Three Generations Of Wiggers Preach For Baptist Churches

Harry C. Wigger, the father, has been preaching for 29 years, serving churches in Missouri, Indiana and Texas. W. M. Wigger, the grandfather, is retiring from active pastoral duties after preaching for half a century in Texas and Missouri.

Postal Increases Go Into Effect Friday, August 1st

The general public is reminded that on August 1, many classes of mails will increase in cost. Letters and all other first class mail will increase from the present rate of 3 cents an ounce to 4 cents an ounce; postal cards will go up to 3 cents, air mail stamps from 6 cents to 7 cents. Postal rates have been revised slightly, and in some cases small parcels will go at a lower rate than at present.

Local drop letters will increase from 2 cents to 3 cents.

All mail postmarked on or before July 31 will go at the present rate, but any mail after July 31 must have the increased amount of postage.

Now's A Good Time To Check Up On Your Social Security Money

Workers and self-employed people are encouraged to check their social security accounts at least once every three years according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager at Abilene.

This may be done easily with a pre-printed and addressed postal card furnished free of charge by all social security offices. Just insert your own name, social security number, date of birth and mailing address before signing, stamping, and mailing the card to the central accounting office in Baltimore, Maryland.

Tuley pointed out that each person should make sure his account is correct because the amount of future benefits to him or his survivors is based on the wages or self-employment income posted to his social security account. If an error or an employer's failure to report wages is discovered within three years, quick corrective action can be taken. After three years, it is more difficult and sometimes impossible to correct an account because of the statute of limitations and other factors.

The Social Security Administration maintains approximately 125 million separate individual accounts and has an index of nearly 5 million employers. Most of the huge job of posting all the accounts is done by advanced automation techniques. The postings of these accounts are almost fool-proof, Tuley stated, but sometimes an employer fails to report some wages or reports them under an incorrect social security number. Also, self-employed people occasionally report their income under an incorrect number or even without a number. Any of these might cause an error in an account.

Since so much depends on your account being correct, you should keep a record of your income each year and check your account regularly to make sure it is correct. The handy card for doing this may be secured by writing the Social Security office, Abilene, Texas.

Voss To Concho County Line Farm Road Approved

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm-to-Market Road 2134 in Coleman County was awarded in Austin this week, Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood has announced. The firm of E. M. Bailey, Contractor, Ltd., Abilene, submitted the low bid of \$136,335.23 on the project which runs from FM Road 566, 1.0 mile south of Voss, Southwest to Concho County Line, a distance of 7.6 miles.

Resident Engineer Eric C. Mayo, Sr., of Coleman, will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 120 days to complete.

