Mrs. J. T. Oakes, Pioneer Resident, Buried Monday

Funeral services for Mrs. Lora E. Oakes, 71, were held at the Presbyterian Church at 4:00 p. m. Monday, Nov. 17. Mrs. Oakes died at the Coleman Hospital about 1:30 p. m. Sunday, after suffering a heart attack earlier that morning. Dr. Ben H. Moore, pastor of the church, officiated.

Lora E. Williams was the youngest child of John W. and Molly Turner Williams, early day pioneer residents of Santa Anna. She was born in Grayson County December 12, 1886 and would have been 72 years of age in less than a month. She came to Santa Anna with her parents in 1888 and has lived in this immediate area since that time. On June 13, 1907 she was married to J. Turner Oakes. The family lived for about three years in the Cleveland Community and have lived in their home two miles north of town since 1925.

Mrs. Oakes became a member of the Presbyterian Church in early girlhood and has remained faithful all her years. After raising a family of four boys and four girls, she taught the beginners class at the church for many years. A stained glass window was dedicated to Mr. and Mrs. Oakes when they observed the Golden Wedding Anniversary last year.

A quiet, soft-spoken lady, she and her husband have gained a large number of friends over the years.

Survivors include the husband, J. T. Oakes Sr., of Santa Anna; four daughters, Mrs. Veva McClellan of Santa Anna, Mrs. Era Walters of Washington, D. C., Mrs. Charlotte Wojtek of Robert Lee, and Mrs. Louise Konz of San Antonio; four sons, Lenton Oakes of Brownwood, J. T. Oakes Jr., of Baton Rouge, La., Vernon Oakes of Hobbs, N. M., and Fred Oakes of Fort Worth; and two sisters, Mrs. L. L. Simpson of San Antonio and Mrs. W. F. Holt of Abilene. Eighteen grandchildren and three great-grandchildren also survive. One daughter, Novelle, died in 1917 at the age of three years.

All the immediate members of the family were present for the services with the exception of six grandchildren.

Fifty dollars in merchandise will be given away Saturday, Nov. 22, if the person whose name is drawn from the tumbler is present and answers when his or her name is called. Campaign To Rid Town Of Stray Dogs Underway

Numerous complaints received by City Officials during recent weeks have resulted in a plan to rid the town of stray or unwanted dogs. The program will get underway Monday, December 1st.

Stray dogs have caused considerable damage to several sheep herds and turkey farms in this area recently, and are causing other disturbances over town.

Dog owners who value their dogs or want to keep them, should have the dogs vaccinated against rabies, take the vaccination certificate to the City Hall and purchase a City License tag. If this tag is on the dog and is current, the dog will not be picked up as a stray.

A City Ordinance requires all dogs running loose in town to be vaccinated and to be licensed. In order to buy a license, you must present the Certificate of Vaccination to the City Secretary and pay \$1.00 for the dog tag.

Beginning Monday, Dec. 1, everyone who sees a stray dog, or who has dogs bothering them, is requested to call the City Hall and report the dog. As soon as possible, someone will come and pick the dog up and take it to the pound at the City Hall. All dogs picked up will be kept in the pound for three days, and if not claimed in that time, they will be disposed of. In order for an owner to claim a dog from the pound, he must pay for his keep for the time he is in the pound, plus his vaccination and dog license.

The cooperation of every citizen in this area is needed in order to keep the stray dog situation under control.

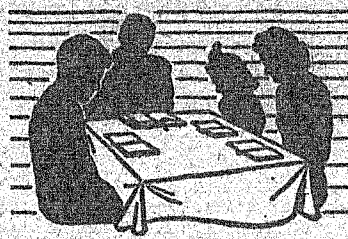

Mail Early For Christmas Asks P. M. Strother

Postmaster Lee Strother said today, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early For Christmas' Campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record."

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully — make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message.

whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-to-date.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Strother reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails through on time. He is making many advance preparations to handle the 1958 Christmas mail rush, with extra mail clerks, carriers, and expanded facilities all around.

Speaking further about his plans, the Postmaster said, "With over 170,000,000 people in the U. S. A. today, that means more Christmas mail than ever before, and that's why the Post Office needs your help in planning your Christmas mailings well in advance."

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10th, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15th, or at least a week before Christmas.

The gift book is an entirely new item, providing a useful, attractive, and inexpensive gift for the youngster who "has everything." Size 4" x 2", the book cover is in red, white, and blue, picturing Uncle Sam wrapping a huge gift, with the wording: "A Gift of U. S. Savings Stamps" and the customary "To" and "From" lines. While especially appropriate at the Christmas season, the gift books are for all-year-round use.

Savings Stamps are accumulated in a special album, available free at all post offices. Filled albums may be exchanged for Savings Bonds at any bank.

More than one hundred million Savings Stamps were sold last year, at a total value of nearly \$20 million. Many of these sales were made through weekly Stamp Day plans in schools enrolling more than a million students. Many additional schools are in process of installing the Savings Stamp plan this fall, the Treasury reported.

G. I. Insurance Holders Can Add Low Cost Disability

Opportunity for veterans holding National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) to buy a low cost new type of total disability income rider for their GI policies is now open, Dr. George T. McMahan, Manager of the VA Center in Waco, said today.

Under the new type rider, policyholders who become totally disabled from any cause, before age 60, and while their rider is in effect, will receive an income of \$10 per month for each \$1,000 face amount of their GI policies.

Previous maximum was \$5 per month. Those with the old type rider can get the new at a slight extra cost and a physical examination, except a limited number of service-disabled veterans who were sold the original rider since April, 1951.

