## Former Santa Annan Selected As Woman of the Week At El Paso Recently

(Editor's note: The following article by Cecilia McMaster of the El Paso Herald-Post, appeared in that newspaper Friday, August 8. Miss Turner is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Turner of Santa Anna.)

"You want a revision of the revised revision revised?" is the standard joke around the offices of Davis-Foster-Thorp & Associates where the Woman of the Week, Miss Doris Belle Turner, is a draftsman.

Miss Turner is one of the few registered women architects in El Paso and is the only woman member of the El Paso chapter, American Institute of Architects.

What brought the Woman of the Week into this world of T-squares, drawing boards and slide rules? It was the creative aspect which the Woman of the Week, known as Dee Bee, finds challenging.

The Woman of the Week gave vent to her creativeness by studying music before she entered the field of architecture. During her first year of college at North Texas State in Denton, she took night courses in drafting, her first taste of what was to become her career.

Her education was interrupted by World War II when she accepted a job as draftsman with Consolidated - Vultee Aircraft Corp. in Fort Worth. She found aircraft designing so fascinating that she took extension courses in aircraft engineering and design from Southern Methodist University and the University of Texas.

But Dee Bee found aircraft engineering wasn't quite the field for a woman. She entered Texas Technological College in Lub-

The annual fish supper cooked by the Bangs men will be served Tuesday at supper time. Other meals will be served at the regular times.

The directors of the WCID and the supervisors of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District will meet in the near future to formulate a maintenance plan for maintaining the flood retaining structures. The Central Colorado SCD has requested help from the Soil Conservation Service in gathering detailed information needed for checking adequacy of easements and detailed design preparatory to awarding contracts for construction. This engineering field work will be completed as soon as possible. Eldon Knox, acting chairman of the Central Colorado SCD has been told.

Four other water control and improvement districts are in progress in the local watersheds. On Monday, August 18, the Brown County Commissioners Court granted the petition for a water control and improvement district election requested by landowners in the Brown County portion of Mukewater Creek and Turkey Creek watersheds. Temporary directors for the two watersheds were appointed.

Taylor County Commissioners have called a hearing for Upper Jim Ned landowners for August 26 and Callahan Commissioners have set August 29 to hear testimony for Turkey Creek watershed. These sub-watersheds are all in or part in the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District, a local sponsor of the watershed work.

## Water District Favored 52-4 In Trickham Sat.

A water control and improvement district on Mukewater Creek was approved Saturday by the watershed voters, reports J. H. Martin, election judge.

Fifty-two voted for the approval of the district and four voted against. The new water district will be known as the Coleman County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1.

The voters also approved the limitation of \$8,000 as the amount the district may be taxed for operation and maintenance of works of improvement as needed. Voters also voted to limit the district to a five cents per acre tax in any one year. The five cents per acre tax would amount to approximately \$2500.

"Our next step will be to secure easements and rights-of-way on the eight structures to be constructed in the Coleman County portion of the watershed," reports W. L. Vaughn and J. H. Martin, directors of the newly formed WCID. "The WCID directors would like to thank everyone concerned for their cooperation, time and assistance in the organization and endorsement of the WCID. We are ready to continue as fast as possible in developing the Mukewater Creek flood control plan."

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## Wading Pool Closed For The Season

Mrs. Robert Smith, chairman of the Wading Pool program for summer activities, announced this week that she was closing the wading pool because of lack of attendance. The last day for the pool to operate was on Tuesday of this week.

Mrs. Smith said attendance was good through June and July but beginning the first of August, attendance began dropping off and the last two or three times the pool was open only two or three children were present.

Speaker for the program will be Clyde R. Nail, vice president of the San Antonio Union Junior College District, which administers San Antonio College and St. Phillip's College, and dean of San Antonio College. He will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

Preceding the commencement program, Dr. and Mrs. Newman will honor the graduating seniors and their parents with the traditional president's reception from 5 until 6 p. m. in Veda Hodge Hall.

