Brownwood Suffers From High Water Saturday

In the estimation of old-timers living in Brownwood, the highest flood waters they have had since 1900, inundated the Bayou City Saturday morning, rendering sevral hundred homeless and, one man, A. O. Brannan, 69, lost his life in an attempt to make his way out in a small boat. The boat capsized and apparently Mr. Brannan was unable to swim A small boy in the boat with him was rescued.

According to reports reaching here, mostly published in the Brownwood Daily Bulletin, one mile of the city, a portion of it in the business district, was flooded. The Brown County chapter of the Red Cross and service men from Camp Bowie, assisted by a number of local volunters, worked faithfully most all day, rescuing people stranded in trees and on such places as they could find to partially protect them. selves from destruction.

The Red Cross and the City Commission arranged food and shelter for about 750 people who Veterans Hospital were temporarily rendered home less. Camp Bowie furnished cots and bedding.

Heavy rains fell in the vicinity of Coleman, giving the City a water supply that will last for months. Coleman had been in distress over her water supply for several months.

Creeks and rivers were reported Monday to be out of banks, and some report the flood doing considerable damages to crops in the low lands.

Jesse K. Barton **Awarded Bronze** Star For Action

Major Jssse K. Barton, son of V. W. Barton of Santa Anna, has been presented the Bronze Star Medal for Meritorious service against the enemy in Hollandia. The citation reads:

"Bronze Star Medal is awarded to Major Jesse K. Barton, 0-402184, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in direct support of military operations against the enemy at Hol. landia, Dutch New Guinea from 20 November 1944 to 28 February 1945. As plans and operations officer of an infantry regiment, Major Barton displayed extensive professional knowledge and superior comprehension of tac tics and training. He successful ly formulated and put into operations a training program de signed to prepare his regiment for many exigencies of future combat operations. He coordinated and effectively controlled training in all subordinate units utilizing unlimited energy to the utmost. This achievement was effected despite the dispersal of units over a large area, and across bodies of water. His cheer fulness, zeal and unselfish devotion to duty is especially worthy of commendation. The actions of Major Barton are a credit to himself and in accordance with the high standards of the United States Military Service."

It Takes No Sugar To Dry Peaches

Finding ways of conserving the large peach crop this year, with sugar shortages offering an acute problem, suggests the idea that peaches can be dried sat isfactorily at home. More sim portant still, it takes no sugar to dry peaches, says Miss Jewell Hipp, County Home Demonstration Agent of Coleman County.

The method of preparation of the fruit is similar to that for canning The peaches may be dried without peeling, or if desired, peeled peaches dry more quickly and make a good pro-

Treat with sulphur to keep color and food value, One meth. od is to dissolve 3½ tablespoons of potassium metabisulfite or sodium sulfite in 1 gallon water, drop peaches as they are peeled or cut into this solution for 15 minutes, and drain, and arrange on tray for dring, The other method is to burn flowers of sulphur under the fruit. Use 1 tea. spoon sulphur for each pound prepared fruit. Put the sulphur in a small piece of paper, roll it loosely and twist the ends Arrange a place out doors. Place fruit in a tray and put the roll of sulphur in a pan about 12 or 15 inches under the trays. Start burning the roll of paper containing the sulphur. After it has started burning, put a box or barrel down over the trays, and pull some loose dirt up around the edge of the box to hold the fumes. For peeled peaches, sulphur for 20 minutes, and for unpeeled peaches, leave under the tight box with the sulphur fumes about three hours.

Complete the drying process either by sun drying method, or by controlled heat in an electric drier or stove oven. If sun drying method is used arrange fruit on slatted or wire trays covered with cheese cloth, cover peaches with a layer of cheese cloth or a regular screen dryer. Place where air can circulate around

When the fruit is dry the peaches are pliable and leathery, as part of the program. Arand not sticky. They have a springy feel. Heat to 150 degrees in an oven from 15 to 30 minutes Place in hot dry jars or cans and seal immediately, then store in a cool dry place.

Remember fruit can be can ned without sugar or with syrup. The flavor is not quite as good as when sugar is used in canning but it is much better to have fruit on the table without sugar than to not have fruit in the
