## NEWS OF OUR MEN and WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Pfc. Hubert W. Smith received his discharge from the Army Tuesday Nov. 6, at Cheyenne, Wyo. He was in the service 3 years and most of that time was spent in the Hawaiian Islands. He returned from overseas June 4 and since that time has been stationed in Wyoming. He has 64 points. Hubert is expected home the last of this week to visit with his wife and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Turney Smith, before leaving for Monument, New Mexico where he will be employed by the Warren Petroleum Co.

Otis Smith received his discharge Nov. 5 at Camp Fannin, near Tyler, Texas. Otis returned to the States Sept. 5 from the European Theater and after a 45 day furlough here at home he reported to Camp Bowie for reassignment. From there he was sent to Camp Fannin where he received his discharge. For the present he is making his home here.

Word was received here this week that J. W. Payne had arrived in the United States and that he would be home soon with his discharge.

S-Sgt. Denzil A. McCombs of Box 125, Santa Anna has received his discharge from the United States Army at the Camp Cooke, California Separation Center. S-Sgt. McCombs was a member of the 13th Armored Division (Black Cat) which fought under General George S. Patton in Germany. The Black Cat tankmen captured more than 20,000 German prisoners in the fighting in the Ruhr and took an additional 19,000 during its spearhead drive through Bavaria and Austria. In the closing days of the European war, the 13th captured Hitler's birthplace city of Braunau, Austria, and liberated 14,000 Allied prisoners of war. The 13th Armored Division was in the process of being redeployed to the Pacific for action in the scheduled invasion of Japan when the Japanese suddenly surrendered.

Bellows Field, Oahu, Hawaiian Islands—Private First Class Daniel F. Wristen, Jr. is presently assigned to duty at this field. His squadron helped administer and maintain the field for the fighter planes that later flew against Japan from Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

A member of the Military Police, Private First Class Wristen has been in the service since December 1941. He arrived overseas in December 1943 and now has a total of 62 discharge points.

His father, Mr. Dan Wristen, lives in Santa Anna.

Headquarters, IX Air Force Service Command, Erlangen, Germany—M-Sgt. Roy A. Richardson of Santa Anna, Texas is a clerk with the IX Air Force Service Command.

Prior to the invasion of the continent, and throughout the campaign for the liberation of Europe—in England, Normandy, Northern France, Luxembourg, and Germany—the IX Air Force Service Command has supplied, maintained, and repaired the fighters and bombers of the Ninth Air Force.

M-Sgt. Richardson, a graduate of Santa Anna high school entered the service in Feb. 1943 and arrived overseas Oct. 1943. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Richardson, Santa Anna, Texas. Before joining the Army, M-Sgt. Richardson was employed by the Santa Anna National Bank.

Little more than ten weeks ago men stopped dying 8,000 miles from home.

Death and misery we had known almost four years eased with victory. But to some it still comes. Men missing in action die in a cold, legal way every day. Telegrams still arrive.

One after another ships and planes stream back to these United States by the hour, carrying the maimed. Not for weeks and months and years will many take their places in normal home life again.

Some will carry forever scars of battle. The legless, the armless, the blind. Some will never smile again.

We paid heavily for victory. To count it in lives and wounded and heartaches would take time eternal. We paid the top price—we gave a generation, our bedrock of the future.

Too much American blood made sacred the soil of the Bastognes, the Salernos, the Tarawas, the Iwo Jimas and the Okinawas to forget now. Such sacrifice isn't forgotten in ten short weeks.

One more job faces America, the job of gathering up the loose ends. We have a Victory Loan drive at hand and there are many good reasons for it. We have built vast hospitals for the Purple Heart legions, we have armies of occupation, we have rehabilitation tasks among the liberated.

We have a bill to pay.

No idle talk is that which identifies the Victory Loan drive as one of the most important of all. It is the test for thinking people, the people who sent every previous War Loan drive far past its goal.

It is our last chance to say—I helped create that victory.

It is our last, and greatest, chance to say—Thanks, Yanks!

It is our last chance to have our cake and eat it—to buy a piece of victory for \$3 and get back \$4 for that gesture.

Maybe a 21-year-old B-29 pilot with thirty-five missions to his credit said it when he commented in Dallas Monday:

"We have been served peace and victory. Now let's pick up the check!"

