Call-counts made throughout the state in cooperation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Austin - Prospects for the indicate a breeding season popmourning dove season appear ulation comparable to last year.

Open season periods this year are Sept. 1 through Oct. 20 for the North Zone and Oct. 1 through November 19, for the South Zone except in counties having a white-winged dove season or special regulations.

Shooting hours will be from 12 noon to sunset.

Favorable weather conditions this year have provided mourning doves with ample native and lomestic food. The abundance

being due to a spring growing season which produced good weed seed and grain crops the Assistant Director said. The call-count method of estimating dove populations, was

begun in 1951. A base line of time, and place was determined to keep conditions similar for each year's count. By this method the counts are made May 20 through June 10, beginging onehalf hour before official sum rise. Along established 20-mile routes, counts are made allone mile intervals of 3-minute dulation, noting the muster of earls heard during this period and of birds seen on route to the hex one-mile stop.

es, polishes and cleaning agents out of reach of small children. Avoid throwing/partially filled containers into wastebaskets or

Justice Hamilton was selected as the preferred candidate of Texas lawyers in a secret vote conducted by the State Bar and he led the field of three candidates with a total of 476,799 votes in the first primary, less than seven percent short of a majority which would have giv en him a victory without a run-



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

Question — I am 40 years old. and I have already worked more than 10 years and have paid social security tax on the maximum possible each year. I understand I need only 10 years of covered work to qualify for retirement payment when I am old, so I cannot see any advantage to continue paying social security tax.

Answer — By working 10 years (40 quarters), you are "permanently insured," which means that you will qualify for a retirement payment regardless of whether you work any more. The amount for which you qualify however, will be affected considerably by whether you continue working under social security until you reach retirement age.



For instance, research conducted at Purdue University shows that some nearsightedness comes from too much visual tension, in reading and studying, in the early school years. And, that temporary preventive bifocal or training lenses can, in many cases, reduce that tension. Thus, nearsightedness may be halted or even prevented.

Cooperate with your professional optometrist if he prescribes preventive bifocals for your child. He is practicing preventive vision care.