# 2nd Primary To Be Saturday

The second primary election will be held throughout the state on Saturday, August 23rd. Polls in Coleman County will open at 8:00 a. m. and remain open until 7:00 p. m. It is hoped that a large percent of the eligible voters will go to the polls and select their choice in the two races that will be listed on Precinct No. 2 ballots. Only one race will be on the other county ballots and that is the state race for a place on the Supreme Court.

Of primary interest to the voters of Precinct No. 2 is the race between Earl Hardy and the incumbent Walter Holt, for the office of Commissioner of Precinct No. 2. Holt is presently serving his first term as Commissioner and Hardy has previously served in the same capacity. Both men are well known over the precinct and interest in the election is good.

In the first primary election, Holt led the field in the three-man race with 321 votes, while Hardy was a close second with 294 votes. The third candidate received 157 votes. Four years ago the same two men were in the race for Commissioner with Holt winning by an 18-vote majority.

## News To Sponsor Election Party Saturday Night

Election results from all eight voting boxes in Precinct No. 2 will be announced over a loud speaker system Saturday night, beginning at 7:00 p. m. or as soon as election returns begin coming in. No bulletin board will be put up as there is only one race on the ballot of local interest.

All election judges of Precinct No. 2 have been requested to call their results to The News. Collect as soon as their counting is completed. Because of the fact that only two races are on the ballots, counting should be fairly well completed by soon after 7:00 p. m. and results should come in pretty rapidly.

Everyone is invited to be in Santa Anna to hear the election returns. Several of the county officials are expected to be on hand at The News Office Saturday night to help carry on the proceedings here.

The only other race on the ballot is between Robert W. Hamilton of El Paso, and J. Ed. Smith of Houston, for a place on the State Supreme Court. Hamilton has 31 years experience as a lawyer and judge and is presently serving as Chief Justice of the 8th Court of Civil Appeals. Smith is a Houston labor lawyer, called the DOT-ALF-CIO candidate by the Dallas Morning News. Every person should express a preference in this race as well as the Precinct race.

Six Coleman County 4-H Club members will attend the Texas 4-H Junior Leadership Training Laboratory at Bastrop State Park, August 23-30, as winners in the annual 4-H Junior Leadership program. It was announced by the Extension Service District Agents, Thelma Casey and Roy Hukabee.

The Coleman County winners in the statewide program are Virginia Ruth Adain, Joan Gardner, Richard Ellis, Parker, Claude Austin Hart, and Charles Robert Taylor, Jr., all of Coleman; and Janice Winslett of Gouldbusk.

The leadership lab, one of the nation's outstanding youth training activities, is directed by Extension Service personnel. The 4-H Junior Leadership program is sponsored by United Gas in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A & M College system.

Virginia Adain, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Adain, has been active in 4-H Club work for six years. A tenth grade student at Coleman High School, and a member of the County Wide 4-H Club, of which she is secretary-treasurer, she has also been president, reporter and recreation leader of her local club. In 1957 she was Gold Star runner-up, won 28 ribbons at the West Texas Fair and was top girl in the youth division. That same year she won 34 ribbons County Achievement Day and was top girl of the day. She has received many dress revue awards, as well as awards in dairy foods and electric demonstrations. Joan Gardner, 17, a senior at Coleman High School, is also a member of the Coleman County Wide 4-H Club, and has been active in 4-H Club work for seven years. "I found the most opposition to women architects during college," said the blonde Woman of the Week. She was the object of some teasing at Texas Tech but she ignored the jests of classmates and became one of the two women to receive an architecture degree out of the nine who started the five year course.

"If there is any prejudice against women architects, I don't hear of it now," smiled Dee Bee.

The Woman of the Week, as a registered architect, is qualified to serve as a consultant and when called upon, can design churches, warehouses, offices, airports, department stores and parking facilities in addition to houses which are commonly associated with architects.

Dee Bee leans toward house designing. "Women architects sometimes have a different approach since it is the woman who is most familiar with the home," she said.

The Woman of the Week believes an architect should keep in mind the family's comfort and needs and should design a house the family will be proud of.

