Mountaineers To Visit Cross Plains Friday Night

The Mountaineers will resume their non-conference schedule on Friday night after a weeks lay-off. They will visit the Cross Plains Buffalos. The game is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p. m. at Buffalo Stadium.

Cross Plains has lost three games this season and won one. They lost to Baird, DeLeon and Eastland and have won over Goldthwaite. They will be expected to put up one of their best attempts of the year to win over the Mountaineers.

The Mountaineers have also won only one game this year, over Menard, and have lost two games. However the local eleven is expected to put forth every effort to ice this game away. No paper comparison is available on the two teams as they have not yet played the same teams.

control of rats and mice in Coleman County got a good start the past few days, as the result of several meetings held over the county. V. R. Smith of the Department of Interior, Jack Brennan, County Agent, and Cecil Horne, president of the Farm Bureau, made meetings all over the county for four days in the interest of bringing the rodents under control. Mr. Smith said he was very well pleased with the cooperation and stated that more people actually attended the meetings in Coleman County than attended the meetings in Taylor County. He expressed his appreciation to the residents of the county for their cooperation in getting the program underway.

The program got underway last Thursday. The group had 2600 pounds of an anti-coagulant type poison and it was sold out before the day was over. During the other meetings orders were placed for about 5000 pounds more of the poison and this is on order. The poison is due to arrive in a week to 10 days. It will be handled by the Farm Bureau in Coleman and in Santa Anna it will be handled by the Chamber of Commerce office. As soon as the poison arrives, it will be announced. This poison is available only to those who attended the meetings. The same type poison is available through commercial outlets.

Every family in the county is urged to participate in the program, to make it as successful as possible. Unless about 100 per cent cooperation is realized, the county cannot be rid of the rats and mice. Smith said the infestation we are suffering now is likely to be mild to what it will be in 30 to 60 days. Some rats and mice reproduce in 26 days with litters of from 6 to 12. Their young can reproduce in 45 days. In order to kill them out, it is a job for everyone concerned. Smith said this poison should

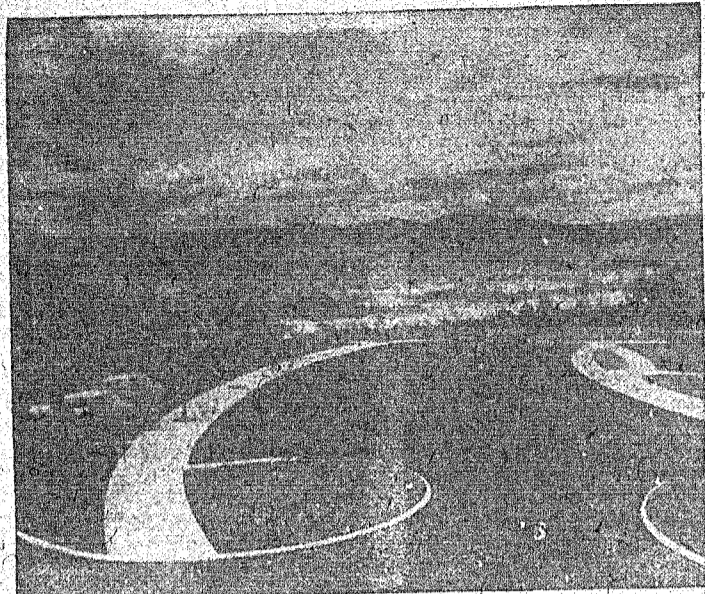

Cities To See

Middlesboro, Kentucky

One of the few Kentucky cities built on the original "Wilderness Road," Middlesboro occupies a prominent place in the history of the nation. Incorporated in 1890, Middlesboro was an English community established with English capital.

The Cumberland Gap Pass is known to every student of American history. It was here that the first news when the cooperating states of Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia showed about 20,000 troops in 1792 the establishment of Cumberland Gap National Historical Park.

