O. M. Jackson Produces First Bale of Cotton

A picture of Mr. Jackson receiving his premium check has apparently been lost in the mail. We will publish it next week if it arrives from the engraver.

Otis M. Jackson of the Plainview Community, brought in the first bale of 1958 cotton Thursday afternoon of last week. Mr. Jackson said he had been living in the Plainview community almost 39 years and this was his first time to produce the first bale of cotton. And this cotton is earlier this year than usual.

The bale weighed 526 pounds and was ginned from 2,060 pounds of seed cotton. It was gathered from approximately 8 acres of land. Mr. Jackson has 20 acres of cotton and said he thought he would make about one-half bale to the acre.

Pierre Rowe, manager of the Santa Anna Co-op Gin, where the cotton was ginned, said the cotton was good and would likely be graded midlin' 31/32. Rowe said it seems all the cotton this year is going to be good, but there is just not enough of it. Most of the cotton acreage has been in the Soil Bank program. Rowe said he would guess 8,000 acres would take care of all the cotton in Coleman County.

Total premium contributed by the local merchants for the first bale amounted to \$195, with the Co-op Gin giving the ginning and buying the seed, plus making a \$25 contribution above the market price of the cotton.

Attendance has been very good considering that some are still on vacation and things of that nature. The Marching Band will make its first appearance at the Comanche-Santa Anna game on Sept. 5, at Comanche.

The Santa Anna Band Boosters have had a Cedar lined closet for uniform storage, constructed in the Band Room the past week. Construction is just about completed. Plans for a sink and drinking fountain are in progress and new shelves for music are to be constructed in the near future. These are much needed items that are for the use of band students. Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent of the Santa Anna schools, announces the local school system will open for the 1958-59 season on Tuesday, Sept. 2 with a general assembly in the high school auditorium at 8:35 a. m. Plans call for the assembly to last about 20 minutes and regular class periods will begin at 9:00 a. m. and continue through the day. Patrons of the school are invited to attend the opening exercises and parents of children who are entering school for the first time are especially invited to be with their children through the day and help get them registered and started to school.

First grade students will be released early on the first day. For students registering in the first grade, birth certificates are required and no student under the age of six years on Sept. 1, 1958, will be enrolled.

The lunchroom will begin operation on Tuesday. Meals will increase in price this year as follows: For students in all elementary grades, 30 cents per meal; for students in the four high school grades, 35 cents per meal; and for all teachers and other adults, 40 cents per meal.

Walter Holt Wins by 36

Walter Holt won a second term as Commissioner of Precinct No. 2 Saturday in the second primary election. Holt received a total of 390 votes to 354 for his opponent, Earl Hardy. A total of 744 votes were cast in Precinct 2 in comparison to 772 in the first primary. Totals are unofficial returns and will be canvassed by the Commissioners' Court at their next meeting.

In comparing the number of votes cast with the number in the first primary, Santa Anna South Ward and Niwot were the only voting boxes casting more votes in the second primary than in the first primary. Trickham cast the same number, 55.

In the first primary Santa Anna South cast 262 votes and 176 in the second primary; Niwot cast 28 in the first primary and 30 in the second primary. The other boxes were as follows: Absentee, 7 under; Santa Anna North, 1 under; Shields, 8 under; Whon, 5 under; Red Bank, 9 under; and Rockwood, 14 under. The total votes cast was a surprising number in comparison

with other second primary elections. Because of the lack of offices usually contested in the second primary, a lot of people do not take the few minutes necessary to cast their votes.

The News would like to express appreciation to the Election Judges of the precinct for their cooperation in getting the votes called in Saturday night. All the votes were called in, tabulated and announced over the loud speaker by 7:25 p. m. The polls closed at 7:00 p. m. We do not believe you could ask for or get any better cooperation than that. Thanks to all the election judges.

Our WASHINGTON Letter

ADVANCEMENT OF SURVEY work on the Colorado River and its tributaries was assured last week when approval was obtained of \$50,000 to continue that project. Last year \$15,000 was appropriated and the work was begun.

This survey, which I have been urging for several years, includes a study of the flood records and economic factors related to floods, and covers all tributaries of the Colorado.