She keeps abreast of other phases of building and when designing a house, she draws from her knowledge of the latest types of wood, flooring, roofing, tile, paint and other building materials. She also is familiar with the fields of civil, mechanical and electrical engineering, interior decoration and landscape architecture—all of which are related to designing a home, hotel or warehouse.

The Woman of the Week is originally from Santa Anna, Texas, and came to El Paso eight years ago. She was employed by Carroll and Daetle and Associates before taking her present job and maintains a private practice at home.

Many designs have come from the pen and drawing board of this talented and ambitious Woman of the Week and the buildings have taken their place on the El Paso skyline.

### Prospects Good For Mourning Dove Season This Year

Austin — Prospects for the mourning dove season appear excellent at this time, according to the Assistant Director of

Wildlife Restoration of the Game and Fish Commission. Call-counts made throughout the state in cooperation with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service indicate a breeding season population comparable to last year. Open season periods this year are Sept. 1 through Oct. 20 for the North Zone and Oct. 1 through November 19, for the South Zone except in counties having a white-winged dove season or special regulations.

Shooting hours will be from 12 noon to sunset.

Favorable weather conditions this year have provided mourning doves with ample native and domestic food. The abundance being due to a spring growing season which produced good weed seed and grain crops, the Assistant Director said.

The call-count method of estimating dove populations, was begun in 1951. A base line of time and place was determined to keep conditions similar for each year's count. By this method the counts are made May 20 through June 10, beginning one-half hour before official sunrise. Along established 20-mile routes, counts are made at one-mile intervals of 3-minute duration, noting the number of calls heard during this period and of birds seen en route to the next one-mile stop.

At that time of year, the nesting season is getting into full swing, the Assistant Director said. It is also the time when most birds are singing, making for an accurate count.

### GUARD AGAINST "KILLERS" IN YOUR HOME

College Station — If you made a list of the "killers" around your home, you would be amazed. Insecticides and other poisonous chemicals stored within a child's reach can bring tragedy. Statistics prove this point. Two out of every 100 persons die each year from accidental poisoning. Of this number, every fourth person is between the age of 1 and 5 years.

Check your home now to make sure that all "killers" are stored well out of reach of the children. Extension home management specialists suggest some important check points:

Start with the medicine cabinet. Keep it locked or make certain that it is high enough to keep children out. Label all bottles and material stored there.

Keep cosmetics, soaps, bleaches, polishes and cleaning agents out of reach of small children.

Avoid throwing partially filled containers into wastebaskets or trash barrels where children could test for taste.

Keep matches and all inflammable materials well out of reach.

### Hamilton Makes Statement in Supreme Court Race

The leading candidate for Place One Supreme Court in the first primary has issued a statement urging all voters to take a personal interest in the runoff election to be held Saturday.

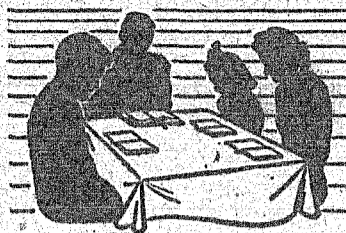
Robert W. Hamilton, who led the ticket by more than 160,000 votes in the first primary, said:

"Each voter should decide for himself which candidate is best qualified, then be sure to take time to vote on Saturday, remembering that the Supreme Court has a greater potential effect upon our rights as individuals than any other office in our state or nation. Texas is one of the states which allows its citizens the privilege of voting upon members of its Supreme Court and each Texas voter should express his preference in this election even though in some cases this will be the only race on the ballot."

Hamilton is a veteran jurist now serving as Chief Justice 8th Court of Civil Appeals, just one step in rank below the Supreme Court post for which he is a candidate. He has 31 years experience in general practice, as county and district attorney, district judge, and including five years as Chief Appeals Justice.