## Carrier Pigeons Released From Depot Saturday Morning

Saturday morning Mr. V. W. Priddy released 34 carrier pigeons from in front of the depot. These pigeons belonged to a racing club in Brenham, Texas. Mr. Priddy was asked to turn the pigeons loose about 20 minutes after they arrived. They were released from here at 8:47 a. m. and arrived at Brenham at 1:34 p. m., making a speed of 1260 yards per minute or 43 miles per hour. This was very good time, as they usually average about 35 to 40 miles per hour. This writer along with several others were there to witness the interesting spectacle of the pigeons being released and them flying around town to get their bearings and then heading home. There were three of them that seemed to have some trouble finding their way, but they ultimately found their way and headed out. Mr. L. D. Williams of the club in Brenham said there were 5 of the birds that had not arrived yet but that usually some would come in late.

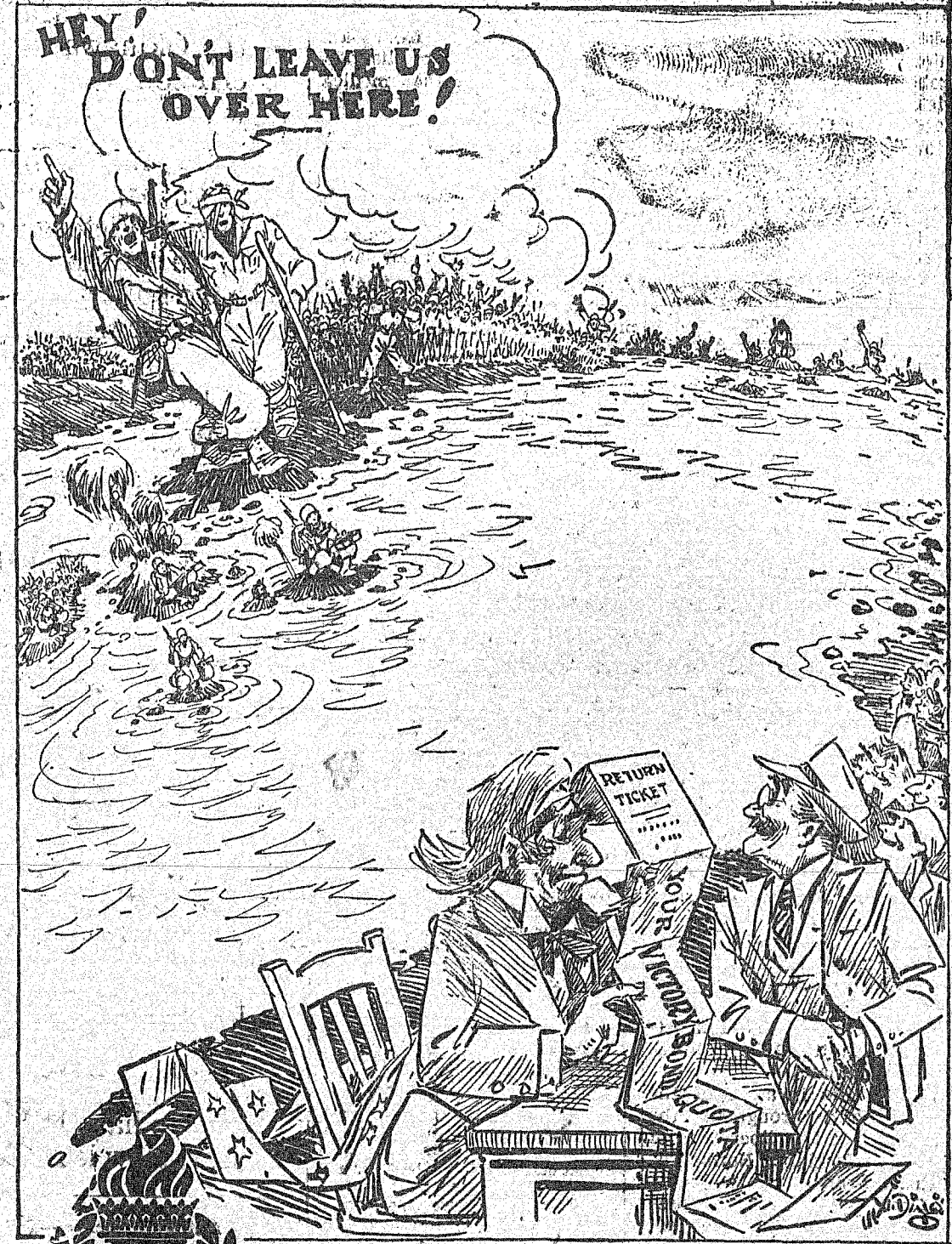

Henry Smith, Rockwood conservation group, has 3 acres of winter peas up to a good stand. He requested terrace lines this week for one and one-half miles of terraces which he has under construction.