Under Federal law, no flood control projects are considered in Congress unless and until the Corps of Engineers makes such surveys and finds that a dam at a given site is economically feasible. The Corps of Engineers has

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

The Internal Revenue Service questions more tax returns on whether a taxpayer is eligible to claim a dependent than any other item. The allowance of the \$600 dependency exemption on the tax return makes a very important difference in the amount of tax a taxpayer owes. Two taxpayers cannot claim the same dependent, however, children who support their parents can agree on claiming the parents as dependents if they have shared the support of one or more of the parents and if they have contributed more than half of the support. Form 2120, Multiple Support Agreement, may be obtained from the District Director of Internal Revenue for this purpose. You may find this worth looking into if the children in your family share the support of your parents.

reported that it will probably require an additional two years to complete the survey and economic studies.

Earlier this year a bill which I introduced was incorporated into the omnibus bill covering new authorizations for flood control and planning.

This would allow the Engineers to proceed with a flood control study of the turbulent San Felipe which runs through Del Rio. The bill was also approved by the Senate and has been signed by the President.

THE FARM BILL, approved in the closing days, will assure Texas cotton farmers more acreage next year and a choice on two programs. The same bill includes a three year extension of the wool act. The latter is financed exclusively from revenue

derived from tariff duties on imported wool.

The second session of the 85th Congress is winding up. It has made a fairly constructive record. This session has faced up to the demands of this space and missile age, and has legislated extensively on those subjects.

I have an idea the country would be better off if this Congress had adjourned at least two weeks earlier. There has been a lot of wild spending measures considered and some of them have been enacted. We were able to hold the line against a good many, however.

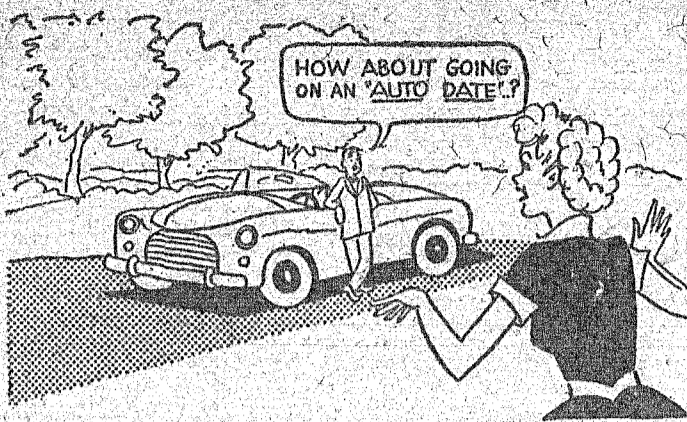

Is Auto Essential To Teenage Dating?



A 15-year-old teenette writes that her folks allow her to date 16-year-old boys (and in this age, they drive, of course)—but she isn't allowed to go on dates with them in their autos. Not right, she says.

We're not inclined to back up her contention for several reasons. To begin, a wise parent must concern himself with the dating activities of the young teenager; the parent cannot simply say, "You're old enough to date," and then forget about the whole matter. There

must be guidance and the restraining hand of experience.

Too, you don't just dive off the highest springboard the first time you get near the water. Some parents used to take their children to the nearest creek, toss them into deep water and command them to "swim out." Many youngsters learned to swim—or at least made it to shore—but just as many got into trouble and had to be rescued. Learning to do things in this life and to get along is not a mere

matter of being "old" enough, nor is it a mere matter of being granted permission from one in authority.

In the writer's opinion, there is nothing wrong with a 15-year-old girl riding in the car with a 16-year-old boy—to and from such an event as a school picnic, church social, etc. In this instance the car is a convenient method of transportation, providing the boy is a competent driver. But, in this day and time "auto dates" often mean fitting back and forth along the highways and off-beat by-ways, sometimes taking part in "drag races" and in general risking life and limb in youthful exuberance. This is not a condemnation of teenagers in general. Many teenagers who think for themselves look upon a car as a means of transportation—and not as a "speed-boat." Some develop this idea before they are 16 or 17, but when it comes is not important. Until it does the teenager shouldn't have "auto dates" because he or she hasn't learned that they ought to use reason as well as the auto.