Justice Hamilton was selected as the preferred candidate of Texas lawyers in a secret vote conducted by the State Bar and he led the field of three candidates with a total of 476,799 votes in the first primary, less than seven percent short of a majority which would have given him a victory without a runoff.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows:

Section II. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT A HOME RULE CITY MAY PROVIDE BY CHARTER OR CHARTER AMENDMENT, AND A CITY, TOWN OR VILLAGE OPERATING UNDER THE GENERAL LAWS MAY PROVIDE BY MAJORITY VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED VOTERS VOTING AT AN ELECTION CALLED FOR THAT PURPOSE, FOR A LONGER TERM OF OFFICE THAN TWO (2) YEARS FOR ITS OFFICERS, EITHER ELECTIVE OR APPOINTIVE, OR BOTH, BUT NOT TO EXCEED FOUR (4) YEARS; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT TENURE UNDER CIVIL SERVICE SHALL NOT BE AFFECTED HEREBY; PROVIDING FOR AN ELECTION, A FORM BALLET AND THE ISSUANCE OF A PROCLAMATION THEREFOR."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"I am about to enter the state university," a 17-year-old says. "I want to be a chemist, my Father continues to insist that I become a doctor. I don't think we'll ever agree, so I don't think I'll go to college at all. Am I right?"

"You are wrong. Go on to school. The disagreement doesn't concern your going to college—only the type of location that you will prepare yourself for while you are there. Simply giving away from college doesn't solve the problem at hand. It's just an effort to ignore it. Problems are the stones that we continually find in the garden of life. When we strike one of these stones as we plow along, we must pick it up and do something with it. We must do something with it because turning our back on it will not make it disappear; it is always there, retarding growth and acting as a stumbling block until we get it out of the way."

The history of differences between father and son regarding a vocation may be a long one. The older the difference, the more difficult a friendly solution. But, unless one party is unreasonable, there is a solution.

Someone, of course, is going to have to "give-in." But, this giving in can be a victory rather than a defeat if it is based on understanding and recognition of the fact that the path agreed on is the right path to a happy and fruitful life.

Chances are, the father in this situation is himself a doctor. Yet the mere fact that medicine has been a good and fruitful life for him is no guarantee that his son will be happy — as successful — in the same profession.

It is a problem, indeed, that our young friend has brought to attention. But it is not a new or impossible situation. That's why we say, go to your father, man to man, and work for an agreement . . . but begin your college education in the meanwhile.

