Funeral services for Mrs. Paul Van Dalsem of Santa Anna were held in the Stevens Memorial Chapel in Coleman at 10:00 a. m. Friday, Oct. 31. Rev. J. W. Burgett of Weatherford, Pastor of the Weatherford Presbyterian Church and a former pastor of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Henry Jongema of Runge. Mrs. Van Dalsem died at her home here Thursday, Oct. 30, after being in ill health for several months.

Nancy Boyd was born to Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Boyd in Arkansas, December 19, 1874. The family moved to Johnson County, Texas where they made their home for several years, moving to Santa Anna in 1882, where the family home has been since. Nancy was a student in the first school established in Santa Anna.

She was married to Paul J. Van Dalsem December 28, 1904, and they made their home in Santa Anna. Eighty-three years of age, Mrs. Van Dalsem had lived in Santa Anna 76 years of her life. She became a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in early life, and remained in that faith to the end. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

Survivors include the husband of Santa Anna; and six sisters, Miss Blanche Boyd of Big Lake, Mrs. Eron Wilson of El Paso, Mrs. Jennie Oakes of Santa Anna, Miss Lena Boyd, a missionary in India, Mrs. Henry Jongema of Ranger, and Mrs. Louise McCaughan of Abilene. A number of nieces and nephews also survive.

256 Votes Cast In General Election

A total of 256 votes were cast in the General Election in Santa Anna Tuesday. The Democrats carried all the way through with all of them receiving big majorities. The North Ward cast 136 votes and the South Ward cast 126 votes. This is the first time in many years the North Ward has cast more votes than the South Ward.

In a write-in campaign for Constable that developed during the last few days before the election, M. R. (Bud) Simmons, presently serving as City Marshal and Deputy Sheriff, received 145 votes to 8 votes for Joe Sealy Price. Others receiving write-in votes were Ray Owen, 2 votes; and George Johnson, 1 vote. Johnson and Owen were not in the campaign.

So far as Santa Anna was concerned, none of the proposed amendments passed. No. 3 on the ballot passed by one vote (49 to 48) in the South Ward, but in the North Ward No. 3 was defeated 90 to 39 votes. On all the other proposals they were defeated by big majorities.

Special European Duty Offered U. S. Army Enlistees

European duty is offered qualified men through a special U. S. Army "Gyroscope" enlistment, M.Sgt. Leonard M. Evans announced today.

Qualified men have a choice of joining one of the two "Gyroscope" units for duty in Europe. They are the 1st Battle Group, 7th Infantry, 3rd Infantry Division (Replacement Packet), and the 1st Howitzer Battalion, 36th Artillery (Replacement Packet).

These enlistment options are open to both non-prior and prior service personnel who qualify. Prior service personnel will not be accepted in grades above private first class.

Men enlisting for the 1st Battle Group, 7th Infantry, will receive training at Fort Jackson, S. C., before going overseas. Enlistees for the 1st Howitzer Battalion, 36th Artillery, will train at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas. Upon completion of training, all men will join their units on duty in Europe.

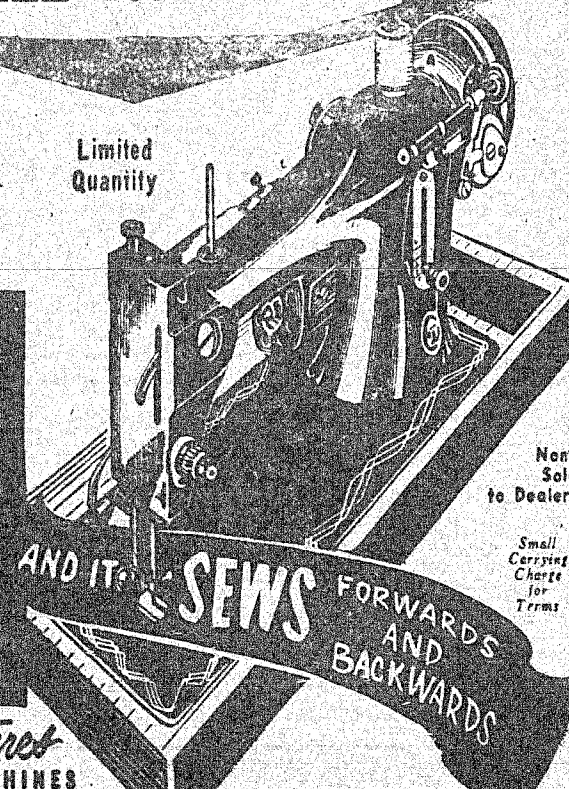

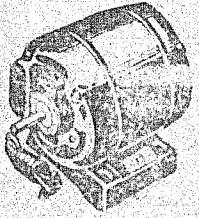
SECOND QUARTER
