**NEW TRANSFER LAW**

A new law on transfers passed by the last legislature requires that all transfers, including both high school and elementary pupils, must be applied for in the County Superintendent's office by August 1. The law also gives any parent whose application for transfer has been refused by the County Superintendent the right to appeal to the County Board, but the appeal must be filed prior to August 6. All transfers must be approved, all appeals completed, all tabulations filed together with the original application signed by each parent whose child is to be transferred, in the office of the State Superintendent by August 15.

According to John L. Beard, County Superintendent, the law must be followed to the letter in order to give his office a chance to get the tabulations made and the entire proceedings filed in the office of the State Superintendent before the deadline.

All parents desiring school transfers are requested to make applications at once.

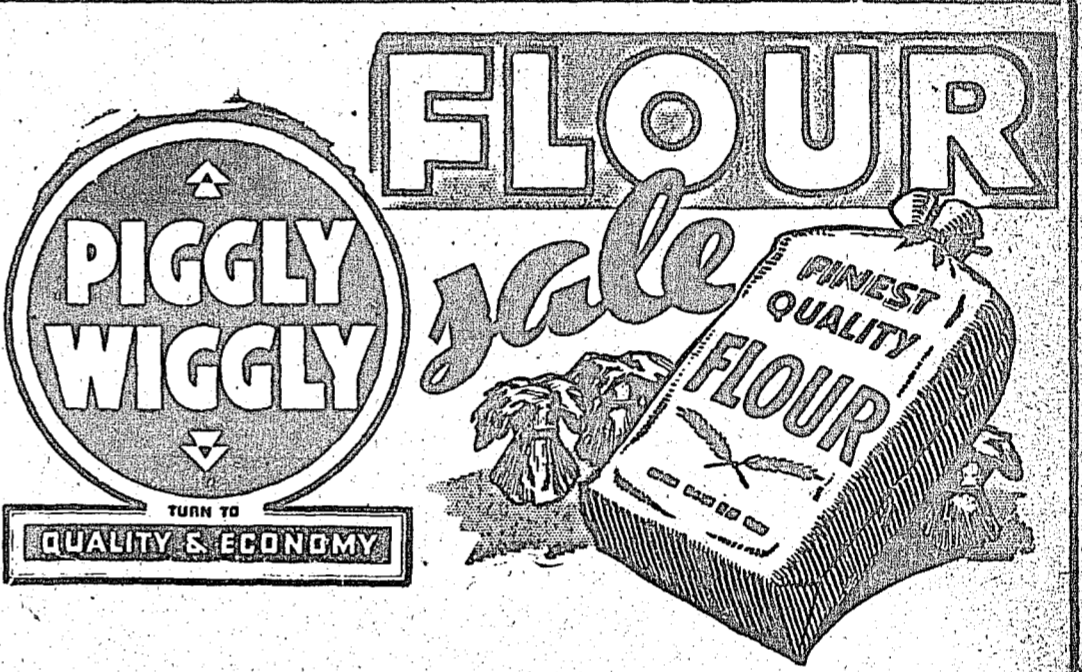