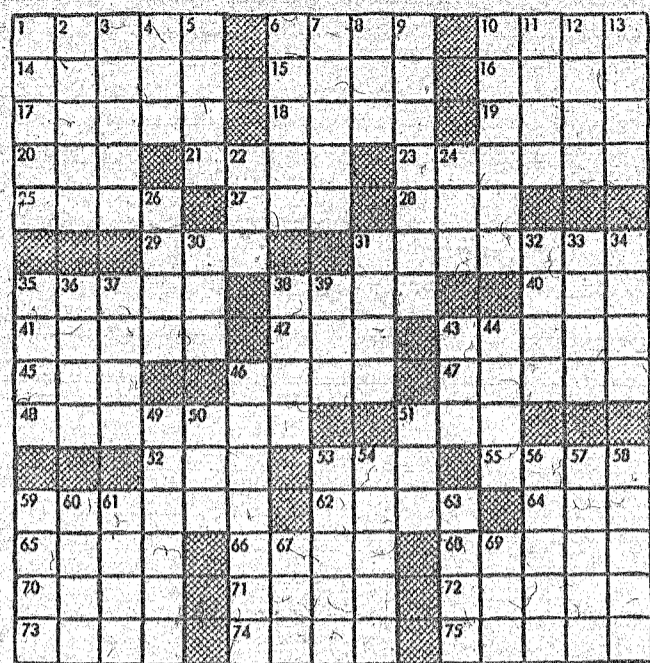

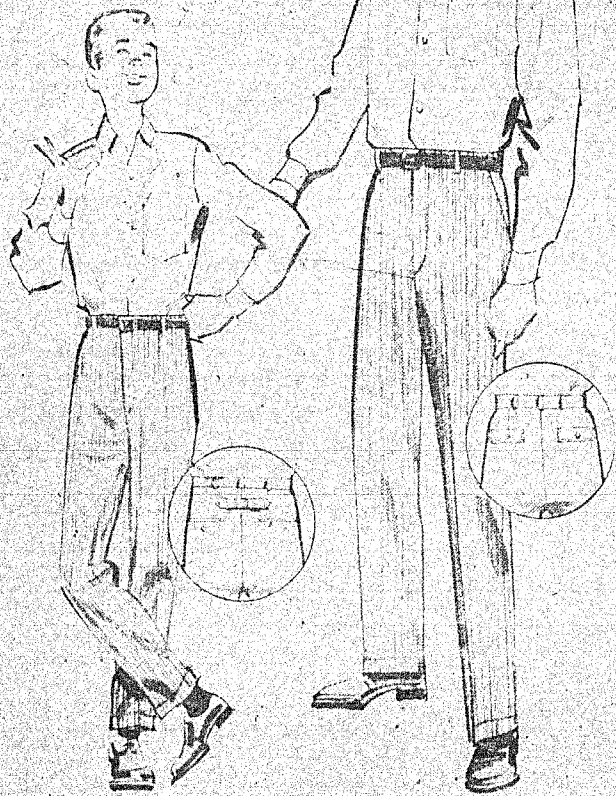

## About Your HEALTH

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M. D. Commissioner of Health



Is your child starting to school this year for the first time? If so, is he ready for it? There is still some time left before school begins, and now is the time to prepare him for his exciting adventure.

He needs to start his school life in good physical health. Have your family physician give him a complete physical examination even though he has periodically examined your child in the last few years. An eye test is very important, and teeth should be checked by the family dentist. Now is the time to re-check and correct any defects not found in the past before school begins.

Most likely your child has already been immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough (pertussis) and small pox, but if he hasn't, have these

immunizations started immediately for his own protection and that of his class mates. And by all means don't wait until school starts for those polio shots. Even if all immunizations have been done, be sure to check with your doctor about necessary booster shots.

Your child should have escaped these "childhood" diseases by early and correct immunization while he was still in the protective atmosphere of his home, but once he starts school, he will be exposed to conditions that he is unfamiliar with and may not be able to cope with if he is not protected. Be sure and learn how his school handles sudden illness or accidents and your role in avoiding them.

He should know how to wash his face and hands, how to comb his hair, and how to use a handkerchief or tissue, not only for blowing his nose, but for covering a cough or sneeze.

Perhaps the most important part of your child's preparation for school is his mental and emotional outlook. Learning to give and take, to get along with others, will be necessary at school and through life. If he has felt secure in your affection, has learned to take his place in the family group, shared in small responsibilities and learned to do some things on his own — if he has played with children his own age, the chances are that he will get along well at school.

But there are other factors too. Not enough sleep can make him tired and edgy. He may need from ten to 12 hours a night to build up his energy. If you haven't already begun, now is the time to see that your child has plenty of sleep regularly.

As parents, you will play the leading role in the development of your child's character and personality. His future depends more than anything else on your support and encouragement in his outside activities.

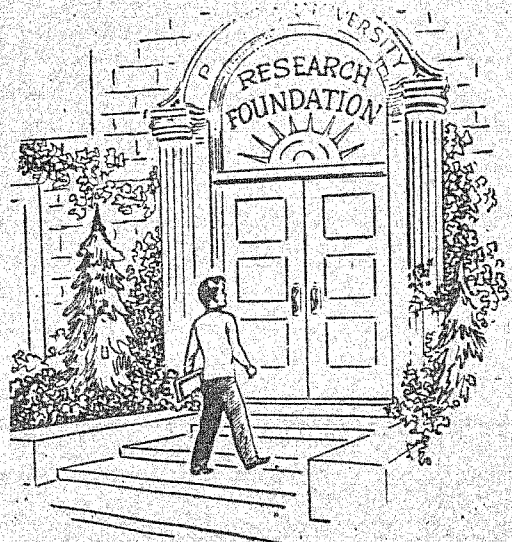

(Serves 6)

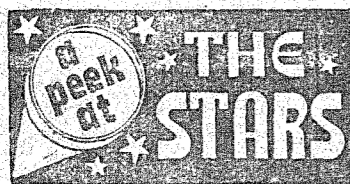
3 1/2 cups sliced peaches, drained