The Cumberland Gap Pass is the most significant physical feature of the famous Wilderness Road which opened Kentucky to Revolutionary times. The altitude of the pass is about 1,600 feet above sea level, about 1,000 feet lower than the two portals in the Cumberland Mountains along the path which it passes. In 1779, Dr. Thomas Walker and a group of surveyors came from Virginia and built a log cabin on the Cumberland River—the first cabin erected in Kentucky. Daniel Boone first passed through the Gap in 1769. Boone and a party of 30 men cut out the road from Cumberland Gap to a settlement on the Kentucky River at Boonesboro. George Rogers Clark used the road in coming out of Kentucky to recruit supplies and men for his expedition

against the British and Indians. In 1827, a visiting Canadian lumberman, Alex. A. Arthur, interested in the English capital in the steel industry of that country in the Cumberland Gap area. A syndicate purchased 60,000 acres of land, built Middlesboro, named for Middlesboro, England, and \$29,000,000 was poured into the area in the development of railroads, the big tunnel underneath Cumberland Gap and a playground for tourists at nearby Harrogate, Tenn., which became a famous spa of the South. English capital failed in 1832, and with the panic of 1833, so did the development of the area. The story of this boom and collapse is one of the most fantastic and exciting in the annals of American industry.

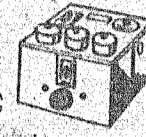

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I employ farm labor. When should I report wages I pay them?

A. In January after the year in which you paid the wages. The reports are made once a year, not quarterly. If you pay a laborer \$150 in the year, the wages are covered by social security. If he works for you for 20 or more days in the year on a time basis (by hour, day, week, or month), the work is also covered even though you pay him less than \$150 in the year.

Q. I am 67 and am drawing social security benefits. If I return to work, when and how do I report so that my benefit payments stop?

A. If at any time during the year you are working for wages of more than \$80 in a month or are rendering substantial services in self-employment, and you expect your total earnings for the year to be more than \$1200, notify the Social Security Office at once.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

The age of keeping family records in the Bible or on the calendar is about past. Good records are a must with modern business. This record business is also awfully important when it comes to determining how much tax you will pay each year. "The Tax Guide for Small Business", prepared by the Internal Revenue Service, devotes several chapters to the importance of keeping records. "The Farmers' Tax Guide" devotes several chapters of advice to farmers on keeping good records. The Texas Extension Service and their very capable staff of County Agents spend a great deal of time working with farmers on better records. The Small Business Administration has prepared a number of free publications for business owners on keeping records. If you don't have some sort of record on your personal deductions for income tax purposes, it is probably costing you money. A calendar record still beats no record at all, however, a simple set of books is a definite family need for most of us nowadays.

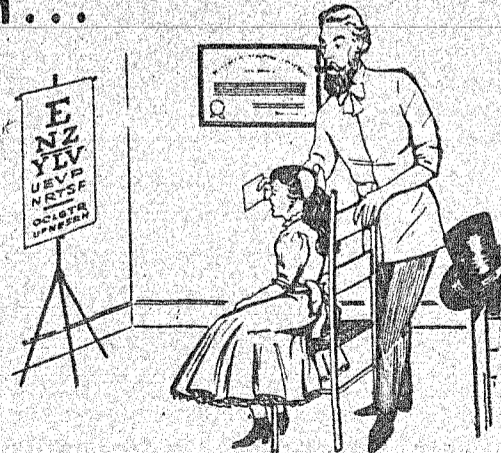

Teaching Taxes Being Taught In Some Public Schools

Two T's have been added to the three R's. Teaching Taxes, the Internal Revenue Service's contribution to the cause of education has grown during the last several years into a nationwide, carefully planned detailed study of Federal taxes. The program has found a ready welcome in Texas.

