What Edwin Markham said of Abraham Lincoln can well be said of John the Baptist: "One fire was on his spirit, one resolve — To send the keen ax to the root of wrong, Clearing a free way for the feet of God." PRAYER:





G. I. Insurance Holders Can Add Low Cost Disability

Opportunity for veterans holding National Şervice Life Insurance (NSLI) to buy a low cost new type of total disability income rider for their GI policies is now open, Dr. George T. Mc-Mahan, Manager of the VA Center in Waco, said today.

.Under the new type rider, policyholders who become totally disabled from any cause, before age 60, and while their rider is in effect, will receive an income of \$10 per month for each \$1,000 face amount of their GI policies.

Previous maximum was \$5 per month. Those with the old type rider can get the new at a slight extra cost and a physical examination, except a limited number of service-disabled veterans who Fort Lewis, Wash. (AHTNC) — were sold the original rider since Army Warrant Officer Martin L. April, 1951.

Although a physical examination is required, policyholders may be examined by local physicians, provided VA medical application forms are used.






