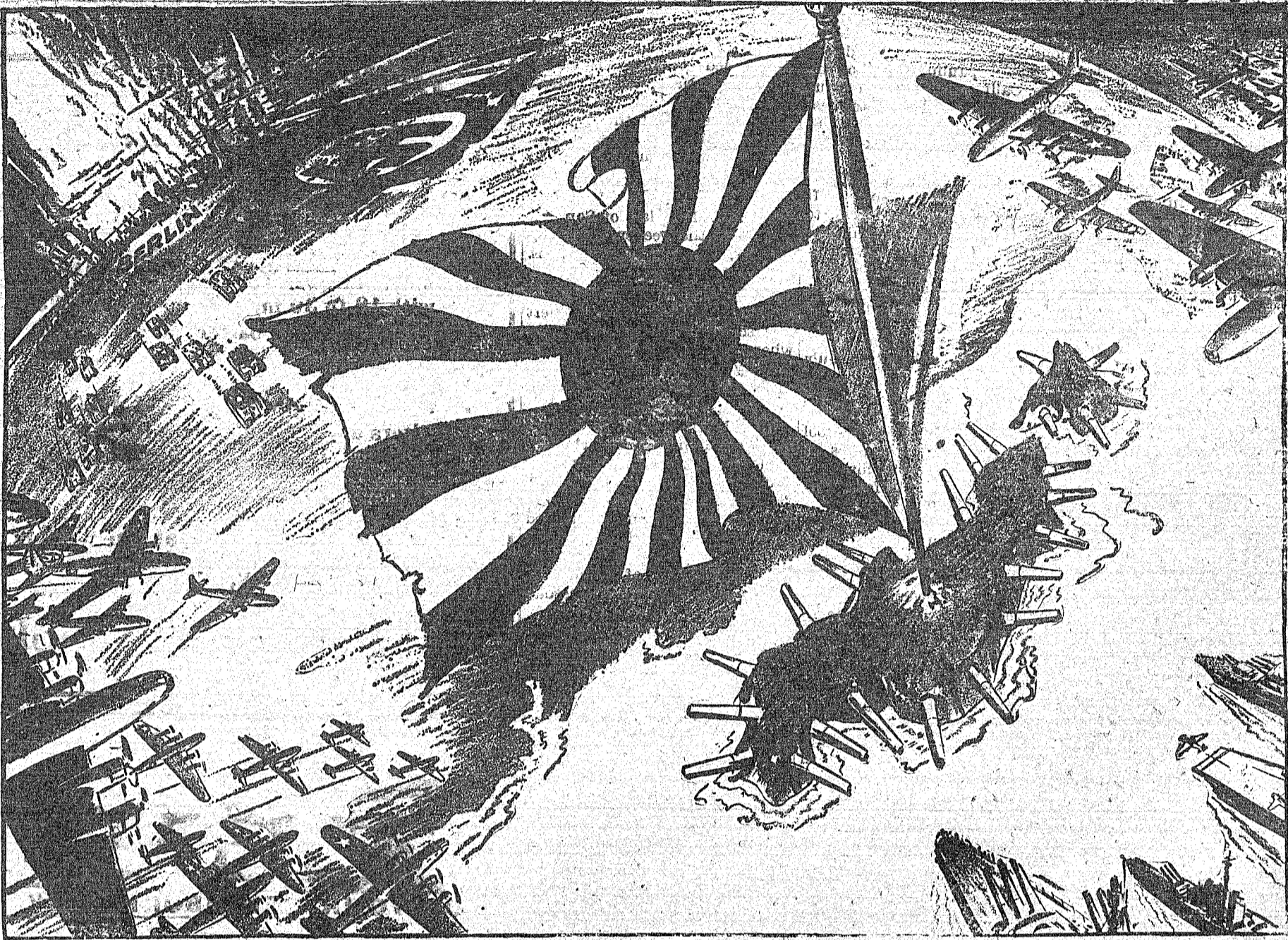

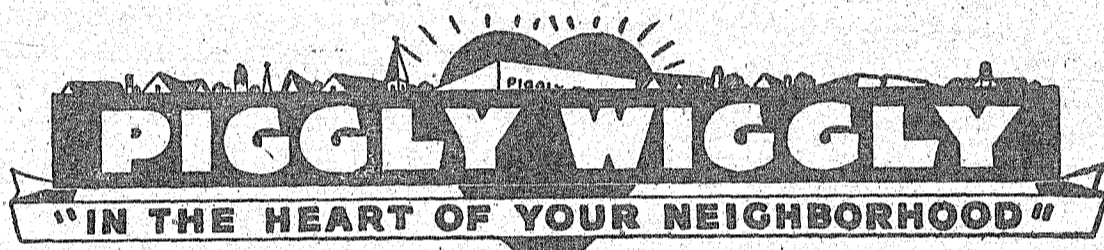