H. W. Schulze of the Rockwood conservation group, has planted 20 acres of winter peas. He has 4 acres of Madrid sweet clover that is furnishing good fall grazing.

I. H. Neff made application last week for district assistance to plan and establish a conservation program on a farm he owns in the Watts Creek conservation group.

William Wallace, Whon, has 30 acres of vetch up to a good stand which he plans to graze during the winter before permitting sufficient growth for use as a soil improving crop in the spring. Also, 35 acres of winter peas and 5 acres of Madrid sweet clover have been planted for soil improvement and for grazing.

Carl W. Turner, discharged last week after overseas service in the Army, made application for district assistance to plan and establish a soil conservation program on his farm in the Crossroads conservation group.

Three thousand pounds of certified Madrid sweet clover seed have been received for distribution to local growers. Wilson Grain Company at Coleman is handling the seed.

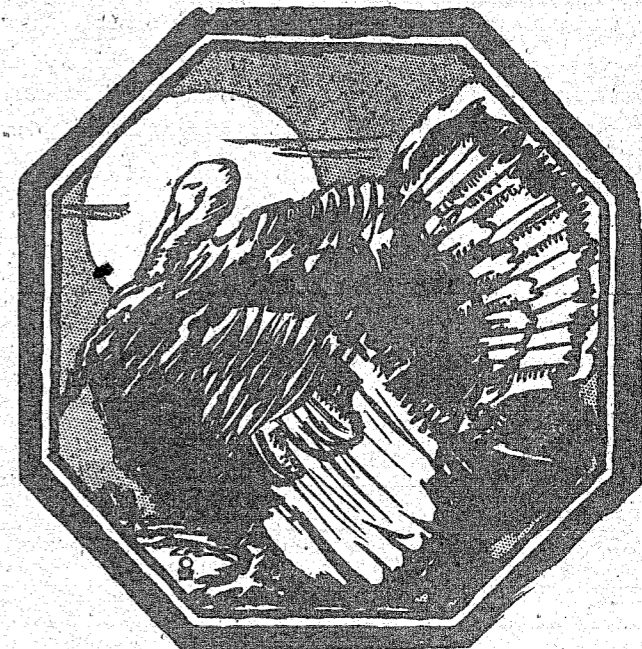

**Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

**Lesson for November 11**

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**THE FRUITS OF PUBLIC WORSHIP**

LESSON TEXT: Ephesians 5:19-21. GOLDEN TEXT: Praise ye the Lord. I will praise the Lord with my whole heart, in the assembly of the upright, and in the congregation.—Psalm 111:1.

The center of every community should be the church. The house set aside for the worship of God is the gathering place of His people. There they find fellowship as they meet their Lord. He is in their midst exalted in majesty, but ready to enter every humble and contrite heart.

Our lesson shows us how the worship of God brings blessed results as His people meet.

**I. Recognizing God's Presence (Isa. 6:1-4)**

King Uzziah, who had begun well but had forgotten God, was at the end of his life a leper because of his sin and dying in disgrace. Israel which had known unprecedented prosperity under God's blessing now hardened its heart nationally against God and was about to go into eclipse. God needed a man to speak for Him in such an hour, to bring to His people a message of judgment and also of blessed invitation. To prepare that man, the great Isaiah, God gave a remarkable manifestation of His glory and power.

It is essential that the man who speaks for God should first see the Lord high and lifted up and to hear of His holiness and glory. The negative tone of the present-day message, the lack of enthusiasm and interest in holy things, the low standards of personal holiness, the failure to preach boldly the truth regarding God's holy standards are to be explained by the fact that there has been no vision of the eternal holiness and glory of God.

**II. Renewing by God's Power (vv. 5-8)**

To see the holiness of God is to be immediately conscious of one's own sin and unworthiness. The obvious conclusion which one draws from that fact is that anyone who is proud, who is not concerned about his own sins and the sins of his people, is living far from God and has either never known or has forgotten about His divine holiness.

Isaiah spoke of the pollution of his lips, thereby confessing that his heart was not right. Whereof the heart is full, thereof speaketh the mouth, for we read that "out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh" (Matt. 12:34). Remember that even though Isaiah was a believer he recognized the need of cleansing.