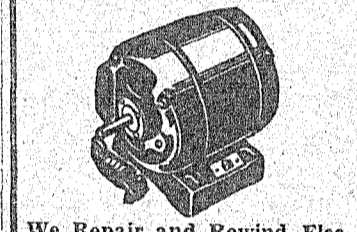
V. W. Newman, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood Internal Revenue Service office, stated, "Last year 1600 high school and college teachers used the Teaching Taxes course to train approximately 49,577 students in the Dallas District in North Texas. This program is in use in most of the schools in our area. The program is now taught in some 22,000 high schools and many colleges in the United States; at larger military and naval installations and other localities."

Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director, mailed a letter on Sept. 2, 1958, to 1101 high school principals inviting them to order the free instruction kits for this school year. The Internal Revenue Service instruction kits will not be available until December. Most schools schedule them for instruction to coincide with the Internal Revenue Service's filing season, January to mid-April. Orders are being placed now, however, by interested teachers and principals in order to assure availability of the material.

Interested teachers needing information concerning this program should contact Chief, Administration Division, Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, Texas, for order blanks and other help, according to Mr. Newman.

Coffield pointed out that each star has agreed to make a benefit personal performance in order to help swell the prisoners' welfare fund which provides necessary services not furnished by the state.

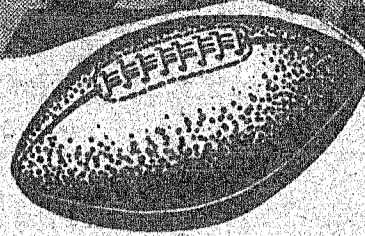

"Our 'Shower of stars' plus the performance of devil-may-care inmate riders," Coffield added, "assures rodeo fans of a show they'll not find elsewhere."