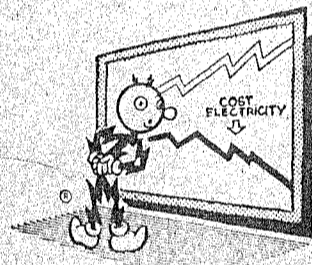

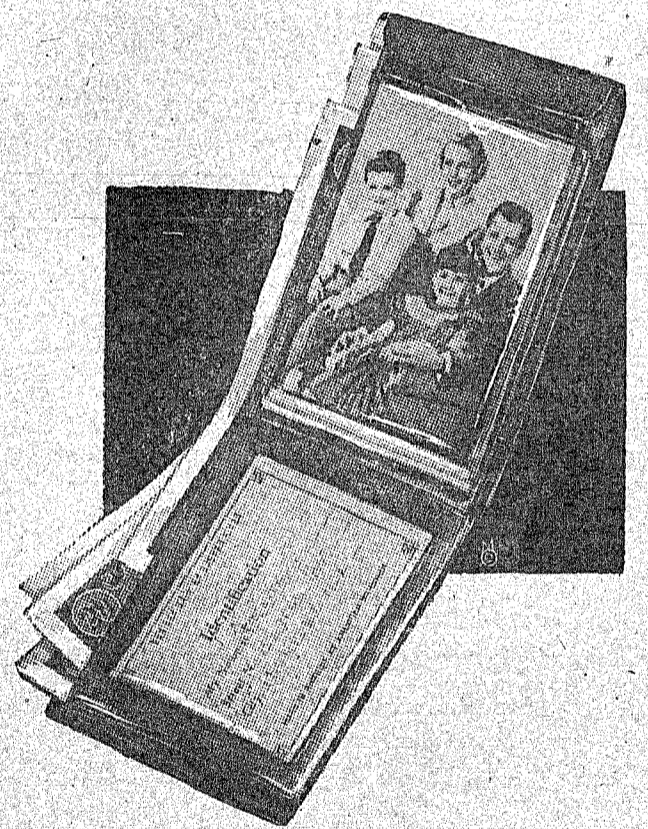

Central Colorado Soil Conservation District News

Directors of the new water control and improvement district that is being created by landowners in the Mukewater watershed, have completed re-

quirements for qualifying as directors. Officers of the board consist of: W. L. Vaughn, president; W. P. McClatchey, vice president; and J. H. Martin, secretary and treasurer. Other members are Casey Herring and Rankin McIver.

At a joint meeting with supervisors of the soil conservation district held July 14, Mr. Vaughn announced that a meeting of the water district directors would be held at Trickham Community House on July 21, to discuss further plans for applying the watershed protection program to Mukewater. An election date is expected to be announced whereby landowners will vote to determine final approval of the water control and improvement district.

The Brown-Mills SCD has reported that landowners in the Brown County portion of Mukewater watershed have approved a petition and presented it to their Commissioners Court for creation of a water control and improvement district. A substantial part of the planned watershed treatment program for Mukewater lies in Brown County.

Leon Copeland, District Supervisor in the Lawn area, reported landowners in the Upper Jim Ned watershed will present a petition to the Taylor County Commissioners Court at its next meeting to ask for the creation of a water control and improvement district. Copeland stated that more than 40 landowners had already signed the petition. C. M. Garrett, District Supervisor in the Cross Plains area, announced that landowners in Turkey Creek Watershed are circulating petitions in both Brown and Callahan counties to get water control and improvement districts created. These petitions are expected to be completed and presented to the Commissioners Court of each county at an early date.

These watersheds are being made ready by local people to participate in the USDA Water-

shed Protection and Flood Prevention Program. Local sponsors must show financial ability to operate and maintain the works of improvement, provide easements and rights of way, have 50% of the acreage above structures under basic conservation plan with a goodly portion of the practices applied. Other watersheds are in the talking stage of preparing to participate in the program. District supervisors are anxious to assist any watershed group to start preparing their watershed for planning.

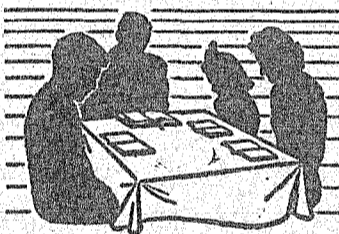

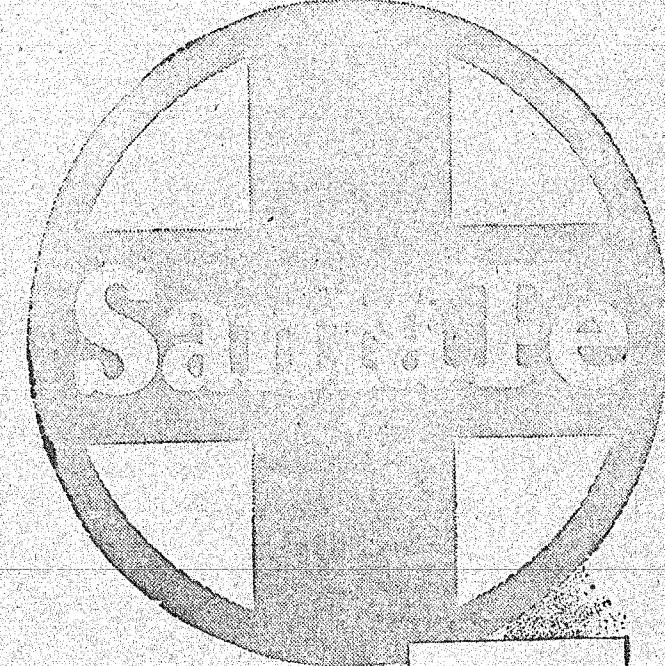