Although a physical examination is required, policyholders may be examined by local physicians, provided VA medical application forms are used.

Information and forms are available at any of the VA Contact Offices in Waco, Austin, Brownwood or Corsicana, and from Contact Representatives at VA Hospitals in Temple and Maflin.

Annual Livestock Survey Starting

Postmaster Lee Strother announced today that Rural Mail Carriers will begin distributing December 1, 1958, Livestock Survey Cards to patrons on their routes about November 20.

This annual livestock survey, which your Post Office and Agriculture Departments cooperatively have made since 1924, provides basic information to the Texas Crop and Livestock Service in Austin for estimating number of cattle, hogs, sheep and chickens on Texas farms and ranches.

Voters Make Seven Changes In State Constitution

Final outcome (from unofficial returns) of voting on proposed constitutional amendments resulted in these changes:

1. Appointees to vacated county judge and justice of the peace posts may serve only until the next general election - not for the remainder of a four-year term.
2. Precinct, county and district office holders may not announce for another office without resigning the office they hold.
3. Cities may elect their officials for four-year, instead of two-year terms.
4. Former Texas Rangers or their widows may receive pensions up to \$80 a month.
5. State funds may be spent to advertise Texas outside the state.
6. Legislature may pass a law providing medical care assistance for people receiving old age

pensions, aid to the blind, disabled or dependent children.

7. Legislature may authorize the creation of new hospital districts in Potter, Wichita and Jefferson counties.

On the other hand, when Texans put their foot on the proposal for annual sessions and \$7,500 annual salaries for legislators, it meant lawmakers would face next year's tough taxing session with only 120 "pay days." Lawmakers will have to get along on \$25 a day for the first 120 days and then their pay stops except when special sessions are called by the governor. Also turned down was a proposal to set up pension plans for elective officials of counties and precincts.

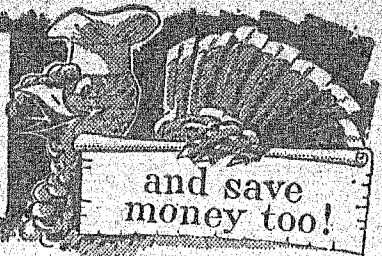

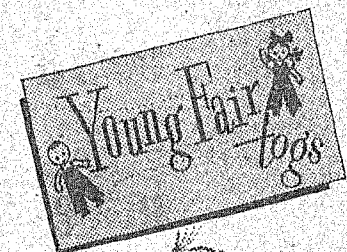

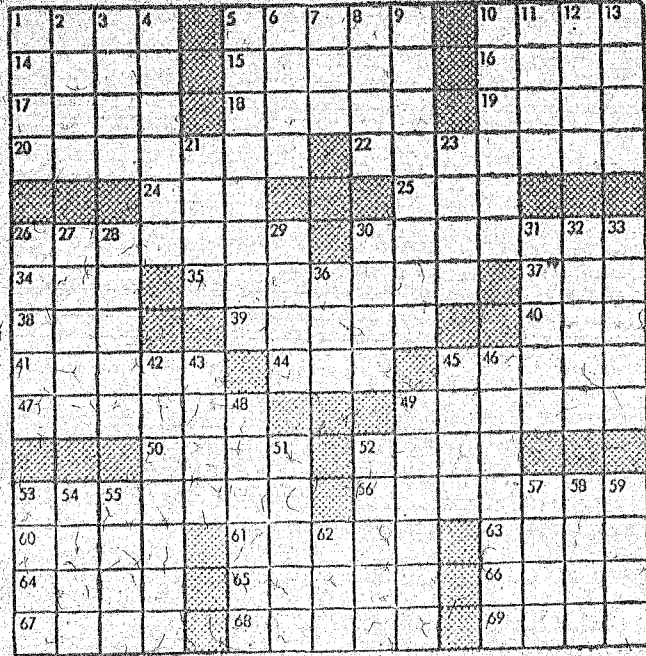

Cotton Referendum To Decide Important Questions

College Station. — How farmers vote in the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held throughout the Nation's cotton-growing area on Dec. 15 will determine whether quota penalties will apply, the kind of allotment program in effect, and also the level of price support for 1959-

crop cotton. The referendum therefore is of vital concern to every cotton grower, says Searcy M. Ferguson, Chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, the chairman explains, if at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, farm operators will have an opportunity to elect a choice between (A) complying with their "regular" farm allotments — with upland cotton, or (B) complying with an increased farm allotments 40 percent larger than the "regular" farm allotment — with support at a level 15 percent of parity lower than under the first choice; quota penalties will apply to any cotton produced in excess of the chosen allotment.

If more than one-third of the votes are against quotas, there would be no quota penalties, only the "regular" allotments would be available, and the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 50 percent of parity.

All farmers who are engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

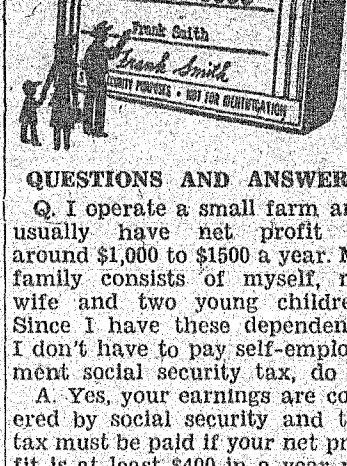



All holiday leaves and cruises off have been cancelled and all personnel will work during the peak hours of traffic. Radar will be pressed into use extensively in an attempt to control speed.

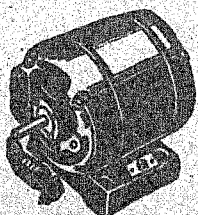