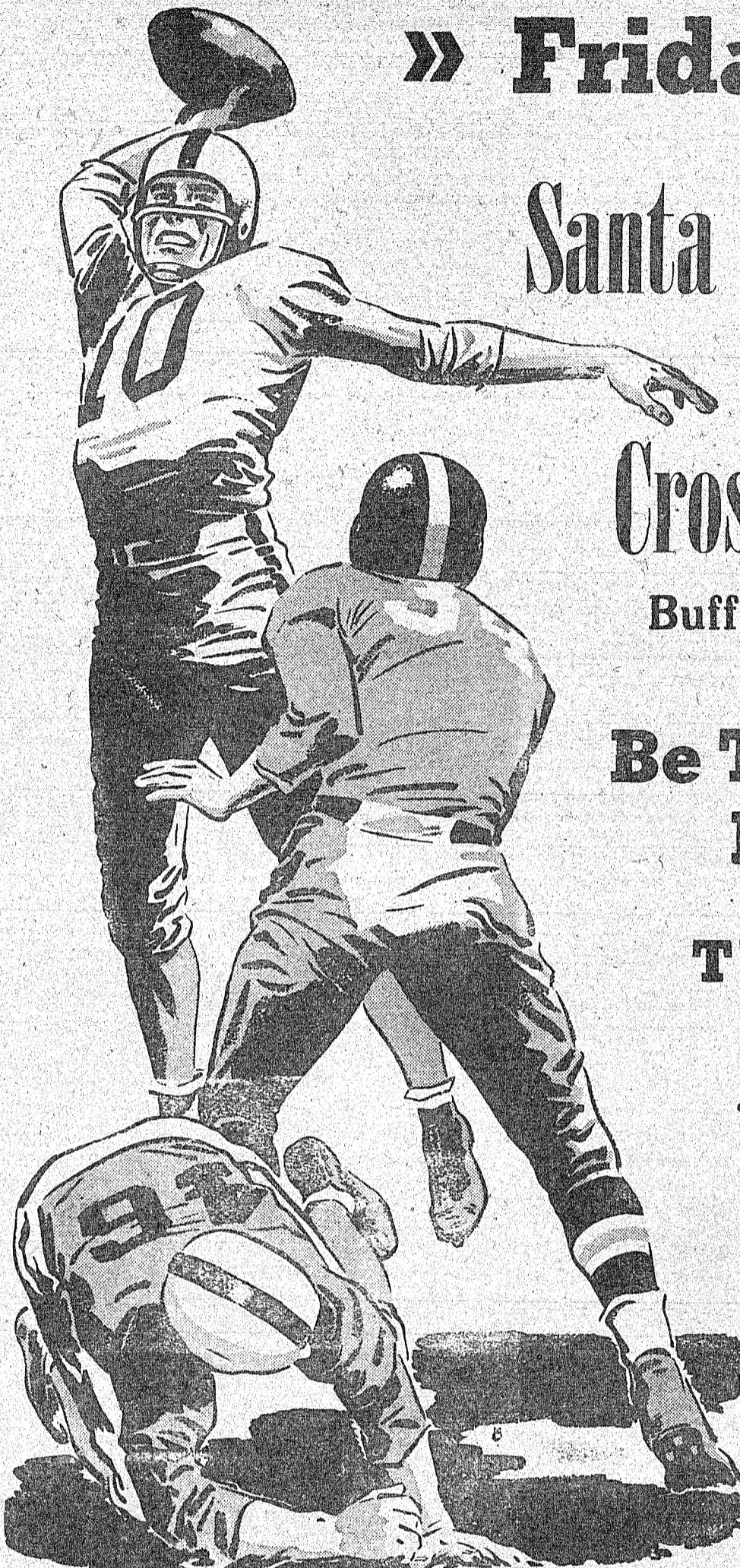

About Your HEALTH

Texas' senior citizens stand to get a better shake in nursing homes as far as care, safety and comfort are concerned, with the latest action from the State Board of Health.

Revisions in existing "standards for nursing and care homes" were adopted by board members at their recent quarterly meeting in Austin. More than 9,000 elderly persons residing in 560 licensed nursing homes in Texas stand to benefit from improved nursing care.

The board's action will prevent future applicants for state licenses from using existing buildings as nursing homes unless electrical wiring conforms to national electrical codes and unless all walls and materials are capable of resisting fire for at least one hour. Too, roofs must be constructed of non-combustible material and the building's heating system must be vented.

The new standards also discourage occupancy of upper floors of multi-storied homes unless they are equipped with automatic sprinkling systems. New nursing home construction or remodeling plans must be submitted to the State Department of Health for review and approval, according to the Board of Health's new rulings. In new construction, private rooms must contain at least 100 square feet of floor space, and at least 72 feet must be devoted to each bed in wards or multi-bed rooms.

The revised standards require that nursing home laundry rooms be separated and screened with washing machines connected to sewer systems. Invoices must be kept on foods purchased for patients. The new code asks that daily meals include the basic foods contained in "Texas Food Standard", prepared by the Texas Nutrition Council.

Other provisions set up in the new standards are aimed at keeping the State Department of Health informed as to the policies concerning the operation of the homes. This will include information on types of patients, restrictive rules and charges or refunds.

The upgrading of nursing homes standards is the aim of the new standards. All future applicants for state licenses to operate nursing or care homes are required to be graduates of an accredited high school or show proof of attaining the equivalent. Licensed physicians, registered nurses or licensed vocational nurses are exempt from this ruling.

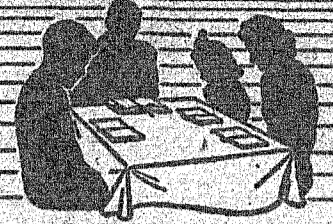
These basic changes in existing state standards went into effect in September upon their adoption by the State Board of Health. Information on the new standards may be obtained from Texas State Department of Health.

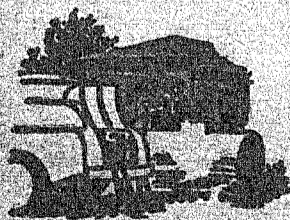
