

Mountaineers Lose First Game 34-0 To Comanche

The Comanche Indians took advantage of a considerable weight difference Friday night and defeated the Mountaineers 34-0 in the first game of the season for both teams. The Indians outweighed the Mountaineers about 35 to 40 pounds per man on the average, and during the last quarter scored three TDs and one extra point.

A good crowd of Mountaineer boosters was on hand and most were pleasantly surprised at the good showing the boys made during the first three quarters. There was no particularly outstanding one man for the local eleven, but all of them played an exceptionally good game. The score does not in any way actually indicate the kind of game this first one was.

The Mountaineers received several bad breaks throughout the game, and these helped the Indians considerably in their final score. The Indians also received numerous 15-yard penalties that probably kept them from scoring one or two more TDs.

In the first period the Mountaineers took the kickoff and drove to the Indian 45-yard line, then an apparent mix-up on signals caused a fumble and the Indians recovered. After 4 tries the ball went back to the Mountaineers and a quick kick on 2nd down put the Indians on their 29-yard line. After gaining only 5 yards, the Indians kicked to the Mountaineer 30-yard line and the ball was returned to the 40. A fumble on 3rd down gave the Indians the ball on the Mountaineer 44-yard line and the Indians drove to the Mountaineer 13-yard line when a fumble was recovered by the Mountaineers. A 5-yard penalty gave the Mountaineers a first down and five to go. The Indians intercepted a pass and as the quarter ended were on the Mountaineer 8-yard line.

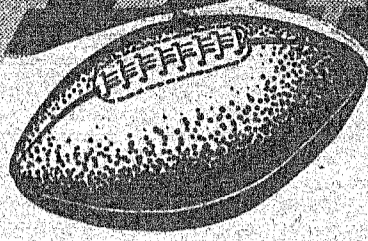
The second play in the second period saw Kenneth Henry go five yards for the first TD. The point-after was good for 2 points and the Indians led 8-0. Taking the kickoff, the Mountaineers made one first down, then attempting to punt, fumbled and the Indians recovered on the Mountaineer 41-yard line. The Indians made two first downs, then got a 15-yard penalty, lost a couple more yards then fumbled on the Mountaineer 27-yard line. Three attempts failed to gain the necessary yardage and the Mountaineers kicked to the Indian 36-yard line. A penalty sent the Indians back to their 27-yard line. After gaining a first down, another penalty sent them back to their 32-yard line. After three attempts the Indians punted to the Mountaineer 34-yard line and the ball was returned to the Indian 46-yard line. Failing to gain, the Mountaineers kicked after three downs. The half ended on the next play with the ball near midfield and the score 8-0 for the Indians.

The Indians took the kickoff to begin the third period and drove to the Mountaineer 25-yard line, were penalized to the 40. Four tries failed to gain the necessary yardage for a first down and the ball went to the Mountaineers on their 21-yard line. Attempting to kick out, the punt was blocked and the Indians ended up with the ball on the Mountaineer 10-yard line. On the second attempt, Lewis Sims went over from 9 yards out. Try for points after failed. After the kickoff, the Mountaineers completed a pass for 21 yards and their deepest penetration into Indian territory, to the 42-yard line. After losing ground on three tries, a fumble on the punt attempt gave the Indians the ball on the Mountaineer 44-yard line. The Indians made a first down, were penalized 15 yards and could not make up the loss, with the ball going over on the Mountaineer 27-yard line. On the first play a long pass was intercepted and the quarter ended with the ball in Indian possession on the Mountaineer 36-yard line.

Four plays in the final period saw Sims cross the goal line a gain and the point-after was good for two points. The Mountaineers took the kickoff, failed to make the needed 10 yards and kicked. Two 15-yard penalties put the Indians back to their 21-yard line. They kicked on 4th down and the Mountaineers returned the ball to their 48-yard line. A fumble on the next play gave the Indians the ball on the Mountaineer 36-yard line. The Indians made a first down and then were held for four downs, giving up the ball on the Mountaineer 14-yard line. A loss of yardage for three downs put the Mountaineers on their 10-yard line and a blocked punt gave the Indians the ball on the 4-yard line. One play brought the next score and the try for point-after.

THIS WEEK'S RECIPE
Tuna-Cranberry Sandwiches.
(Serves 4)
1 1/2 cans tuna, chunk style
1/4 cup soured cream
1 teaspoon grated onion
Dash of pepper
1/4 cup jellied cranberry sauce
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
3 slices buttered bread
1 tablespoon mayonnaise
Combine tuna, soured cream, onion and pepper; mix well. Combine cranberry sauce and celery; mix well. Spread 4 bread slices with mayonnaise. Top with cranberry sauce mixture. Spread tuna mixture on remaining slices and put the two halves together. Slice and serve.
