





The earth and moon passed out of the uncommon conjunction for another extended whirl around their terrestial orbits. Scientists determined that the moon was to enter the earth's shadow at a point 226,000 miles in space, with the black cone of shadow extending another 435,-

000 miles beyond this point. Dr. Clyde Fisher, curator of Natural History, said the unusually long eclipse was due to

two phenomena. At this time of the year, he explained, the earth is closest to the sun at any point in its orbit-nearly 1,000,000 miles closer than in the winter. Also, at the time of the eclipse the moon is almost on full meridian,
