The observance was held in the Coleman City Park, where Mr. and Mrs. Taylor and their children met for a dinner in the Replica building and a reception from 2 to 5 p. m.

Mrs. Taylor is the former Miss Willie Mae Morgan, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Morgan. Mr. Taylor is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Taylor.

The couple were married at Menlow, in Hill County, Texas, July 28, 1898, while seated in a buggy and those attending were also seated in a buggy.

Elder C. R. Nichol, a Church of Christ minister, officiated.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor came to Coleman County in 1904 and have remained. They lived on their farm near Santa Anna for more than 50 years and have lived in Santa Anna several years. Their home is located on Jefferson Street.

Eleven children were born to the Taylors, two of them dying in infancy. One daughter, Fay, a twin with Ray, died January 24, 1933, at age 26. The eight living children were all present for the observance.

Postal Rate Increase Goes Into Effect Friday

New postal rates voted by Congress recently will go into effect Friday, August 1. The new rates will affect every patron of the post office.

The major change will be the increase of one cent an ounce in first class mail, postal cards, drop letters and air mail postage. Regular first class mail will increase from 3 cents to 4 cents an ounce; drop letters (letters mailed that do not leave the post office for delivery) increase from 2 cents to 3 cents an ounce; postal cards increase from 2 cents to 3 cents; air mail letters increase from 6 cents to 7 cents an ounce; and air mail postal cards increase from 4 cents to 5 cents.

Third class mail rates will also increase. Third class mail usually consists of circulars and merchandise, and will increase to 3 cents for the first 2 ounces and 1½ cents for each additional ounce.

Second Class mail, which is mostly composed of newspapers and other periodicals, will also increase.

The new 4 cent stamp will bear a likeness of Abraham Lincoln and will be printed in purple ink. The new air mail stamp will be printed in blue and will have a picture of a jet airplane. Post cards will have an imprinted stamp with a Statue of Liberty design. All new stamps will go on sale at post office windows across the nation Friday.

Another change in mail regulations which went into effect recently is on Air Mail packages for overseas delivery. Formerly the weight was limited to two pounds. The new regulation increases the weight up to 70 pounds.

Telephone Co-op Gets Go Ahead On Burkett Purchase

The Rural Electrification Administration has approved plans of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc., for the purchase of the Burkett Telephone Company.

This approval provides also for the rebuilding of the Burkett and Santa Anna exchanges and their conversion to dial operation.

Completion of this project will give the cooperative 100% dial operation within its system. The cooperative will then have toll-free service between adjacent exchanges of the system. Other exchanges are at Mozelle, Rockwood and Trickham. Funds are released first for the purchase of the Burkett Company. Advances will be made for the rebuilding of lines and purchase of switching equipment as soon as the title to the Burkett property is approved by the Washington officials.

The cooperative hopes to have the new Burkett exchange in operation in about twelve months. Conversation of the Santa Anna Exchange will likely require six to twelve months longer due to the time required to manufacture the dial equipment for this larger exchange.

It is expected that new lines in the rural areas of the Santa Anna exchange can be placed in operation several months prior to the installation of dial equipment.

Central Colorado Soil Conservation District News

August 16 is the election date set by the directors of the water control and improvement district being formed by land owners in the Mukewater watershed. The election was ordered to determine final approval of the water district. Fifty-two landowners in Mukewater watershed had petitioned the Commissioners' Court earlier to create a water district which would enable them to carry out their responsibilities in applying a watershed treatment program for flood prevention. The election will be held at Trickham on Saturday, August 16.

Directors of the Water District include W. L. Vaughn, president; W. P. McClatchey, vice president; J. H. Martin, secretary; Rankin McIver, member; and Casey Herring, member. The group met at Trickham July 21, with J. W. Vance and Eldon Knox, supervisors of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District. Vance is the soil conservation district representative on the Mukewater watershed program.

A good seed crop of Johnson grass is in wide-spread prospect in the area. Many cooperators have stated their intentions of harvesting sufficient seed for replanting thin stands in new areas where it is desired to establish the grass. Johnsongrass is a strong perennial forage plant, though some growers have had difficulty maintaining the plant under grazing conditions with sheep. It is considered to have little use except on cropland where some tillage can be given.

Tom Cowan, who owns a farm in the Echo community, reported he plans to seed his new tank dam to Texas Winter Grass with hay and seed sarked from a nearby producing area. Texas Winter Grass makes an excellent cover for tank dams as well as affording excellent protection for water courses that need perennial vegetation established.

Authur Eppler, who operates the Byers farm in the Shields area, has planned a new stock water supply. The new pond is planned to be fenced so as to water livestock from five separate grazing areas. Permanent grazing will be developed on cropland to enable him to defer grazing of native pastures. Also, Dr. H. H. Greenlee, who ranches in the Rockwood area, has planned an additional stock water supply that will be fenced to afford water to two separate areas, one of which is a 128-acre field of blue panic grass.

Voters - Attention

In this issue of The News appears the full text of one of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election, Nov. 4. So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the nine amendments follows:

Number One On The Ballot—(HJR 1) — Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

Number Two On The Ballot — (SJR 6) — Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

Number Three On The Ballot—(HJR 30) — Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

Number Four On The Ballot—(HJR 31) — Provides that any District, County or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

Number Five On The Ballot—(HJR 48) — Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

Number Six On The Ballot — (HJR 17) — Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

Number Seven On The Ballot—(SJR 4) — Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

Number Eight on the Ballot—(HJR 36) — Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

Number Nine On The Ballot—(SJR 3) — Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas, and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Tex.