"Then" (v. 6)—what an important word! When Isaiah called out in humble confession, "then" he was cleansed. The turning point is right at that place for any life. Only when we come to the place of confession and contrition which Isaiah knew, can we expect the Lord to send the cleansing fire and the enabling power.

Reformation, turning over a new leaf, character development, all commendable in their place, are not sufficient. There must be a divine cleansing of the life if there is to be a commission to service.

**III. Realizing God's Will (Eph. 5: 15-17)**

The ministry of the Church of God can serve no greater purpose than helping men and women to know the will of God. That wisdom (v. 17) comes through the teaching of God's Word and through the ministry of the Holy Spirit, both in the church and in the individual.

The Church (and that means every member) is to recognize that the evil day in which we live is a challenge to holy and effective living. Time is not to be wasted, or casually used. It is to be redeemed,—every moment to count for God.

The walk of the believer is to be circumspect, that is, with "pains-taking attention to details, under a sense of their importance," not a foolish walk, but a wise one.

**IV. Receiving God's Spirit (5:18-21)**

God wishes to fill His children with the Holy Spirit in such mighty overwhelming power that they are entirely under His control. Such Spirit-filled believers find their joy and satisfaction in the fellowship of those who sing the praises of God from the heart.

Being a Christian is not a depressing, sorrowful business. It makes you glad. It is God's people who

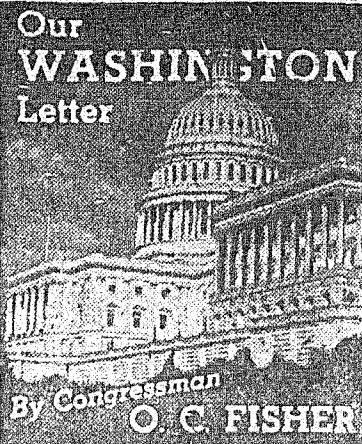

Last week the House approved the amended tax-reduction bill which will soon become law, passed a resolution committing ourselves to a postwar naval policy and voted some additional funds to help feed the starving people of Europe this winter.

In planning a postwar Navy, the House followed a recommendation from Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz and other top naval leaders.

The future Navy would be comprised of 1,082 ships in the entire fleet, exclusive of auxiliaries, and would be split into three groups, many being retained in stand-by condition and manned only by caretaker crews. But all would be ready for service on thirty days' notice.

One thing certain is that the mistakes following the first war when many of our big battle ships were scuttled and sunk will not be repeated this time. We know the disarmament agreements of twenty-five years ago were in the main a farce. Japan went right on building a Navy far beyond her agreement and so did Germany. This time we have the biggest and most powerful Navy of all time and we should keep it. That was what the House said last week will be done.

**Economy Bloc?**

A word that is not often heard in Congress is "economy." But Representative Cannon of Missouri, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, resurrected the word the other day in referring to the rather juicy pork barrel airport aid bill that was passed the day before by a vote of 279 to 82. It was the seven-hundred million-dollar appropriation to be used in matching local funds in the building of 7,000 airports over the nation. I was one of the eighty-two who voted against the measure.

"Mr. Speaker," Cannon began, "I hope no one will overlook the list of eighty-two men on page 9964 of this morning's Record. It is a notable list of notable men. They not only preach economy but, extraordinary as it may seem, they actually vote for economy."

"Mr. Speaker, that list of names ought to be printed in every newspaper in the country. I do not know just how interested in economy the newspapers are, but there have been so few votes for economy lately that it ought to be in the same class with the story of 'Man Bites Dog.'"

"We have all kinds of blocs

here—the farm bloc, the railroad bloc; now, at last, we have an economy bloc.

"May I suggest that informal meetings of the bloc be convened here on the floor of the House every time a bill is up to spend money we do not have for something we do not need."

"You will recognize a brother of the bloc when he gives the password. The password is the word 'No,' spoken clearly and distinctly when the Member's name is called on a vote to appropriate borrowed money for something we can get along without. The uninitiated are earnestly invited to affiliate at any regular meeting of the bloc."

It has been said, and I think correctly so, that nothing would do more to assure confidence in the future of our country than a re-assumption by State and local governments of their responsibility to pay their own bills.

But at the same time, those local demands on a depleted Federal treasury will continue just so long as Congress votes the money for such purposes. There are, of course, many necessary expenses in which Uncle Sam must share. But the big job is to draw the line at the place where it ought to be drawn.