Do Not Shoot More Than Ten Doves Per Day

Austin — Don't be confused, it may cost you a fine for killing too many doves, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. The North Zone season opens Sept. 1.

This year's hunting regulations, approved by the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, permits a possession limit of 20 birds after the first day. This does not mean, the director warns, that a hunter can go out and kill 20 birds in one day and get by with it.

The daily limit is still 10 birds. However, after the first day a hunter may have two days' possession, provided he doesn't have them on his person or in a manner to indicate they were all killed on the same day.

"The dove is a migratory bird and as such comes under final federal control," the chief says. "This year the possession limit has been modified, as well as the season lengthened. A good dove crop indicated early this year is responsible."

The chief also warned that new licenses must be obtained before hunting Sept. 1. These licenses are required for all hunters between the ages of 17 and 65 who hunt out of their own county. The new licenses will be available next week from game wardens, sporting goods stores and county clerks.

New fishing licenses also will be required at the same time.

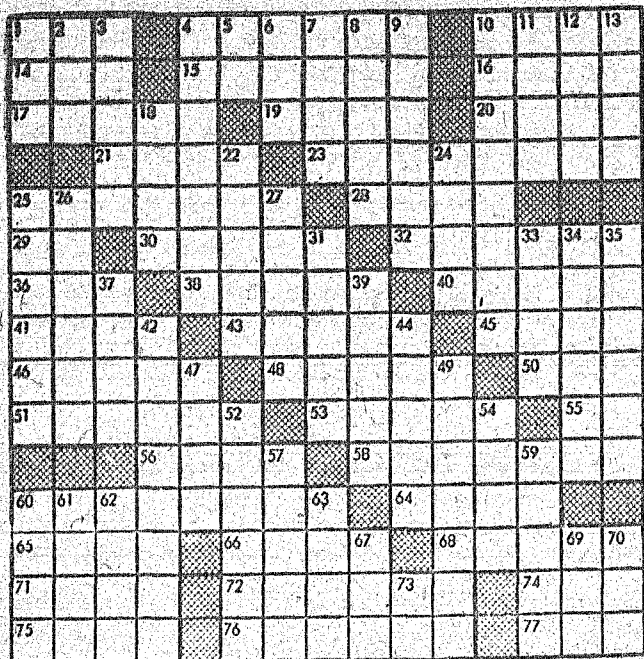

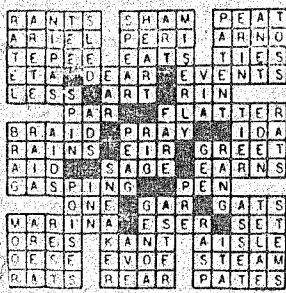

Dept. of Public Safety Seeks Deathless Labor Day Holiday Period

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety made a personal appeal to Texas motorists today urging them to join an all-out attempt to make Labor Day a historical event free of traffic deaths.

In his statement, Garrison said that he was talking personally to each driver when he asked them to join the DPS, Gov. Price Daniel and business and civic organizations throughout the state to make Labor Day a yet unobtained deathless holiday. He said such a traffic record for a holiday in Texas would be recorded in the history books.

"I would like for every driver to realize that his chance of becoming a motorcade this holiday is greater than he would imagine. On an average throughout the 72-hour Labor Day period, we estimate that one fatality will occur in Texas every two-and-a-half hours; a traffic accident will occur every two-and-a-half minutes. This will be the rate of our accidents and fatalities if records of past holidays hold true."

Earlier the Texas Department of Public Safety had predicted that 29 persons would become motorcades during the three-day Labor Day holiday extending from 1201 a. m. August 30 through 11:59 p. m. Sept. 1. The state police organization has planned an extensive traffic law enforcement program for the holiday weekend, alerting all available patrolmen for an a-

round-the-clock vigil.

The Texas DPS has labeled its program "Operation Motorcade" and will run its usual count of traffic fatalities.