Walter Holt and Earl Hardy are paired for a run off in the race for County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, as the result of voting in the First Primary Election Saturday. Holt took first place in the voting with 321 votes in the precinct, while Hardy ran a close second with 294 votes, only 27 behind. The third man in the race, Jesse Williams of the Shields Community, received 157 votes.

Hardy has previously served as County Commissioner from this precinct and was defeated by Holt four years ago by a margin of only 18 votes.

In the only other Commissioners race in the county, Ralph Brown won over his opponent by a big majority in Precinct No. 4.

The only county wide contested race was for County Treasurer, Monte Gideon of Coleman won over C. C. Burkett in a fairly close race. Gideon polled 1539 votes to 1394 for Burkett. In other county races, G. A. (Tode) Hensley was re-elected District Clerk; Frank Lewis was elected County Judge; Lee F. Craig was re-elected County Clerk; D. E. Loveless was re-elected County Superintendent of Public Instruction; and Lewis H. Jobe was re-elected County Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee. In Justice Precincts, Earl Erick, Sr. was re-elected in Precinct No. 7, and Barclay Martin was re-elected in Precinct No. 1.

In the race for District Attorney of the 35th Judicial District, Gordon Griffin, Jr., of Brownwood, won over Joe B. Dibrell, Jr., of Coleman. With all returns complete but a few from McCullough County, Griffin had

6,835 votes to 4,686 for Dibrell. By counties, Griffin polled 4,346 in Brown; 1,202 in Coleman; and 1,287 in McCullough. Dibrell polled 3,210 in Brown, 1,861 in Coleman, and 615 in McCullough County.

In the race for State Representative of the 77th District, A. J. Bishop, Jr., of Winters, was re-elected by a good majority. His opponent, Parker Nunley of Coleman, carried Coleman County by a 1,913 vote to 1,118 votes for Bishop. However, Bishop carried the other three counties in the district by good majorities.

So far as state races went, there seems to be only one race that was not settled in the first primary, and that was for Place No. 1 on the Supreme Court Robert W. Hamilton of El Paso received 450,781 votes while his nearest opponent, J. Edwin Smith of Houston, received 293,819 votes. The third man in the race, Wilmer B. Hunt of Houston, received 287,971.

In other state races, Governor Price Daniel amassed 763,238 votes to 506,488 for his three opponents. State Senator Henry Gonzales outpolled W. Lee O'Daniel for second place and Joe Irwin of Dallas was in fourth place.

Ralph Yarborough outpolled William A. Blakley of Dallas by more than 200,000 votes. Yarborough polled 724,853 votes to 509,230 for Blakley. Ben Ramsey won over his opponent by more than 300,000 votes; Bill Alcorn won over his opponent by almost 400,000 votes; and John White polled 551,567 votes to 486,284 for two opponents. All other candidates on the ballot were unopposed and of course each won by votes.

All figures quoted are from unofficial returns.



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
 HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section "H" of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section H. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby.

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any general, special or primary election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled.

"A municipality providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect all of the members of the governing body by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT A HOME RULE CITY MAY PROVIDE BY CHARTER OR CHARTER AMENDMENT, AND A CITY, TOWN OR VILLAGE OPERATING UNDER THE GENERAL LAWS MAY PROVIDE BY MAJORITY VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED VOTERS VOTING AT AN ELECTION CALLED FOR THAT PURPOSE, FOR A LONGER TERM OF OFFICE THAN TWO (2) YEARS FOR ITS OFFICERS, EITHER ELECTIVE OR APPOINTIVE, OR BOTH, BUT NOT TO EXCEED FOUR (4) YEARS; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT TENURE UNDER CIVIL SERVICE SHALL NOT BE AFFECTED HEREBY. AND PROVIDING FOR AUTOMATIC RESIGNATION WHEN SUCH OFFICERS BECOME A CANDIDATE FOR ELECTION TO ANOTHER OFFICE AND PROVIDING FOR ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF SUCH MUNICIPALITIES AND THE FILLING OF VACANCIES OCCURRING ON SUCH GOVERNING BODY BY SPECIAL ELECTION."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

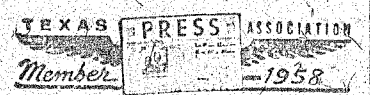

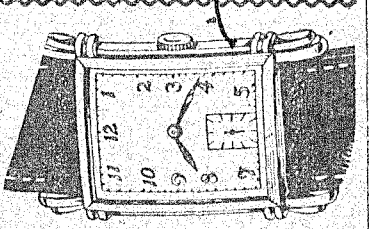

Our **WASHINGTON** Letter

By Congressman **O. C. FISHER**

SMALL BUSINESS had a good week in Congress last week. Two bills were passed, one giving estates the right to make 10 annual installment payments of inheritance tax, the other accelerated depreciation write-offs of equipment costs. The latter would also apply to farmers. Actually, these measures are more accurately described as tax postponements rather than relief items. But they should ease hardship problems considerable. Both had my support.

RECIPROCAL TRADE extension was assured last week by Senate passage of the House-approved bill, with some minor changes. Designed to facilitate trade negotiations and policies with foreign countries, this legislation contains no protection for domestic industries that are plagued by the dumping of low-cost competitive products on our markets. A good many of us felt some procedural safeguards should be included to enable a domestic industry to have a "day in court" for an objective and factual determination of its complaints.

A WOOL BILL, to extend the present wool program, which expires next Spring, gained hope for approval at this session when the Senate included the extension in an omnibus farm measure that was approved last Friday. It is now up to the House Agriculture Committee to act, and the outlook is fairly favorable.