Operation Motorcade will be bolstered by a "Deathless Days" campaign conducted by the Texas Association of Broadcasters, "Crusade Child Safety" during September conducted by the Dairy Institute of Texas and special safety programs conducted by Kiwanis clubs throughout the state.

Garrison said that safe driving is a primary responsibility of every driver. In emphasizing the point, he said that if you are a driver, he is talking to you.

"Traffic accidents are generally regarded as happening to the other motorist; a person never considers that he may become the victim. But that time does come the instant before the impact of the tragedy."

His advice was to drive at speeds which you know are safe and to avoid situations that place you in conflict with pedestrians and other vehicles.

Cities To See

Biloxi, Mississippi's Vacation Spot



Highway and Beach—Biloxi, Miss.

RISE above the clear white sands of the nation's longest "man-made" beach, the century old lighthouse at Biloxi, Mississippi is an historic landmark well known to visitors from all over the country.

Biloxi, the oldest French city in the United States and once capital of the Louisiana Purchase Territory, was settled in 1699 by Pierre leMoine d'Iberville for King Louis XIV. Eight flags have flown over this deep-in-dixie city on a peninsula of the Gulf of Mexico. d'Iberville met the Biloxi Indians on his arrival on the front of Gulf Beach. Even though located on the Gulf of Mexico, the Biloxi Indians were members of the Sioux family and Biloxi, in Indian language, signifies, "The First People."

Modern-day Biloxi is a year-round vacation city, with luxurious hotels and motels. It is also a military town, the site of Kessler Air Force Base, "The Electronics Training Center of the Air Force." Population-wise, Biloxi is growing rapidly. The city, which now has over 37,000 population, has shown a gain of 114.2 per cent since 1940.

MODERN BEACH

Today a modern, four-lane highway follows the Biloxi shore line, only a few feet away from the 28-mile sand beach which extends from the Bay of Biloxi to Bay St. Louis.

The blue waters of the Gulf are not only a playground for boating enthusiasts and fishermen but as well an important factor in Biloxi's economy. The city is the

largest shrimp and oyster port in the world. Local fisheries operate more than 900 boats and employ 12,000 people.

Historic Spots

Interesting to Biloxi's many visitors are such historic spots as "Beauvoir," last home of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy; and Ship Island, 12 miles out in the Gulf, the harbor for French exploration and settlement from 1699 to 1720. During the War Between the States, Fort Massachusetts, completed by the Federal Government, was used as a prison under General Butler. Biloxi Lighthouse was erected in 1848, and painted black at the time of Lincoln assassination (to show the people's resentment and feeling against the fiendish act).

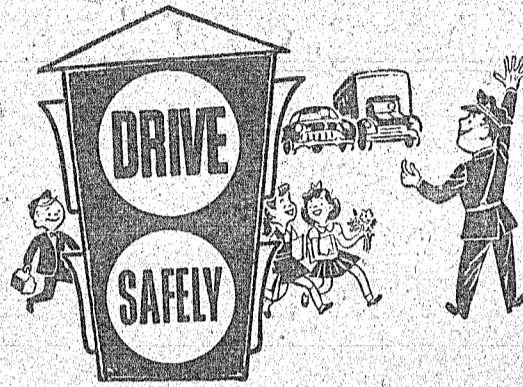
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**L. P. Jennings Rites

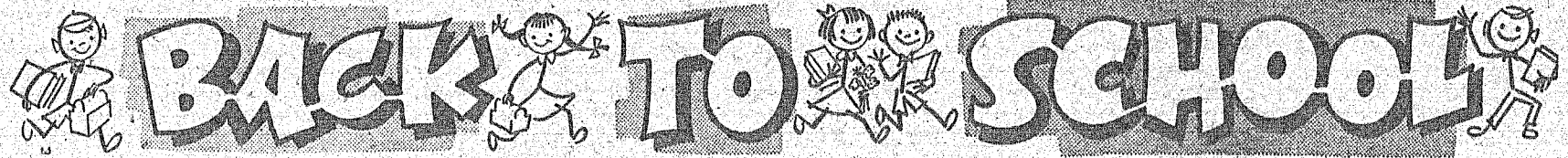
